ELEVEN ARRESTED.

Out of Twelve Indicted by Last Grand Jury.

Sheriff Wall made a record on arrests of those against whom indictment for felony was returned by the grand jury last week, and by Saturday had eleven out of the twelve who were indicted lodged behind the bars.

In district court, the jury in the case of W. F. Dutton vs. G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co., suit for damages, Saturday morning brought in a verdict for the defendants, the Frisco railway having been interestedly jointly in the case. Dutton immediately gave notice of appeal. The motion was overruled by the court.

In the case of State vs. J. D. Darrouch, forgery, a plea of guilty was entered by the defendant and his punishment was assessed at two years in the penitentiary, to which he was immediately sentenced.

Upon motion of the district attorney, the third case against Valentine Sancedo for forgery was dismissed. Sancedo had already plead guilty and had accepted sentence of two years each in two cases for forgery.

The second case against Charlie Sellman for theft of a horse was also dismissed upon motion of the district attorney, Sellman having plead guilty and accepted sentence of two years in one case.

It is very likely that court will finish its labors this afternoon. The cases against the Mexicans charged with the theft of a cow in the Waldrip neighborhood were continued until next term of court, as were several other cases.

Need Stockwater Badly.

J. F. Kyzar is here this week from the Rochelle community attending court, and made us a pleasant call yesterday, ordering The Standard sent to his father, J. J. Kyzar, at Fredonia. He reports that while the rain was light, yet it would prove of great benefit to the farmers. It was, however, insufficient to put out much-needed stockwater, and the freeze that accompanied the moisture caused considerable suffering among cattle. Water is scarce in many places, and some folks are obliged to haul both for stock and household purposes. One man has been hauling water for thirty head of stock since last July. Another stockman ran out of water for 90 head of cattle last July and for a time drove to water. During the winter he lost between 15 and 18 head, and is now hauling water for the remainder. Mr. Kyzar reports Mrs. Laura Yates building a new residence on the place recently purchased by her from Mr. Hughes in the Mercury neighborhood, and says she is having quite a bit of land cleared and grubbed.

OFFICIAL APPROVAL.

S. W. T. Brady-Austin-Houston-Galveston Route.

T. P. Grant yesterday was in receipt of advice from C. M. McFartridge, Moravia, Iowa, president of the South-West Trail, to the effect that official approval had been given the Brady-Austin-Houston - Galveston route for the South-West Trail. Mr. Grant is highly elated over the fact that his endeavors have met with such signal success. Heretofore, he was informed that the most he could hope for was to have the Brady-Austin route included in the officially designated Trail, but his persistent efforts have at last won recognition from the officials, and the addition of this route means a turning of a great portion of the Gulf coast travel via Brady and intermediate points.

Cattle Killed.

Albert Behrens was here from the Voca community Monday and reported having found two cows killed in his pasture. One of the cows was partly skinned. Both had been shot directly between the eyes. The killing evidently took place in the early part of the week, as both carcasses were already beginning to decay.

The only possible clew to the perpetrators of the slaughter, according to Mr. Behrens, is that a party of some fifteen or twenty Mexicans camped Monday of last week in that neighborhood, and later passed through Voca. Mr. Behrens' opinion is that they intended slaughtering the cattle for meat but were frightened away.

Both were dry cows in fine condition, one belonging to Mr. Behrens and the other to his brother, Henry. Both are considerably wrought up over unwarranted loss and threaten severe measures should the guilty parties be discovered.

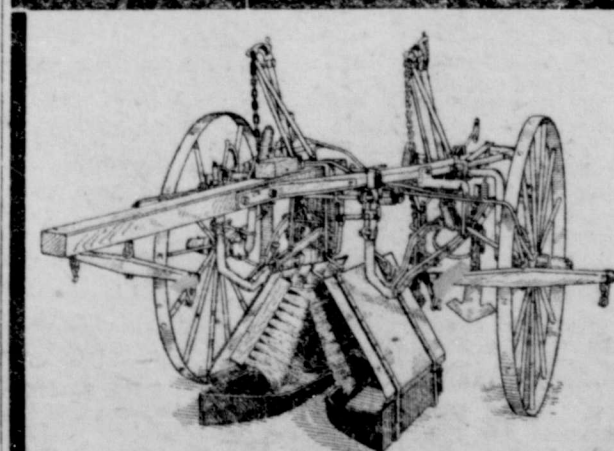

PUBLICITY FOR BRADY

Brady is receiving much favorable publicity because of the new Fort Worth and Brady Scenic highway, and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram is giving freely of its space in boosting the new state highways and information concerning road development.

In last Sunday's Star-Telegram there were three articles concerning the new highway. One, an illustrated write-up emanated from Brownwood, and from it the reader would infer that the new highway ran from Fort Worth to Brownwood only. That this view, however, is not shared by other cities and correspondents of a fair-minded and broadminded disposition is evidenced by both of the other two articles appearing in the same paper. The one from Dublin reads as follows:

Dublin, Tex., March 3.—
With the completion of the highway between Fort Worth and Brady, tourists are being attracted this way. The increase has been noticeable in the last few days. The road goes by the way of Granbury, Dublin, Comanche and Brownwood—Star-Telegram. And this from Comanche:
Comanche—This county has completed its part of the Fort Worth-Brady Scenic highway, claying all of the sand hills and cutting adobe on the black land, which furnishes the final link in the pike.

BEWARE OF DIAMOND DOUBLETS.

The person who would not be outdone these days, must keep eyes and ears open every minute of the day. Here is a report of the latest swindling scheme to which prominent and experienced business men have fallen victims.

A number of Chicago pawnbrokers have recently been victimized by a man presenting a diamond set in a Gypsy ring and asking: "How much will you loan me on this?" or "How much will you give me on this?" Pawnbrokers have generally advanced \$40 per carat on the rings. Later, on cleaning them up, preparatory to putting away, they have discovered a lack of brilliancy, and one of the rings was sent to a jeweler, who took the stone out and discovered a diamond top with a sapphire base, the joint being concealed by a fine \$75.00 value. The average finger ring shows very little brilliancy anyway, on account of the dirt accumulated in wear and the lack of brilliancy in the stone is not noticed when pawning, particularly on a dull day or at night. These rings are said to be worth about \$10 to \$15 per carat, while pawnbrokers have advanced \$40 to \$50, and if the ticket is sold one can see that it is a profitable transaction. The retail jewelers are warned to be on the lookout for diamond doublets.—American Jeweler.

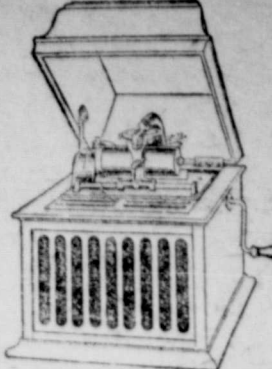

H. T. Prater Dead.

Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Prater have returned from Belton, where they were called last Thursday by the death of his father, H. T. Prater, that morning.

H. T. Prater moved to Belton from Tennessee in 1883 and had been a resident of that city ever since that time. He was 85 years old at his death and is survived by a wife, and the following children, Mrs. J. W. Filon, Nashville, Tenn., Mrs. J. A. Caldwell, Marshall, Texas, Mrs. Lizzie Osterhout, Belton, Mrs. W. A. Wethwin, Temple, A. M. Prater of Austin, and R. G. Prater of Brady. The funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. L. Williams, pastor of the First Christian church of this city, of which church the Capt. was an Elder.

The following is the announcement of the death of Capt. H. T. Prater, as it appeared in the Belton Journal under the date of March 1st:

Capt. H. T. Prater died at his home in this city at 7:00 o'clock this morning. The end came peacefully while sitting in a chair. The Capt. had been in failing health for several years.

He was born in Tennessee, July 16, 1832, and would therefore, have been 85 years old on the 16th of next July. He was Sergeant-at-arms of the Tennessee Legislature for seven sessions, and during his service Andrew Jackson, who had been president of the United States, was elected to the Senate of the United States by the Tennessee Legislature. The Capt. came to Texas January 19, 1883, and to Belton, December 4, 1883. He was door-keeper of the Texas House of Representatives for five sessions. For the past thirty-four years he has made his home in Belton, living quietly at his home in the western part of the city, enjoying the confidence and the hearty good wishes of a large circle of friends. Capt. Prater was a good man, during his long life his kindly and lovable manner of meeting and conversing made him many friends.

Last year when the Capt. saw his health was failing fast, and that he could live, at most, only a few years, he exacted a promise of the editor of the Journal, that he, if alive, would go out to the Captain's home when called. When he saw that the end was near Tuesday afternoon the Capt. had his nurse to call us. We went out to see him accord-

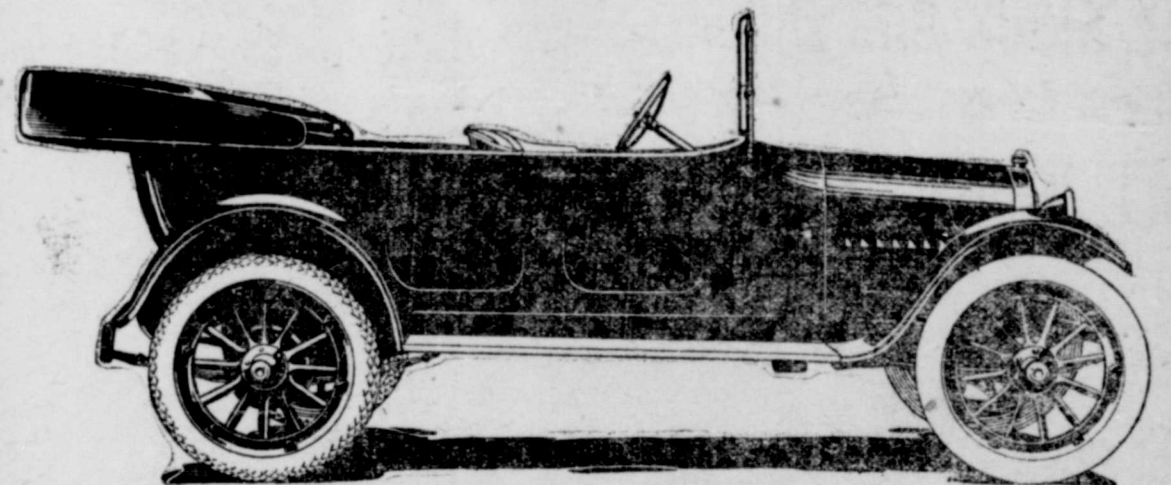
