VOTE GOOD ROADS BOND

**\$30,000 ISSUE AUTHORIZED
LAST SATURDAY.**

**Road District No. 2 Declares for
Progress by Vote of 67 to 25
—School Tax Increase Al-
so Voted.**

Put the citizens of Road District No. 2 in the list of progressives!

By a vote of 67 to 25 the issuance of \$30,000 bonds for good roads improvement was authorized at last Saturday's election. In the history of McCulloch county, perhaps, there was never an election planned, worked out and carried with more expedition and dispatch than was this. There was no doubt from the start about what was wanted! They knew, and the only pause in the whole undertaking was the endeavor to start the election campaign according to Hoyle—and the laws of the state.

Prominent in advocacy the issuance of the bonds were Messrs. E. T. Jorian and Oscar Sellers of Melvin, who were tireless in their efforts. Lending co-operation and endorsement, and coming to the assistants of the proponents of the bonds upon every occasion, was the Brady Y. M. E. L. And to the credit of the business men of Melvin may it be said, that they practically were unanimous in endorsing the stand of their leaders.

In fact, the vote shows that the citizens of the district were themselves practically of one mind on the bonds.

The district is composed of the Melvin community and parts of Whiteland and Doole communities. The bonds are authorized in the sum of \$30,000, bear 5 per cent interest, payable semi-annually, mature in 40 years, with option of redemption after ten years, and are to be issued for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof; and a tax is levied upon the property in Road District No. 2, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and providing a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

As an indication of the spirit that prevailed among the voters at the election, it is of interest to note that the school tax increase in the Melvin school district, voted upon at the same time as the good roads bonds, carried by a vote of 53 to 9.

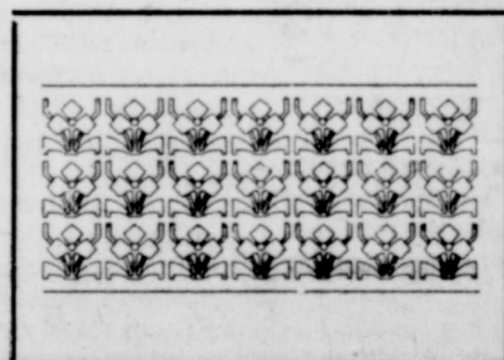
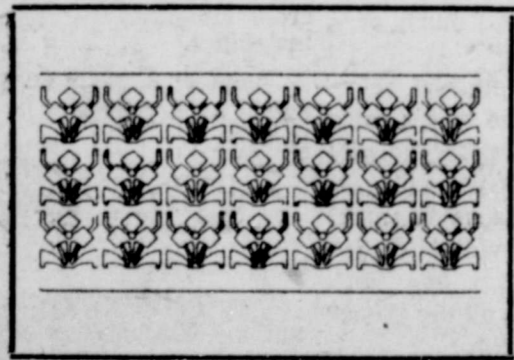

NATIONAL HIGHWAYS

Is McCulloch county to become the center of a net of highways approved by the U. S. Government, or is she to lose heart and interest in the project and slip into the back-woods state?

The answer of Road No. 2 is emphatically in favor of road improvement. The sentiment for road building in District No. 1 is well known, and has been demonstrated by road improvement dating back several years. It is now up to the citizens in the balance of the county to make good, and complete the links in the chain of good roads.

Captain Fauntleroy, district engineer of the National Highway association stated emphatically that the citizens must cooperate in every way to assure first-class highways. The narrow lanes, such as now exist between Rochelle and Mercury must be made standard width—40 feet. The short, sharp turns must be smoothed out. To accomplish this, citizens owning adjoining property must stand ready to help by aiding in the widening and straightening of the roads, rather than to place an obstacle in the path of the builders by refusing to give the land or by holding for exorbitant prices. The importance of the national highway is already recognized by many land-owners. One of the leading citizens of the Rochelle community has offered to give all the land necessary to make the road passing his property conform to national highway standards and another citizen has gone him one better by stating that he would not only give the land but would donate \$100 in cold cash if the national highway came past his place. These citizens have foresight to see the value and importance of this highway.

If a community had the opportunity of being either on a trunk railway line or on that of a jerk-water line, would it hesitate in choosing the former? Verily, it would not! How much greater, then, is the importance of being on a trunk highway, rather than on a branch road that leads nowhere, and that can be only of community benefit and interest.

FLOWERS FOR US.

It is a rare occurrence that an editor is openly commended for any act or deed. Without doubt the readers appreciate the efforts of the newspaper man, but
