NEW TAXES ARE NOW IN EFFECT ON MANY ITEMS

Washington, D. C.—The man in the street feels the added burdens of the war revenue tax which become effective November 1st. Some of the taxes which went into effect that day are:

One cent on each ten cent admission to theaters and movies. Children under twelve years pay a total of one cent tax.

Eight per cent on passenger fares by rail or water, except on trips less than forty miles.

Three per cent on freight charges.

Ten per cent for berths, state-rooms and seats on parlor cars or vessels.

Ten per cent on club dues more than \$12 annually.

One cent on each twenty-five cent charge for parcel post.

One cent on each telephone, telegraph charge.

Five cents on each telephone, telegraph and radio message costing fifteen cents or more.

Eight cents for every \$100 of life insurance.

November 2nd, the new postal taxes went into effect. Letters carry three cents in stamps instead of two and postcards carry double the old number of stamps.

The tobacco taxes actually went into effect November 1st, but dealers have been collecting this tax for some time. Cigars are taxed \$1 to \$7 per thousand and cigarettes 80 cents to \$1.20 per thousand.

The liquor, soft drinks, sporting goods, automobile, income, excess profits and other taxes have been in effect for a month or more.

After December 1st, 1917, all drafts, checks, notes, deeds, stock certificates, bonds, etc., will require revenue stamps.

Revenue Cancelling Stamps

Sec. 804. That in any and all cases where an adhesive stamp shall be used for denoting any tax imposed by this Act, except as hereinafter provided, the person using or affixing the same shall write or stamp thereupon the initials of his name and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used, so that the same may not again be used.

After December 1st, 1917, all drafts, checks, notes, deeds, stock certificates, bonds, etc., will require revenue stamps and will have to be cancelled as per above (Section 804).
