## DEPOT NEAR COMPLETE

FREIGHT DEPOT WILL SOON BE IN SERVICE.

Splendid Progress Being Made on Union Passenger Depot. Most Artistic Appearance.

Work has been going rapidly forward on the freight depot, and within a very short time it will be ready for service. The depot is arranged with the Frisco offices at one end, while the Santa Fe offices will be at the opposite end. In the building, these great systems made their plans evidently with the view that Brady would experience a remarkable growth in the next few years, as the depot is amply large to accommodate twice the freight business of any ordinary town of the size of Brady.

The depot was placed with a view to handling the freight with the utmost facility, and with this object in mind changes were made several times in the original plans, and as a result the completion of the depot has been delayed several weeks. The depot has been built about 100 yards farther east than the original plans called for and where the foundation was originally set. This for the purpose of connecting the freight track with the main line before it reached the Bridge street crossing. The freight track is located on the north side of the building while the wagon track is on the south side, thereby giving easy approach for the purpose of loading out the freight.

Especially are the citizens of Brady proud of the way the new union depot is beginning to loom up. It is evident that the Santa Fe planned to build a depot in Brady that would be pointed to everywhere as a model. The exterior is of buff colored pressed brick, and is of a most pleasing style of architecture, while the interior will likewise be finished in pressed brick. The curbing for the sidewalks about the depot and along the main line have already been placed and hint at a most graceful and pleasing appearance. In spite of the gloomy and otherwise unfavorable weather, work on the depot is going steadily forward, and the early part of the new year will see the completion of the handsome depot on the Santa Fe, as well as the Frisco, system.

J. C. Nolan, superintendent of fuel, of the Frisco, was here Wednesday for a few hours. Mr. Nolan says that central west Texas can congratulate herself on the fact that the drought was not anything compared to what it was in the south-eastern states. All that scope of country from the tobacco fields of Virginia, he says, through the Carolinas, Georgia and into Florida experienced the most distressing drought known in fifty years, and crops are practically nil. Many of the largest cities in Georgia were entirely without water during a part of the summer and had to depend upon a limited supply from neighboring supplies. Mr. Nolan has just recently become identified with the Frisco lines, but is well acquainted with a large portion of Texas. He will locate his family in Fort Worth, and expects them to arrive from Georgia some time this week.

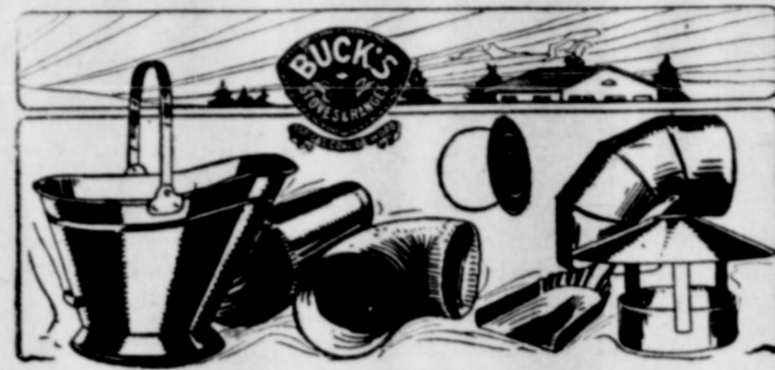

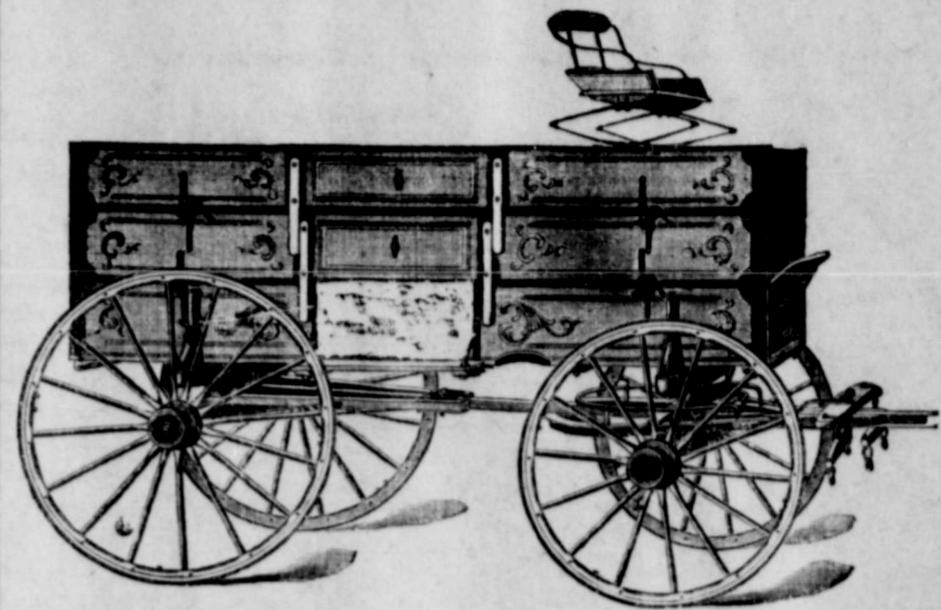

**FARM DEMONSTRATION DEPARTMENT**

J. W. Griffin, Demonstrator

Upon the inauguration of the farm demonstration work in the Southern states, it was thought best to outline some of the fundamental principles of good farming and to insist that the tillers of the soil should become familiar with them and practice them as the first step in the betterment of farm life. These principles are as follows:

- (1). Prepare a deep and well pulverized seed bed by breaking in the fall to a depth of 8 or 10 inches, according to soil, with implement that will not bring too much of the subsoil to the surface. The foregoing depths should be reached gradually if the field is broken with an ordinary turning plow. If a disc plow is used, it is safe to break to the above depth at once.
- (2). Use seed of the best variety, intelligently selected and carefully stored.
- (3). In cultivated crops give rows proper space suited to the soil, plant and climate.
- (4). Use intensive cultivation during the growing crop.
- (5). Secure a high content of humus in the soil by the use of lign and winter cover crops.
- (6). Carry out a systematic crop of rotation with a winter cover on southern farms.

It is the purpose of the farmers' co-operative work to insist upon such preparation of the soil as will furnish the best feeding ground for the roots and such as will provide at all times plenty of moisture for growing plants. It is better to secure 8, 10 or 12 inches of thoroughly pulverized soil filled with humus than to go deeper at the expense of thorough preparation. The presence of heat, air and moisture are essential to chemical and germ action in the preparation of plant food in the soil. The depths to which these penetrate the soil in the south depend upon the depth of

the plowing, provided the soil is well drained.

It has been proven without question that the roots penetrate soil deeper and feed deeper in deeply plowed land. Thus in general, it may be said that when soil is plowed 3 inches deep the plants have 3 inches of food, and when plowed 8 inches deep they have 8 inches of food. The fact that the bottom portions of the land are not as rich in available plant food as the top portion, shows the necessity of getting more air and heat down to them by deep tillage. More important matter in next week's issue.
