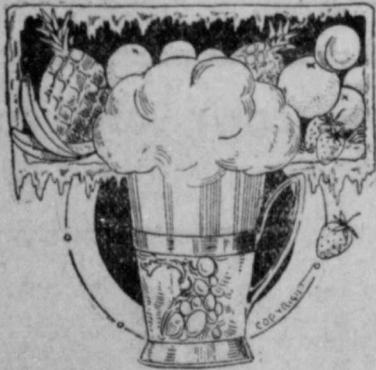
Tom and Will Bradley of Fife, were here Monday.

TO ISSUE ROAD BONDS

Commercial Club Decides to Get in Behind a Road Bond Issue for Precinct No. 1, McCulloch County.

The good roads committee of the Brady Commercial Club has been very busy since its appointment some two weeks ago. Messrs. Thos. Bell and Frank Bennett were sent to Brownwood last week to investigate the road work being done in the Brownwood precinct and for which bonds to the amount of \$100,000 were recently issued. They found less than half the money spent and a great deal more work accomplished than had been anticipated, and the roads being built are a credit to any country.

On Sunday Mr. F. A. Gayle who has charge of the road work in Brown county, came to Brady by invitation of the committee. He was given an auto ride over all the principal roads leading out of Brady, and he was enthusiastic at the prospect of this county being able to construct first-class roads at a nominal cost. Mr. Gayle is an expert in road building, and he says he never saw better opportunities for road building than here. He estimates that the Brady precinct with an issue of \$75,000 can construct fifty miles of the best roads in the world. His plan as recommended is to grade the roads, making the proper drainage ditches, and covering the road with crushed rock, which is better than gravel and can be had at a less cost.

Mr. Gayle had no selfish motive in making the estimate for the club, as he has contracts ahead of him which will preclude his company from even putting in a bid on the work. He recommends strongly that after the bonds are issued, a competent civil engineer be employed to lay out the work, and that then the construction work be placed in the hands of a competent superintendent, and no contract let for the job as a whole.

The board of directors of the club held a meeting Monday afternoon, at which time Mr. Gayle made his report. After a serious discussion a motion prevailed that a petition be prepared asking the commissioners court to order a bond election for Precinct No. 1 in the sum of \$75,000. A committee consisting of Judge F. M. Newman, Joe Matthews, V. T. Randall and S. S. Graham was appointed to take charge of the matter and start the ball to rolling.

The residence of County Attorney John E. Brown, which was under course of construction in the southwest portion of the city, was considerably damaged last Friday at 3:00 p. m. by a monster whirlwind. The miniature cyclone struck the house from the southwest, entering at a place where the siding had not yet been placed, and bodily lifted the structure from its brick piers, moving the entire building several feet. All the brick piers were torn down except the two at the corner where the wind entered. This corner was lifted clear and the bricks were undisturbed. A quantity of shiplap which was laying on top of the house was lifted and scattered for a hundred yards. The occurrence was quite in the nature of a phenomenon, as the sky was clear and no sign of storm cloud.

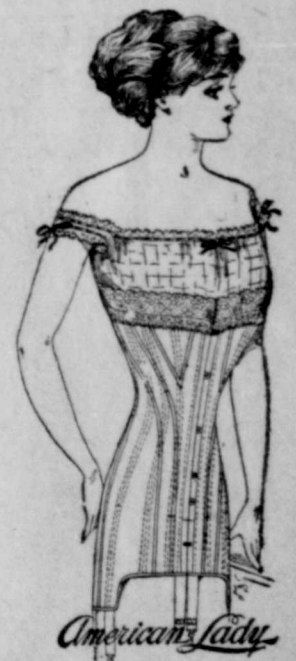

School Trustee Election.

Only 85 votes were polled Saturday in the election for school trustees. There were three to elect and the following good men were elected: Thos. Bell, E. E. Willoughby and T. J. Bradley. The school board met yesterday and these gentlemen qualified. Mr. Bell was elected president and A. C. Baze secretary of the board. Mr. Baze has been secretary for several years, and has made a good one, and although he asked to be relieved his fellow trustees would not permit. There is not a man in Brady with a greater love for and interest in school matters than Albert Baze and as secretary of the board he is the right man in the right place.

T. J. Bradley was elected as assessor and collector and will assume the duties of the office as soon as he completes the scholastic census. The election of three new men on the board will have no bearing on school matters as there is no friction of any sort nor any dissatisfaction with previous methods. Neither is there any dissatisfaction regarding the school management under Supt. M. L. Stallings' regime, and the very efficient work that gentleman has done in the past is practical assurance that when the board meets to elect a faculty in the near future Mr. Stallings will be the unanimous choice of the board for superintendent another term.

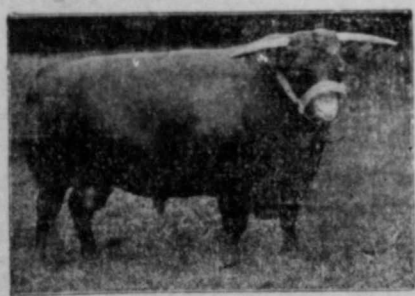

The following friends were the guests of Miss Gladys Phillips on Thursday afternoon to assist in celebrating her eleventh anniversary:

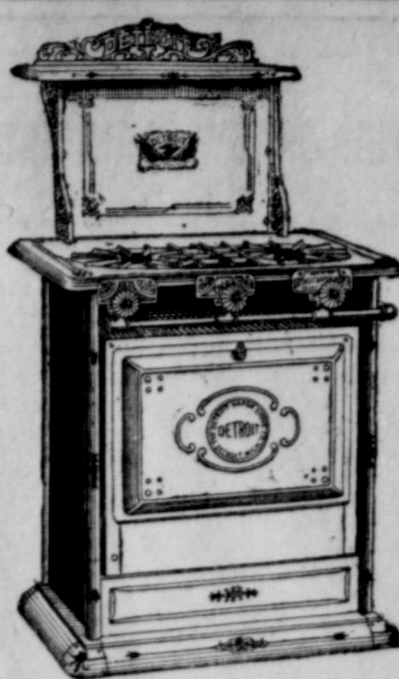

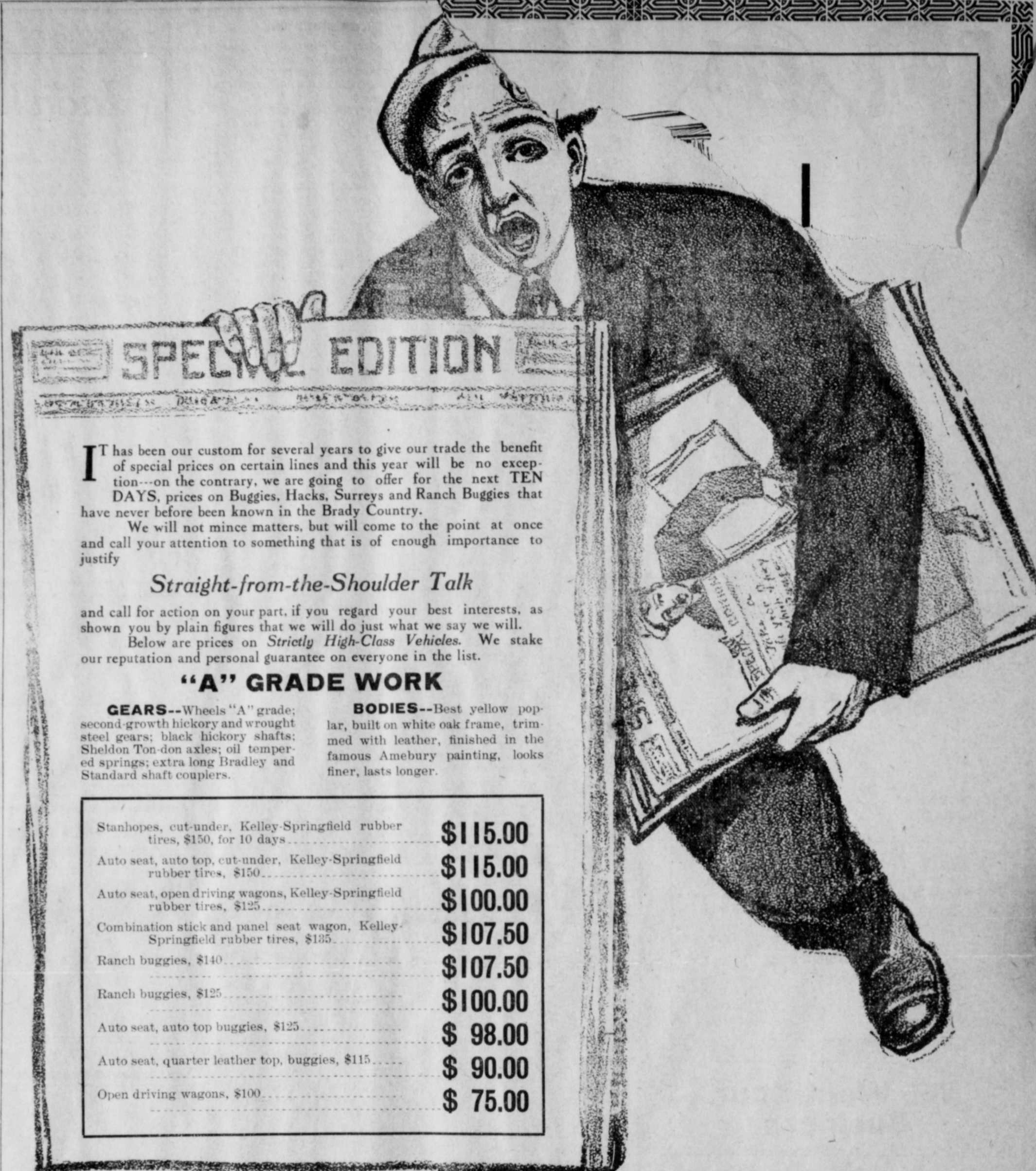
