IN McCULLOCH COUNTY BECOMES OPERATIVE.

Commissioners Are Placed Under \$1,000 Bond—Old Bridge Bonds Paid Off in Full.

Commissioners court held a brief session this month, convening on Monday and adjourning Tuesday evening.

Amount of \$240 was transferred from Special Road Fund No. 4 to Special Road Fund No. 2 to correct error in the payment of such sum for balance due Alamo Construction Co. out of Fund No. 2, when payment should have been made out of Fund No. 4.

The county treasurer was ordered to notify the holders of the Old Bridge bonds to present same for payment, there being a sufficient sinking fund to pay off same. The funds heretofore applied to this purpose

Judge Adkins last year made the race for Congressman in the 14th district, of which McCulloch county and this section is now a part, against James I. Shaden. The new 14th district will be composed of the southern part of the old district, including San Antonio, Slayden's home, and will include part of Congressman Gilmer's present district.

During his campaign last year Judge Adkins became well and favorably known over a large part of the new district, and his candidacy will, no doubt, no only receive the enthusiastic support of his fellow citizen in his home county, but from his friends throughout the new district.

SAFE BLOWERS ABROAD.

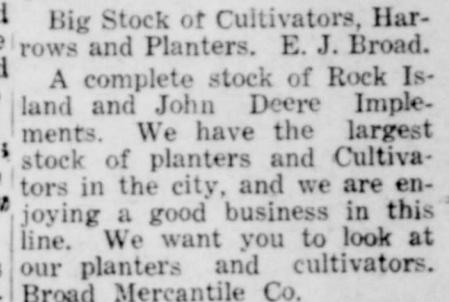
Crack Safe of Barney Craven at Winchell.

Monthly report of S. H. Mayo, tax collector, was examined and approved.

Bonds were presented by Chas. Samuelson and H. E. McBride, each in the sum of \$1000 the former with C. A. Johnson and D. A. Hurd, sureties, and the latter with J. N. Holland and J. M. Bell, sureties; such bond being for Road Commissioner of Precincts 1 and 4, respectively. The reason for this bond becoming necessary is that McCulloch county is now under a Special Road law.

The law was written by Judge J. E. Brown, introduced in the State Legislature by Representative T. J. Beasley, and only recently passed. The law makes the commissioner road superintendent in his district, provides for calling out the road hands on 24 hours' notice, and enlarges the duties and prerogatives of the commissioner.

Each member of the court was allowed per diem.

The court also ordered the working of county convicts on city streets stopped, it being declared an added expense to the county.

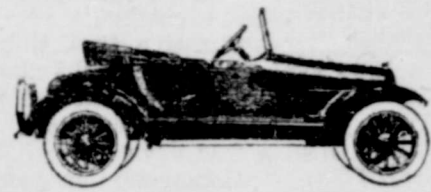

BETTER ROADS FUND.

The Scurry County Good Roads association has a live membership, and the following describes a rather unique method adopted by that body to turn bad roads into better ones: "The Scurry County Good Roads Association now has a membership of 105. These members pay \$2 a month. With this fund the association has employed men and teams with scrapers and they are working on the county roads. "The officers have visited Dunn, Ira and Camp Springs and have enlisted the co-operation of citizens at these places. It is their purpose to build a system of good roads in every part of the county.

WAR ON ANTS.

Houston is waging a campaign against ants. Brownwood people who find ants bothersome each summer may find the ant trap described below of use to them this year. It is recommended by Federal agents now in Houston:

To make a trap, take a jar that will hold about a gallon. Fill it half or two-thirds full of sticks of kindling. Fix over this, about level with the top of the jar, protruding very slightly, a sponge. The sponge is to be saturated with a sugar solution of weak arsenic. Same solution should be used in the bottom of the jar.

Over this put a piece of screen wire with a hole cut in the middle. Bury level with the earth, leaving access to the bait for the ants. But there's a science in mixing the poison. It should not be so poisonous that the ant that eats will drop dead at once. If so the purpose is defeated. A few ants would die and the rest would shun the bait. It must be just poisonous enough so that the ants will bear away the little sugar crystals to their nests and there, at ease and leisure, poison the entire nest.

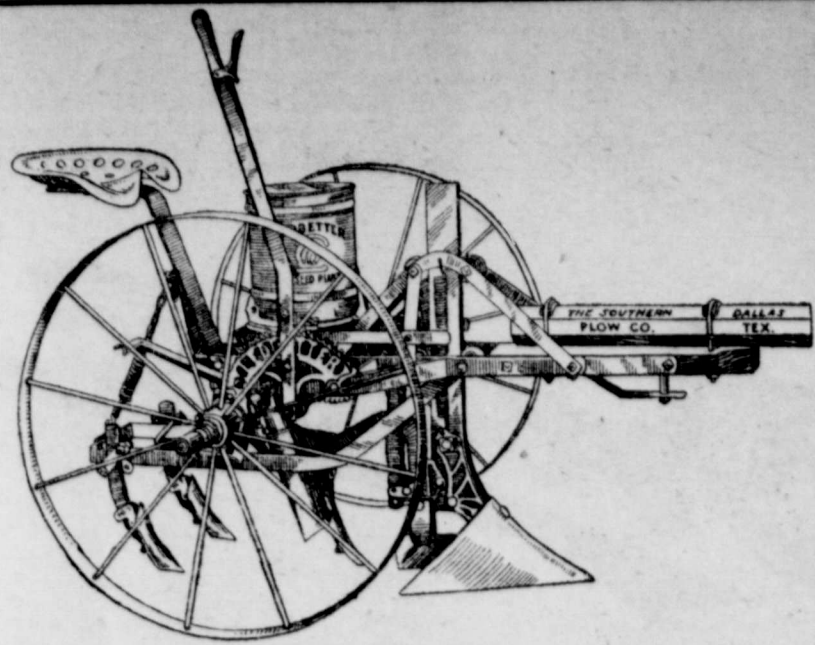

HOW WILL ALLIES PAY DEBTS?

England and France Said to Be in Peculiar Position of Financial Distress.

England's foreign investments are not owned by the government, but by individuals, and they will not sell; and there seems as yet no way to compel them. American securities are the only ones that appeal to the British and French investors at this moment as being good.

What no financial expert ever predicted was the amazing trouble that England and France would have in paying for the equipment purchased in this country. It has been thought that these two creditor nations would merely have to sell their foreign securities, or merely stop making foreign investments, to have all the money they needed. Sir George Parsh, a representative of the British treasury, came to this country last winter and boastfully told his interviewers and hosts that England could fight on for five years merely on the interest from its foreign investments—an assertion that Sir George probably wishes he had never made. Even Lloyd-George formerly spoke of the \$5,000,000,000 and the \$2,000,000,000 this country and Argentina respectively owe Great Britain; but he has long since changed his tune. England and France are in a position of peculiar financial distress, Albert W. Atwood asserts in the Saturday Evening Post. They are buying war equipment in this country on a gigantic scale. They are exporting practically nothing to this country, and their inhabitants will not or cannot sell American securities back to America. They have nothing to pay with but gold, and they cannot afford to lose gold.

France is in an even more embarrassing position. She has gone mad for years over *epargnes*—savings. The average Frenchman would rather go without clothes and food at the present moment than sell his American securities at a loss. A friend of mine in New York recently received a letter from a French banker in which it was said that only one thing gave his clients any grande quietude at the present moment, and that was their holdings of American stocks and bonds.

"Wherever you go in France today you will find American investments held intact; for the Frenchman will tell you that if he sells others will do the same, and that would put down the price of American securities—which would never do."

WAS A BRILLIANT INVENTION

And Inspired by the Mother of All Such, but It Failed to Work.

Doctor White, a sportsman, heard of the bird and made an artificial brass leg, which he fixed to the injured stump with silver wires. After the pheasant had worn its new leg a week, the wires broke. Then Doctor White fashioned another leg to fit snugly about the remnant of broken bone, and this time procured a support upon which the bird could walk with apparent ease.

Italy's Mad Dates.

May holds some fateful anniversaries for Italy. It was on May 20, 1800, that Napoleon crossed the Alps, and on May 26, five years later, that he proclaimed himself king of Italy. On May 8, 1859, the French entered Genoa, and on the 20th of the same month saw the heavy defeat of the Austrians at Montebello. In May of the following year the French troops left Italy, and Garibaldi made his famous descent upon Sicily.—Pall Mall Gazette.

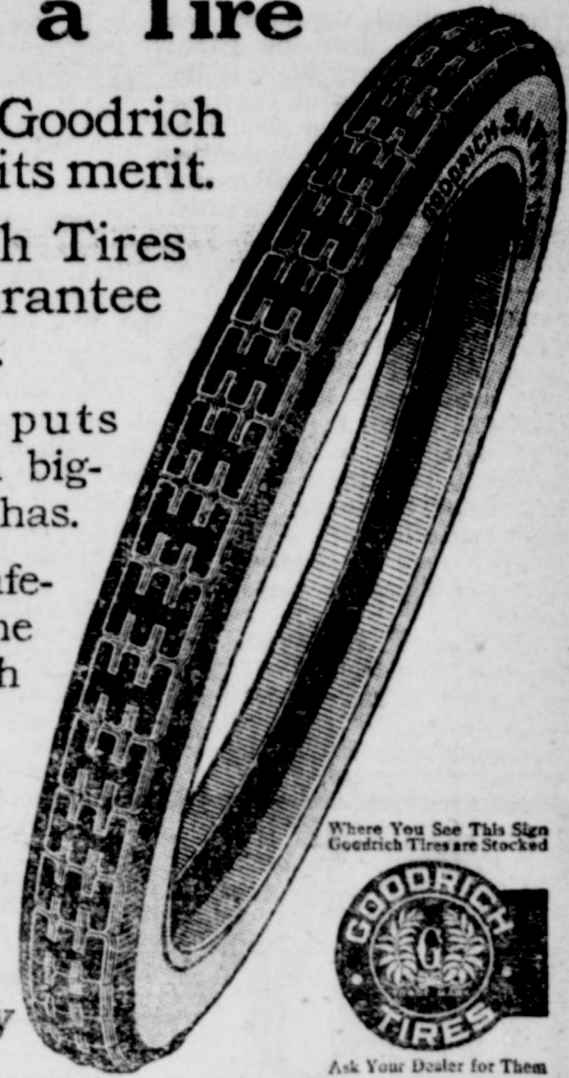

MCCULLOCH EXEMPTED.

From Part of Provisions of Irrigation Law.

Through the alertness of T. J. Beasley, both McCulloch and San Saba counties, in addition to four other counties, were exempted from a section of the provisions of the new Irrigation Law, which has been passed to engrossment. The section applied to the permitting of Johnson grass or Russian thistle to go to seed upon the banks of any reservoir, irrigation ditch, or the like, and its enforcement would have confronted the land owners in this section with an almost impossible task. The section reads as follows:

"Sec. 89. It shall be unlawful for any person, association of persons, corporation, water improvement or irrigation district owning, leasing or operating any ditch or canal or reservoir, or cultivating any lands abutting upon any reservoir, ditch, flume, canal, wasteway or lateral within ten feet of the high water line of any such reservoir, ditch, flume, canal, wasteway or lateral, where the same crosses or lies upon land in the ownership or control of any such person, association of persons, corporation, water improvement or irrigation district, and anyone violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; provided, that this section shall not apply to Tom Green, Sterling, Irion, Schleicher, McCulloch and San Saba counties."

OFFICIAL WARNING.

Beware of Fire on Windy Days! Says State Fire Marshal.

The following article, addressed to Mayors, Fire Chiefs, and Fire Marshals; is sent out by S. W. English, state fire marshal, and should be carefully noted.

A loose fire brand, a high wind and buildings covered with wood shingles are the three principal elements of a conflagration. The combination of these three elements has caused thirteen conflagrations in the United States within the past fifteen years, entailing a property loss of more than sixty million dollars. Three of these conflagrations occurred in the month of March, 1916, the most destructive of which was at Paris in our own State. The property loss at Paris approximated at least ten million dollars, and in hundreds of cases wiped out the savings of a life time.

Buildings with wood shingle roofs we have. High winds we are subject to periodically and can not prevent; so it is against the loose fire brand that we must direct our preventive efforts. The season of the year is now here when a general clean-up is the order of the day. A general clean-up is a good thing since good housekeeping, individually and collectively, is one of the worst enemies of fire waste, yet we must not get careless in the use of the renovating agency—fire, else with our trash and rubbish we may also destroy our home and business.

This communication is to give warning about open fires on windy days. Wait for a still day to burn your dead grass and the winter's accumulation of rubbish, and, in no event, start open fires near buildings. Even a fire under the wash kettle in the yard on a windy day may destroy your town. When you are about to start an open fire on a windy day—think of the danger of a conflagration and beware!
