

Show Plans Complete For FFA Livestock

Bovina FFA Livestock Show gets underway at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 18, in the FFA barn with approximately 50 animals lined up for the event, according to Mike Potts, vocational agriculture instructor.

Ribbons, cash prizes and trophies will be awarded various winners in this year's event, sponsored by Bovina Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce. Young Farmers

Chapter is also lending its support to the show. Four classes of barrows, one each of gilts, lambs and steers will make up the show. Scotty Windham, vocational agricul-

ture instructor at Lazbuddie, will be the judge. Potts says he expects 33 barrows, 10 gilts, four lambs and about four steers in the judging contest. Some of the

steers will be 4-H Club project animals. Ribbons will be awarded the first five places in seven classes. Cash prizes of \$15, \$10, \$7.50, \$5 and \$3 will also be

awarded the same five top places. Trophies will be presented to grand champion and reserve champion barrows and gilts, and to grand champion lamb and

steer. In addition, a trophy will be presented to each breed champion. Potts says Bovina FFA members will also enter the Parmer County Junior Livestock

Show that weekend, Friday and Saturday, in Friona. The swine and lamb judging will be held on Friday and the steer show on Saturday. The sale will also be conducted Saturday, Potts said.

City Calls Election For Mayor, Council

City election was called for April 4 at a meeting of city council here Thursday night.

Terms of Mayor Bedford Caldwell and Councilmen Lloyd Gober, Billie Sudderth and Dolph Moten expire this year. Deadline for filing as candidates for the position is March 4, a month prior to the election.

Holdover members of the council are Vernon Estes and Vernon Willard, who have one more year to serve.

As the 1970 election was called, Moten was sworn in as a council to fill the vacancy created when Charles Corn resigned recently.

J. E. Sherrill was appointed election judge. He will appoint three assistants.

Attending the council meeting were Caldwell, Estes, Willard and Moten. Also present were Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary, Darrell Read, water and sanitation superintendent, and Ronald Mitchell, city marshal. Councilmen Sudderth and Gober were absent.

Mayor Caldwell indicated at the meeting that water turn-on fee (water deposit) is too low. Read pointed out that the present \$10 fee is not enough to take care of two months minimum bill, which is \$5.75 per month, or \$11.50. The council considered raising the amount of deposit, but agreed to delay decision until a later time. Council members also considered making a charge for turning water on and off. No charge is currently made for this.

Also under discussion was a proposed rate increase by Pioneer Natural Gas Company.

Read was granted permission to attend short course at Texas A&M March 1-6 of Texas Water Utilities Association. Mrs. Martin will attend a meeting of North Plains Chapter of Texas Association of Assessing Offices Friday, Feb. 13, in Amarillo.

Council reshaped the dog problem in Bovina. They pointed out that dogs must have a city tag or may be picked up. It was generally agreed that a tagged dog will not be bothered as long as no complaint is made against it.

City Marshal Mitchell said the police car needs repairs. The vehicle now has 70,000 miles registered.

Investigation of obtaining another dump ground location will be conducted. The pit now used for dumping is almost full and need for another location was discussed, as well as several possible locations.

The salary of Manuel Lopez, assistant water superintendent, was raised \$25 monthly, from \$375 to \$400.

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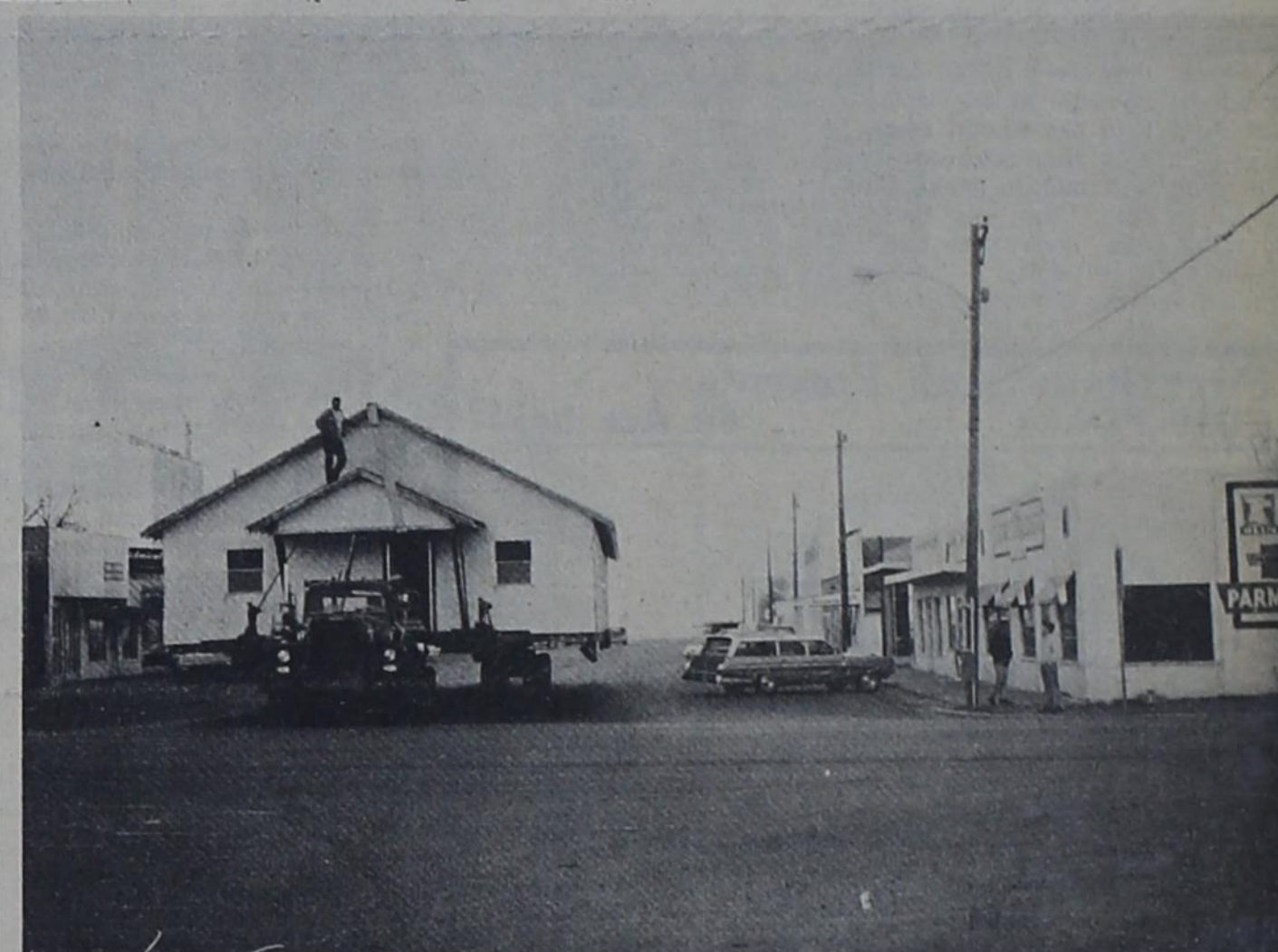

Seek Census Takers Here

Applications for Federal census enumerators are now being taken by Glen Lust of Lazbuddie.

Lust says requirements include an applicant must be 18 years of age or older, must have a car and telephone, must pass a test to determine ability to follow directions and do addition.

The test will be given in Parmer County the latter part of February, with time and place announced later, Lust said.

Enumerators will attend a training session March 30-31 and begin work April 1. Pay will be from \$60 to \$100 per week, depending on number of people contacted. The job will probably include about three weeks' work.

Bovina residents are reminded that oxygen is available here for emergency use.

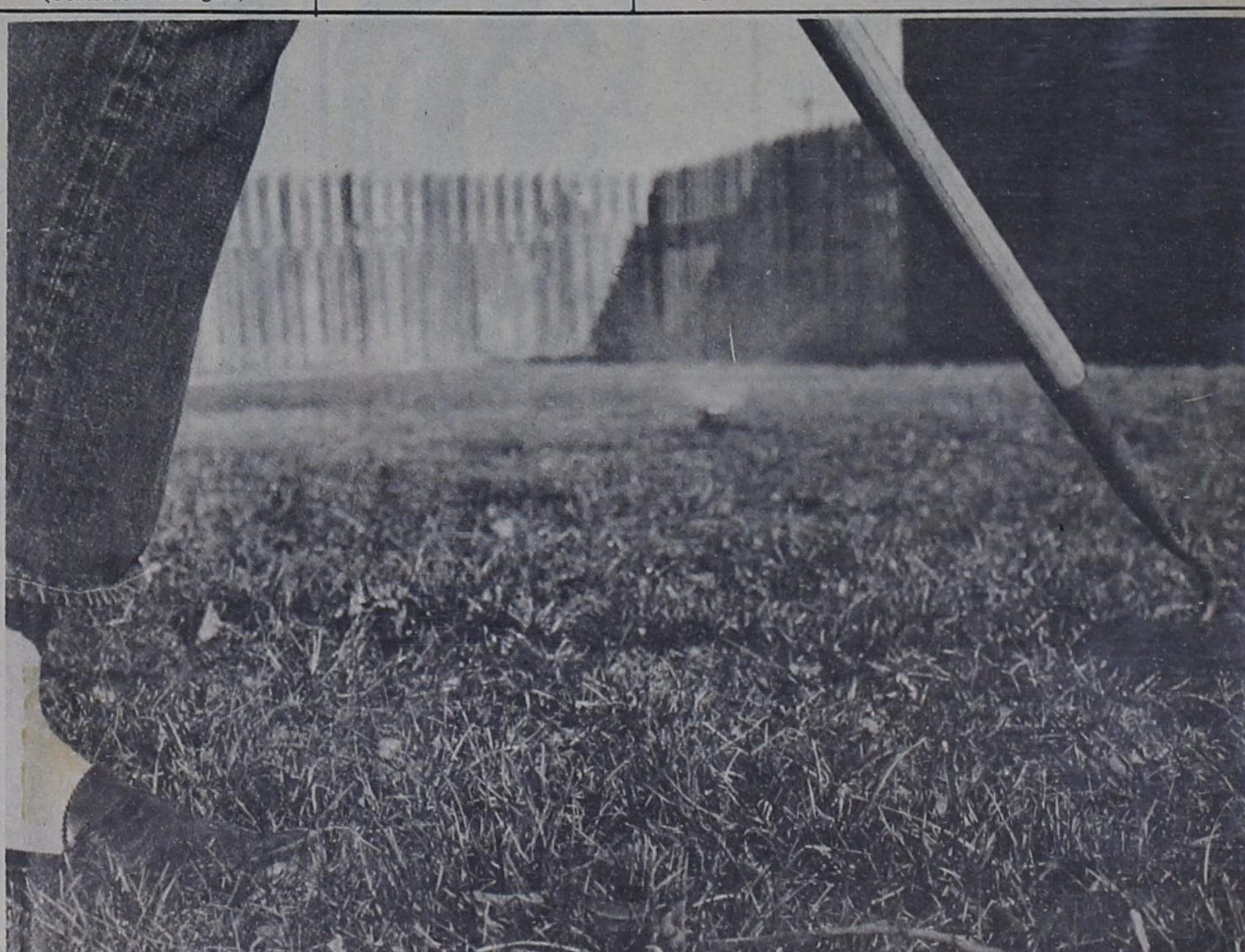

EASY FRUIT COBBLER

Canned fruit cocktail and refrigerator biscuits make this cobbler a snap to make.

- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 (1-pound, 13 ounce) can fruit cocktail
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1 can refrigerator pan-ready biscuits
- 1 tablespoon margarine, melted

Mix 2 tablespoons of the sugar, corn starch, and 1/4 teaspoon of the cinnamon in a saucepan. Mix a small amount of juice from fruit into corn starch mixture, then stir in remaining juice, fruit and rind. Bring to boil, stirring constantly. Pour into 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Top with biscuits brushed with margarine. Mix remaining sugar with cinnamon and sprinkle over biscuits. Bake in 425° F. (hot) oven about 20 minutes.

For Valentine greetings in the form of a sweet dessert, try this heart-shaped meringue filled with lemon. The recipe makes four to six small meringues or a large one.

Before preparing the meringue shell, line a cookie sheet with unglazed brown paper on which you have traced a large heart or small hearts if you wish individual servings.

Beat four egg whites until frothy, then add a half teaspoon cream of tartar and gradually add one cup sifted granulated sugar. Beat until the mixture is stiff.

Add a half teaspoon vanilla and a few drops of red food coloring.

Now, using a pastry tube or tablespoon, outline the heart design with the meringue. This makes a border. Then build up the outer edge of the border to about a half inch and in the center put just a bit of meringue for a base.

Bake in a slow oven 275 degrees until set. The large heart will take about one hour to cook--the smaller ones from 25 to 30 minutes.

To remove the meringue easily from the brown paper, lift the paper and all from the pan and place a damp towel on the warm cookie sheet. Replace the paper and meringue and after a minute of steaming the meringue will loosen from the paper.

Fill the heart with a favorite lemon or other fruit filling or with ice cream, and have a happy Valentine's Day.

Can semi-sweet chocolate be substituted when a recipe calls for unsweetened chocolate? Yes. There is such a slight

difference in the amount of sweetness that you will never know which chocolate you did use. Use the same amount of sugar whether you use unsweetened chocolate or semi-sweet chocolate.

When a recipe calls for blanched almonds, why is blanching necessary? Blanched almonds will give a main dish, vegetable or dessert a special nutty flavor and texture.

To blanch, cover the shelled almonds with boiling water. Let stand until the skins will slip. Drain and then put into cold water, then rub off the skins. Dry the almonds between towels and you're ready to start cooking.

A 24,000 head capacity cattle feeding operation is nearing completion near Summerfield in Deaf Smith County.

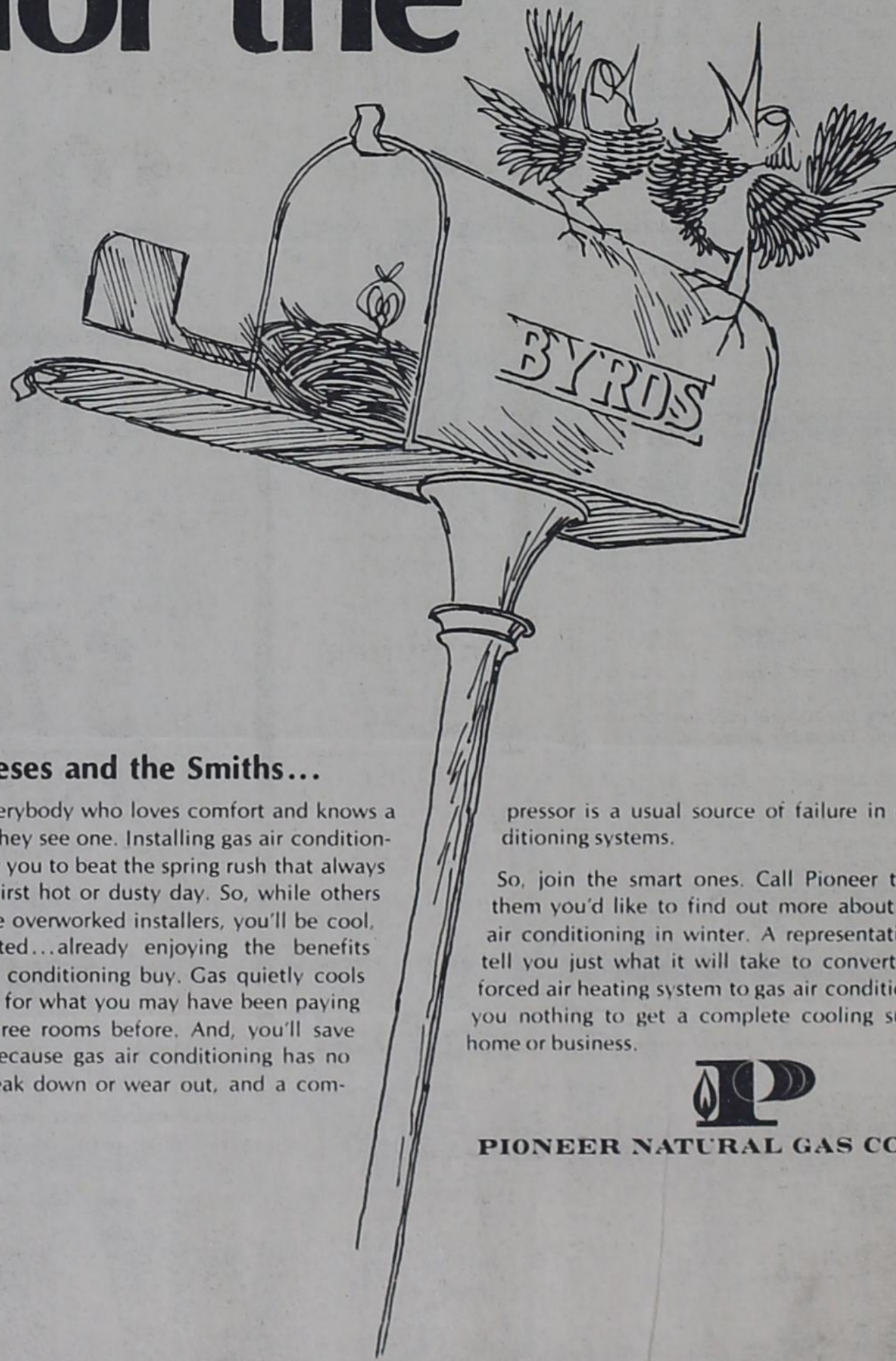

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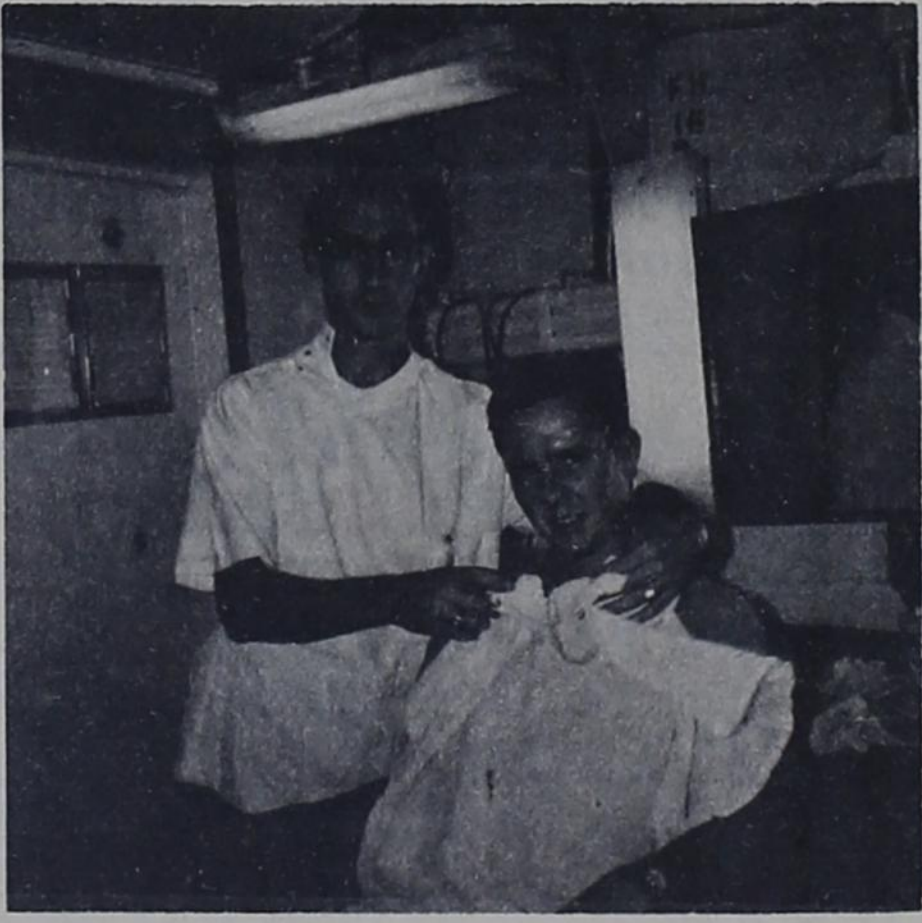
