THROUGH TO FREDERICKS-BURG VERY PROBABLE.

San Antonians Determined to Build—Frisco Can Connect at Fredericksburg.

Interest just now is centered in the trip of the Frisco officials from Brady to San Antonio by way of Mason and Fredericksburg. The officials are very conservative in their statements and do not give a great deal of information as to their intentions. However, it is evident from the statement given out by Mr. Yoakum that the Frisco would be very glad to build the extension to Fredericksburg, providing some other parties would build the road from Fredericksburg to San Antonio. The reason for the Frisco's reluctance to building between these two points is that the intermediate country is indescribably rough, and presents a herculean task to the railroad builder. The very best grade they could possibly obtain would be one and a half per cent.

Fredericksburg citizens hailed the coming of the official party with delight and were ready with a proposition. They proposed to give the Frisco \$200,-000 bonus, right-ofway through the county and the two grades, one from Fredericksburg to Waring, where the Frisco would connect with the Sap road, and the other a ten mile grade from Fredericksburg toward Llano. The latter would be of use to the Frisco only for protection from encroachment upon its territory by the H. & T. C. extending from Llano. The proposition obligated the Frisco to give Fredericksburg through connection with San Antonio, and required that an answer be made within 60 days.



Why should the saloon and its advocates try to make sensible people believe that they prefer local option to prohibition because it is a more effective restraint on the traffic. One would almost be led to believe at this time that they are the originators of local option in our state, and its foremost advocates in such elections. But of course they fight it by fair means or fraud, and because they know that statewide prohibition will prove more disastrous to the traffic, by so much is their opposition to it increased. I wonder if those respectable and honest anti-prohibitionists who claim that they are in this fight from purely patriotic and exalted motives, really deceive the saloonkeepers themselves. I believe if one should speak from the heart he would say to one and all from the governor down-or up-"Oh, you are my friend all right, but I pity your patriotism!" 



LIQUOR SHIPPED BY EXPRESS INTO THE PROHIBITION STATES.

The Interetate Commerce Commission Has Developed That the Traffic Will Approximate Twenty Million Gallons Annually-Conclusive Evidence from Authoritative Source on Failure of Prohibition Theory.

(Associated Press Report.)

Washington, June 23.-Approximately 20,000,000 gallons of liquors annually are shipped by express, principally from mail order houses, directly to consumers in prohibition states. This startling fact was developed today in an inquiry conducted by the interstate commerce commission.

The commission held that the express requirement that liquor containers should be packed in corrugated paper cartons was reasonable, but that the charge for transportation based upon arbitrary weights, eighteen pounds for a gallon of whisky packed, was unreasonable and that the discrimination against stone jugs also was unreasonable.

Fostered by Prohibition.

Commissioner McChord, who conducted the inquiry, points out that the industry directly concerned is that of the mail order liquor houses.

"It was the spread of the prohibition movement," the opinion says, "that care vitality to this character of traffic in liquor, with statewide prohibition came the interstate traffic in liquor. The decision of the supreme court that this traffic was interstate and, therefore, superior to interference by the state governments gave the industry a tremendous impetus, and established the express companies as the carriers of practically the whole of this traffic.

Startling Figures.

"Jacksonville, Pla., probably the largest shipping point for liquor in the outh, sends out between 3,000 and 4,000 packages of one and two gailons daily, or a total of about one and one-half million gallons a year. Chattanoga, Tenn., ships about 786,000 gallons; Richmond, 546,720 gallons; Petersburg, 268,128; Pensacola, 267,760; New Orleans, 255,856; Augusta, 215,150, and Norfolk, Cairo (Ill.), Emporia (Va.), Louisville, Portsmouth (Va.), Roanoke (Va.) and Savan- Saturday morning, and a splennah ship more than 100,000 gallons each annually.

Cheap Whisky for Negroes.

"The movement is much more active in the south than in other sections of the country, partly because of the extent of the prohibition territory in that section, partly because of the large quantities of very cheap whisky manufactured and shipped there for the consumption of the negro population.

The opinion concludes with the statement that although it is not the function of the commission to dwell on the moral aspect of the question, it is considered that the traffic has an evil effect and is one of the important factors in the race problem of the south.

The 20 million gallons of whisky shipped in accordance to the above state ment, is not included in any of the statements of distilled spirits or fermented liquors produced in the prohibition states; because this was shipped into the state and not produced. In other words, prohibition states consume 2,002,532 gallons distilled spirits produced in these states, and in addition thereto, 20 million gallons shipped in, making a total of 22,002,532 gallons of whisky sold and consumed in the prohibition states during the years 1909 and 1910, which has been accounted for; to say nothing of the numerous shipments smuggled over the lines for which no accounting has been made. Besides this, 892,208 barrels of beer, containing 31 gallons each, or a total of 27,658,293 gallons, was produced, to say nothing of the beer shipped into prohibition states.

Bear in mind that the above is taken from the prohibition hand book and the official records. Statewide pro bition will cost the taxpayers of Texas \$1,137,502.33, or more than two dollars per head for each voter, without a single redeeming feature. (Advertisement,

THIRD: All men who were 60 years of age on the 1st day of January, 1910, are entitled to vote without Exemption Certificate of a

Poll Tax receipt excepting those who live in a city of 10,000 or more, in which event they must procure an Exemption Certificate. FOURTH: All men coming from other states of the Union since January 1st, 1910, can vote without a Poll Tax Receipt or an Exemption

Certificate by making affidavit when ho offers to vote. FIFTH: All men who are blind, deaf, dumb or who have lost a hand or limb. These people are not required to have a Poll Tax Receipt or an Exemption Certificate in any section except in cities over 10,000. In any election any person offering to vote must have resided in the

State one year; in the county six months; and if the election is for a precinct only, he must have resided in that precinct six months; but if in election involves the whole county of the State he votes in the precinct where he resides on the day of the election. But in c'ies of over 10,000, eight days before the election he will have to notify the Tax Collector of his change of residence from the ward in which he had procured his Poll Tax Receipt or Exemption Certificate to the new ward in which he may live on the day of the balloting.

Any voter who has resided in the county since January 1st, 1910, can vote if the collector's receipt shows by the stub that it is an exact copy of the Poll Tax Receipt held by the voter.

The only time to obtain Poll Tax Receipts or Exemption Certificates upon which you can vote is between October 1st, 1910, and January 31st, 1911, inclusive. A Poll Tax Receipt obtained on or after February 1st, 1911, does not entitle the holder to vote in 1911.





Prominent Oklahoma Man Tells of Benefits.

In their effort to become enlightened concerning the value of prohibition to a community, the voters of Utah are securing information from business men in prohibition states. A Salt Lake City paper publishes the following letter from J. H. Johnson, secretary of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Com-

"Prohibition had a very material effect in the betterment of legitimate lines of business in Oklahoma City.

"Legitimate enterprises did almost immediately occupy the property formerly occupied by saloons and gamblers and at quite as good a rental figure as was ever paid by the illegitimate business.

POPULATION INCREASES "Our city did not lose business on account of the closing of saloons, but to the contrary appeared to progress even more rapidly than ever before in the history of the city. According to the federal census, we had but 32,000 people when the saloons were closed in 1907. and according to the federal census of 1910 we had 64,205 people, or an increase of 100 per cent in little less than three

PRICES RISE STEADILY. "It did not affect the price of real estate adversely, even temporarily, nor would I say that the closing of the saloons created a boom in the price of real estate; but there was a steady increase which was not in any way retarded by the closing of the saloons.

"Taxes were increased somewhat upon property values.
