As just about everyone, sports fan or not, knows by now, it's World Series time. Nothing, we'd guess, from a sports standpoint, attracts the attention of such a large percentage of the nation's people at one time as does this annual baseball classic.

Some people who act as if they don't know the difference between a ball and a strike during the regular baseball season become avid fans at this time each year. Many of these don't remember who played in last year's series and don't care which two teams might be involved next year, but they're highly enthused about the Series currently in progress.

We're amazed at the tremendous amount of interest the Series creates. But, needless to say, we like it.

Before this year's Series started today, the odds were in favor of the Hitless Wonders, the Los Angeles Dodgers of the National League over the American League's entry, the Minnesota Twins.

Don't believe those odds. The Twins, with their superior hitting power, will win the Series in six games. (You're more than welcome to take that bit of advice and bet on it. We won't, but you can.)

The Dodgers have the edge in pitching, without a doubt. However, we think the big bats in the Minnesota lineup will provide enough runs to win four of the first six games. The Dodgers almost have to steal the few runs they get and then, to win, their fine pitchers are forced to hold the opposition to an even lower score. If the LA pitchers slip just a wee bit, and we think they will, the Dodgers have had it.

The first edition of the Bovina High school paper came out a few days ago.

It may be an old story, but a Bovina preacher told us this one on himself this week.

A member of his congregation, he said, told him following the sermon, "You did a fine job of preaching today until you found your notes."

This year may very well be the last for Bovina's Mustangs to compete in a Class B athletic conference.

School officials expect Bovina to be moved up a notch in classification by next school year. High school enrollment is the factor on which a school is assigned to a sports classification. Changes are made each two years.

The announcement that Bovina will be moved up to Class A is expected to be made this month, Superintendent Otis Spears tells us. The past two school years will be used to figure the set up this time. The enrollment figure which determines whether a school is changed isn't always the same. Therefore, there can't be anything definite until the changes come from the state interscholastic league office.

Bovina will probably compete in the district now made up of Farwell, Sudan, Springlake-Earth, Hale Center and Kress if it does qualify for a step up, sports-wise.

Though the competition will be stiffer, we hope Bovina High is qualified for a Class A rating. There's something to the theory that "You play like your competition." It's our opinion that it would be only a few years until Bovina High teams would be holding their own in the faster company.

There's a little more natural rivalry between at least some of the schools in the aforementioned...

Bovina Vs. Texline In District Opener

The warm-up tilts are over and the Bovina Mustangs start playing for keeps Friday night. They meet the Texline Tornadoes in the first District 1-B game of the year for both teams.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

The Mustangs are expected to be favored in the game which will be the second meeting between the two teams. Texline was made a member of this district only last year. Bovina won last year's game by a 26-0 count after being the underdog according to pre-game dope.

The Tornadoes will bring a 1-2 record to Bovina with them. They were defeated by a Boise City, Okla. team and have broken even with a pair of Colorado schools, Primo and Walsh.

32 Enter --

Freeze Contest Remains Open

"It's not over yet."

That was the report this week from Willie Williams, Bovina weatherman and judge of The Blade's First Freeze of the Fall Contest, which is now being conducted.

He was referring to a light frost here Friday morning. "That wasn't a killing freeze; just a light frost and, of course, won't count in our freeze contest," the judge says. "The frost just hit the leaves a little and certainly wasn't a killing freeze."

As of mid-week, a total of 32 had entered their guess of what date the first freeze this Fall will be.

The winner will receive a \$5 cash award and, in addition, will be declared Bovina Champion First Freeze Predictor of 1965.

Those entering the contest are asked to write the date they think the first freeze of this Fall will be on a post card with their name and mail it or bring it to The Blade.

"Time is running out," Williams points out, "You'd better hurry if you're going to enter this year's contest. It could freeze anytime," he warns.

The contest is open to everyone, no one is barred from taking a crack at winning the cash award.

As contest judge, Williams will determine the date of the first freeze and the contest winner. In case of a tie, the entry which is submitted earliest will be considered the winner.

All amateur weather predictors are urged to get their guesses in the mail or delivered to The Blade immediately. "The more entries we have, the better we'll like it," Williams explains.

First of Week --

Light Drizzle Halts Harvest

Area farmers viewed light moisture in the area Monday and Tuesday with mixed emotions.

The rain was wonderful for their new crop of wheat which needed moisture to aid it in coming up to a good stand. On the other hand, the wet spell brought to a halt grain sorghum harvesting operations.

About the only farmers who were neutral about the weather situation were those harvesting sugar beets. The rain wasn't enough to stop them from digging beets, in most cases. Some stopped, however, Tuesday when fields became too muddy to get trucks out.

There was little actual rain, as such. The moisture came

more in the form of a drizzle. Only .2 of an inch had been measured in Bovina by Tuesday at noon and predictions were that a clearing spell would begin soon.

Though temperatures dropped because of the moisture, there was no threat of a serious cold spell.

Milo harvest was considered to be "just getting underway" as far as the entire area is

concerned when it was stopped by the rain.

Cotton harvest is still a couple of weeks or more away.

The first frost of the season hit here Friday morning. The damage it did to crops, for the most part, was considered beneficial.

Some top leaves on cotton and grain sorghum plants were "burned" by the frost, but the crops weren't considered to be hurt.

Temperatures accompanying the frost dropped under the 40 degree mark early Friday morning, but they warmed quickly later in the morning.

Enrollment In Schools Nears 700

Enrollment in Bovina Schools is crowding the 700 mark.

A total of 696 students were enrolled as of Tuesday of this week, announces Superintendent Otis Spears.

The enrollment has continued to increase on a weekly basis since the beginning of school a month ago.

Of the 696 total, 429 are in the first six grades, 112 are in junior high (seventh and eighth grades), and 145 are in the top four grades.

As the enrollment increases, it continues to set records here. Spears says it's possible for the total to go over 700 in the next few days.

The present total, however, is the largest ever enrolled in Bovina Schools.

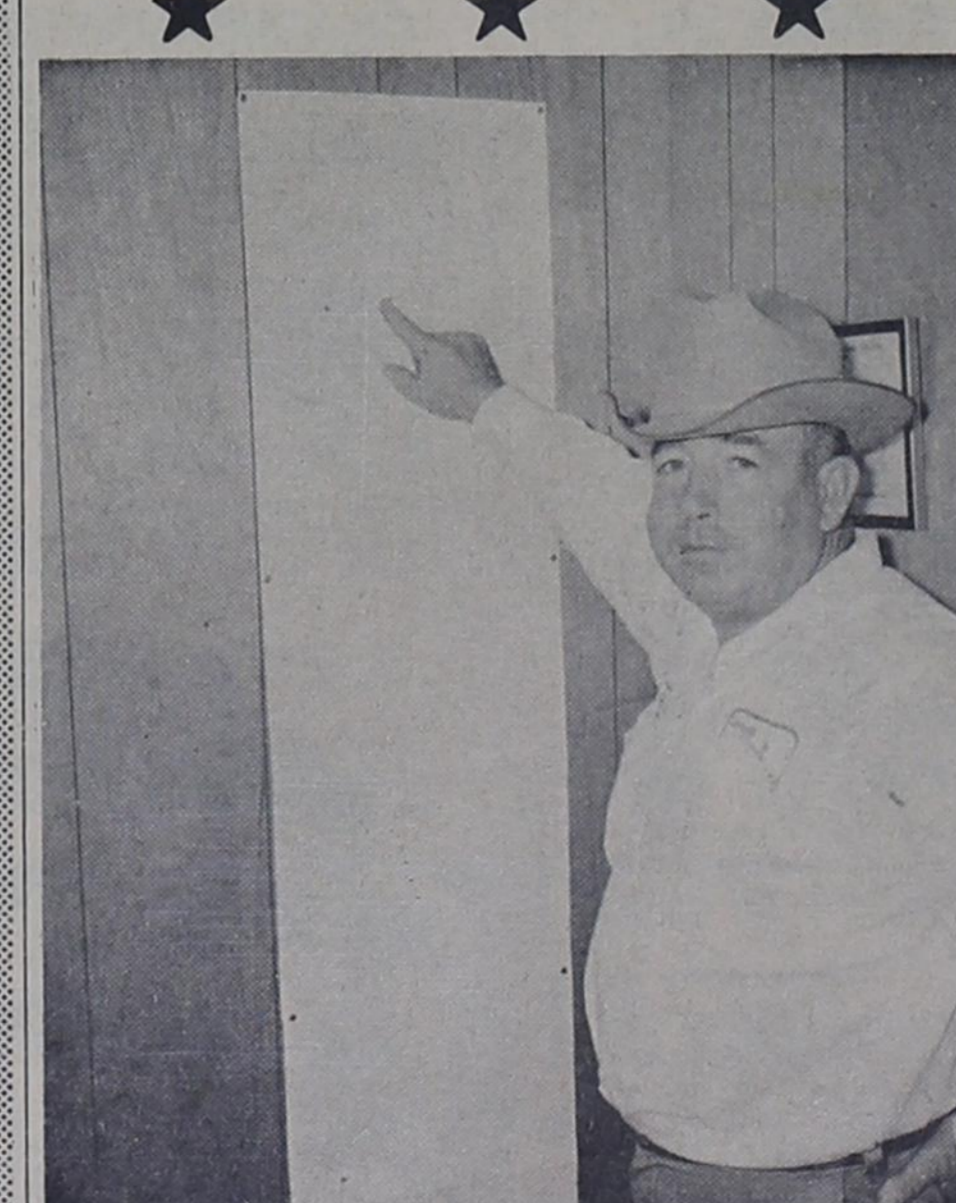
There were 32 naming seven, 29 predicting six, 21 naming five right, seven naming four and three named three right.

For Season's First Win --

Mustangs Mow Meadow

Capitalizing on a fierce, determined defense and recovered fumbles, the Bovina Mustangs picked up their first win of the 1965 football campaign with an 8-6 decision over Meadow there Friday night.

Trailing 0-6, the Mustangs punched across their winning margin with less than four minutes to play in the ball game.

Halfback Scotty Rundell got the TD on a one yard blast up the middle. The winning margin was tacked onto the score as Quarterback Jerry Roach skinned right end for the two extra points.

Midway in the fourth period, a sustained Mustang drive bogged down at touchdown's door -- Meadow's two yard line. However, four plays later the not-to-be-denied Ponies regained possession as Eddi Corn pounced on a Broncho fumble on the three yard line. Four plays later, Rundell

banged his way across the goal.

Meadow unleashed an impressive attack for its score which came just before the half ended. With time running out in the half, the host team put the ball in play on its own 20 following an interception of a Roach aerial in the endzone. The 80 yard distance was covered in 10 plays with 73 of those coming via the air route.

Quarterback Dwain Hester did the throwing. The tally came on a three-yarder from Hester to Halfback Jerry Liles.

A passing attempt for the extra points failed and the score was 6-0.

The Mustangs helped make their own breaks in the tilt as they recovered three Meadow fumbles and intercepted two passes.

Roman Ramirez, spectacular defensive lineman, killed a Meadow threat in the second period when he recovered a

fumble on Bovina's 25 yard line. As the game ended, he recovered another miscue to give the Mustangs possession.

Broncho passes were intercepted on two occasions in the fourth period. Dean Stanberry gathered in one. Billy Marshall picked off the other with less than two minutes remaining to be played.

The Mustangs' defense pretty well held Meadow's ground game in check. The Bronchos were able to make only 71 yards rushing. Their passing, however, was a different story as they threw for 125 yards. Hester completed 10 of 18 attempts.

Carl Harris, a sophomore who had been playing halfback, was shifted to fullback for the game and, running from the new position, was the game's leading ground gainer. He picked up a total of 86 yards in 15 carries.

Rundell, running with a lot of determination and power for his

145 pounds, netted 62 yards in 17 tries. He was also on the receiving end of a Roach-thrown pass for 18 yards. Stanberry, the former fullback who took over at Harris' halfback slot, had 49 yards net in 13 attempts.

Record for Coach Roy Stone's charges is now 1-3. This record is the same as last year's at this point in the season. In 1964, the Mustangs took a 1-3 mark into district play with them and went through district play undefeated for the championship.
