

### BIG YIELD POTATOES

Yoca Farmer Raises Sixty Bushels to the Acre and Markets Crop at Good Prices.

That McCulloch county is a farming county wherein the practice of the diversification of crops is a sure winner is brought more forcibly to our attention each week, as through conversation with our farmers and careful reading of our correspondent's letters we get better posted on the country's resources.


