### DUTTON DAMAGE SUIT.

Occupies Attention of District Court This Week.

M. C. Dutton vs. G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co., suit for damages in the sum of \$15,000, has occupied attention of district court this week. Mr. Dutton claims damage by reason of the union freight depot built across Elm street, thereby closing the street, and obstructing the free passage from his business and other property lying south of the depot, to his residence property in Dutton addition lying north

of the depot. Attorneys Shropshire & House, F. M. Newman and T. C. Wilkinson represent Mr. Dutton, and C. K. Lee and Sam McCollum represent the Santa Fe, while S. C. Rowe represents the Frisco Ry. Co., which is jointly defendant with the Santa Fe Ry. Co.

Cases set for Monday of next week are as follows: State vs. I. H. White, burglary; State vs. M. Conto and Leo Garzia, theft of cattle. White, who is not white, but colored, is charged with burglarizing a house near the depot. A charge for arson is also pending against him, Conto and Garzia are the two Mexicans arrested just across the line in Coleman county some months ago following their stealing and killing a yearling on this side of the river.

State vs. J. D. Darrouch, forgery, is also set for next week. The accused is charged with raising a check from \$1.00 to \$11.00 at Melvin some time ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller Hammons visited at Comanche from Friday until Sunday.

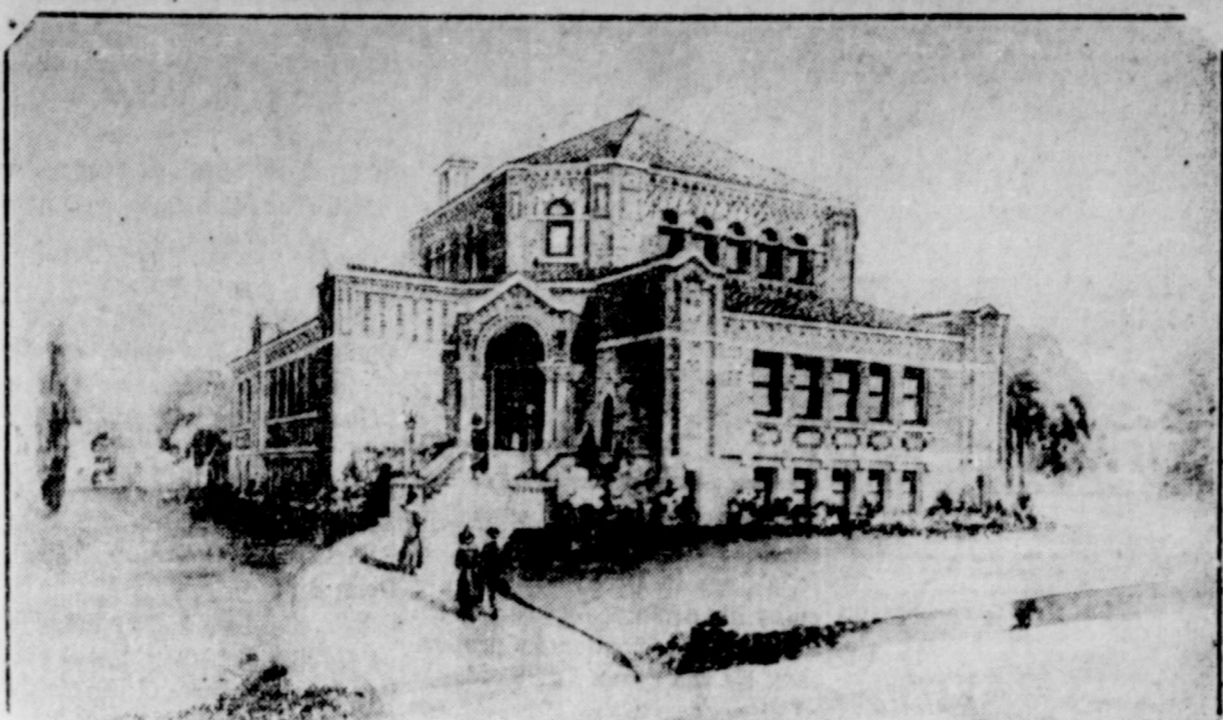

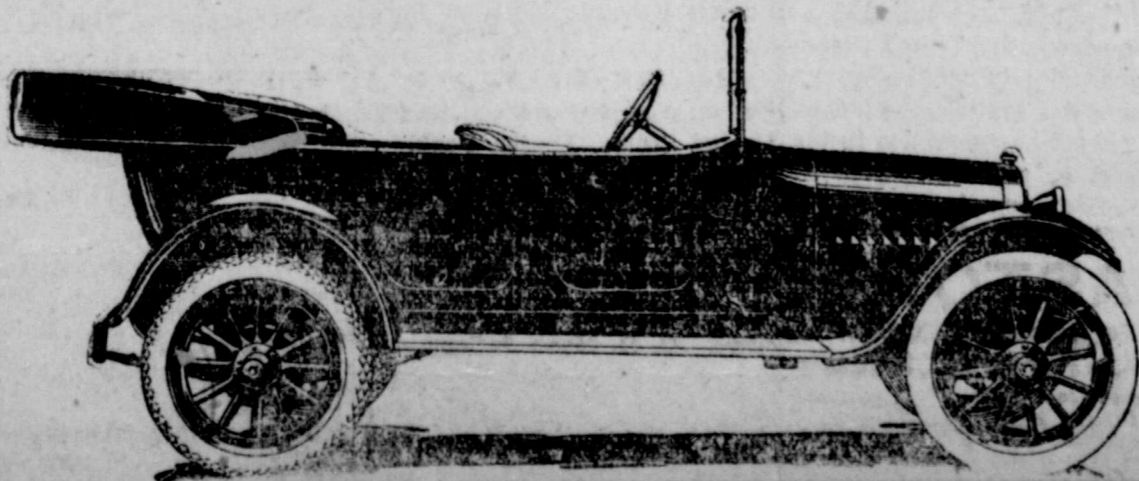

**GRAND JURY REPORT**  
SEVENTEEN INDICTMENTS  
—TWELVE FELONIES.

**Suggest Removal of City's Fire Bell from Court House—Affected by Vibrations.**

The following is the report of the grand jury, which convened on Monday of last week, and adjourned on Wednesday of this week:

Hon. J. O. Woodward, Presiding Judge District Court McCulloch County.

Dear Sir: We, the Grand Jury empaneled for the February term, 1917, beg leave to submit the following:

We have been in session for nine days, during which time we have examined about 165 witnesses for various violations of the law, and have returned into court 17 true bills of indictment, 12 felonies and 5 misdemeanors. We find that in the town of Brady there have been many violations of the law, viz: burglary, theft, bootlegging and gambling. In making this statement, we do not mean to censure any of our country or city officials, but on the other hand have reason to believe that they are using every effort to suppress crime of every kind. After careful consideration, we are fully convinced that the law that is being violated above all others is that of perjury. This should by all means be suppressed, and we find that the only way to do so is to make an example of some one. In our humble opinion this will go a long way toward checking crime in this or in any other county.

We have received only a few reports from the precinct officers, and they have reported on ly fines assessed, with nothing to show amounts of money collected and turned over to the county treasurer. This they should do in every report.

The county jail is being creditably kept. We find it clean and sanitary. Two more electric lights are badly needed and the water pipes are in need of repairs. This should be attended to at once.

We cannot say too much for the county janitor. The court house and lawn is absolutely clean and well kept. The plastering in the building is rapidly giving away, and we recommend that the commissioners court have this repaired at an early date.

After a careful consideration, and by a unanimous vote, we have decided to request the removal of the city's fire bell from the court house, for we are fully convinced that the ringing of same produces a vibration that has damaged the building and will continue to do so until its removal. We largely attribute the condition of the plaster in the court house to this vibration. The court house is the property of McCulloch county, while the fire bell belongs to the city. We represent in this the county's interest as a whole; hence our request for its removal.

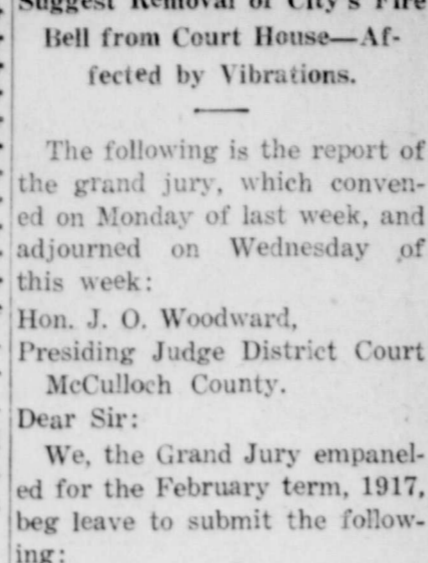

### Famous Scout Picture at Lyric Tuesday Night.

## LOHN SCHOOL JOURNAL

Vol. 1 Friday, March 2, 1917 No. 1

The Lohn community is a wide awake community. The people are enterprising and progressive and want nothing but the best. A splendid school spirit prevails and that explains why their school is fast pushing to the front. The people take a live interest in the school movements and contribute liberally their time, money and brains to aid those movements.

Washington's birthday was observed in the school as Arbor Day. After appropriate exercises in the chapel, the students, teachers and visitors got busy cleaning up the building, beautifying the rooms and putting out trees—the women taking charge of the building, while the men saw to the tree planting. These trees will need water, and lots of it, but luckily an old unused well is on the grounds, which the citizens are going to make servicable again by installing a windmill and tank. This will be a blessing to the school, as it will furnish water sufficient for flowers, trees and sanitary drinking fountains.

Friday afternoon the Home and School League of Lohn met at the school building. Some fifty members were present. Several interesting subjects were considered. The country church question was discussed by principal W. W. Joyce. Mr. Joyce spoke of the possibilities of the country church as an educational and socializing factor in the community, and showed that at present it was failing to realize the efficiency possible for it to attain. He proposed the federation of the various denominational churches into one co-operative, or federated church, wherein doctrinal beliefs are to be, not surrendered, but subordinated to the general good. "This," he said, "will eliminate sectarian wrangling, will insure sufficient funds to employ a strong pastor and to maintain a worthy church, wherein a spirit of fraternity and co-operation will prevail.

And as an immediate step toward the realization of this ideal, Mr. Joyce proposed the organization of a Union Sunday school to meet in the school auditorium. "And why not use the school plant for such purposes?" said he. "Thousands of dollars of the community's money are invested in the building. Why should it lie idle from Friday to Monday, and for four

months in the summer? It is the community's property. Why not use it for any purpose for the community's upbuilding?"

Interesting talks were also made by Mrs. Carl Lohn and Mr. S. R. Crawford. Mrs. Lohn spoke of the importance of the formation of correct habits in young children, and Mr. Crawford pointed out ways in which the fraternal orders of the community may contribute to the general social life of the people.

Several of the members of the League are preparing a play to be given in April. The object of the entertainment is to secure funds to finish paying for the school piano. Taking it all in all, a better community organization would be hard to find.

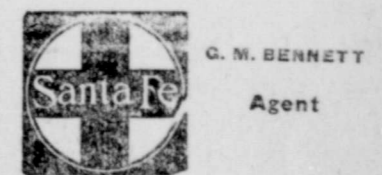

### NEW R. R. SCHEDULE

FRISCO AND SANTA FE BOTH CHANGE TIME.

Frisco Night Train Leaves at 5:50 p. m., Effective Sunday. Santa Fe Shortens Time.

An important change in the Frisco time card is announced effective Sunday, March 4th. The change is made for two reasons, it is said, one being in order to help the through traffic to St. Louis, and comes as a result of an agreement with the Katy for trackage; the other is that the new schedule of the north bound train it is thought will stimulate local travel between Brady and points north of Brownwood.

The exact schedule has not yet been received, but it is understood the north-bound Frisco will arrive at Brady at 5:50 p. m., leaving at 6:00 p. m., or two hours earlier than at present. No lay-over at Brownwood will be had, other than is necessary for unloading and loading arrival at Ft. Worth is scheduled for 2:30 a. m. The Pullman sleeper will be set out there and occupants of berths will be allowed to continue their slumbers until morning.

The south-bound Frisco will leave Fort Worth at about 9:00 o'clock p. m., instead of at 11:30 a. m. as at present. Its arrival at and departure from Brady to Menard will be the same as at present, viz: 9:00 a. m. and 9:10 a. m., respectively. The extra couple hours will be consumed in laying over at Brownwood until 7:00 o'clock a. m.

Another advantage of the change in the north-bound schedule it is pointed out, is that it will give connection with both the California and the New Orleans limited Santa Fe trains leaving Brownwood at 8:25 p. m., as well as with the 9:30 p. m. Santa Fe for San Angelo.

C. O. Jackson, general passenger agent gives assurance that the new schedule will not affect the delivery of the Fort Worth daily papers, both the Record and the Star-Telegram issuing in time for the south-bound train.
