### DAILY MAIL FOR RURAL ROUTE 2 IN EFFECT MON.

By order of the postoffice department at Washington, Rural Route 2 has been changed from tri-weekly delivery to daily delivery, Sunday excepted. The new order went into effect Monday, and co-incidentally the salary of Carrier Ernest Bell was raised to that of daily carrier.

The daily service is an appreciated innovation, and is sure to greatly increase the volume of mail going over the route. At the end of the first six months' trial period, the route hardly showed up to the requirements of the postoffice department. Many patrons had been tardy in erecting their boxes, others preferred to come to town daily for their mail to getting it only tri-weekly and the further fact that at first the third delivery was made on Friday instead of Saturday, caused a considerable loss in the early showing. Having prevailed upon the department to inaugurate daily service Postmaster Reagan is now confident that a healthy increase in business on the route will become at once apparent.

### THREADED-RUBBER KEEPS BATTERY LONG ON JOB.

The object of the new classification undoubtedly is to simplify the auditing of the post office accounts at Washington, D. C. and in future instead of having eighteen accounts from McCulloch county, but one will be had; and all other counties throughout the U. S. will afford a like saving in labor for the postoffice officials in Washington, but at the same time will impose additional duties upon the postoffice employes forming the central auditing office.

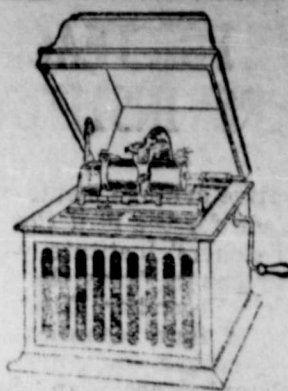
