Mrs. Elms' body was recovered from the ruins of the Elms' home, which was destroyed by fire at midnight Friday night.

Elms summoned neighbors and told them that he and his wife were awakened by the fire and that Mrs. Elms lost her way in trying to get out of the building and burned to death. The family of the woman ordered an investigation after the body ar-

SEMI-WEEKLY STANDARD TO BE DISCONTINUED

This will be the last issue of The Semi-Weekly Brady Standard, and in its stead, beginning with next week, will be issued the Weekly Brady Standard.

It is with the greatest regret that this step is taken. After a continuous publication for the past seven years, the management has been extremely loathe to make the change, and has delayed the step as long as possible. A careful survey of business conditions, both retrospective and prospective, convinces us that, in justice to ourselves, the change must be made.

This year has been a hard one with publishers. The doubled and trebled price of print paper,

Standard, Brownwood Semi-Weekly News, Coleman Democrat-Voice and Granbury News. The Standard, however, has maintained the \$1.00 price to all subscribers in the Brady trade territory, believing subscribers and advertisers could best be served by keeping the cost of subscription at the minimum figure. Only those living entirely outside the Brady trade territory were asked to pay the \$1.50 price. This same subscription basis will be continued, viz: \$1.00 per year within 50 miles of Brady; \$1.50 per year 50 miles or more distant from Brady.

The Semi-Weekly Brady Standard has occupied a unique position in the journalistic field. Of all the hundreds of newspapers printed in the state of Texas, there are only about 35 semi-weeklies, the number including the semi-weekly issues of the big state papers, such as the Dallas News, and of these thirty-five, The Standard was one of the most successful. The editor has received inquiries from all over the United States regarding the success of a semi-weekly from publishers contemplating changing their papers from weekly to twice-a-week issue, the most recent one coming from the state of New York. From the standpoint of service, the maximum has been represented in the twice-a-week paper. The news was carried to all subscribers while it was news, the Tuesday issue including all the happenings from Saturday until that day, while the Friday issue contained all the news happenings of the middle and latter part of the week. The advertisers, however, were in position to receive the greatest benefit, since the first-of-the-week issue enabled them to place their announcements before the readers in ample time to derive benefits in the Saturday trade, while the Friday issue enabled the careful perusal of their advertisements on Sunday, at which time the great majority of rural subscribers read their county paper. In fact, we have always contended that a semi-weekly paper gave better service to both readers and advertisers than a daily paper since the daily paper's circulation is chiefly confined to city subscribers, and a weekly edition of the daily is necessary to reach the rural subscribers.

However that may be, there is no use in wasting regrets over the inevitable, and The Standard's future aim will be to give the greatest possible service its income and financial resources will allow. Whenever times and conditions will permit, it will give us greatest pleasure to re-establish the semi-weekly paper and again serve our readers and patrons in a manner of which very few communities can boast.

arrived at Killeen and Elms' arrest followed.

Elms and his wife had no children. Elms was one of the most prominent and well-to-do farmers of this county and a dozen of his neighbors accompanied him to Killeen with the body. Two witnesses are being summoned for the examining trial.

Waiving preliminary hearing, Elms, charged with the murder of his wife, was allowed bond in the sum of \$10,000. More than thirty neighbors of Elms signed the bond.

Mrs. Elms was formerly Miss Hall, a member of a prominent family of Bell county. She and Elms married twelve years ago and moved to this country and were prominent in social and church life. John Hall, county commissioner of Bell county, and brother of the dead woman, together with other Bell county citizens will direct the prosecution.

Elms came from a prominent Bell county family and two brothers from Temple accompanied him back to Ballinger. The man is one of the most prominent and well-to-do farmers in that county and recently engaged in the mercantile business at Winters, eighteen miles north of here.

The great majority of country newspapers in Texas average only eight pages per week, yet during the seven years of its life The Semi-Weekly Standard has averaged twelve pages per week. Naturally this practically increased the cost of publication 50 per cent, and was made possible only through the liberal advertising patronage. When prices of paper and material advanced so tremendously, nearly all newspapers in this section advanced their subscription price to \$1.50 per year. 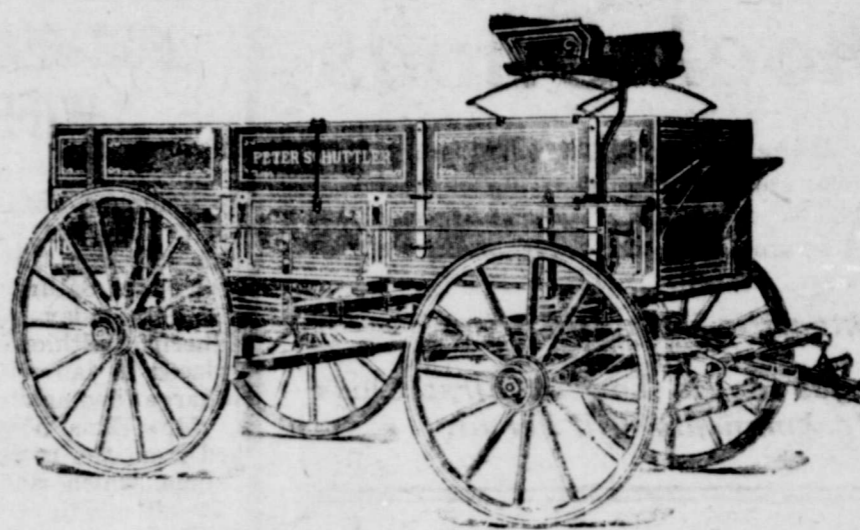

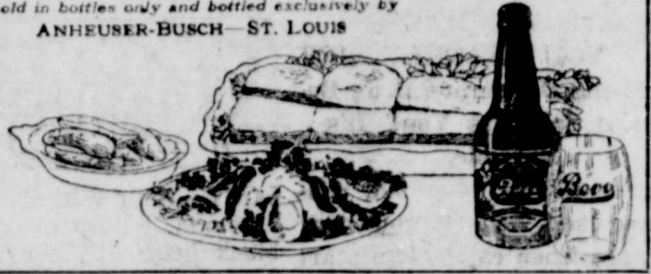

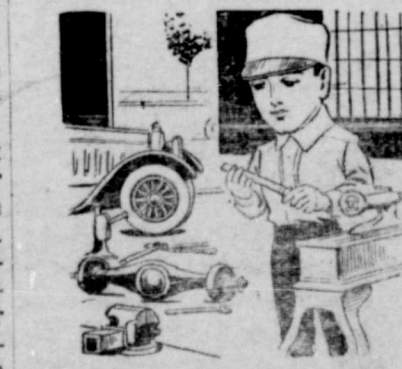
