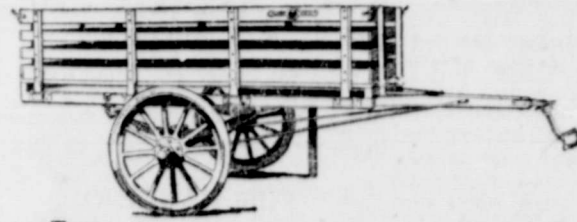
## SCHOOL BOARD NAMES TEACHERS

### \$50,000 LIBERTY BONDS.

To be Awarded in Maxwell Economy Test—June 16-25.

Broad Mercantile Co., local representatives for the Maxwell Motor Co., are in receipt of several day letter messages from Walter E. Flanders, president and general manager of that company, stating \$50,000 in Liberty Bonds will be awarded in a nation-wide Maxwell auto economy test to be conducted June 16 to 25th.

Half of the sum named will be awarded to private owners of Maxwell cars and the other half to Maxwell dealers. The test is to equip a Maxwell car with a tank holding exactly one gallon gasoline, and then see how far that quantity will carry it. In a recent test 2,000 Maxwells averaged about 30 miles per gallon. One car smashed all records by making over 49 miles. Another car just the other day made the distance from Dallas to Fort Worth in 32 minutes, or at an average speed of a mile a minute. At times the car made 65 miles an hour and the expert driving, trained as he was, could hardly hold the car in the road so fast did it travel.

Edd Broad is greatly interested in the proposed test, and in view of the excellent showing made by some of the local cars,

he will endeavor to have some of them enter the contest.

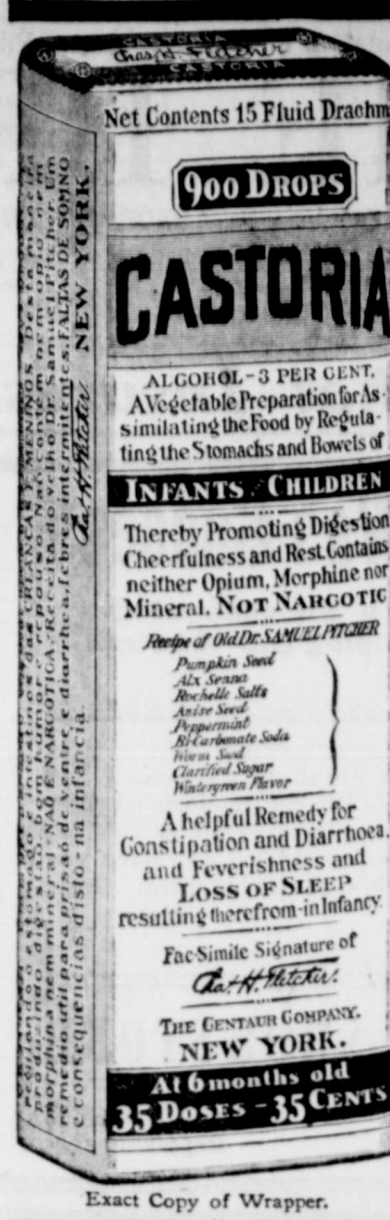

## CHEER, BOYS, THE STREET WORK'S ON

Blackburn Street Being Torn Up, Re-Bedded and Rolled.—Work Progresses Rapidly.

Under the superintendency of Alderman N. T. Cook, chairman of the street committee of the Brady council, the work of improving Blackburn street was begun yesterday, and an interesting crowd watched the operations throughout the greater part of the day.

H. McGee, representing Austin Bros. of Dallas, and who sold the city the big ten-ton Kelly Springfield engine, arrived yesterday morning to demonstrate the work of which the machine is capable and to instruct the city's crew in its operation. In order to make the test thorough, the engine was attached to the county's scarifier and set to work tearing up the macadam on Blackburn street. This macadam had become thoroughly packed by numerous rollings and by constant travel and made a splendid test for the new machine. Although the work started late in the morning, and was rendered more difficult by reason of the breaking in of new hands, good progress was made, and the work of scarifying the street from the square to the top of the hill was completed early today. The new engine has a 50-h. p. gasoline motor, is exceptionally quiet in running, and gives every indication of its capability to do the work assigned.

A demonstration test of the new road grader is being made today. The new machine is in charge of a man sent out by the Austin Western Co. of Dallas, sales agents, and instructions in the use of this machine are being given. Following the regrading of the street, it will be wet down and thoroughly re-packed by the combined engine and roller. Should an opportune rain come before the street is re-rolled, it will aid greatly in giving the street a smooth, firm surface.

The engine has been at work the past several days in the operation of the rock crusher in the vicinity of the Christian church, and a great amount of surfacing material has been accumulated. However, because of the urgent need of work in other sections of the town, no effort will be made at present to make a finished job of grading on Blackburn. As soon as the test of the new machinery is decided sufficient and the street can be placed in good condition, the scene of operation will be changed to North Bridge street, which will be graded and given a heavy surface of crushed rock. Following this attention will be given the courthouse square.

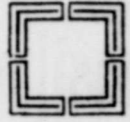

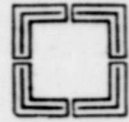

**PLANS BEST YET**

President R. E. L. Knight Declares They Have No Equal on the Continent.

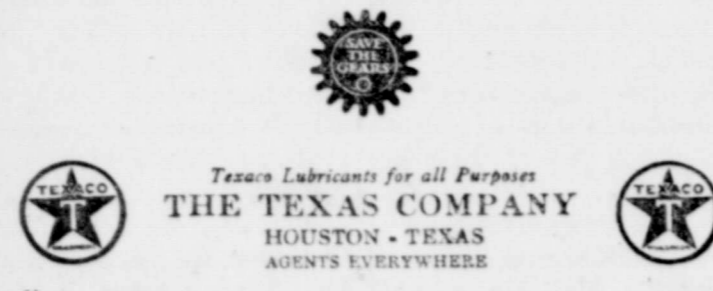

## IT COSTS TO BE EXCLUSIVE

Carnegie and Other Millionaires Pay High for Adjacent Property in Order to Protect Their Homes.

Possessing a mansion in the metropolis apparently is not without its troubles, observes the New York Globe. Recently Andrew Carnegie paid \$1,750,000 for the privilege of deciding who shall be his neighbors to the south. A few years ago Mr. Carnegie similarly protected himself to the north, where a select colony of homes has since been established.

In the case of Mr. Carnegie these seemingly wasted millions work a double purpose. In addition to preventing undesirable construction they become very profitable investments, as the land is turned over piece by piece to persons who will pay handsomely for the privilege of joining a millionaire's home colony.

Commandore Arthur Curtiss James conducted a similar protective buying movement on Park avenue. He bought up all available lands adjacent to his million-dollar residence at Sixty-ninth street.

## SPADING BY MACHINERY.

One objection to starting the back yard vegetable garden has been overcome by the invention of a small motor-power spading machine. The contrivance is designed for use on farms too small for the lightest tractors. It is mounted on a truck body and controlled by plow handles. Two spading forks driven by a piston, operate alternately. Main springs are connected to the shanks of the spading tools below their pivots. Counter-balancing springs are connected above the pivots. This arrangement permits the spades to yield individually either forward or backward when a rock is encountered. The cost of operating such a machine should not be as great as the expense of feeding a horse. Its use would remove some of the closeness of contact with the earth that the amateur gardener likes to talk about, but it would also probably result in the completion of more back yard gardens after they have been started.—Indianapolis News.

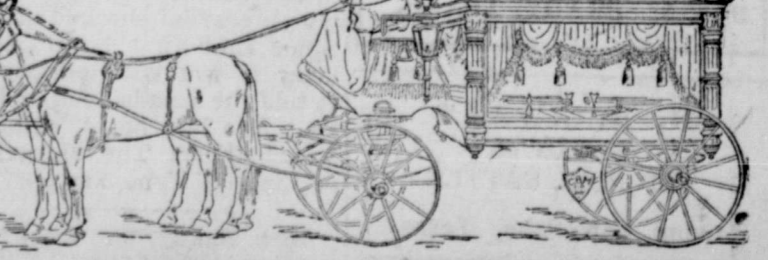
