TO BUMGUARDNER HOLE

COMMISSIONERS CONTRACT WATER SUPPLY.

Will Pipe Water to Filter Plant Before Supplying Customers—Pipe Now Enroute.

The Board of Commissioners of the Brady Water & Light Works has contracted for the use of the Bumguardner water hole east of town, and a rush order has been made for piping to connect the new water supply with the filter pipe. This pipe is expected to arrive today or tomorrow and a large force of workmen will be engaged in laying the mains, and connecting up the new water supply in order that there may be no interruption in the service to water consumers.

The board has had several projects under consideration, one being to go to the Dodge hole, but the great distance made that plan not feasible. An examination of the Bumguardner hole showed a supply of water much larger than had been anticipated. The last rain that filled the hole was a big gully washer than ran the creek clear through, clearing out all drift and silt, and making the supply as good as any on the creek. Springs feeding the hole add and help to conserve the supply. The water will be piped all the way across town to the filter plant, and will go through the usual process of filtration before being pumped into the mains for use by the water consumers. This assures a supply of water that chemists have declared to be absolutely pure. As a further evidence of the excellent quality of the water provided by means of the filter, it is called to mind that there have been no cases of typhoid in the city—and typhoid would have been one of the first results from impure water.

The board was fortunate in securing a supply of pipe sufficient for their needs, although it had to be gathered from various sources. Between 1700 and 2000 feet of pipe is now on hand, and an additional supply of 13,000 feet has been secured, part being bought in Dallas, part from the city of Winters, and the balance elsewhere. This supply is now enroute to Brady.

NEW TEMPLE COMPLETE.

Masonic Building Committee Accepts New Structure.

The finishing touches are this week being placed upon the new Masonic temple, and the magnificent building now stands as an enduring monument to its progressive builders, and as a credit to the city of Brady and as one of the show places of the city as well. Workmen have just completed the laying out of a cement walk alongside the building on South First street, the street is being cleared of all obstruction and debris, the plate glass front is being placed by E. B. Ramsay, and only the installing and connecting of the lights now remain to make the building perfect in its completeness.

Architect Ralph H. Cameron was in the city Saturday and together with Contractor Johnson met with the Masonic building committee composed of J. H. White, Dr. J. B. Granville, Sam McCollum, W. B. McKenzie, L. A. Williams and S. W. Mofatt, for examination and approval of the new edifice. After a thorough inspection, the committee not only accepted the temple, but were fulsome in their praise of the work of both the architect and the contractor.

So far only the first floor of the temple is occupied, Lankford's bakery having moved to their new quarters about the first of the year. The West Texas Telephone Co., who have leased the second story have been awaiting a delayed shipment of their switchboard before occupying their quarters, and the Masons will occupy the third floor as a lodge room as soon as their new furniture and fixtures are installed.

Order placed Saturday by the building committee for the furniture included three massive cathedral chairs for each of the three stations, while leather-finished settees, each accommodating about six persons have been ordered for the members. In addition there was ordered six dozen opera chairs for use on special occasions. All the furniture is of mahogany finish, and will be substantial, as well as dignified and beautiful in appearance. The floor will be carpeted with cork matting. The members of the Order of Eastern Star are planning the purchase of a player-piano, completing the attractiveness and enjoyment of the lodge hall for the members of both orders.

DELINQUENT TAXES.

The collection of taxes back to 1885, may be a good idea all right, but it has its unjust features, and may result in the passage of a law invalidating all taxes five or ten years past due. There is a great deal of complaint among tax payers who find their lands and lots advertised delinquent somewhere back yonder in the remote past, when in fact the taxes were duly paid. The question naturally arises: Must a man preserve his tax receipts for 25 or 30 years in order to protect his property? It is very annoying to those who have paid their taxes in years past to at this late date find that some rascally collector has failed to give them proper credit, and the taxes must be paid a second time. It's a poor rule that won't work both ways, so let's have a law that will compel the collector to collect the taxes when they are due with a heavy penalty for his failure to do so, and at the same time if such taxes are not collected within say five or ten years give the taxpayer a clear receipt.—Melvin Advocate.

The point raised by the Advocate is well taken. It surely must grate upon the sensibilities of every honest and law-abiding citizen to be called upon to pay taxes delinquent in the years of long ago. In the first place, it is not just and equitable that one man should pay taxes, while his neighbor evades payment. Let every man do his duty toward the government.

On the other hand, the carelessness, neglect or rascality of some tax collector, who failed to give proper credit for the payment of taxes may likewise cause a piece of property to appear delinquent.

A simple plan, it occurs to us, would be to have each tax receipt vouch not only for the payment for the current year's taxes, but for the payment of all taxes in previous years. In this way, if taxes are delinquent for any previous year, no receipt can be issued until such arrearages are made good. This would be protection not only for the present owner, but for innocent purchasers as well.

LEGAL ADVERTISING.

The effort of the Texas Press Association to bring before the Legislature the need of an adequate publicity law is roundly to be commended. The present plan of advertising many classes of legal notices is a survival from the rush light period of democratic government, and is

little more suited to the demands of today than birch bark canoes would be suited to the commerce of the Panama Canal. In this connection it may be well enough to call attention to the State law regarding the State's advertising. One feature of that statute is the arbitrary price it prescribes for State advertising—one cent a word for the first insertion and one-half cent a word for each subsequent insertion. Such a rate may be very fair to some newspapers, but it absolutely bars the State's advertisements out of some other newspapers. Imagine a big business man, or even a little business man, conducting his advertising campaign on such a basis! Advertising rates, necessarily, are based upon the circulation and character of the various advertising mediums. Certainly the paper with sixty thousand subscribers can not accept advertising at a rate acceptable to a paper with one thousand subscribers, yet the State appears to regard no difference between large and small circulations. The Federal Government could hardly turn a wheel in this matter if it were as stagnated as the State Government. The Federal Government proceeds with reasonable intelligence in distributing its advertising. It requires all publishers with whom it contracts to quote exact rates and to affirm that such rates are not higher than the regular commercial rates. If the rate named appears reasonable in view of the paper's circulation and standing, the Federal authorities accept it just as does any other general advertiser. The State's idea seems to be that by the naming of a price fair enough to a small paper it can force down the prices of the larger papers, which idea is extremely fallacious. The result is, logically, that the State's business is barred from many publications which might be used with profit to the State and the people.—Dallas News.

APPROVAL.

Spoke a prominent citizen Wednesday to The Standard editor: "I read and approved of your editorial on publicity in the Tuesday issue. The people are entitled to a full knowledge of the affairs of the city, county and state government, and I am of the opinion that at regular intervals such statements should be published."

Our friend spoke truly and well. Publicity is the things in these days and times. Think of turning your business over to your bookkeeper and entrusting everything to him, without so much as requiring him to make a statement to you of the affairs of the business. Such a course would be close kin to business suicide. To say the least it would betray an utter lack of business acumen. How much more then are these citizens entitled to a full knowledge of the conduct of public and municipal enterprises! Not only does it take the responsibility off the shoulders of public officials, but it gives opportunity to reward and promote the efficient, and remove and replace the incapable.

NEWSPAPER CHANGE.

The Kerrville Mountain Sun last week announced a change in ownership, J. E. Grinstead, who for a number of years conducted that excellent and substantial weekly, having sold the same to the H. B. Terrell Publishing Co. The new management announces a continuance of the policies which have made the Sun a recognized factor in the Kerrville country.

This makes the fifth newspa-

per under the Terrell management, two at West, Texas, one a Bohemian publication and the other the West News, also the Cameron Herald and the Lorena Register. In addition a magazine publication, the Texas Weekly Review, was launched a few months ago at Austin by this company. Comptroller H. B. Terrell is at the head of the company, and to his unwavering faith in publicity may be ascribed his rise from the office of State Senator to that of Comptroller, while now he is being favorably mentioned as heading a ticket two years hence as a candidate for Governor of Texas.

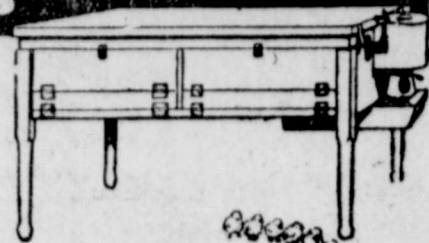

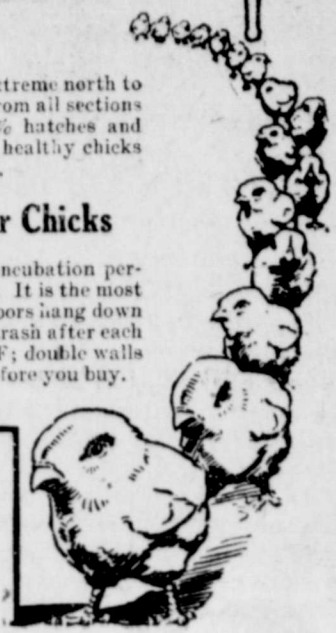

DELINQUENT TAXES.

The collection of taxes back to 1885, may be a good idea all right, but it has its unjust features, and may result in the passage of a law invalidating all taxes five or ten years past due. There is a great deal of complaint among tax payers who find their lands and lots advertised delinquent somewhere back yonder in the remote past, when in fact the taxes were duly paid. The question naturally arises: Must a man preserve his tax receipts for 25 or 30 years in order to protect his property? It is very annoying to those who have paid their taxes in years past to at this late date find that some rascally collector has failed to give them proper credit, and the taxes must be paid a second time. It's a poor rule that won't work both ways, so let's have a law that will compel the collector to collect the taxes when they are due with a heavy penalty for his failure to do so, and at the same time if such taxes are not collected within say five or ten years give the taxpayer a clear receipt.—Melvin Advocate.

The point raised by the Advocate is well taken. It surely must grate upon the sensibilities of every honest and law-abiding citizen to be called upon to pay taxes delinquent in the years of long ago. In the first place, it is not just and equitable that one man should pay taxes, while his neighbor evades payment. Let every man do his duty toward the government.

On the other hand, the carelessness, neglect or rascality of some tax collector, who failed to give proper credit for the payment of taxes may likewise cause a piece of property to appear delinquent.

A simple plan, it occurs to us, would be to have each tax receipt vouch not only for the payment for the current year's taxes, but for the payment of all taxes in previous years. In this way, if taxes are delinquent for any previous year, no receipt can be issued until such arrearages are made good. This would be protection not only for the present owner, but for innocent purchasers as well.

LEGAL ADVERTISING.

The effort of the Texas Press Association to bring before the Legislature the need of an adequate publicity law is roundly to be commended. The present plan of advertising many classes of legal notices is a survival from the rush light period of democratic government, and is

little more suited to the demands of today than birch bark canoes would be suited to the commerce of the Panama Canal. In this connection it may be well enough to call attention to the State law regarding the State's advertising. One feature of that statute is the arbitrary price it prescribes for State advertising—one cent a word for the first insertion and one-half cent a word for each subsequent insertion. Such a rate may be very fair to some newspapers, but it absolutely bars the State's advertisements out of some other newspapers. Imagine a big business man, or even a little business man, conducting his advertising campaign on such a basis! Advertising rates, necessarily, are based upon the circulation and character of the various advertising mediums. Certainly the paper with sixty thousand subscribers can not accept advertising at a rate acceptable to a paper with one thousand subscribers, yet the State appears to regard no difference between large and small circulations. The Federal Government could hardly turn a wheel in this matter if it were as stagnated as the State Government. The Federal Government proceeds with reasonable intelligence in distributing its advertising. It requires all publishers with whom it contracts to quote exact rates and to affirm that such rates are not higher than the regular commercial rates. If the rate named appears reasonable in view of the paper's circulation and standing, the Federal authorities accept it just as does any other general advertiser. The State's idea seems to be that by the naming of a price fair enough to a small paper it can force down the prices of the larger papers, which idea is extremely fallacious. The result is, logically, that the State's business is barred from many publications which might be used with profit to the State and the people.—Dallas News.

APPROVAL.

Spoke a prominent citizen Wednesday to The Standard editor: "I read and approved of your editorial on publicity in the Tuesday issue. The people are entitled to a full knowledge of the affairs of the city, county and state government, and I am of the opinion that at regular intervals such statements should be published."

Our friend spoke truly and well. Publicity is the things in these days and times. Think of turning your business over to your bookkeeper and entrusting everything to him, without so much as requiring him to make a statement to you of the affairs of the business. Such a course would be close kin to business suicide. To say the least it would betray an utter lack of business acumen. How much more then are these citizens entitled to a full knowledge of the conduct of public and municipal enterprises! Not only does it take the responsibility off the shoulders of public officials, but it gives opportunity to reward and promote the efficient, and remove and replace the incapable.

NEWSPAPER CHANGE.

The Kerrville Mountain Sun last week announced a change in ownership, J. E. Grinstead, who for a number of years conducted that excellent and substantial weekly, having sold the same to the H. B. Terrell Publishing Co. The new management announces a continuance of the policies which have made the Sun a recognized factor in the Kerrville country.

This makes the fifth newspa-

per under the Terrell management, two at West, Texas, one a Bohemian publication and the other the West News, also the Cameron Herald and the Lorena Register. In addition a magazine publication, the Texas Weekly Review, was launched a few months ago at Austin by this company. Comptroller H. B. Terrell is at the head of the company, and to his unwavering faith in publicity may be ascribed his rise from the office of State Senator to that of Comptroller, while now he is being favorably mentioned as heading a ticket two years hence as a candidate for Governor of Texas.

THE COTTON GAMBLE.
 By Clarence Ousley, Director Extension Service Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. That the world didn't need our cotton crop of 11,500,000 bales as badly as the world thought three months ago is shown by the fact that cotton has dropped from 20 cents to 16 cents—\$20 a bale. I cannot resist the temptation to say "I told you so." When cotton reached 18 cents I said that the price became speculative and was as likely to decline as to advance. That was not prophecy; it was more analysis of economic conditions, plain to every observing mind not cotton-mad. This means that there is enough cotton on hand to supply the mills until the next crop comes in, and that the mills expect an increase average in 1917 and correspondingly lower prices. The acreage of 1916, with good weather, will make a crop of 13,000,000 to 15,000,000 bales. How much of this can the world buy in 1917-18? Shipments to Europe are smaller at this time than at the same time last year, and Europe is getting poorer every day. Ships are becoming scarcer; freight room to Liverpool the middle of January was quoted at \$3 a hundred pounds; if many more ships are sunk the rate may be prohibitive by next fall. Germany is practically doing without cotton and is making yarn out of nettles and wood pulp. If the war continues, these conditions will grow worse; if it ends, the demand for 2,000,000 bales of cotton a year for gun powder will cease. Europe is patching its clothes and will continue to buy sparingly after peace comes because the people will be more poverty-stricken than the South was after the war between the states. But whether there is peace or war, Europe will spend her last dollar for food and feed. It is not possible to increase meat and bread production in 1917 to such an extent as to bring prices down to the level of 1915; it is easily possible to increase cotton to an extent that will bring the price back to that level or lower. What will it profit a farmer to raise cotton at even 20 cents with which to buy bacon at 30 cents a pound and flour at \$10 a barrel? What will be his condition if there are only ships enough to carry wheat and war supplies? It will require 25-cent cotton to make its purchasing power equal to its purchasing power when it was worth only 12 cents. Those who have cotton for 1916 crop should receive a good price for it and will do so, if the increased acreage in 1917 does not cause spinners to buy more sparingly between now and August, or if the further destruction of merchant ships does not make ocean transportation more uncertain. But those who are counting upon a big cotton crop this year at high prices are including in a game of chance which an ordinary tin-horn gambler would scorn. The only safe plan of farming for 1917 is to make sure of food for the family and feed for the live stock, and then to put what acreage remains in cotton or other money crops. The banker, the merchant or the landlord who uses his influence otherwise is taking a fearful responsibility; the chances are two to one that he will put the farmer back to where he was before conditions required the South to raise its food and feed. I am speaking of the farmers who till the soil, not of the men who collect rent or interest, or make profits on merchandise. The banker, the landlord and the merchant may prosper by all-cotton farming though they would prosper more enduringly by food and feed farming, but their prosperity by all-cotton farming can be maintained only by exploiting the land or the labor, that is by exhausting soil fertility and by keeping the actual tiller of the soil in a condition of distress.

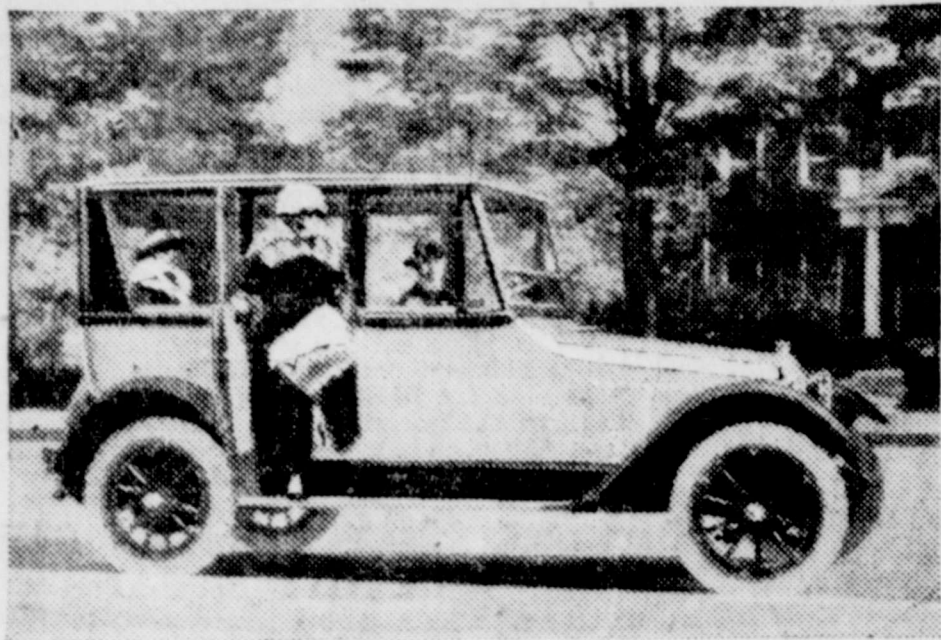

\$25,000 FIRE-LOSS.

Brownwood Suffers Disastrous Fire Loss Last Week.

The Midget Marvel Mill and W. A. Butler's feed and grain store were destroyed by fire at 9:30 o'clock Friday night. Both houses were owned by W. D. McCulley. The Butler place was an old frame building, while the Marvel Mill was a new brick structure recently completed.

The fire, it seems, originated in the back end of the Butler store, and although it was early in the night, the blaze was under good headway before the fire department arrived.

The great quantities of inflammable material stored in both buildings added to the unconquerable feature of the blaze, and the fire burned fiercely in spite of the half dozen streams of water that were played upon it.

In the mill there were stored some seven thousand bushels of wheat and a large quantity of flour. Mr. Butler had on hand considerable stocks of corn chops, bran and hay. It is understood that Mr. McCulley estimates his loss around \$20,000, with insurance at \$15,000. Mr. Butler's loss approximates \$3,000, partially insured.

The Empire Furniture company had a narrow escape. A fire proof brick wall was all that saved the Empire warehouse, with its large stock of furniture from being added to material for the fire. Prof. J. H. Grove, of the Empire Furniture store, was very gratified over the firemen saving his warehouse, and also the main show room, that he set up a midnight lunch to the boys after the work of the night was over. Prof. Grove's loss from water leaking through the roof of the warehouse will amount to several hundred dollars, covered by insurance.

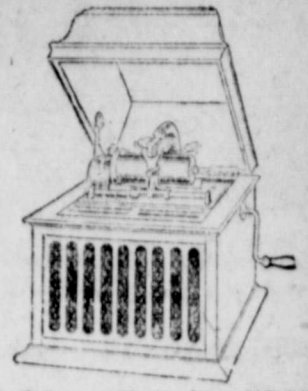
