ELTON ABERNATHY RIFLE CLUB HAS BITTEN BY SKUNK 76 MEMBERS NOW

Rabid Animal Sinks Teeth in Lad's Forehead—Boy Taken to Pasteur Institute.

While camped out on the river Tuesday night, Elton, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Miles Abernathy, was bitten by a rabid skunk, the sharp teeth of the vicious animal cutting three or four deep gashes just over the eye and a couple more gashes in the back of his head.

Mr. and Mrs. Abernathy, in company with his brother, L. J. Abernathy, and family, had camped on the river for the night, and while the men went to look at the trot lines, the ladies and children retired. They had scarcely fallen asleep before they were awakened by the lad's screams. Mrs. Abernathy grabbed her son to her, and Mrs. L. J. Abernathy hurried to the scene, where she found the skunk still showing signs of fight. She finally drove the animal away by beating it off with the only weapon at hand, a pillow.

The party went at once to the Frank Wilhelm residence, where the wounds were cauterized, and yesterday they left for Austin, where they will place the lad in the Pasteur Institute to obviate any dangers that might result from the injury.

Status of Club Has Not Been Definitely Established by Government Authorities.

Seventy-six citizens of McCulloch county have voluntarily affixed their name to the list as members of the proposed Rifle club, or Home Guard. While most of those whose names are on the list are Brady citizens, so widespread has the interest in the organization, become that several citizens from rural communities have made request to be allowed to join.

The status of the Rifle club, at present, seems to be in quandary. During a recent visit to San Antonio T. P. Grant made special inquiry as to what the U. S. government would do for such an organization. The only reply that could be secured was that while the old regulations allowed one gun free to every five men so joining, and 120 rounds of ammunition to every member, and also enabled the purchase of Krag-Jorgenson or Springfield rifles at cost, yet so often had the regulations been changed and countermanded, and so chaotic was the state of the war department, that at present nothing definite could be given out.

To secure government recognition it is necessary for a \$10 membership fee to be paid by a home guard, and following such action, it is possible that the matter might be brought to the attention of officials with authority to act, but not even this could be assured. Consequently the matter of taking any further steps will be held in abeyance until information can be had.

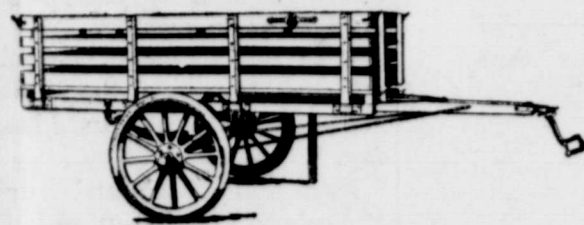
JIM TURMAN ON TRIAL AT LLANO

Jury Secured Wednesday and Numbers of Witnesses Have Been Examined.

The trial of Jim Turman, charged with the killing of Will Kettner at Mason on July 4th of last year, was begun at Llano on Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, Judge Stubbs presiding. The jury was completed Wednesday and five witnesses had been placed on the stand. Something like 200 witnesses were subpoenaed for the trial, but the trial judge later dismissed about 50 of these witnesses. The case is attracting widespread attention, because of the prominence of both the defendant and the deceased.

The details of killing, which occurred on the afternoon of July 4th at Mason, during a big celebration at that place, are more or less familiar to all our readers. Kettner was instantly killed in a pistol duel between himself and Turman, the latter being seriously wounded also, but having later recovered. The

BUYS ALLMAN BAKERY.

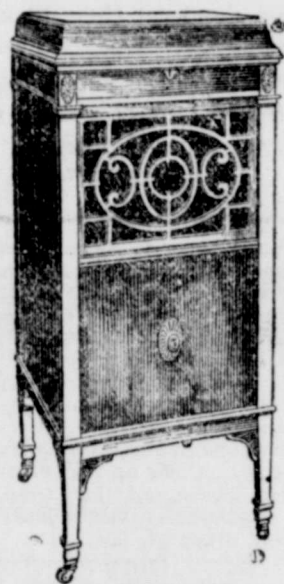
J. Q. Lankford Consolidates Bakery Business With Own.

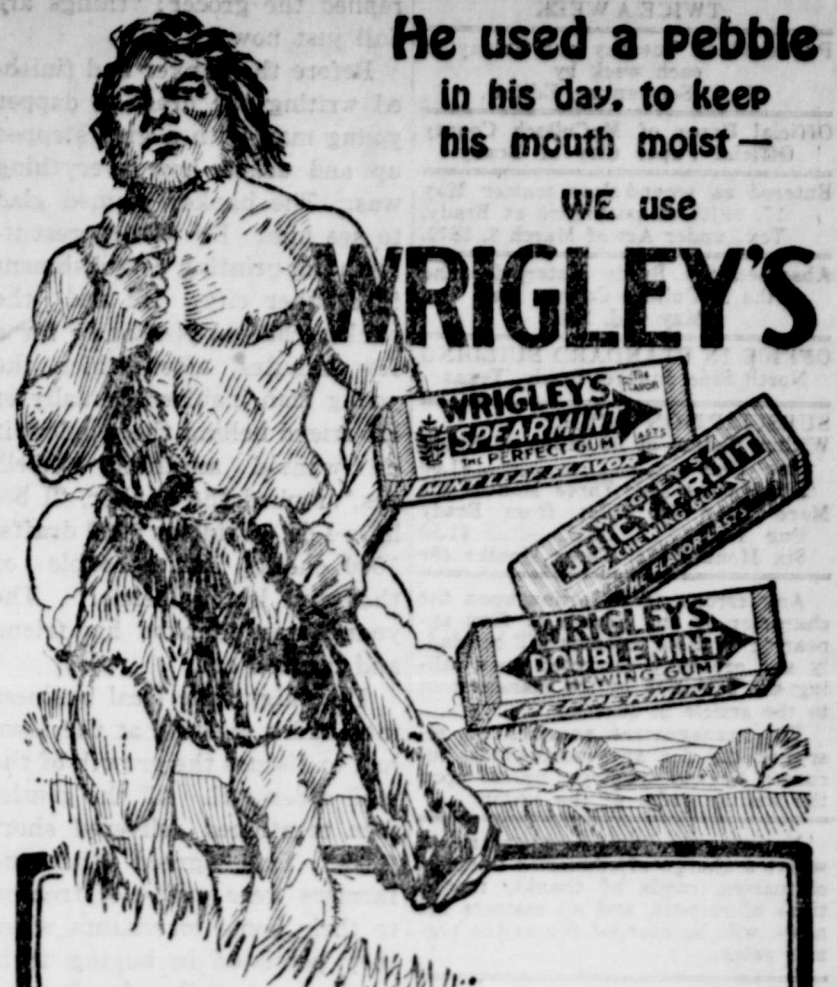

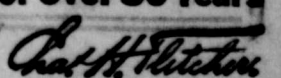

"I want my name to still appear on your list, and thought I'd write you a few scattering thoughts. The order of the day is War—but I think we could have made out without so much war.

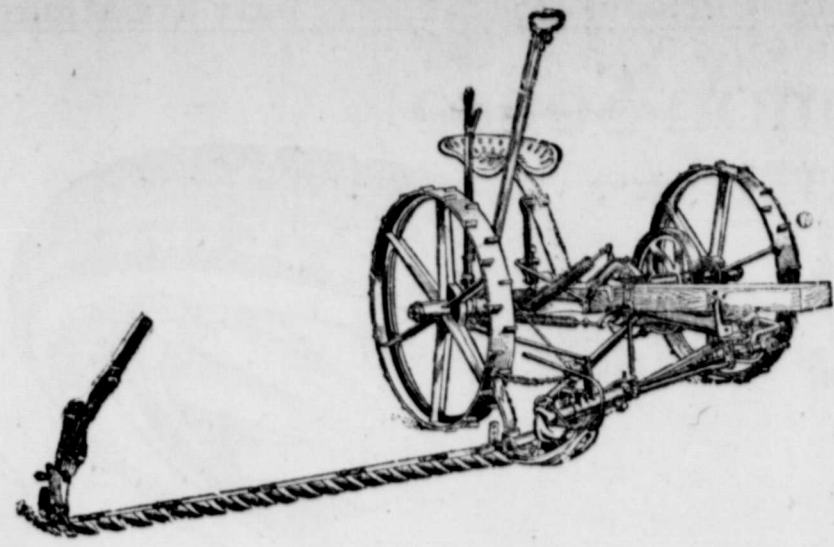

TEXAS ROAD MATERIAL.

Crushed Stone, Gravel and Sand in Demand by U. S. Govt.

Austin, Texas, May 7.—Engineers of the United States Army wish to secure, at the earliest possible date, complete information about available materials for road construction in the Southwest. The authorities of the University of Texas have been requested to collect this information and transmit it to Washington.

To carry out this plan it is necessary to secure the names and addresses of owners and operators of plants producing crushed stone, gravel and sand in every county in Texas. Information is also desired about localities where road materials may be obtained, and the kind of road materials available.

Persons owning gravel pits, sand pits, or stone quarries, or who have information about such deposits, are urged to write and, if possible, to submit samples of the materials to Dr. J. A. Udden, University of Texas, Austin, Texas. By responding at once to this request a great service can be rendered to the work necessary for the defense of the nation and in the development of one of the important national resources of Texas. It is of the utmost importance that action in the matter be taken promptly.

Be master of your car at all times.

Don't attempt to turn out of ruts while under speed.

Remember, at the bottom of each hill you will usually find a culvert, some good and some bad and don't take a chance.

Be considerate at all times. Other users of the road have equal rights with you.

Freshly oiled roads are dangerous—drive slowly.

When approaching a fractious horse stop your car, kill your motor, get out and offer to assist in leading the horse by.

Never under any circumstances drive fast approaching or passing a school.

Upon signal from another driver approaching from the rear, pull over to the extreme right and allow him to pass. The law compels you; courtesy demands it of you.

Spasmodic spurts of speed are dangerous. Hold the speed of your car steady around twenty miles an hour and you will get there more quickly, safely, pleasantly and at less expense.

Speed means serious and fatal accidents, increased tire and repair expense, nervous prostration, loss of appetite, loss of money, time and pleasant disposition.

In case of accidents get the name of every witness and immediately draw a diagram of the position of the car with reference to all surrounding objects as well as the curb lines. This information might save you annoyance, time and money later on.

Stop—When in doubt—at railroad crossings, behind street cars taking on or discharging passengers. Better to cause a delay than an accident.

Chicago, April 26.—A crusade to rid the city of "bums" and at the same time provide help for farmers in "bone dry" states was started here today. The crusade is the result of a conference between Harry Gleason, chief justice of the municipal court; John Whitman, superintendent of the house of correction, and Herman Schuettler, chief of police.

Municipal court judges were instructed to fine the individuals brought before them \$5 and costs, which is equivalent to twenty-two days in the house of correction. There they will be given treatment to get the alcohol out of their systems and at the expiration of their terms will be sent to a "bone dry" commonwealth, where their farmers to solve the food problem.

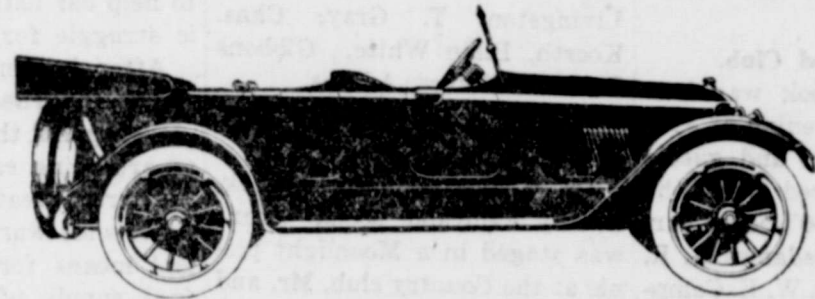

INCREASE CORN PRODUCTION IN CORN REGIONS

Washington, D. C.—The Secretary of Agriculture, today (April 18) issued the following statement:

Corn is America's most important cereal. It can be grown successfully over a wider area than any other and furnishes nutritious food for man as well as the staple grain for cattle and draft animals. The production of corn should be increased this year to the fullest extent, taking into consideration seed, labor, and existing economic conditions, and the availability of good land in corn growing regions not needed more urgently for other crops. The acreage may well be increased in most of the country east of the 100th meridian, as corn, in general, thrives in this region.

An appreciable increase in the corn crop is most feasible, however, in the sections of highest corn production. Favorable growing conditions exist in such regions; farmers there are familiar with corn-growing; they have the necessary equipment available, and have adapted corn production to prevailing economic conditions. Farmers in such regions, through many years of experience, have learned methods of successfully combating adverse conditions. They know that the planting of virile, tested seed in well-tilled, friable soil, immediate replacing the missing hills, and early and continued cultivation of the fields count for much in the ability of the yield. This knowledge should plants to produce a bountiful be put to good use during the

coming season in order that however unfavorable conditions may be production of an exceptionally large crop may be assured.

In practically every county in the country in which experience has shown that corn may be produced successfully, the possibilities of increasing the corn crop without encroaching upon other important crops is at least worthy of consideration, if land, labor, and seed are available.

RECEIVES CONTRACT.

W. P. Gray Successful Bidder on Brownwood Ward School.

W. P. Gray of Brady was awarded the contract for the construction of the Coggin Addition ward school last night by the board of trustees. Eight bids were submitted, most of the bidders preparing estimates on both the plans submitted by the board. The successful bid is for the construction of an eighteen-room building. Plans had also been prepared for a twelve-room building. The contract price of the building is \$27,559.

Contractor Gray promised the board that he would begin construction work immediately, and a time limit of five months. This will provide for the completion of the building in time for next year's school work.

The new building is to be of Brownwood brick throughout, Brownwood face brick also being used. The plan of construction is entirely modern, and, according to the board of trustees, each member of which has given much time to a study of such matters during the past few months, is arranged with a view to the convenience of the pupils in every detail. There will be no basement, although the first floor will be a few inches below the surface of the ground. There will be six class rooms on each floor.

While such an arrangement will not be practicable at once, the board plans as soon as possible to arrange a boiler room, kitchen, dining room and such conveniences on the ground floor. This will not be done, however, until the sewer system is extended to Coggin Addition, and until a second ward school is built for that portion of the city to relieve the crowded condition of the new school. Whether the small wooden buildings will be retained at this school next year has not been determined, there being some uncertainty as yet as to how many pupils will be enrolled in the school.

The walls of the old burned building will be torn away, and the new building will be erected approximately on the same site. The large campus is an ideal one for school purposes, and the new building will be located so as to give the entire school plant the best possible appearance. — Brownwood Bulletin.

MOTORS SEEN IN NATION'S DEFENSE

Timely Exhibition of Highly Interesting Motion Pictures Arranged for This City.

Probably no more opportune time could have been selected for showing the motion picture, "The Motor Car in Defense of the Nation," which will appear at the Lyric Theatre, next Wednesday and Thursday, May 16th and 17th.

Intimate views of all the New England governors are shown, as well as an interesting experiment in which the motor car was hoisted aboard a battleship to prove that it is useful, even as a part of the naval equipment.
