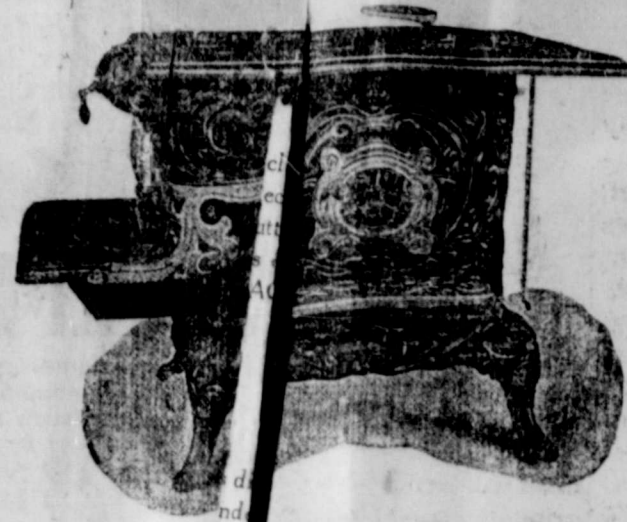

AMERICA'S RICH POOR FARM

Dexter Asylum at Providence, R. I., Unique Among Institutions of Its Character

The most remarkable "poor farm" in the United States, if not the world, gives Providence a distinction about which little is known, the Providence (R. I.) Tribune states.

It is the Dexter asylum, located in the midst of wealth and fashion, "on the hill," but more exclusive in its solitary state, behind substantial walls, than any other estate on the East side.

For nearly eighty-eight years there has been a continuous procession of living "freemen" of Providence, or their descendants, who had "settlements" within these plantations, to the unique institution behind the \$12,600 stone wall that it took the city eight years to build.

Upward of twenty-five hundred have lived and died behind those gray walls, and more than nine thousand have been cared for out of the "Dexter donation" and the beneficence of the city of Providence—cared for in a manner befitting a charitable people and in strictest conformance with the will of Ebenezer Knight Dexter, who bequeathed this now most valuable property, out of "a strong attachment to my native town," "an ardent desire to ameliorate the condition of the poor" and "to contribute to their comfort and relief," "in fee simple forever" the "Neck Farm" in question and various other properties, most of which the city still holds.

The value of the "Neck Farm" at the time it was devised and bequeathed to the city of Providence, for the benefit of her poor, was in the neighborhood of \$2,500, it is claimed, but its assessed valuation today, with the other properties remaining in the estate, is close to \$250,000.

IMBECILES DO GOOD WORK

Experiment Draws Favorable Comment From a Leading New York Newspaper.

Charles Bernstein, superintendent of the State Custodial Asylum for the Feeble-Minded at Rome, N. Y., last year rounded up 25 of the higher-grade imbecile boys and men and sent them up into the Adirondacks for a month of summer camping. The commissioner of conservation at Albany rounded up 150,000 young evergreens and shipped them to a railway siding near the boys' camp. George Kuehn, a scout master, got the trees and the boys together in a spirit of outdoor competitive play.

In just four weeks these 25 feeble-minded wards of the state set out 150,000 young trees on 150 acres of deforested state land at a total cost of \$100. The work was worth \$1,000 to the state as it stood, and the commissioner of conservation called it just as well done as though civilian labor had been given the job.

These wards were turned from liabilities into assets in an experiment that could be duplicated this summer on a large scale. Politicians handicap such work whenever it is tried, and they almost prevented this venture, but despite them this pioneering will go on until the public awakens to its big significance as a partial solution for one of the grave and growing problems of our social economy.—New York Mail.

LAST ZULU ELEPHANT DIES

Was the Sole Survivor of Immense Herd That Once Roamed Native Forests.

There is not a single elephant left in Zululand, once a paradise of these great animals. The last survivor was found dead the other day on the banks of the Unbolzi river, where he had lived since the early part of the reign of the great chief, Cetewayo.

An immense herd once roamed the Duguzuru forest and along the Unfolozi, but it was diminished by incessant hunting, until Cetewayo one day finally drove it away forever. The chief used to make medicine of certain portions of their bodies. On the occasion referred to he organized a mighty drive in which two elephants were killed and many wounded. One of the latter turned and trampled one of his pursuers to pulp. It was this animal which was captured and whose death is now reported.

The remainder of the herd broke away, and thereafter none was seen in Zululand.

PECULIAR CONTRACT.

A curious fact was divulged in the British house of commons recently in the debate in supply on the vote of £50,000 to purchase Col. Hall Walker's property at Tully, in Kildare, and in Wiltshire, to meet the requirements of the stud of horses which the colonel has presented to the government for the breeding of horses for the army. The secretary to the board of agriculture stated that seven two-year-olds are to be loaned to the Earl of Lonsdale, who will run them in races on the understanding that he will give the government half the winnings after payment of expenses.

KEEPING THE COLORS FLYING

Increased Use of Electric Lights for Displaying the United States Flag at Night.

The wave of patriotism which has swept over the country and some recent electrical development has been responsible for some innovations in displaying the colors. In several of the recently erected buildings there are "flood lights" arranged around the base of the flagpole so that at night the bunting is to be seen proudly flying just as plainly as in daylight. As a matter of fact, it is much more effective at night, for the flag seems to stand out in the darkness, and the effect is spectacular. Another novelty is an electric flag which has been designed and built by a western electric company and is carried in stock, ready for delivery. This was done in response to a general demand which was created by the example of a Denver doctor who had one of these flags built to his order and placed on a new house which had just been finished for his occupancy. The standardized electric flag as built for general sale is four feet long and contains from 94 to 200 lamps, as desired. It is said that the 94-lamp design may be operated for eight cents an hour.

A taxicab on a gasoline jag spun around like a St. Catherine's wheel, back-firing flame and smoke all around Forty-third street, says the New York Times. 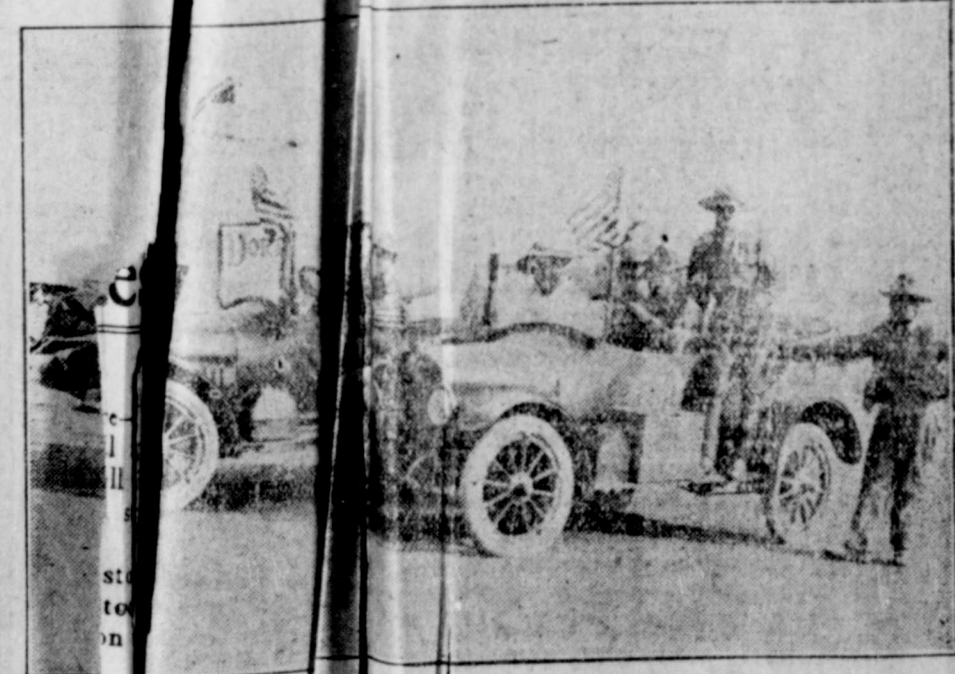

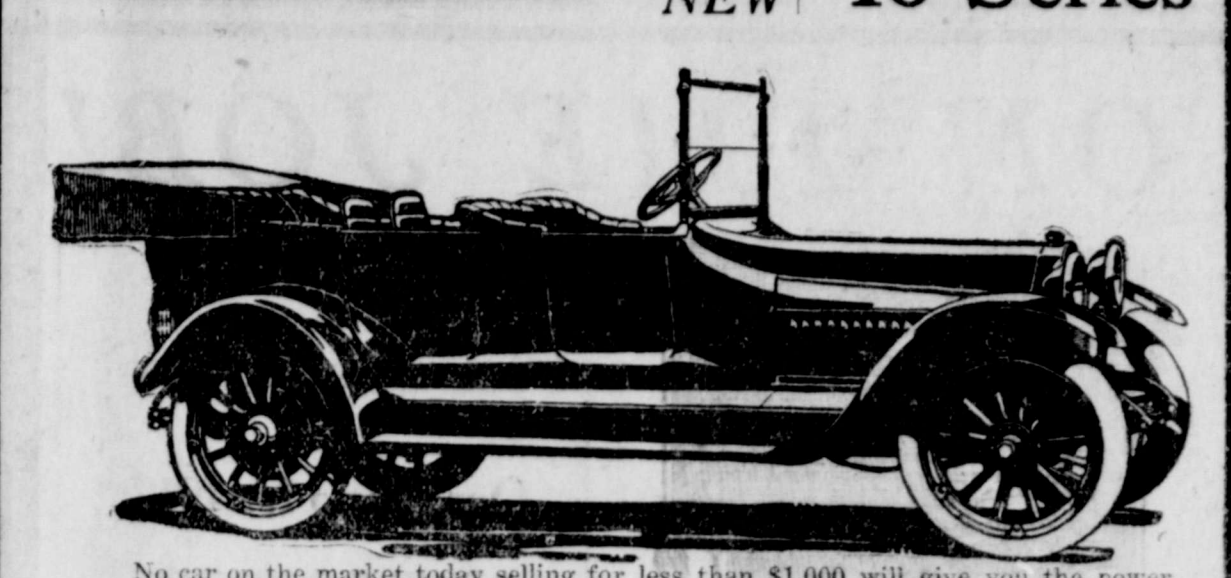
