## ATTRACTING ATTENTION

MCCULLOCH COUNTY EXHIBIT A SPLENDID ONE.

Interest in McCulloch County in Evidence Daily—Advertising Literature Takes.

The McCulloch county exhibit at the Dallas Fair is without a question one of the most attractive on the grounds, and not a day passes but what Sec. Hardison, who has the exhibit in charge, is made to expatiate upon the soil, the climate, the minerals, the resources and the opportunities in Grand Old McCulloch.

Secretary Hardison was fortunate in obtaining one of the most attractive locations in the agricultural hall, the booth being on the east end of the hall just at the entrance and, being the corner booth, gives a view from two directions.

One of the first things about the exhibit to attract the eye is the superb showing of mohair rugs, which never fails to excite comment from the visitors. A purchaser was on hand the very first day, and although asked a good price stood ready to make good. However, the rugs will remain a part of the exhibit until after the close of the fair. Besides this there is a most attractive display of vegetables and garden products, grain, fruit and farm products, as well as samples of various woods grown in the county. There is nothing elaborate about the exhibit, and for this reason there is nothing overdone. The articles are arranged for the best effect, and consequently the exhibit is at once pleasing and striking.

A number of actual photos taken on the farm of Geo. Darley, of Voca, help out the exhibit, and Secretary Hardison is well supplied with booklets and souvenir post cards of the Brady country, which never fail to find favor with the visitors, and fulfill their mission of advertising the best county and country in Texas.

The exhibit was lacking one box of being complete the first of this week, the box having failed to put in its appearance. By this time, no doubt the exhibit is complete. Aside from this, Secretary Hardison was fortunate in having all of his shipment come up in good shape with the exception of a single broken jar of fruit.

Jack McGaughy, the self-styled chicken man and cotton buyer, never fails to make a hit with his poultry exhibits, and the Brady fair was no exception. During the four days of the fair Mr. McGaughy sold \$150 worth of chickens, which is not only gratifying to himself, but means that McCulloch county poultry fanciers are taking to "good stuff."

### A Valuable Plant.

For a number of years C. S. Salter, of Brownwood, held the opinion that the ordinary milk weed, or thistle, which grows wild on our prairies, might have some value because of the long silky lint contained in the seed pods. He mentioned the matter to a number of cotton buyers, but they did not take much stock in his ideas. Finally he sent a sample of the lint direct to a large manufacturer in London, England, and was very much gratified the other day to receive a reply stating that the lint of this Kapoc (Akon), as they termed it, was valuable, and that they could contract for 3000 pounds per year in addition to what they now obtain from India.

The lint in question has a long silky fibre, thin as a cob web, and is manufactured into a cloth similar to silk. It would appear that here was a splendid opening for an entirely new line of industry that might some day rival the growing of cotton.

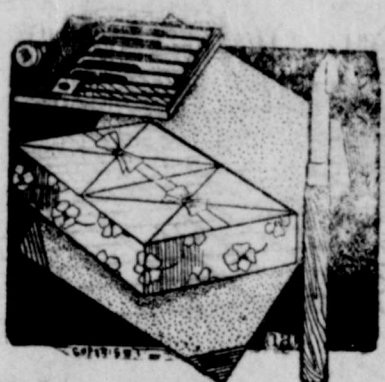

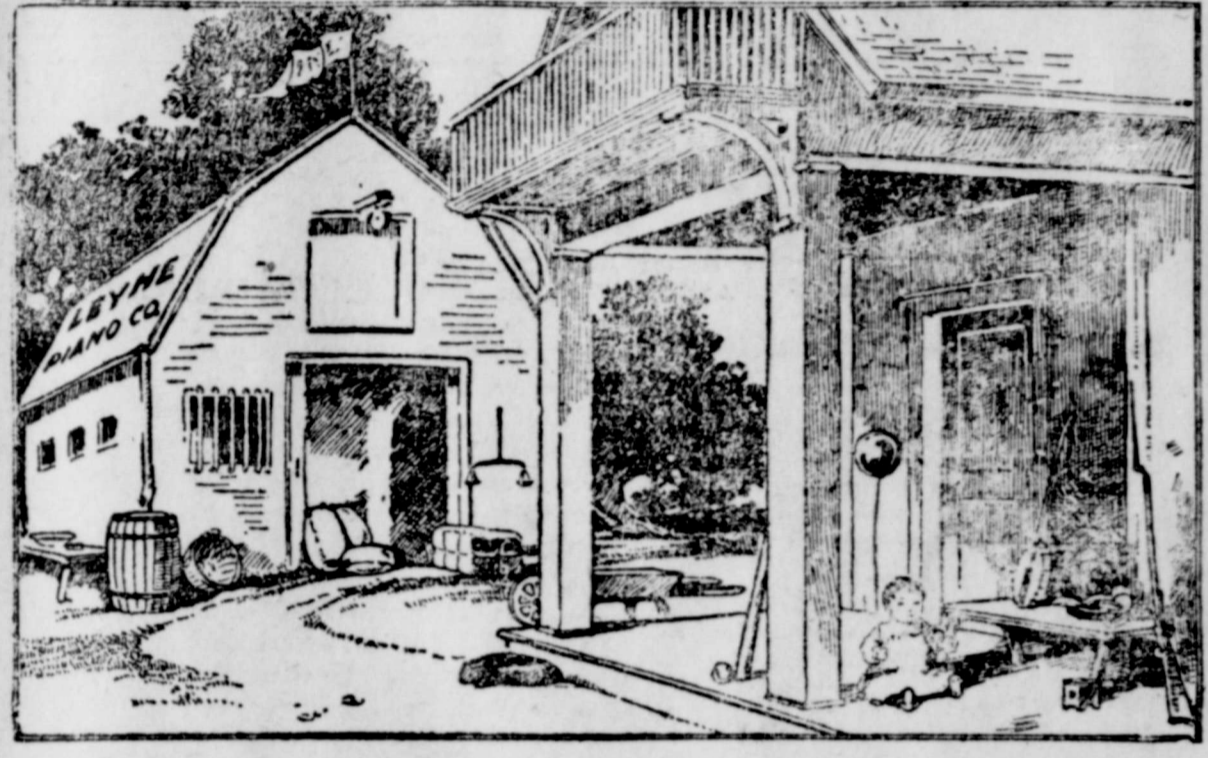

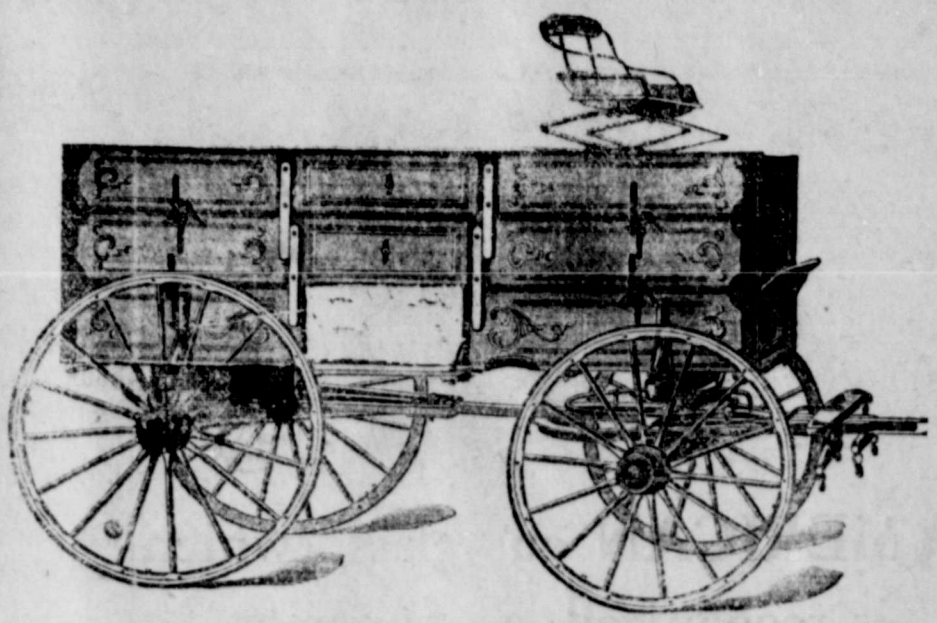
