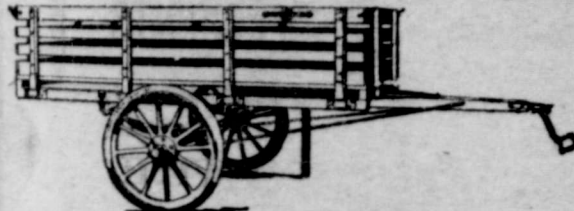

REWARD BEING OFFERED FOR ANY DESERTER

Henry Hutchings, adjutant general in Texas, acting under direction of the governor has sent notices to all district and local exemption boards that a reward of \$50 will be offered for the delivery of any deserter. Anyone who fails to report for service will be called by the exemption board, whether such action be willful or through ignorance, is classed as a deserter. The notice sent by out by the adjutant general, was received as a telegram from Provost Marshal General Crowder, and reads as follows:

"A reward of fifty dollars is payable for the delivery at the nearest army camp or post for a deserter. This reward is in full satisfaction of all expenses incurred in said delivery. A person who fails to report to his local board of military service

at the time specified in his order to report is a deserter. A person who fails to report for military service to the adjutant general of the State by the date specified in the order of the adjutant general is a deserter.

"It is highly desirable from every standpoint that an effort now be made to round up all persons who are delinquent in reporting for military service. It is thought that if the fact of reward is given the widest publicity we shall have a great force of police officers and even of individuals interested in bringing such delinquents under military control.

"If, after such persons are brought to a military authority, it appears to the military authority that their delinquency is not willful, they will be forwarded to a mobilization camp and their local board will be given credit. If it appears that delinquency was willful, they will be prosecuted before court martial as deserters. In either case the reward is payable."

Mr. Watts has not yet progressed sufficiently in his work to give out any information, but his final conclusion will be awaited with great interest by our citizens.

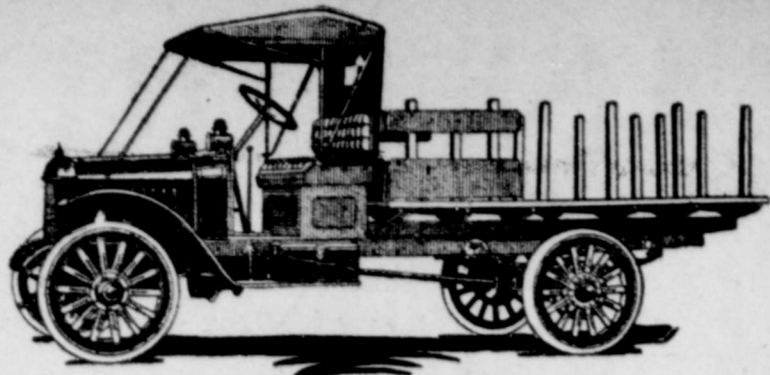

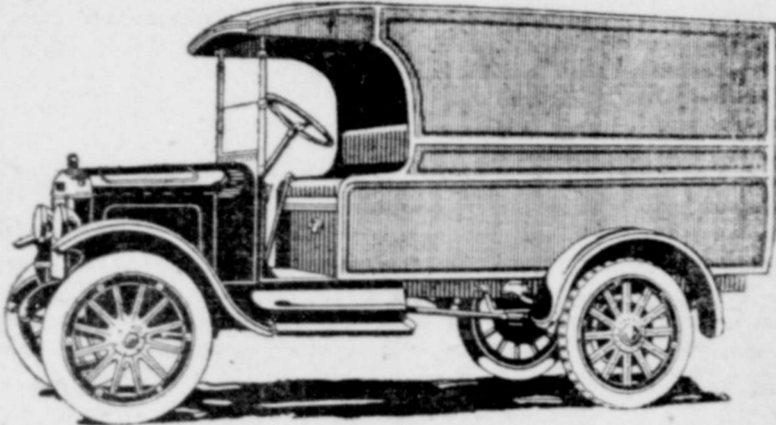

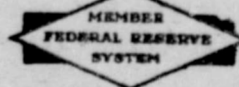

\$20,000 FOR MASON ROAD.

Commissioners Court Equals Federal Aid of \$10,000.00.

At its regular meeting this week commissioners court voted the sum of \$10,000 for the improvement of the Brady-Mason road. This action was taken to meet the \$10,000 Federal aid, promise of which was made to representatives of the Brady Y. M. B. L. and McCulloch County Highway league at Big Springs for improvement of the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway. Federal aid is never given for more than half the sum to be expended and consequently to assure the \$10,000 federal aid it was obligatory upon the county to appropriate a like sum.

The court arranged to provide the funds in the following manner: \$4,000 to be transferred from the general fund to the road and bridge fund; \$3,000 to be transferred out of Commissioners Precinct No. 1 fund, and \$3,000 to be supplied by Commissioners Precinct No. 2. This last \$3,000 is to be paid \$1,000 cash out of funds now allotted to that precinct and the remaining \$2,000 to be raised by the issuance of warrants payable out of the road and bridge funds allotted each year to said precinct.

To make this \$2,000 immediately available, the Commercial and the Brady National banks have each agreed to take up \$1,000 of these warrants. The \$2,000 will be divided into eight warrants of \$250 each, and two warrants will become due each year; consequently each bank will be enabled to collect one-fourth, of the sum advanced, each year.

It is specified in the commissioners order that the total sum of \$20,000 is to be used solely for the construction and improvement of the Brady-Mason end of the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway, and that such work is to be done according to government plans, or under the supervision of a government engineer.

Encouraged by the success so far met, with, F. R. Wulff, acting for the Brady Y. M. B. L. has now made application for \$30,000 more federal aid—\$15,000 for the Melvin road, and a like sum for the Brady-Mercury part of the Fort Worth-Brady-Fort Stockton highway, and in view of our record for past performance, there is every reason to believe the aid will be forthcoming.

WILLIE HURD WRITES.

Tells of Studies and Drills in the Hospital Corps.

Fort Clark, Texas, Oct. 7.

Editor Brady Standard:

Dear Friends and readers:

I have just finished reading your paper and have noticed letters from Camp Bowie and a few more places and they were telling of their work and what they have to do. Of course we all hold up for what we do, and think it the best. So I am going to give you a slight idea of what I do. I am in the hospital corps and think it is the best branch of service of them all. The reason is that it teaches you the nature of the human body and that is what every man and woman should know—understand something of the structure of the human body and functions of the various organs.

We have just one body, and if we do not know the nature, and do not know how to repair or build up the body, it will finally die away and then we will not get the pleasure out of life that we should.

We have a good school here in the medical or hospital corps. All the teachers, or doctors, you might call them, are the best you will find in the state.

I study anatomy and physiology, first aid, nursing, materia medica, hygiene and minor surgery—and these subjects will give you all the gears, high or low, weak or stout.

Saturday, the 6th, we had final examination, and I made an average, at a rough guess, of 90%.

The past week we were drilling with the ambulance in the morning, and our company consists of twelve ambulances, with four mules to the ambulance, and 151 men. We go about two miles out in the country and pitch tents, and some of the boys play like they were wounded and sick; so we get our litter and first aid material and dress the wounded part, or what it might be, and then carry the patients to the ambulance and load them.

One ambulance will carry four litters, one person to the litter; two persons upper and two lower, or ten seated.

In this post we have twenty-four mule and twenty-five motor ambulances, and about twelve motorcycles with side cars, and when they are all in a row, you never saw anything more beautiful than these with a great U. S. and a Red Cross on them.

Next week we are going out about nine miles and camp for about three or four days. This evening we got our little tents (we call them dog-tents because they are so small—for two persons only).

I have noticed that lots of the boys and men have been called out. Now, I will say to those who will enter the army or to those who have lately entered, what the effects will be. The first three weeks will seem like a year, and the next three weeks will seem like a dream and the next three weeks will seem like a nightmare—so ride on, and with good success to all.

If anyone wishes to ask a few questions, and I can answer them I will be glad to.

THIRD INCREMENT OFF.

McCulloch Has Furnished 93 Men of Allotment of 101.

No less enthusiastic was the farewell send-off for the men composing McCulloch county's third increment to Uncle Sam's Selective army, than it was for the first and second increments.

The entrainment of the twenty-six men took place at noon Monday, and the union depot was the scene of an immense gathering of relatives, friends and well-wishers from all parts of the county. Ben Moffatt had charge of the bunch, with Dair Baldrige second in command.

Mr. Moffatt, who was chief of the Brady Fire department, was given a farewell ride over the city on the big truck, the big steam fire whistle was sounded and all the fire boys turned out en masse as a tribute to their departing chief.

The Boy Scouts, under the leadership of Prof. Bowden, marched to the depot and stood at attention while the train pulled out. They looked every inch the soldier in their natty uniforms, and their cheer awoke an echo from among the recruits.

Prior to assembling at the depot the men were given a banquet by the business men of Brady, the spread being had at the Queen hotel.

The following figures show the number of men sent to the training camp from McCulloch county, and for which the local exemption board gets credit:

1st Increment..... 5
2nd Increment..... 60
3rd Increment..... 28

Total..... 93

Of the 28 mentioned in the third increment, 26 reported to Camp Travis, one was transferred to Camp Taylor, and another, Joe White, a medical student, reported by telegraph. 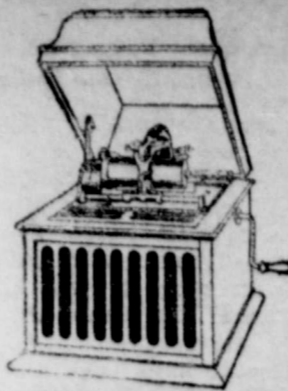
