

Old-Time Award Stirs Okla. Lane Memories

Harold Carpenter, who is president of the exes organization, this week dug out an old trophy which will stir up memories for some of the many per-

sons planning to attend the reunion.

The old loving cup, which doesn't seem to be too much worse off for the wear, is engraved, "Parmer County All-Around Championship 1932." The trophy was bought jointly

by the five schools in Parmer County at that time to be awarded annually to the school which garnered the most points in the interscholastic events, literary and athletic. A stipulation to the award was that a school should win the cup three years

in a row, it would belong to that school permanently.

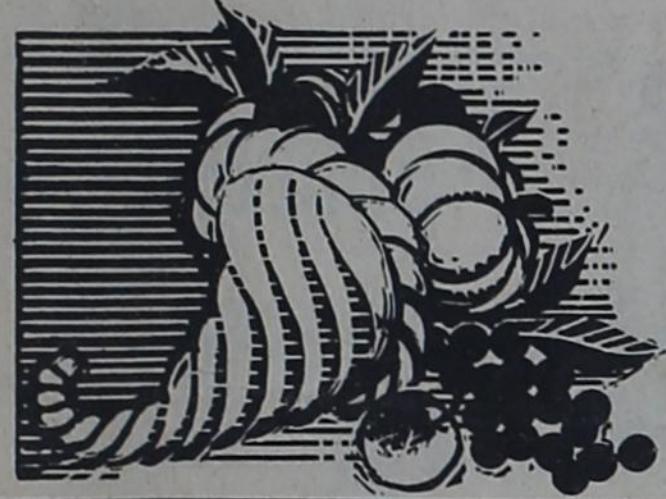
Oklahoma Lane School, although it did not field a football team, managed enough points through its other endeavors to latch onto the trophy for three straight years, and

thus none of the other county schools ever received the award. For some unknown reason the schools never got around to buying another loving cup and so the award was forgotten.

When the school at Oklahoma Lane consolidated with Farwell in 1948, the late R. S. Tucker, custodian, took all the trophies and the case and zealously guarded the mementoes. When ill health forced his retirement, Mr. Tucker contacted

Carpenter who took the prized possessions for safe keeping.

And the old loving cup is sure to cause many "remember when" comments when the exes get together Friday night at the community building.

Certainly there's much to be thankful for during this Thanksgiving season.

For some of us, there will be still more if the Texas Aggies upset the Texas Longhorns, currently ranked the Number One team in all of college football, come tomorrow in the traditional Southwest Conference battle between the two schools.

As we pointed out in this space recently, our own District 3-A was an interesting league this year. We'd like to think greater interest was created by the addition of two more teams, Happy and Hart, to bring the total number in the loop to eight. However, that probably isn't the case since those two teams won only one district game between them throughout the 10-week season.

While the Bovina Mustangs finished in tie for third and fourth places, they had as much to say as anybody about the district representative to the bi-district contest.

Kress won the district, of course, with a 6-1 record. That loss was to Vega. When the Vega team played the Mustangs here in the next-to-last game of the year, its record was 4-1 and the Longhorns were tied for the league's top spot. Bovina upset the Longhorns, 12-6, and the 'Horns went on to win over Farwell the next week. Had Vega won over Bovina as the dope sheet said it should, the Longhorns would have won the district championship instead of Kress. Or, the two teams would have been tied for the top spot and Vega would have been the district representative in the playoffs because of its win over Kress.

Finishing with 5-2 records and tied for second and third places were Sudan and the aforementioned Vega. The Longhorns lost to Sudan as well as the Mustangs. Sudan lost to Kress and to Springlake-Earth.

While the Farwell team won over Bovina, the Steers ended up being tied with the Mustangs in the district standings. Each team had a 4-3 mark. Farwell lost to Kress, Sudan and Vega. Mustangs' losses were to Farwell, Kress and Sudan.

Springlake-Earth finished sixth all by itself with a 3-4 mark. The Wolverines lost to Bovina, Kress, Farwell and Vega after being expected to be one of the district's top teams. S-E was handicapped by injuries to some extent, but who wasn't? Their upset at the hands of the Mustangs might have turned their chances of a good year into a season of mediocrity.

Happy, which probably had a better team than its record indicated, finished seventh and not last only because Hart was in the loop. The Cowboys' only win was over Hart.

And Hart just had a bad year. From Hart School officials we learned, when we attended the Hart-Bovina season finale, that most minor bad things which can happen to a high school football squad had happened to this herd of Longhorns.

Hart school people felt their initiation into Class A ranks after promotion from their former Class B district was a bit severe. They took pretty good licks from most district schools and privately expressed

For Those Who Qualify --

School Board Sets Free Lunch Policy

Board of trustees approved an audit report for the past year and put into effect a new program for free and reduced-price lunches for students who qualify at a regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The new school lunch policy, which appears later in this report, is not much different than the policy which has been in effect in the past, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs. The new policy is in accordance with a recommendation of the National School Lunch Room Program. A major portion of the expense of the free and reduced price lunches will be paid by the federal government. In the past, the local school district paid the cost of the free lunches.

In other action, the board formally approved the use of rooms in the high school building for use by the Adult Education Program which is now in progress.

The audit which the board approved at the Monday night session was prepared by Cornell and Company of Amarillo and covered the fiscal year which ended August 31. A statement of the school district's cash receipts and disbursements will be published in next week's issue of The Blade.

Following is the free and reduced price lunch policy passed by the school board:

"The Bovina Independent School District has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. The school lunchrooms serves a well-balanced

nutritious lunch each day. The charge to students who can pay is 40 cents in grades kindergarten through grade five and 45 cents in grades 6-12. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those students determined by their school principal to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches. "Families who feel that they

are eligible for free or reduced price lunches may apply. Application may be made by an adult family member from 8 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. on school days in the office of the school principal where the child attends school. A new application must be filed by those whose children have been receiving free or reduced price lunches. All applications will be reviewed promptly, and within five days the family will be

notified in writing as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in confidence.

"Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood, or any disaster of this nature; seasonal unemployment and similar situations will be considered.

"If the family is not satisfied with the decision made on their application it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, at his office in Bovina Schools, and he will review the application with them and make a decision.

"The school district's formal free and reduced price policy statement and the procedure that will be followed when a decision is appealed are on file

In the Christmas issue of The Blade, a half-page community Christmas card, listing the names of those who have contributed to the fund, is published.

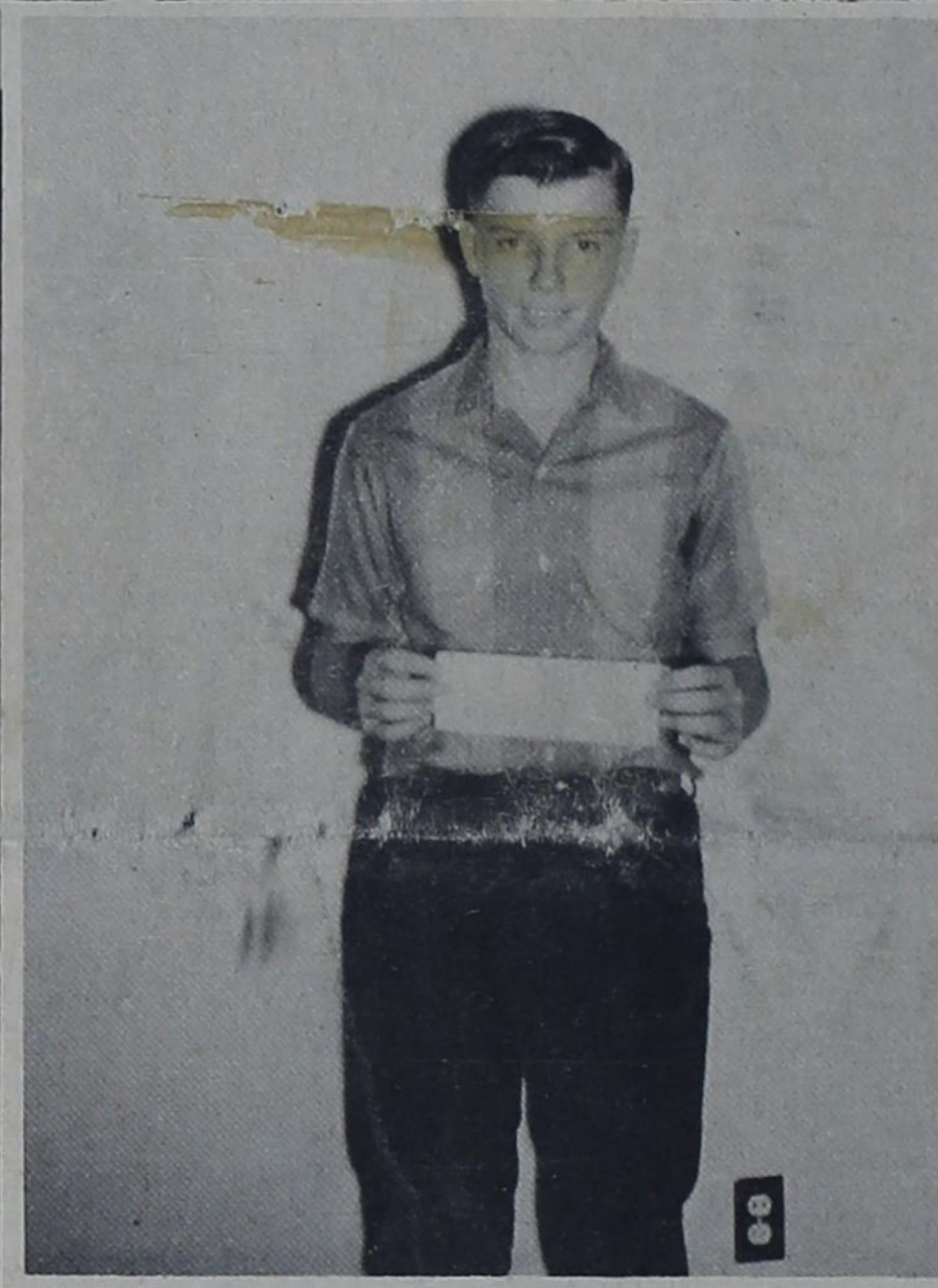

Propose Pay Raise For County Workers

A pay raise is scheduled for officials and employees of Parmer County.

The commissioners court, in a recent meeting, agreed to a \$45 per month increase for each person on the county payroll.

A public hearing in regard to the pay raise has been set for Monday, December 14, in the County Court Room in the Courthouse at Farwell. The hearing will begin at 2 p.m.,

according to County Judge Archie Tarter.

Announcement of the hearing is officially made in a legal notice in this week's issue of The Blade.

If the proposed increase is given approval following the scheduled hearing, it will go into effect January 1, according to C. H. (Charlie) Jefferson, county commissioner in Precinct Two -- Bovina and Rhea.

The last pay raise for county employees was three years ago,

in '67. The increase then was for 10 per cent of each employee's salary.

Under the present plan for increasing each salary by the same amount, \$45 per month, instead of a percentage, those people who make less will receive the same amount of increase, dollar-wise.

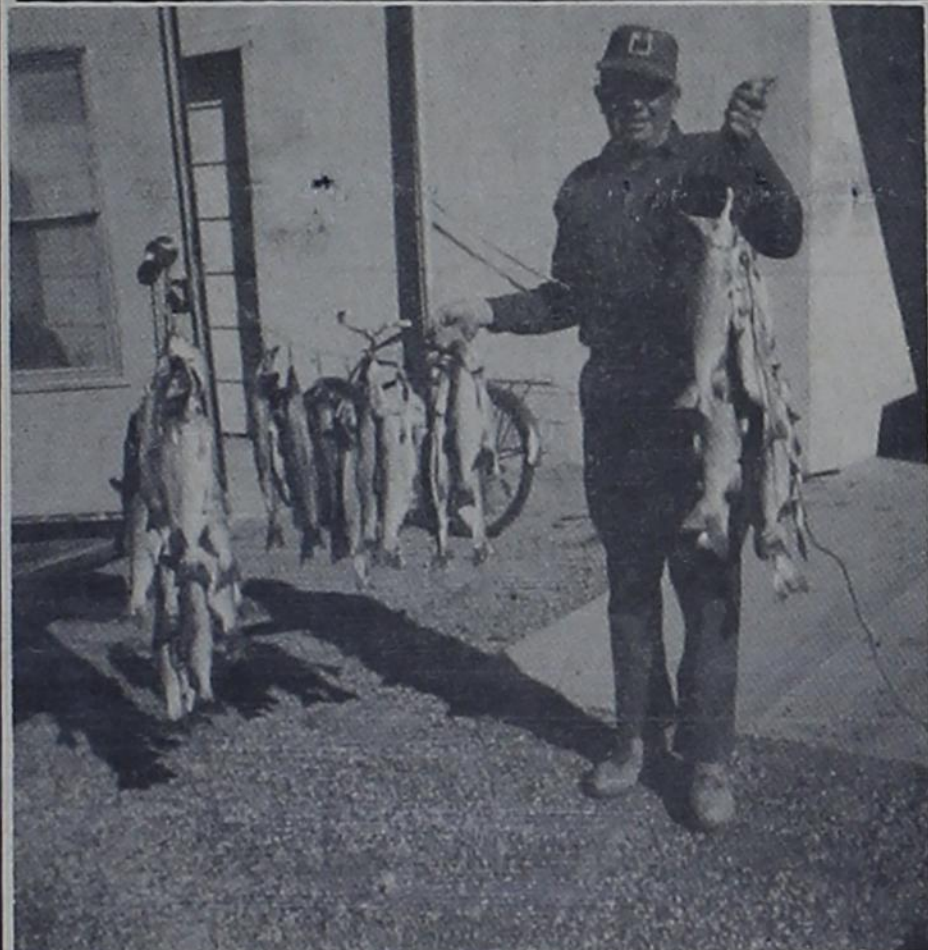

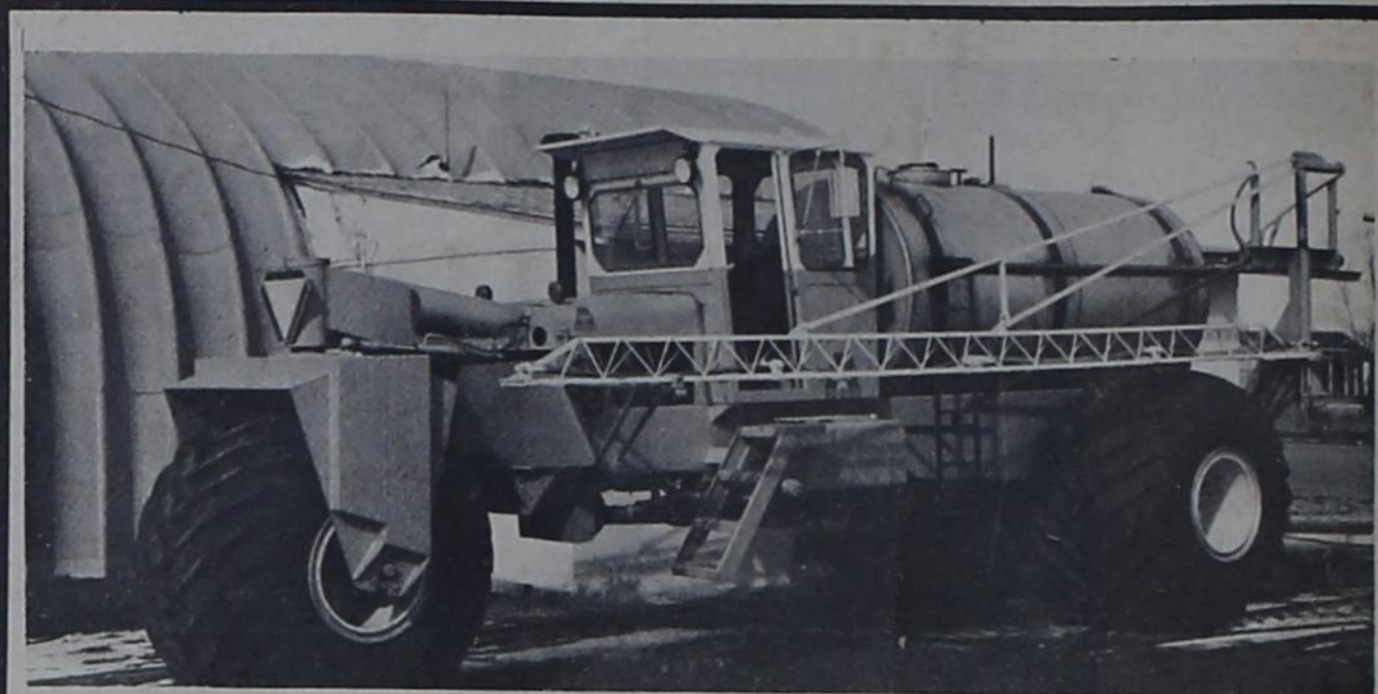
The cantata will be presented under the direction of Betty Hawkins, music director of the church.

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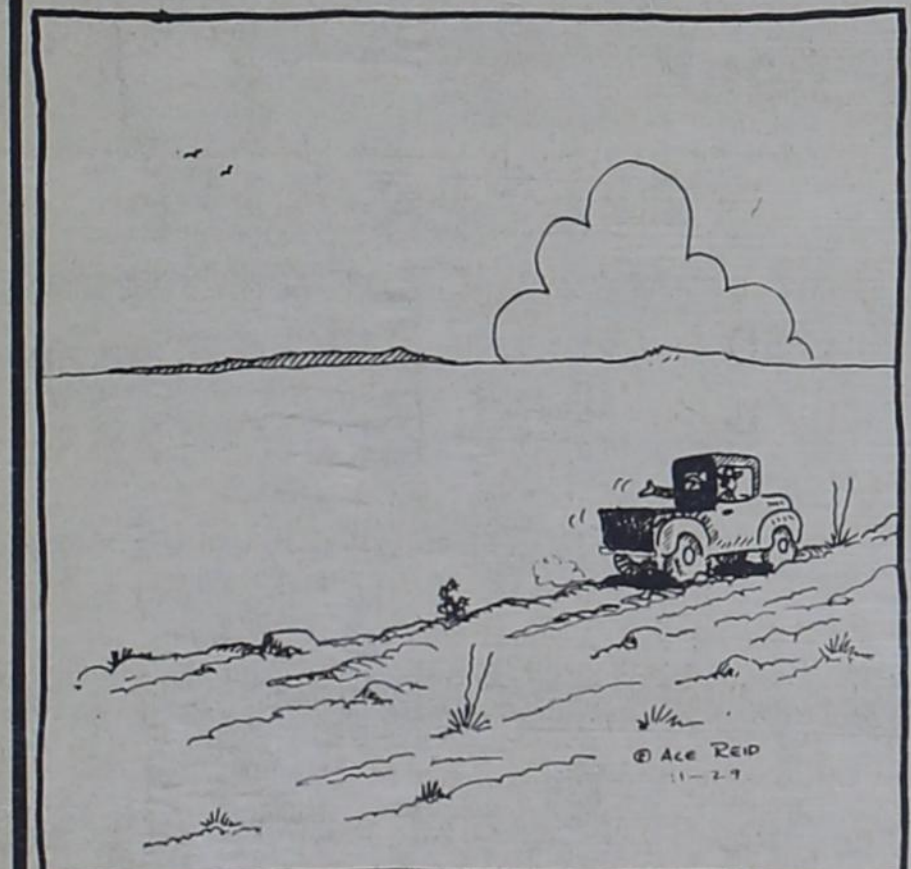

Friona Furies Win In Powder Puff Tilt

The Friona Furies picked up a first quarter touchdown on an eight-yard pass play and went on to defeat the Bovina Babes, 6-0, in a female flag football game here Saturday night.

Some \$400 was earned from ticket sales to the unusual sporting event by the sponsoring organization, Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The money will go toward providing a chain-link fence for Bovina's new city park.

The contest was marred by a head injury to Bovina's Jan Heard, who left the game in the

fourth period after being hurt for the second time in the game. Mrs. Heard was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona by ambulance. She suffered a concussion and was confined to the hospital through early this week.

There was a good crowd on hand for the game considering the lack of cooperation by the weatherman. High winds prevailed throughout the tilt, making viewing from the stands uncomfortable for spectators. Many watched from cars, however. Also, tickets to the game

were sold in advance and this added to the gross income for the game.

Except for Friona's scoring play, the game was a defensive battle. Bovina's leading yardage maker was fullback Effie Mae Shepard.

Called the Powder Puff Bowl of 1970, the game featured male cheerleaders. Vocally leading the Babes on were Neal Mager, Tommy Bonds and Wayne Spears. They tossed powder puffs -- instead of the traditional miniature footballs -- to the crowd at one point during the game.

Don Spring was coach of the Babes and was the leader of the promotion for the Bovina Chamber.

The game turned out to be "rougher" than was anticipated for flag football. There were instances of temper displays by participants in the game.

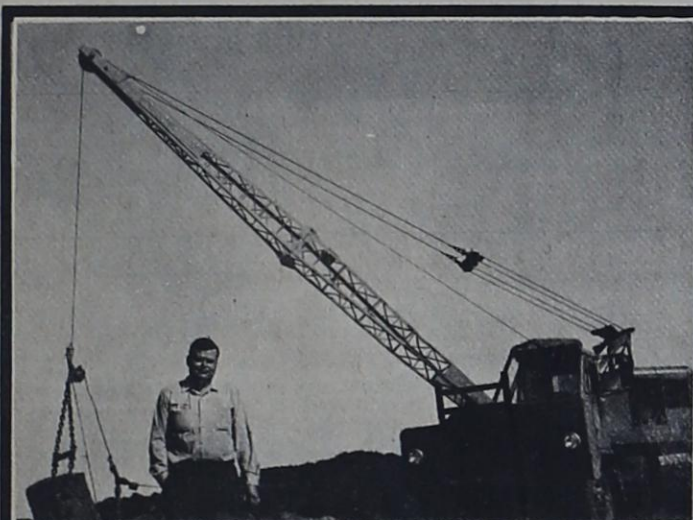

Each family is to bring a covered dish for the Thanksgiving supper to start at 7 p.m. The turkey will be furnished.



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
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Stokes, Allen Vows Read Here Tuesday

Jean likes recipes that are simple and quick to prepare, as these are she shares with Blade readers this week.

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/4 pound salt pork
- 1/2 c. chopped green pepper
- 2 t. chili powder
- 2 T. brown sugar
- 1/2 t. dry mustard
- 1/4 t. oregano
- 2 c. canned tomatoes
- salt to taste

Wash beans, bring the 6 cups water to boiling, add the beans and boil about 2 minutes. Cover, removed from heat and let stand one hour.

Place large pan with soaked beans and soaking water over high heat. Add onion, garlic, bay leaves and salt pork. Bring to boiling point rapidly, reduce heat to simmer, cook with tight fitting lid and simmer for 1 1/2 hours.

Add remaining ingredients, except salt. Bring to boiling point rapidly, reduce heat to simmer. Add salt to taste, lower and simmer for 2 more hours.

BREAD

- 4 1/2 c. flour
 - 4 t. baking powder
 - 1/2 t. soda
 - 1 t. salt
 - 1/4 c. sugar
 - 1/4 c. shortening
 - 1 pkg. yeast dissolved in 1/4 c. warm water
 - 2 c. buttermilk
- Bake at 350 degrees. This can be stored in tightly covered container for several days and used as needed.

- ### BUCKAROO BEANS
- 2 c. pinto beans
 - 6 c. water

FLAVORFUL SAND TARTS

- 1 c. margarine
- 2 c. sifted flour
- 1/4 c. sifted powdered sugar
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 c. finely chopped nuts (pecans)
- 3 t. vanilla
- 1 c. sifted powdered sugar (for rolling cookies)

Cream margarine, sift together the flour, 1/4 cup powdered sugar and baking powder. Add gradually to creamed margarine, mixing well. Stir in pecans and vanilla. With fingers shape into crescents and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 10 to 12 minutes or until delicately browned. While still hot roll in powdered sugar. Makes 3 to 4 dozen, depending on size.
