### SITE SECURED.

Salt Gap School Granted 4-Acre Tract by Henry Estate.

The last obstacle in the way of the new school building at Salt Gap has been removed with the securing of the grant of a 4-acre tract of land by the Henry estate, which will be devoted to the site of the new school building, for which bonds were recently voted.

The Gordian knot was cut this week when a message to Thomas M. Henry, one of the co-trustees of the Henry estate, at Washington, D. C., brought a reply granting the request for a suitable school site.

The construction of a new and entirely modern school building at a cost of \$2,000, will be begun Monday by C. R. Horn to whom the contract has been let. The plans for the new structure were drawn by Architect Henry Mount, and are approved by the State Board of Education.

### Joe Proctor Dead.

The sad news of the death of Joe Proctor of San Angelo on Tuesday, was contained in a message received here by C. H. Bradley from his son-in-law, Joe Proctor, Jr. Mr. Proctor had been in very good health up to the first of the week, when he was taken suddenly ill. A doctor was summoned, and while he was attending, the patient suddenly fell over in his chair limp and lifeless.

Mr. Proctor was well known in Brady and throughout this section, having been one of the earliest settlers here. For a number of years he conducted a livery stable in Brady—probably the first stable the town boasted. Later he removed to Goldthwaite, but returned to Brady in 1903 and made his home here until 1910, when he took up his residence in San Angelo.

At the time of death, he was aged 72 years. Surviving are his widow, two boys and three girls, all of whom are grown.

Austin, Jan. 12.—The Texas company bill was introduced today in the senate by Senators Dayton, Hudspeth and Hall. The bill empowers the company to prospect for an oil produce oil.

Other important bills introduced in the senate today are:

By Smith, to prohibit political contributions by corporations.

By Johnson, suppressing pool and billiard halls.

By Johnson, prohibiting Sunday baseball, moving pictures and theatres.

By Henderson, establishing an agricultural and mechanical college in East Texas.

By McCollum, relating to dealing in futures.

By Floyd, to establish a state teachers' employment bureau.

McNealus, creating a juvenile board out of district judges in the larger counties of the state.

McNealus, anti-dead beat bill, also bill giving hotel men lien on baggage for hotel bill also a bill against the giving of fraudulent checks and drafts.

Bee, state highway commission, composed of three members at a salary of \$4,000 for one and two at \$2,000 each.

Bee, to protect milk bottles from theft.

Bee, fixing salaries of clerks of courts of civil appeals at \$3,000 and no fees.

Gibson, amending anti-pass law so far as to permit passes to city fire marshals.

Hudspeth, prohibiting railroads from confiscating coal, and by Hudspeth to regulate speed of automobiles and motor vehicles to eight miles in towns and cities an hour, and twenty miles an hour on country roads.

Senator Hudspeth introduced a bill providing for compulsory tick eradication.

## PLAN FOR HEALTH INSURANCE

Important States Are Taking Up the Matter Since Its Importance Has Been Recognized.

Compulsory insurance of the worker against the chances of sickness is the reform now in the order of the day. The institution is already established in Germany, Austria, Hungary, Luxemburg, Norway, Holland, Great Britain, Russia, Roumania, Serbia and Greece. When a social reform has won success in Russia and the Balkan states one may suppose that it is about to receive a hearing in the United States of America. And now three of our chief industrial states, New York, Massachusetts and New Jersey, are discussing sickness insurance bills under the more optimistic name, "health insurance."

These bills spring largely from a common source and are almost identical in terms, says the New Republic. If they pass, the manual worker or any other employe with a salary under \$1,200 a year will be assured medical and surgical attendance and nursing through a period of sickness extending to six months; medical and surgical supplies up to a cost of \$50 and money benefits equivalent to two-thirds of his wages for a period not longer than six months. In return for his advantages under the law he will be forced to contribute, in the ratio of his earnings, toward two-fifths of the aggregate cost of insurance. His employer will contribute another two-fifths and the remaining fifth will come out of the state budget.



## FISH CULTURE SUCCEEDS.

Systematic attempt to establish the quinnat salmon in New Zealand waters was first made in 1899. It was decided to concentrate efforts on one river on the east coast of the South island—the Waitaki river. For several years after that large importations of ova were made, and in 1907 it was found that the fish were returning from the sea to spawn. Since then their numbers have been found to be increasing yearly, and the inspector now states that the number of running fish this year was much greater than since the commencement of the experiment. It was also found that there was a large run of fish up the Rangitata river, about seventy miles north of the Waitaki, and some had found their way even farther north. The largest quinnat salmon yet caught in New Zealand weighed over thirty-two pounds.



**NORTHWEST WAS GROWN RICH**  
 Statistics Show That Its Wealth Has Been Increased Remarkably During Last Few Years.

The 1900 figures show these states almost in the pioneering stage. The 1915 figures speak of the development of a vast farm empire with millions of contented families. And all accomplished in 1½ decades, just a fraction of one lifetime. Perhaps the only man who is not surprised at this showing is a visionary like James J. Hill, who, even when his locomotives shrieked the first call of civilization over the western plains, spoke of the Northwest in eleven-figured terms. He has seen his wildest dreams come true.



## THE STATE OF TEXAS

A descriptive write-up of the greatest state in the Union, written by Miss Mabel Ziriach of Voca.

Texas is situated in the extreme south-western portion of the United States. It is included between the parallels of 25 degrees-51 minutes and 36 degrees-3 minutes north latitude and the meridians 93 degrees-30 minutes and 106 degrees, 45 minutes west longitude from Greenwich, and it is about equi-distant from the Equator and the Arctic Circle; it is also located in the North Temperate zone.

Texas is really a Southern State, altho it is often classed as a Central State, because so much of it is in the central part of the United States. It includes a large area of the Great Plains and the Rocky Mountains and its western corner is nearer the Pacific ocean than the Atlantic ocean, therefore it may be called a Western state. It is also a Gulf state as it borders on the Gulf of Mexico for 563 miles. The entire area of Texas is 265,780 square miles, of which 262,290 square miles are land and 3,490 square miles are water surface. It is much the largest state in the United States, being thirty times the size of Massachusetts and seven times the size of New York, and the geographical center of the state is near Waco, in McLennan county.

The boundaries of Texas are mostly natural, and it has very few good harbors.

Forty-four rivers constitute the drainage system of Texas. The principal ones are the Brazos, Red, Colorado, Trinity and Rio Grande rivers.

Texas presents three well pronounced types of climate: the low, damp, cool climate; the low, damp, warm climate; and the high, dry climate. The north-eastern portion of the state presents the first; the coast country the second, and the elevated district of West Texas the third.

Texas has a great variety of soils of wonderful fertility. There is scarcely a known crop that may not find somewhere in Texas the soil suited to its needs. All the prime crops of the United States may be grown here in the greatest perfection. Fertilizers are almost unknown. The chief soils are classified as black waxy, black sandy, red sandy, gray sandy, and alluvial.

Tillage of the soil forms the chief industry of the people of Texas. There are 417,770 farms in the state, and are valued at more than two billion dollars. The annual value of the farm products is \$650,000,000. The great agricultural staples in the order of their importance are: Cotton, corn, fruit and garden truck, wheat, hay and forage, oats, rice, sugar cane, kaffir corn, milo maize, potatoes, peanuts, broom corn and tobacco.

Ranching is another important industry, ranking next to agriculture. Two other important industries of Texas are the raising of poultry and bee-keeping.

On account of an abundance of raw materials and a plentiful supply of cheap fuel, manufacturing is rapidly coming to the front.

The principal cities of Texas are Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Galveston and Waco.
