THE ATTEMPT to assassinate Pope John Paul is another indication of the terrorism which is threatening the future of our very civilization.

Terrorism has always been with us, at least on a small scale, but the events of the past week would indicate that it is an international problem, and is global in scope.

The turmoil in Northern Ireland in recent years is but another example of what can happen to a country when terrorists are able to gain a foothold.

By a strange twist of fate, the cover article in the current issue of the *Reader's Digest* deals with international terrorism. Now, police officials in Rome, and observers a half a world away try to decide if the attack last week on Pope John Paul was an individual act, or another part of the international terrorism.

Foreign correspondent Claire Sterling, in her *Digest* article, claims that such groups as the Irish Republican Army (IRA) and the Palestinian Liberation Organization (PLO) get their support from Communist Russia, and that their activities are sponsored to "devise a global revolutionary strategy to counter the global strategy of American imperialism."

In the early 1970s, most of the world's terrorism was occurring in the Middle East. First, the terrorists' goal was to destroy peace; later it was to resist attempts to restore peace.

The official U.S. reaction to the idea that international terrorists are backed and financed by Russia has been to soft-pedal that idea, or to deny it completely, as late as the Carter administration.

Recently, however, Secretary of State Alexander Haig was quoted as acknowledging the existence of the network, charging the Soviet Union with "seeking to foster, support and expand international terrorism through training, funding and equipping those who kill for political purposes."

In the Mid-East, the main terrorist activity has been hijacking of airplanes, several of which were exploded before a worldwide television audience. The taking of diplomatic hostages was the next step for the terrorists.

Mrs. Sterling claims that training camps for terrorists have been operated in Cuba, Africa, North Korea and in several Arab states.

Among those who trained in the terrorist camps were Iranians, who came by the thousands, she says, gaining experience for the Islamic Revolution.

Individuals who are trained by the terrorists become hired killers, with absolutely no regard for human life, it is pointed out.

They carry out their duties with religious zeal. They all become neo-Nazi, or communist in their thinking. Their "ends" justifies their "means." And if they are killed in their particular assignment, then so be it.

It is hard for the average American to conceive of this type of terrorism, but it's there. We have experienced it to some extent in our country, but nothing like the unsettled areas have.

Something must be done to curb the growth of this international terrorism. But it would be tough to fight. It is not the usual type of enemy, and not bound by geography nor region.

AND, LEST WE forget to make the point: Did you know that Italy has a strict gun control law? Yet, the law, which so many think would prevent violent crimes, failed to keep the Pope from being shot.

If we outlaw guns, as the saying goes, only outlaws will have guns: especially those who practice terrorism.

Following the top three students are Darla Morris (fourth, 92.68),

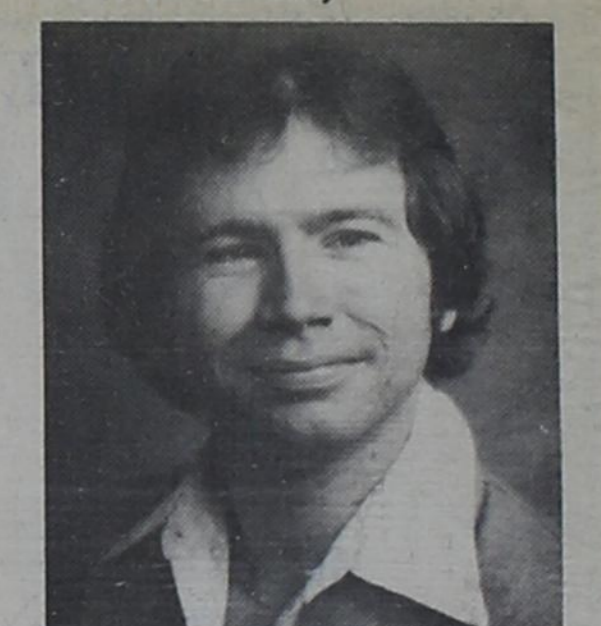

Grandson Killed In Houston

Former Bovina resident, Craig Skaggs, was killed in Houston, Tuesday, May 12.

Skaggs' body was discovered in a Houston motel room by a maid last Tuesday. He had gone to Houston from his residence in Canyon to hold a job interview with a Houston-area school district.

Harris County Medical Examiners report that Skaggs died from a heavy blow to the head. An unknown assailant is being sought in connections with the incident. Skaggs' wallet and his rented car were missing when he was found.

Skaggs was orphaned several years ago and was raised by his grandparents in Bovina. Mrs. E.A. Hromas is a survivor. He was a theater major at West Texas State in Canyon.

He was well-known and highly regarded in the area as the young man who "looked like John Denver" and sold programs at the "TEXAS" outdoor musical drama in Palo Duro Canyon each summer. He had been a member of the "TEXAS" hospitality staff for a number of years.

He was also employed part-time at a Seven-Eleven store in Canyon.

Funeral arrangements were conducted by Laurel Land Funeral Home in Ft. Worth. No details regarding the funeral and interment were available to the newspaper.

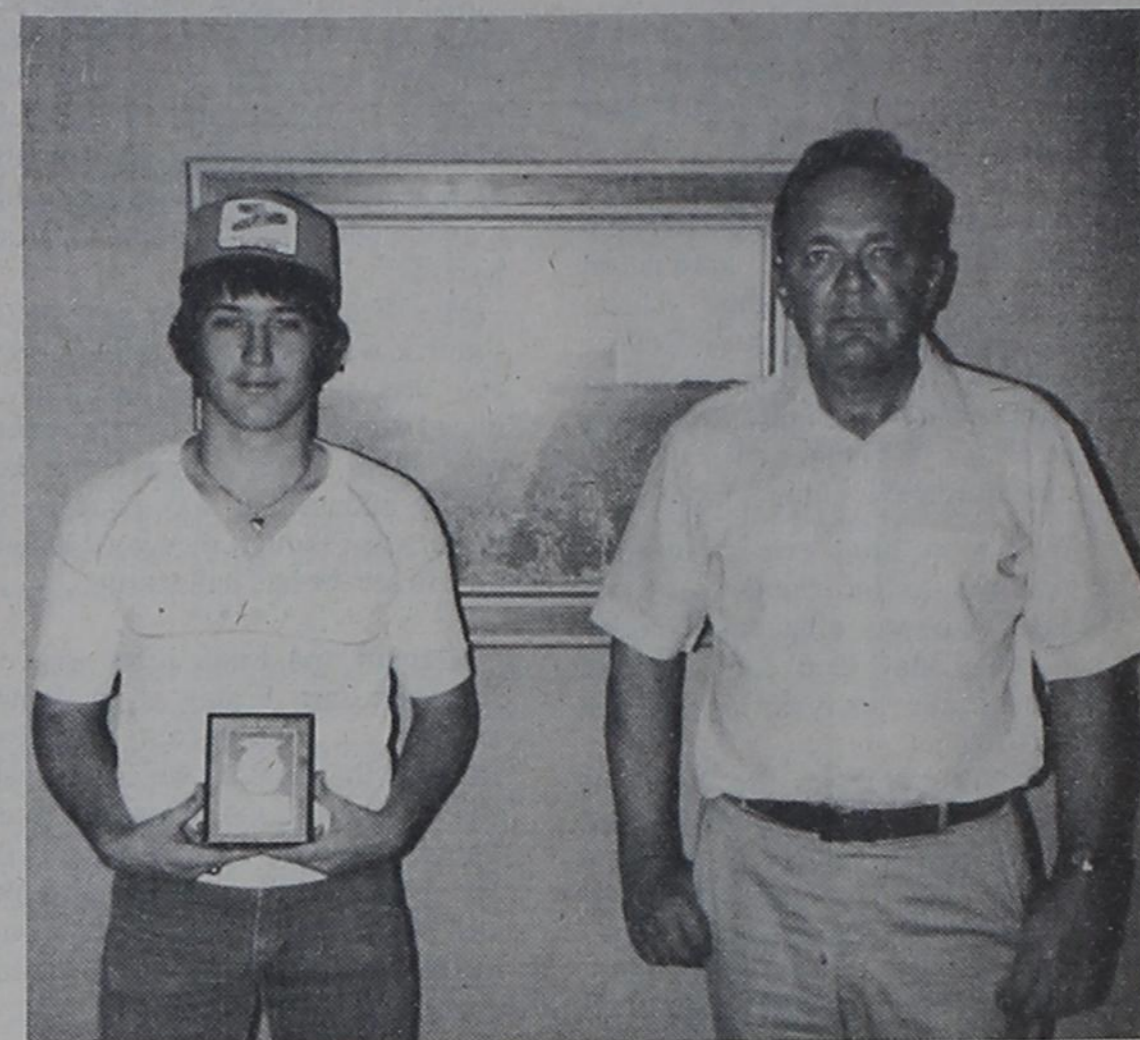
