#### Something Like \$25,000 Invested in Bonds by Patriotic Citizens.

Subscriptions to the Liberty Bonds had totaled very near \$25,000 up to the present in Brady, with today as the last day for receiving applications for the bonds. While the greater part of this amount was taken by Brady citizens, yet several citizens of neighboring and inland communities had come forth voluntarily and contributed "their bit."

While the total amount apportioned to McCulloch county was \$91,000, yet it is generally understood that this is the pro rata part of the entire \$7,000,000,000 fund authorized by congress and not of the \$2,000,000,000 included in the Liberty Loan. The basis of the apportionment is said to have been taken from the bank showings of McCulloch county.

The following business was transacted:

A. Oliver, N. P. Crump and E. O. Perry were appointed trustees of Carroll Colony Common School Dist. No. 37, to serve until next election.

Ordered that delinquent tax list be published in The Brady Standard for length of time required by law.

Canvassed the returns of an election held June 9th, in Claxton Common School District No. 45, for the issuance of \$3,200 of school house bonds. Court declared said bonds carried by vote of 26 to 22 in favor of the bond issue.

Board of equalization on June 12th heard all complaints of tax payers against the raising of taxes.

Report of John Martin, sheep inspector of McCulloch county, for quarter ending June 13th, was approved.

Monthly report of S. H. Mayo, tax collector, examined and approved.

Court let the contract to the Alamo Construction Company of San Antonio for a low water concrete bridge, to be built over Lost Creek on Brady and Austin road, 4 1-2 miles from Voca. Bridge to be completed July 15, 1917, at a cost of \$1600.

After a careful consideration of all business before it, the court adjourned Thursday evening.

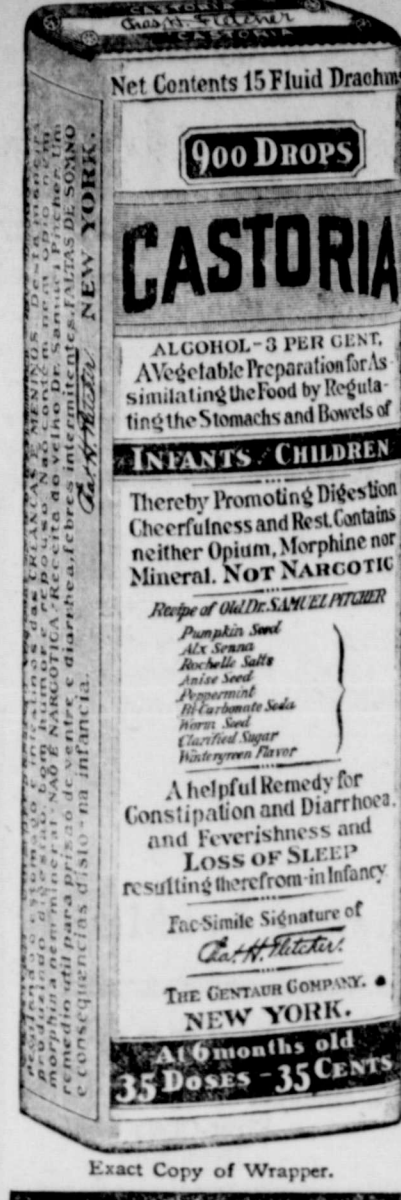

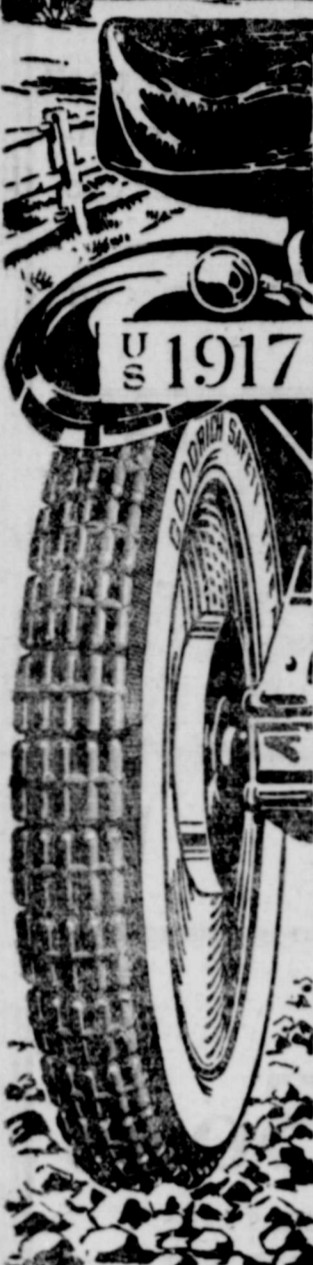

### OXYGEN DRAWN BY ALUMINUM

One Never Sees the Metal in Air Except Through Veil of Superficial Oxide, It Is Said.

Aluminum is in many ways a wonderful substance, albeit in the natural world most of it is oxidized and turned to clay. Its avidity for oxygen is one of its most salient characteristics. It is said that one never sees the metal, directly, in air, but always and only through a veil of superficial oxide which forms on its free surface with marvelous rapidity. It is stated that if a fresh surface of aluminum be prepared by scraping with a knife the oxygen of the air runs in as fast as the scale is peeled off and keeps close behind the knifeblade.

If it were not for this superficial scale of oxide, which acts as a barrier to further action, the metal would burn up, or deflagrate, in air. The large amount of heat developed by thermit, a mixture of powdered aluminum with oxygen-giving substances, bears witness to the activity of the oxidizing process when completed.

### POETS AND SINGERS NEEDED

Famous Writer Declares Races of Artists Have Also Been the Greatest in Material Activities.

Hamilton Wright Mabie, perhaps the leading man of letters in America in recent years, who died recently, used to say, "There ought to be at least one poet to every hundred captains of industry, one singer to every hundred thousand workmen. "It is a great mistake to imagine that the races which produce the poets and artists are the races that dream and do not act. On the contrary, the executive races have also been the artistic races. "The Greek was not only the first artist among ancient people, but he was also the successful rival of the Phœnician who was the greatest trader of his time.

"All material activities and accumulations of every sort are subjects for the poet, and no materials or accumulations fulfill their highest ends until they have been transformed into poetry."

### LOCATING LOST PIPES.

Locating lost or hidden water pipes is the function of a newly patented device which promises to be a friend to the plumber and to the municipality which has to repair its water pipes. The new machine is expected to prove useful by cutting the amount of digging necessary to locating a leaky pipe down to a minimum—a very useful quality where paving has to be torn up. Such a device is also badly needed where a leak must be found quickly to prevent flooding. The detective is an electric one, consisting of two connecting wires and a microphone worn by the man operating it. The connections are fastened to the nearest terminals of the pipe, and by listening in the microphone the operator can tell when he is directly over the hidden section.

### SUEZ CANAL 50 YEARS OLD

Great Britain Obtained Complete Control of Waterway in 1876, Although It Was French Project.

It was more than half a century ago, on February 17, 1867, that the first vessel of any size passed through the Suez canal from the Mediterranean sea.

The completion of the Suez canal imposed upon Great Britain the gigantic task of protecting the sea route to her Asiatic empire. Gibraltar and Malta, already in Britain's possession, were important links in the chain. The peninsula of Aden, controlling the entrance into the Red sea, was fortified on a vast scale, and a protectorate was acquired over a large inland region. Cyprus, Sokotra island and the Kuria Muria islands, off the Arabian coast, added new links to the defensive chain, and it has been said that the Red sea is now "more distinctively British than is St. George's channel, between England and Ireland." Great Britain obtained proprietary control of the Suez canal in 1876 by purchasing the shares of the Egyptian khedive for about \$20,000,000, although it was a French project and its completion was due to French genius.

### COWS USED FOR SIGNALING

Bulgarian Cowherd Transmitted Military News by Moving Animals About on Top of Hill.

At the battle of Ishtib a Bulgarian cowherd signaled news to his military countrymen relative to the position of the Serbian battalions by moving five cows about in various ways on the top of a hill.

The Basutos, by the way, practically anticipated "wireless telegraphy" in a crude fashion. That is, by striking heavily on a huge drum of goatskin, which is placed on a special spot, another Basuto at a distance can gather the purport of the message by placing his ear close to the ground to catch the vibrations; and then he, in turn, passes the message on.

Of course, given suitable climatic conditions, the military heliograph can transmit messages over enormous tracts of country, and the record is probably held by an Englishman, Captain Sadler of the Sixth Dragoon Guards, who, by this means, succeeded in South Africa in sending a message direct a distance of 130 miles.

## TRAMWAY MEN IN KHAKI

British Street Railway Men Serving Their Country in Army and Navy.

Twenty-seven thousand eight hundred and fourteen employees of 91 municipal and 73 company tramways in the united kingdom had joined the army and navy up to the beginning of August. These figures are, of course, being continually added to owing to the calling up of men under the military service act.

At the beginning of August 8,768 woman conductors and 189 woman drivers were employed by municipal tramways, the drivers numbering 150 at Glasgow, the remaining 39 being employed at Ayr, Cardiff, Doncaster, York and Blackburn. In addition, there are 1,295 women working as car cleaners, etc., on municipal systems.

## THE COST OF DELIVERY.

A new investigation bearing on the high cost of living in the United States is to be undertaken by the federal bureau of the census. The inquiry will be directed toward determining how far the cost of cartage in cities is responsible for the increasing retail prices of commodities in common use. Experts of the census bureau, it is said, believe that the city delivery system even more than railroad freight rates figures largely in the high cost of living. Provision for the expense of the investigation has already been made and work will be commenced as soon as Secretary of Commerce Redfield gives formal authorization for it.

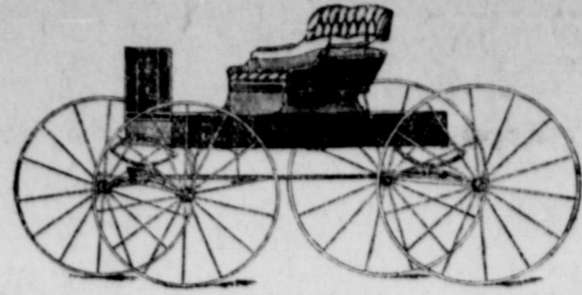

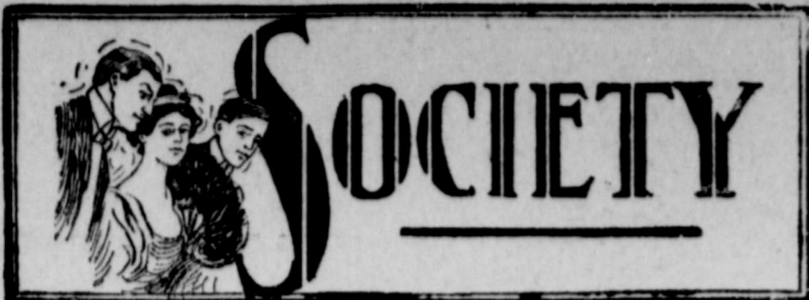

Mr. Hallum had even gone so far as to make arrangements to send men to Flint, Mich., and have some fifteen or more Buicks driven to Brady, overland—a distance of about 1400 miles. Mr. Hallum's trip to Dallas was to ascertain the correctness of this report, and if he finds this plan impossible, it is still his intention to have the cars driven through. Delmar Connally's Letter Snacks of Salt Sea Breezes.

Here's a letter that almost carries the reader to where the salt sea breezes blow. It was written by Delmar Connally to home folks, but there is so much of general interest in it that we give it publication for the benefit of our readers:

"I will write you a few lines to let you know I am well and hope you all are the same. I have gotten out of the mess tent. I have just been over to see Ben Reed while he had a rest out of the mess hall. You know between meals he gets to rest for he says he is very tired after each meal, being on his feet so much.

"The Adkins bunch must be warriors, Hubert and Evans both going to the officers' reserve corps. I just noticed in the paper where they went. Have you got the pictures yet from Fort Worth? We will get another pay day next Friday, that is a week from tomorrow. Ben and I are going to have our pictures made then. I will send you all one. I think we will get the rest of our uniforms this week. That is a peacoat, 2 more suits of blue; 2 more suits of white and a flat hat or dress hat, as the proper name for them is. There are about three Texas boys here to one from any other state. Texas is a familiar word around here; we don't get lonesome because so many Texans are around here. As the saying, they are 'thick as hair on a dog's back.'

"I have met several boys here who live at San Saba and Llano, and have met others who have been in Brady and they all seem like home folks. They changed us around in our tents again. That is, they put us alphabetically. I am in the tent with two fellows, one by the name of Bang of Minnesota and the other one is Barnhill of Iowa. I don't know much about Barnhill, he is in the hospital, but Bang is a good fellow. Now think of that, Texas the most southern state and Minnesota one of the most northern—both in the same tent. That is one thing this trip has been of benefit to all these boys from the different parts of the country. It has helped to bring them all together and helped the East understand the West better, and the North understand the South better. Anyway, if there were no war fought we could all go back home and much better appreciate the nation as a whole.

"This fellow, Bang, is a school-boy just lacks one year being ready for the University. His father offered him \$1,000.00 not to come to the navy, but to go on and finish, but he was kind of turned toward the sea, he told me, and refused his father's offer and came to serve Uncle Sam. You know by that they must be pretty well to do, and I could tell by little things he dropped in his talk that they were a refined family.

"I consider myself lucky to get such a tent-mate, when I could just as easily have gotten the other kind, for in the navy, the same as outside life, there are various characters of men. "We sure live, too, because each week he is always getting a box of candy from home or from some of his college girl friends. Some of that candy those girls make is the best yet. I never yet tasted such a fine article in the candy line.

"Yesterday we had some excitement. One of Uncle Sam's warships pulled into harbor here. It was the 'Luzon,' one of the warships that Dewey captured from the Spaniards in the battle of Manila Bay. Of course, it

looked like a giant to us, but our officers informed us that a broadside from the Texas, New York or Pennsylvania would make kindling wood out of her. Of course you know it is 20 years old and the new ones have such decided improvements over those old models. Still it's guns are effective at a range of 7 or 9 miles, and it is stationed here in the lake on guard duty. In case Germans were to try to slip across the lake and attack this station, it is supposed to stop them. But there is little likelihood of that, as Canada keeps her frontier guarded pretty well.

"The captains gave us a talk (that I'll remember always) here on the lake shore. He told us to look on this warship and think of the famous fighting man that captured her. He told us that while we were yet greeners, that to never lose courage, but keep up courage always and bring more victories yet to the Stars and Stripes. It sure was some talk and as we looked on the old ship we thought of that May day over nineteen years ago when Dewey 'licked 'em before breakfast' in Manila Bay, and there were some sober minds, too, believe me, at the close of that talk.

"This morning she left with about 20,000 jackies cheering and as they say down there, 'rearing to go,' (ha, ha.) Well, there's not much more to tell. Ben and myself are both well and Ben sends you all his

best regards. I think I will transfer to his company some time this week, so when we get mail from home we can both tell one another the news. He takes the Sentinel and I The Standard, and we see each other about once a week and usually it is in a hurry, so I am going to try to transfer to his company. It will be a little trouble, but I think Mr. Storm will do it if I approach him right.

"Well, as news is scarce, I will close."
