FIRST STYLE SHOW.

Brownwood Announces Big Enterprise March 16th.

Brownwood's progress cityward during the past several years was never more marked than during the beginning of the present year 1917. As announced elsewhere in this issue, Brownwood will on March 16th observe her First Style Show. With hundreds of teachers present for the Teachers association and with the Mothers Congress in session, the time was most opportunely chosen, and the brilliance of the event is certain to attract visitors from near and from far.

To five Brownwood merchants—Gilliam Bros., J. W. Jennings, R. B. Rogers, Mrs. Anne Holland and Roussel-Robertson—is due credit for this great undertaking, they having backed it liberally financially and having made all arrangements for the exhibit. As a further proof of their enterprise, it might be noted that the receipts from the admission charge of 25c is donated by these merchants to charity. Garments will be displayed on living models, each of the five merchants having arranged for 28 models for the exhibit.

The Chamber of Commerce is actively assisting, and in addition to giving the event publicity throughout the seven counties adjoining Brownwood, they have induced the merchants throughout the downtown district to place electric lights on their awnings. As a consequence, 700 lights will be flashed on the night of the style

show, and will constitute a permanent "White Way" a mile in length.

BRADY Y. M. B. L. DIRECTORS MAKE SELECTION.

Great Revival in League Is Program—Old Members and New Invited.

At a meeting of the directors of the Brady Y. M. B. L. Wednesday afternoon, T. P. Grant, by a unanimous vote, was chosen secretary of that body, and it is with pleasure The Standard is enabled to announce Mr. Grant's acceptance of the offer.

That the directors used splendid judgment in their selection, no one can for a moment doubt. Mr. Grant is the logical man for the place, not only in view of his previous experience, but from the very fact that for the past year or two he has achieved for Brady, McCulloch county and this entire section what no other man in the state could possibly have done, viz: the locating of Brady upon half-dozen or more National highways—and in this work he was not only a pioneer good-roads enthusiast, but much of his

great achievement was accomplished alone and unaided.

Several years ago, before the matter of National highways had gained its present prominence and publicity, Mr. Grant foresaw the trend of events. Accompanied by a few of Brady citizens he attended a meeting out in the Plains country, and laid the foundation for the routing of the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway via Brady and McCulloch county. This, in the face of the greatest of opposition and almost insurmountable difficulties. Following this achievement, he captured the route of the Great Plains highway; then the Fort Worth-Brady Scenic highway, the South West Trail, and various other roads of national prominence. Through his endeavors he has not only gained national and state-wide prominence for Brady and McCulloch county, but he has gained note for himself, and when the subject of Good Roads comes up—no matter in what part of the state—"The Parson" is a name with which to conjure. His ability has been recognized to the extent that he has been made assistant-secretary of the Texas Good Roads association



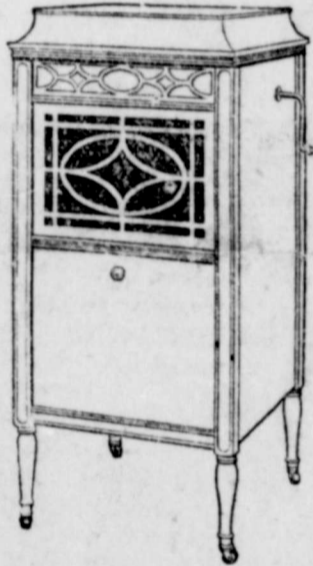

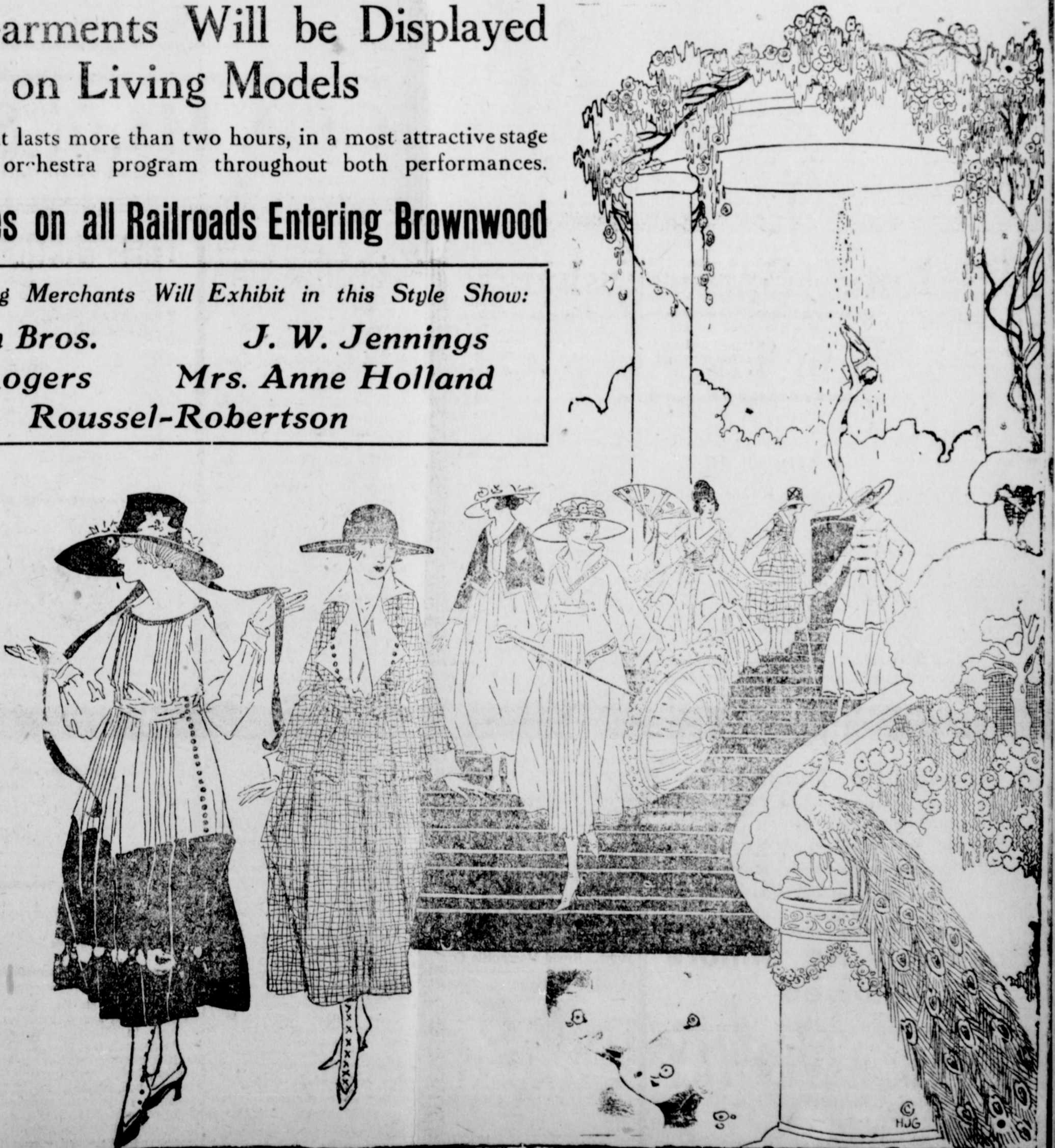

THE FRISCO SCHEDULE.

The new Frisco schedule was fore-doomed to meet the disapproval of the majority of Brady citizens. Possibly this was because of the fact that the old schedule, so far as McCulloch citizens were concerned, was very near ideal. One could complete his day's business, have time for supper and to prepare for a trip, and catch the 8:00 o'clock train. Spending the night on the train occasioned no loss of time, and morning saw one's arrival in Fort Worth. The return schedule was equally favorable to us. In fact, the only way in which it could have been improved would have been to hold the train for an hour or so longer in Fort Worth to enable the Dallas News to make connection.

The new schedule north bound is not without some advantages, in that it gives better connection with Santa Fe trains at Brownwood, and the new Frisco train north out of Fort Worth. But these advantages can hardly offset the disadvantages of dropping one's work in the middle of the afternoon to make the evening train, and then have to wait in the railroad yards of Fort Worth five hours for daylight. And returning, the schedule sadly interferes with an evening at the show in Fort Worth, and the lay-over of several hours in Brownwood yards is another feature not at all pleasing to contemplate. On the surface it appears as though Brady had been given a "rough deal." However, in justice to the Frisco and its officials, we wish to say that their entire motive in making the change is to give the best service to the majority of their patrons, as well as to derive the greatest possible re-

turns. Whether the change made will benefit Fort Worth, Brownwood and intermediate points, all of which enjoy double daily service, sufficiently to overcome the inconvenience to Brady, Menard and points this side of Brownwood, is a question that raises serious doubts.

As the schedule stands, Postmaster A. B. Reagan and his force alone appear to be benefited in that it permits the distribution of mail at very seasonable hours.

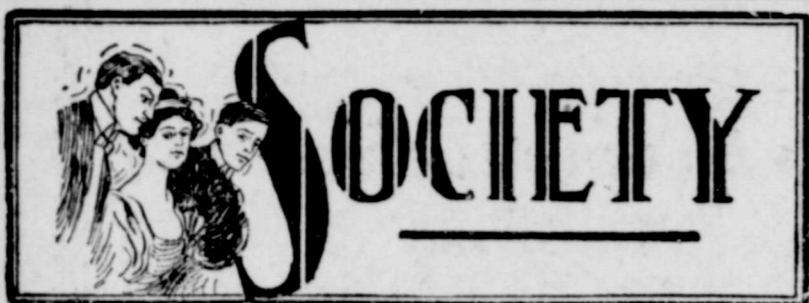

GOOD ROADS MEETING.

Committees Will Boost County Movement.

At a meeting of the Brady citizens Wednesday afternoon at the court house, T. P. Grant briefly outlined the good roads proposition as it affected McCulloch county, and urged the necessity of immediate action throughout the county in order that the good road work now under contemplation might be brought to a successful completion. Mr. Grant mentioned, among other things, the necessity of immediate marking the road from here to Mason with the official designation of the South West Trail; the remarking of the Puget-Sound to the Gulf highway; the assistance and support of Brady citizens towards the movement in various parts of the county for good road development, and various other matters.

Messrs. G. M. Bennett, B. L. Malone, and W. F. Roberts volunteered to place the S. W. T. markers on the road to the Mason county line, which they did yesterday, and which completes the marking of this route out of Chicago. Committees were also named to arranged meetings in the Voca community, and also in Precinct No. 4 to discuss the good roads question at a time convenient for the citizens.

Dr. J. G. McCall is now in communication with Dr. O. C. Jackson, and it is likely that a routing good roads meeting will be arranged at Voca for Saturday of next week, the 17th. Commissioner H. E. McBride was also communicated with and announced his readiness to co-operate with a committee and arrangements will very likely be made to hold meetings at Rochelle, Placid, Mercury and Milburn, also on Saturday of next week. Definite arrangements will be announced in next Tuesday's issue.
