The bulk of his work here was one summer about in '59 between his junior and senior years at Texas Tech. He did a bang-up job for The Blade during that summer and even came back here on weekends some after that to work.

We hated to see him go when he had the opportunity to advance.

As it turned out, though, he went on to much greater things and now has a high-powered job with a big outfit in Fort Worth. His only connection now, as far as we know, with weekly newspapers is reading them.

If he learned enough to get out of the business, maybe his experience in this area was highly beneficial.

Anyway, we're proud to have been associated with J. Vernon and greatly appreciate his letter this week. We wish he wasn't so strongly considering voting for a Republican governor come November, but things like that are the chances you have to take when you have friends.

We wish we'd had the opportunity to publish his letter--- save the last three or four paragraphs---prior to the Democratic Runoff Primary.

Assassinations of prominent political leaders in this country during recent years have indicated that the US isn't as far advanced into civilization as many of us had been led to believe.

It almost seems that we aren't far removed from "jungle law" and we don't know what to do about this situation except to realize that it exists.

A sad state of affairs it is any way you look at it.

Doctor, Clinic Board Have New Agreement

Dr. Cornelius Blesius, Bovina's new medical doctor, is expected to be ready to begin his practice here by early July.

He gave that report to members of the board of directors of Bovina Medical Clinic, Inc. at a Monday night meeting.

Dr. Blesius has purchased complete equipment for the new \$50,000 clinic except for the x-ray machine. The equipment is expected to be delivered and installed within the next two weeks. Some of it is already here and ready for use.

New arrangements were worked out with the doctor at the meeting this week. Original plans, made last month, were for the organization to furnish the building, equipment and an assistant with the doctor paying \$500 per month to the corporation.

That plan was abandoned Monday night and a new one agreed on. It calls for the doctor to furnish all the equipment except the x-ray machine and pay his assistants.

The corporation will provide the clinic building rent-free, purchase the x-ray machine at a cost of \$2000 and provide the utilities for the building.

This arrangement is for a period of one year with the agreement that it will be reviewed by the board and the doctor at the end of six months.

Dr. Blesius recently received his license to practice medicine in Texas. A native of Germany, he was educated there. He was associated with a hospital in New Jersey from June of last year until several weeks ago when negotiations began for him to use the community-owned clinic here.

Arrangements for the x-ray machine were made this week. It, too, is expected to be installed and ready for use in the next couple of weeks.

The doctor expressed satisfaction and gratitude for the arrangements which were worked out at the Monday night meeting. Board members were likewise pleased with the setup.

He expects now to have two assistants, a nurse and a receptionist-bookkeeper.

Estimates indicate that this arrangement plus funds already owed by the corporation will cost about \$10,000. The board

plans to borrow that amount, approximately, from First State Bank.

Pledges to the clinic which are presently due and unpaid total in the neighborhood of \$5000. The board is making an urgent

appeal to people who have not paid their pledges to do so this month.

Following the meeting, the directors adjourned to the new

Name Christian Head Of BTD Celebration

Wendol Christian will be general chairman of Bovina's Bull Town Days Celebration. The three-day event is scheduled for the third weekend in August -- Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 15th, 16th and 17th.

Announcement of Christian being named to the post was made at a director's meeting of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Thursday noon at Bovina Restaurant.

Christian will succeed C. E. Trimble as the head man of the celebration. Trimble has held the position for the past two years.

Co-sponsors of the commun-

ity-wide celebration, which is climaxed with a free barbecue supper for thousands of people, are the chamber and Bovina Roping Club. Christian is a member of both organizations.

Named to assist the general chairman were two assistant chairmen. They are Rouel Barron, a former president of the Roping Club, and Bob Fillpot, manager of the chamber of commerce and agriculture.

Planning for the celebration has been underway since the 1967 event ended. The general outline of activities is expected to follow that of recent years.

An added attraction this year

will be carnival-type rides which will be in town for a week-long stay, beginning Monday night and continuing through Saturday night.

Tentative arrangements have been made with Bovina Lions Club to be in charge of the ticket sales for the rides. The rides are expected to be set

up at the baseball field where adequate lighting is available. Organization of the community will be invited to operate carnival-type booths in the vicinity of the rides. The celebration will receive 20 per cent of the gross ticket sales for the rides. The organizations which operate booths will be allowed to keep their entire receipts, according to present plans.

Receiving 80 per cent of the gross ticket sales will be the company which owns and operates the rides, an Amarillo firm.

Medical Corpsman Garry W. Beauchamp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Beauchamp of Bovina, was wounded recently in Vietnam. His company was ambushed. Beauchamp was wounded as he was helping an injured marine. He had been in Vietnam four months.

Mrs. Beauchamp reports that her son's left leg was injured. He underwent surgery aboard a Naval vessel then again Thursday in Honolulu, Hawaii. The Beauchamps talked with the surgeon Thursday night and he reported Garry's condition as good. He is expected to be flown to the states in approximately two weeks for convalescence.

Beauchamp is a 1965 graduate of Bovina High School and attended Texas Tech before entering the Navy.

Bad Weather Misses Crop Up To Know

With hopes high because of potentially good yields and enthusiasm low because of predicted low prices, area farmers are on the brink of launching the 1968 wheat harvest.

Yieldwise, the crop is expected to be as good as any and better than most. This is almost an oddity in itself because the crop got off to a slow start last fall due to a shortage of rain and poor weather for the crop.

Grazing conditions of the crop last fall, for instance, were considered below average because of the lack of growth.

The crop did an about face during the past two months, however, and has "come on like Gangbusters" to indicate that the number of bushels produced per acre will be good.

The price, on the other hand, is expected to be the lowest in years --- slightly under the amount received last year.

Some early fields of wheat may be cut this week or at least "sampled."

Bulk of the harvest is expected to be done the last two weeks of the month with perhaps some late loads coming in the first week in July.

This observation is based on the weather permitting normal harvesting of the crop.

This year's wheat crop has escaped hail damage throughout the area.

Farmers are hopeful they can get the wheat cut and delivered to the elevators before severe weather strikes as it so often does this time of the year.

Erith Hawkins, who is employed by Tuloma Gas Products Co., was severely burned by anhydrous ammonia last week.

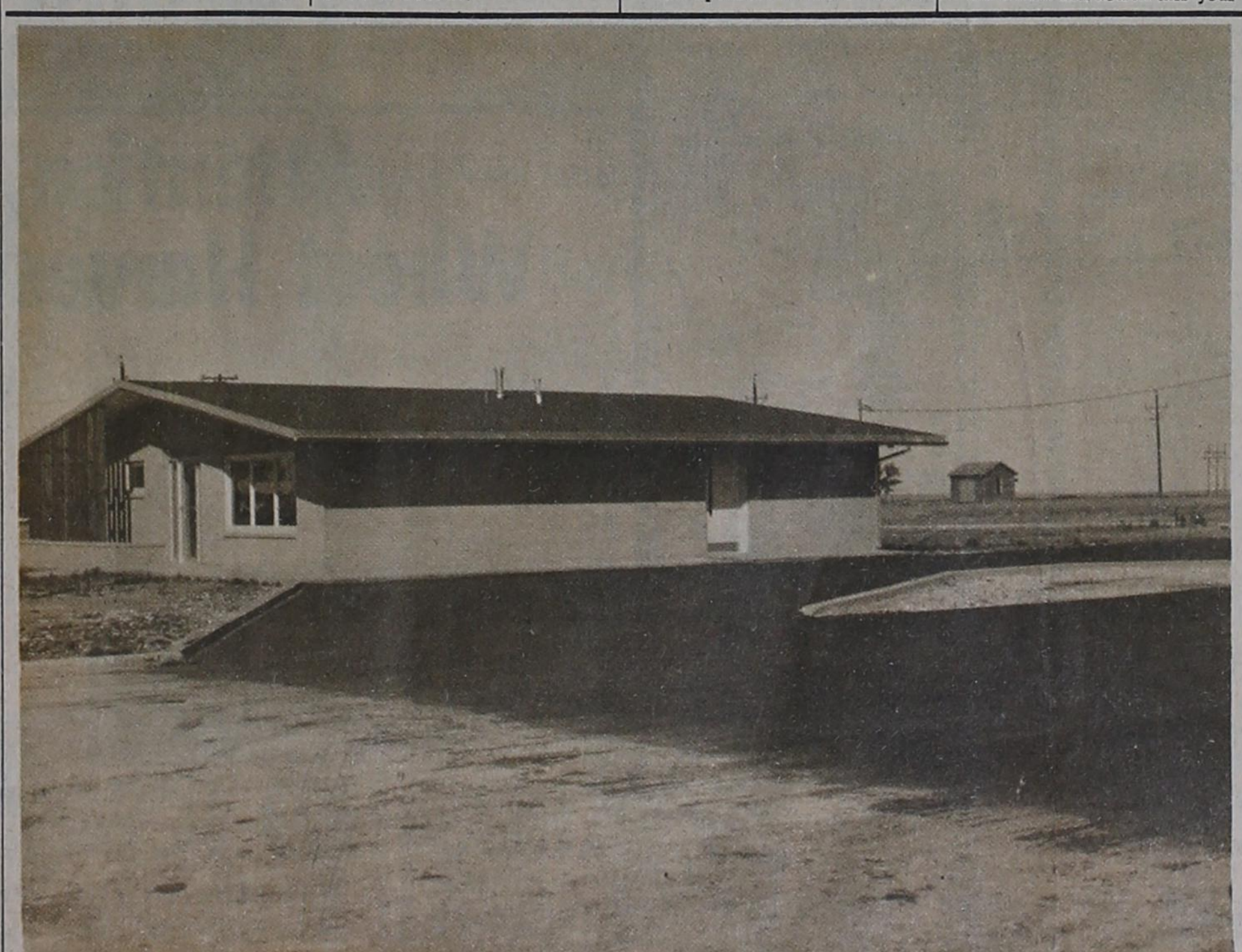
He suffered burns on his arms and chest.

Dear Dolph:

I'm so glad that we finally backed the same candidate in an election that I just can't stand to pass up the opportunity to tell you about it. I supported and voted for Don Yarborough in the Democratic Runoff Election because he at least had something to say and some action to propose on the important issues of the day. Meanwhile, your good Lubbock buddy Preston Smith's only claim to fame was that he has been a public office holder for 18 years.

Now you and I will both agree that experience is valuable in most any endeavor--provided it's good experience. But I cannot agree with Mr. Smith that 18 years of merely taking up space in the State Capitol can be claimed as qualifications for the highest office in Texas. In all of Mr. Smith's vast advertising program, I did not hear him claim a single worthwhile accomplishment for all his years as the silent man in Austin.

The fact that Mr. Smith should receive the nomination over Don Yarborough, whose proposals for improving state government may stimulate even Mr. Smith's thinking, illustrates that Texans are deathly afraid of labels. The Labor-Liberal label worn by Mr. Yarborough blinded many Texans to any sound plank the Yarborough platform contained. Mr. Yarborough was pre-judged by a vast segment of Texas voters. The fact that he proposed one of the most forward-looking administrations ever offered in Texas could not overcome the prejudice caused by his unpopular label. Meanwhile, Mr. Smith could only stumble through press conferences, evading every question that had any bearing on the future course of state government and all the while smile broadly and say that he was a "sound, conservative candidate."

This apparently was all Texas voters wanted to hear. Mr. Smith proposed no conservative-type programs. He didn't say how he would conservatively propose to raise new taxes to run state government. He didn't say how he would conservatively improve Texas educational system. He had no conservative program for industrial development in Texas. But Mr. Smith, capitalizing on the fear and love for labels,

'Food Fun' Course Set Here For July

Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative's Food Fun for Juniors is scheduled for Bovina the week of July 1-6.

The summer program is for elementary school girls, age nine to 12. It is designed to teach the principles of basic food preparation, good kitchen management, meal planning, basic nutrition, table setting and hints about table manners.

The classes will be conducted in the home economics building. The program here depends on a sufficient number of students, according to Ray Simpson, members services advisor of the electric company. Fifteen is considered a proper number for a class, he says.

Application blanks for the course are available at The Blade office.

Miss Nancy Hicks of Canyon has been employed by the Co-op to conduct the Food Fun classes. Miss Hicks is a junior student in the Home Economics Department at Texas Tech. She is majoring in child development.

Simpson says Miss Hicks is a highly qualified person for the position. She has had college courses in nutrition, meal management, household equipment, child psychology, child guidance, and child growth and development. In addition, she has taught in Sunday School and Vacation Bible School. Miss Hicks is past president of Area I and past state president of Future Homemakers of America.

Mr. Eggers is a Republican and already thousands of voters have closed their minds to any constructive changes he may propose for Texas.

You, for instance, have already said that you will support Preston Smith in November. How can you make this statement so early in the game unless you are also a blind label follower?

Texas faces some important problems today. Better control of liquor, promotion of tourism and industry, control of crime, education, new taxes, auto insurance rates--these are the issues Texas' new governor must deal with.

The fact that Mr. Smith is a good ol' West Texas boy who goes to church and has been at the state feed trough for 18 years certainly doesn't mean he is qualified to run out state government.

I will be listening closely to what Paul Eggers has to say, because, frankly, I don't feel we can afford the luxury of letting a man with Mr. Smith's demonstrated ineffectiveness live in the governor's mansion for even two years. I don't fear labels like Republican, Liberal, Eastern Power Candidate, Big City Politician--DO YOU?

Let me hear from you, Dolph, and I hope to see you sometime this summer.

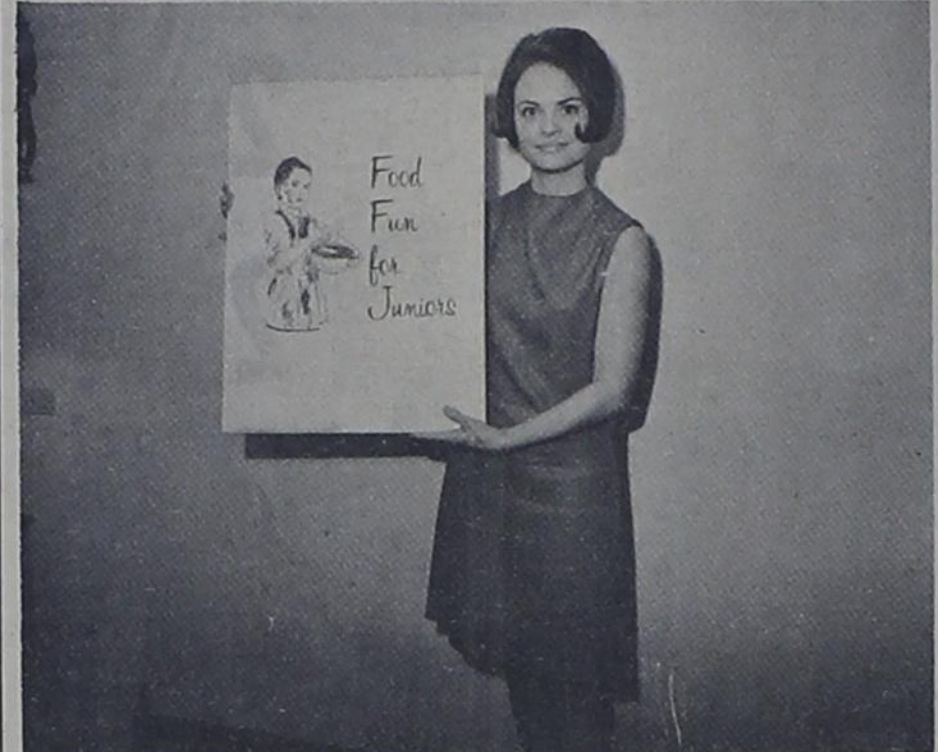
This summer program is made available to all girls age nine through 12 at no charge to the individual through the co-operation of the local school districts as a part of the Co-operative's youth development program.

Mrs. Chester Rogers underwent surgery Friday morning in a Plainview Hospital. She is reported to be in good condition.

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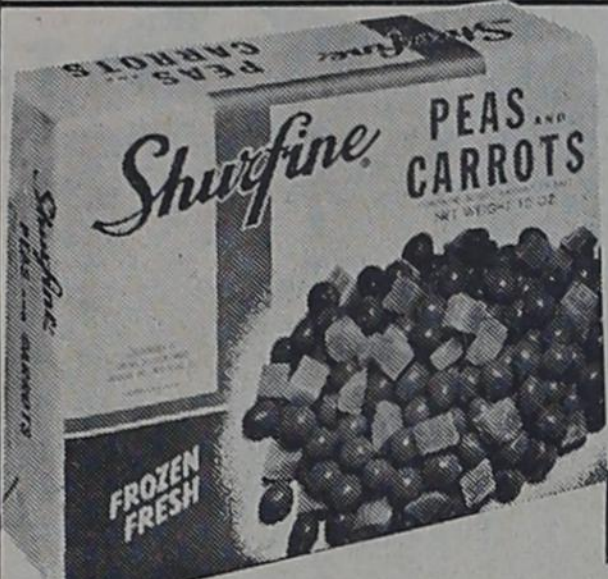

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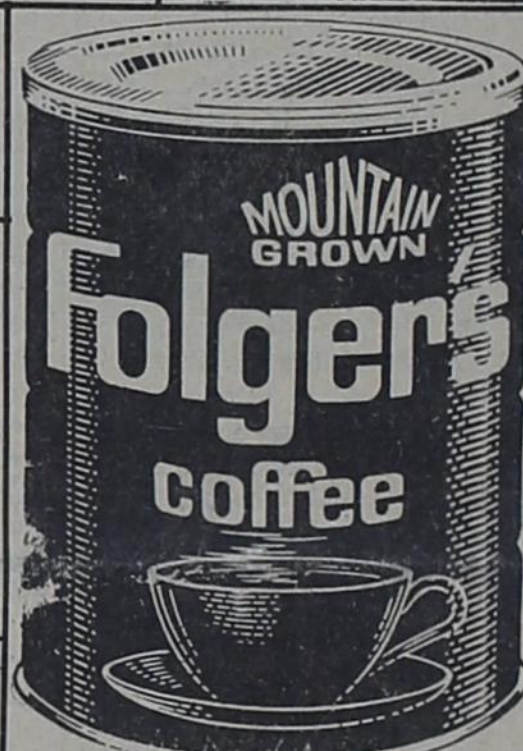

laid with a white linen cloth and carried out her colors of turquoise and white. Miss Martha Snodgrass and Miss Carolyn Damron presided at the table.

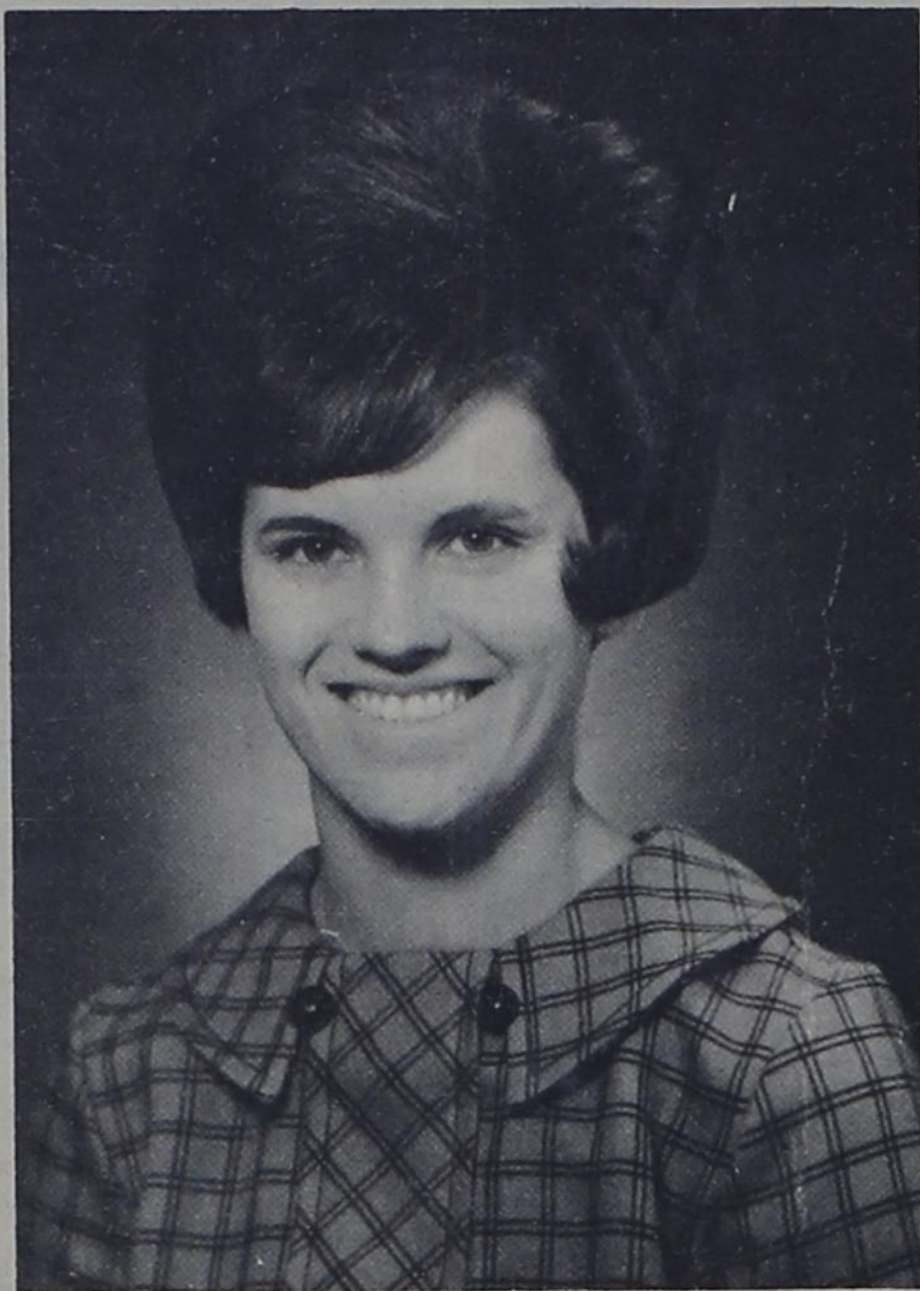

Girls participating in the work are Candy Wilson, Suzanne Wilson, Vickie Kunselman, Brenda McCauley and Marilyn Allen.

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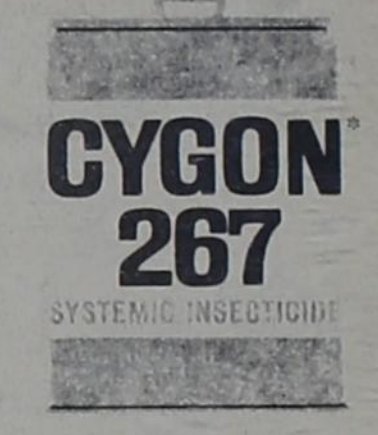
