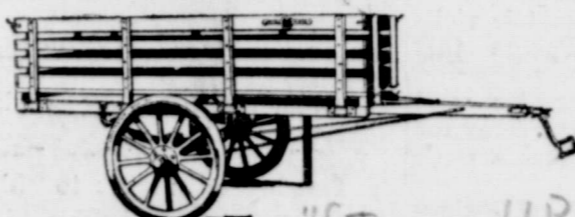

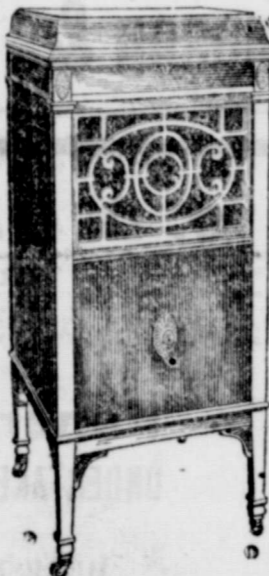

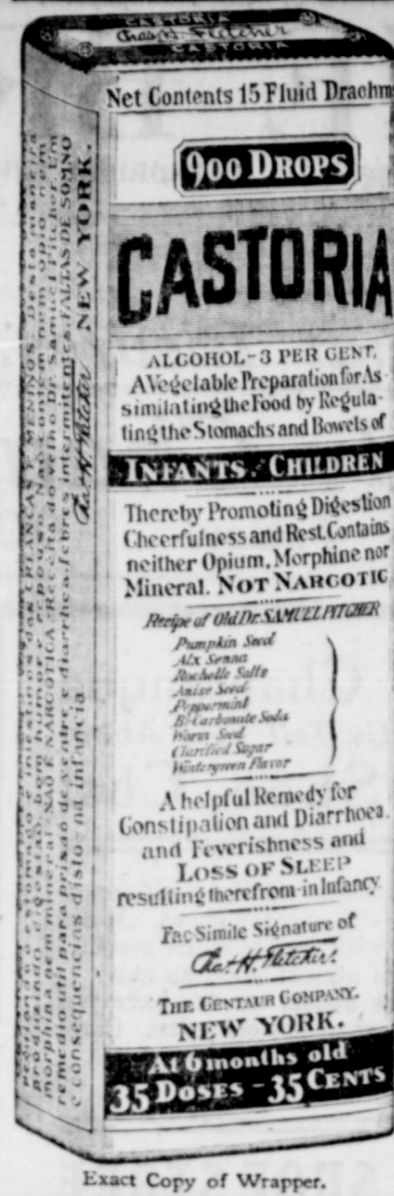

**PASS AVIATION EXAMINATIONS**

With Flying Colors—Messrs. Bill White, Boy Crothers and Bostic Roddie.

Three Brady boys, Messrs. Bill White, Boy Crothers and Bostic Roddie, are congratulating themselves upon having successfully passed the rigid aviation tests, and while their friends and relatives, for sentimental reasons, may not share the joyous feeling, they are nevertheless proud of the fact that these boys have made such a splendid showing.

The boys state that the examination includes every imaginable test—and the fact that all three passed is regarded as remarkable, since out of fifteen who were examined with them, only five passed successfully—one boy from Houston, another from Dallas and the three Brady boys. In a class examined just before them, seven out of ten failed to stand the test.

The boys were first examined by the head of the aviation board, and a thousand and one questions were asked them as to their physical and mental fitness. Then for two and one-half days they were submitted to various other tests. Hot and cold water was shot into their ears and the effect noted; their eyes were dilated; they were required to shut their eyes and raise up on their toes, maintaining their balance; they were asked to shut their eyes and hop on one foot to a certain spot and then hop backwards to the point of starting. Finally they underwent the most searching of physical examinations. Thruout the gruelling ordeal, the boys maintained their composure and their pluck was rewarded when the examiner finally passed them.

The boys returned Wednesday to Brady and are spending the time here while awaiting orders, which may come any day and again which may not be received before July 1st. There are now six aviation schools in the U. S.—in California, Long Island, Florida, Newport News, Va., New York City and one other place. It is very probable that they will be ordered to some southern aviation school, either in California or in Florida, or possibly at Newport News, as soon as a vacancy occurs in the training corps at one of these places.

### PASS AVIATION EXAMINATIONS

With Flying Colors—Messrs. Bill White, Boy Crothers and Bostic Roddie.

Three Brady boys, Messrs. Bill White, Boy Crothers and Bostic Roddie, are congratulating themselves upon having successfully passed the rigid aviation tests, and while their friends and relatives, for sentimental reasons, may not share the joyous feeling, they are nevertheless proud of the fact that these boys have made such a splendid showing.

The boys state that the examination includes every imaginable test—and the fact that all three passed is regarded as remarkable, since out of fifteen who were examined with them, only five passed successfully—one boy from Houston, another from Dallas and the three Brady boys. In a class examined just before them, seven out of ten failed to stand the test.

The boys were first examined by the head of the aviation board, and a thousand and one questions were asked them as to their physical and mental fitness. Then for two and one-half days they were submitted to various other tests. Hot and cold water was shot into their ears and the effect noted; their eyes were dilated; they were required to shut their eyes and raise up on their toes, maintaining their balance; they were asked to shut their eyes and hop on one foot to a certain spot and then hop backwards to the point of starting. Finally they underwent the most searching of physical examinations. Thruout the gruelling ordeal, the boys maintained their composure and their pluck was rewarded when the examiner finally passed them.

The boys returned Wednesday to Brady and are spending the time here while awaiting orders, which may come any day and again which may not be received before July 1st. There are now six aviation schools in the U. S.—in California, Long Island, Florida, Newport News, Va., New York City and one other place. It is very probable that they will be ordered to some southern aviation school, either in California or in Florida, or possibly at Newport News, as soon as a vacancy occurs in the training corps at one of these places.
