

NET QUOTA OF McCULLOCH CO.

Gen. Joe. A. Adkins Receives Letter From The Adjutant General, State of Texas.

The following is the system prescribed by the Provost Marshal Gen. for distributing the draft over the State and ascertaining the gross quota for and the net quota for each county.

"The Provost Marshal General has estimated the population of Texas at four million, three hundred and ninety-seven thousand and ninety-seven people, and the gross quota for Texas is placed at Forty-eight thousand and thirty-three. Credits have been allowed for enlistments from Texas before June 30th in the National Guard and Regular Army to the extent of Seventeen thousand, four hundred and eighty-eight. Leaving a net quota for Texas of Thirty thousand, five hundred and forty-five.

"The population of McCulloch county has been estimated by the Provost Marshal General to be Ten thousand, four hundred and seventy-two. This department has been instructed to ascertain the proportion of the population of McCulloch county to the population of Texas which has been done showing the proportion to be .002387. Multiplying this by the gross quota gives a quota of One hundred and fourteen men for McCulloch county. Thirteen men have been credited as having enlisted from McCulloch county in the National Guard and Regular Army prior to June 30th. Deducting this number from the gross quota leaves a net quota of One Hundred and one men. You will

understand that you are entitled to no credit for men enlisting in the Navy or Marine Corps at any rate, and no credit for enlistment in the National Guard or the Regular Army after the 30th day of June.

"The credits due each county by enlistments in the National Guard have been ascertained by this department as follows: The Commanding Officer of each unit in the National Guard was instructed to report to this department the number of men in each of the counties and cities of over thirty thousand inhabitants in the State. From these reports the credits due each county and each city over thirty thousand were made up.

"The credits due for enlistment in the Regular Army were transmitted to this department by the War Department at Washington. If any of the boys from your county have been credited to other counties, you may rest assured that it was not done with the knowledge or consent of this department."

FLOOD WATER CONTROL

Question of Vital Interest to West Texas.

An election will be held throughout Texas August 21 to decide whether the state constitution will be so amended as to conserve our natural resources by reclamation, through flood control, irrigation, impounding waters, drainage, etc.

Under the present constitution reclamation or improvement districts can be formed and bonds for such purposes voted but the territory embraced cannot be for more than one county. And the administrative authority given the county officers is too limited to secure adequate results, even if this limited area would be sufficient.

The proposed amendment announces a policy that conservation and preservation of all natural resources, including flood control, irrigation, impounding waters, drainage, etc., can and should be done on a much broader basis. It provides for a way for one or more counties to form a district, and for the property owners of such districts to vote bonds for these purposes, and authorizes the legislature to enact laws, that will make effective such means, as aforesaid.

When the bonds are voted in districts thus formed, it will place the burden in the proper proportion upon property owners and it will give such property owners a right to conserve their interests in any of the above ideas of conservation.

According to the State Reclamation department, there are in the neighborhood of thirty-five million acres of land in Texas that could be benefited by the general plan of conservation. This land is valued at present, at something like ten dollars per acre, or a total valuation of three hundred and fifty million dollars. If a general plan of conservation could be adopted, and this immense amount of area brought to its fullest utilization, this land would easily be worth one hundred dollars per acre, and the material addition of many million dollars given to the state of Texas, both in land valuations, and increased production.

In West Texas there is no special concern relative to flood control, except for the general desire of the development of all of Texas.

But there is a serious concern in the matter of an adequate amount of rainfall, and the conservation of the flood waters.

If the flood waters of winter could be impounded and a limited irrigation afforded, this alone, would be worth millions of dollars to West Texas.

According to every law of experience, the impounding of large bodies of water, effects climate conditions, and would result in a greater precipitation.

The adoption of this amendment would make this impounding of waters possible, from the fact that countries forming a district, could vote bonds, for storing flood waters, and from these store limited irrigation could be given, and the consequent results of climate conditions being effected would be realized.

With the dependable rainfall, West Texas would become the garden spot of the Lone Star State. The millions of acres of land in this empire would be more productive, hence the land more valuable, and the fondest hopes of the people of this section could be made a realization.

With these facts, why the people of West Texas join in an effort to take advantage of the opportunity to prevent this great economic waste.

Why not permit an opportuni-

ty to reclaim the flooded lands of Texas?

Why not provide for a way for the impounding of flood waters of Western Texas, thus affording a way for limited irrigation, and a dependable rainfall in this section.

Why not join the movement to make the entire state richer and more prosperous.

This is a day of conservation, people of West Texas to join in this movement, because it is one and I desire to appeal to the people of West Texas to join in this movement, because it is one of material conservation, as well as an constructive policy that will benefit all sections of the great State of Texas.

The date is August 21st, and the cause is one of such paramount importance, as to arrest the attention of all patriotic citizens of West Texas.

CAPITAL ONCE UNDER WATER

Large Part of Eastern United States Was Occupied by Arm of Sea Millions of Years Ago.

Millions of years ago, in what geologists call the Devonian period, a large part of the eastern United States was occupied by an arm of the sea which extended northeastward from the Gulf of Mexico region, embracing Maryland, Virginia and that is now the District of Columbia, into New York state.

The eastern shore of the sea was not far east of the present line of the Blue Ridge and the highlands of New Jersey and southeastern New York, and still farther east lay a great continent which extended an unknown distance into the area now occupied by the north Atlantic.

The northern shore of the sea was somewhere near a line drawn from Albany through Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo and south to the west of Washington. The present site of the Catskills was thus near the northeast end or head of this sea or gulf, with land not far away on the east and north.

As the streams washed in sand and mud from the neighboring lands the sea gradually filled up and the shells of many brachiopods and other shell-bearing animals were thus buried in the sand, and their forms preserved till now. By slow, upward movement of the earth's crust, the sea was drained from the region and the beds of sand and mud that had been hardened into sandstone and shale were lifted thousands of feet above sea level to form a great new land.

The Catskill mountains have since been carved from this uplifted mass of rock through the cutting of valleys by the streams.

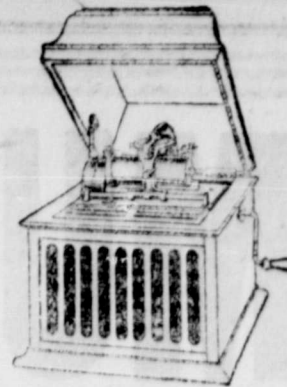
