COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Bond Election at Lost Creek Is Held Invalid.

The county commissioners in regular session this week, took no action and made no canvass of the returns of the bond election held in the Lost Creek Common School district on December 16th, at which time the matter of voting \$1200 bonds for the erection of a new school house came before the voters. The non-action of the commissioners was based on the fact that the election has been held to have been invalid, the confines of the school district having been improperly designated in the election order. The citizens of Lost Creek immediately took up the matter of correcting the error in description and now have ready for presentation to the court a new petition calling for the voting of the bonds, which petition will be acted upon at the next meeting of the court.

Other business transacted was as follows:

F. W. Otte was appointed a trustee for the Camp San Saba Common School district to fill a vacancy.

Bond of J. A. Stowe as J. of P. Precinct No. 4, in the sum of \$1,000, with Wm. F. Roberts, Jr., and J. A. F. Carroll sureties, was approved.

Tom Rogers was appointed a trustee for the Round Mountain Common School district to fill a vacancy.

H. R. Hodges was allowed the sum of \$100 per month for the first six months of 1917 as salary for Tax Assessor.

The County School board having changed all the territory lying north of the San Saba river from Lost Creek to Martin Common School district, all taxes paid or to be paid to Lost Creek from within such territory were ordered changed and refunded to the Martin district.

Warrants in the sum of \$18.75 were ordered issued monthly in

favor of Ralston P. Haun, stenographer for district court.

County Judge J. E. Brown was authorized to act as purchasing agent of stationery, blank books and supplies for use by the county officials.

Bond of T. S. Burk as Public Weigher in Pre. No. 5, in sum of \$10,000.00, with Richard Sellman surety, was approved.

Bond of A. J. Beasley as Public Weigher Pre. No. 2, in sum of \$2,500.00, with John P. Matlock and S. J. Cox as sureties was approved.

Bond of J. W. Womble as Constable Precinct No. 3, in sum of \$500, with J. S. Humphrey and J. A. Robertson sureties, was approved.

Quarterly reports of W. K. McGonagill, butcher at Melvin, V. L. Armor, butcher at Rochelle, W. M. Deans, J. of P. Pre. No. 2, J. C. Wall, sheriff, and S. H. Mayo, tax collector, were approved.

Members of commissioners court were allowed per diem.
