
SHOWERS OVER M'CULLOCH CO.

McCulloch county has been pretty generally visited by showers the past few days, which have proven refreshing, and in some cases stock water has been put out, while feed and food crops will be greatly bene-

The first shower fell early Wednesday morning. In Brady it was of short duration, the total precipitation amounting to but one-tenth of an inch. In most parts of the county it was likewise light, although a splendid rain was had in the Nine and Calf Creek communities, where several large tanks were filled to overflowing. The rain also extended over towards Menard and out towards San Angelo, Sterling City and other western points, heavy rains being reported from that section. The Concho was reported on an 8-ft. rise at San Angelo and the San Saba river in the Camp San Saba neighborhood was reported on a 4-ft. rise, while Lost Creek was converted into a swollen stream. No rain was had at Hext or points beyond the river.

The second rain came shortly after 7 o'clock yesterday morning, continuing to fall for about an hour. In Brady the rain




