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



Read Zechariah 3:1-10

The Verdict He that believeth on Him is not condemned. John 3:18

A great man once complained to his friend that he had a very poor memory. He said, "Oh, that someone would teach me to remember!" Quick as a flash his friend replied, "Oh, that someone would teach me to forget!" There are some things in our past lives that we would like to forget and there are other things we need to remember.

SIX YEARS AGO, Sept. 30, 1959

Amherst Bulldogs broke out of their first quarter doldrums and outplayed Bovina Mustangs for the remainder of the game, grinding out a 14-0 victory at Amherst Friday night.

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
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
