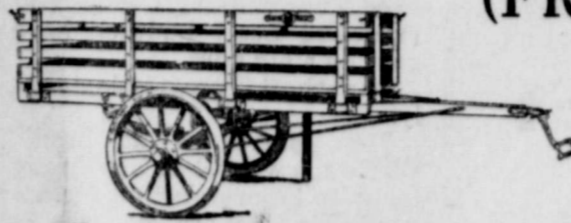

BUY 1 1/2 MILLION POUNDS WOOL AND MOHAIR

H. P. Roddie & Co. of this city have just cleaned up the wool and mohair of West Texas, their purchases amounting to approximately one and one-half million pounds. Two weeks ago Mr. Roddie bought all the wool and mohair then in sight at San Angelo, amounting to 750,000 lbs., but during the past week or so, he has doubled his original purchase. His last buys clean up all the wool and mohair north and west of Kerrville.

While Mr. Roddie refused to state the amount paid, it is admitted that the highest prices paid in the state were given by him, and it is estimated that the deal will run close around a million dollars.

Shipment of the purchase is now being made out of San Angelo, Menard and Brady, and the last of the lot is expected to be in transit by Saturday, assignment being made to Boston and Philadelphia. The entire purchase is being forwarded by rail, it being found impossible to ship by water route on account of the

Sec. 804. That in any and all cases where an adhesive stamp shall be used for denoting any tax imposed by this Act, except as hereinafter provided, the person using or affixing the same shall write or stamp thereupon the initials of his name and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used, so that the same may not again be used.

After December 1st, 1917, all notes, deeds, stock certificates, bonds, etc., will require revenue stamps, and will have to be cancelled as above (Section 804).

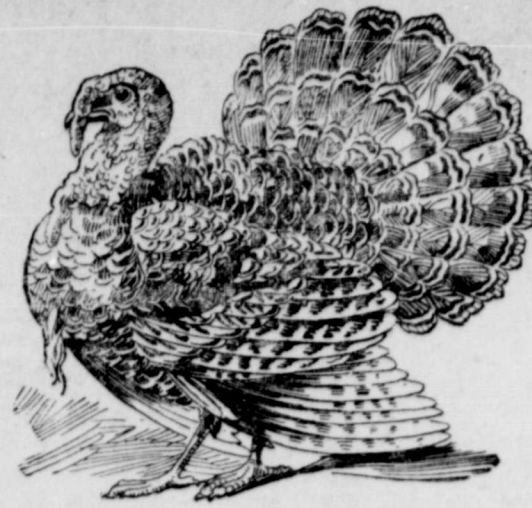

\$50,000 FEDERAL AID SECURED FOR McCULLOCH CO.

Federal aid totaling \$50,000 was secured by the McCulloch county good roads boosters from the Highway commission at Austin Tuesday, \$35,000 being granted on the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway in this county, and \$15,000 for the Fort Worth-Brady-Fort Stockton highway in the county.

The trip to Austin followed receipt of advice by County Judge John E. Brown from the commission to the effect that the commission would meet on November 20th to consider applications from counties for federal aid. Judge Brown conferred with C. A. Weise, secretary of the Y. M. B. L., and it was decided to get a good representation at the meeting, at which time application was to be made for \$54,500. Of this sum \$26,000 was asked for improvement on the north end of the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway, and \$13,500 for the south end, while \$15,000 was to be asked for the Fort Worth-Brady-Fort Stockton highway.

The delegation was successful in having their application for aid on the latter highway approved in full, while \$35,000 was granted on the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway, this total amount of \$50,000 being practically as much as was granted any one county. It is understood, though that other Federal and State funds will be available in July, at which time, if the county can be prepared, additional aid will be sought.

Judge Brown explains that the federal government proposes to go 50-50 on the expense of road building, while the state is proposing to pay only one-fourth of the total cost. Consequently effort will be made to secure federal aid wherever possible. This is obtainable, however, only on post roads, or, in other words, on roads over which rural or star route mail is carried. Consequently on some roads in the county, state aid only will be obtainable. This condition obtains on the north end of the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway, some eight or ten miles of which is not a post road.

Naturally everyone is interested as to when this aid will be had, and Judge Brown explains that before any of the funds are procurable a profile of the roads must be made at the county's expense. In other words, the county must secure the services of a competent road engineer to get up the plans and specifications of the road improvement. These are then submitted to the federal authorities at Washington, and if approved, the funds are then advanced the county as used or needed. It is stated that from 30 to 60 days will be required to get up this profile.

On the Puget Sound, to the Gulf highway, the appropriation has already been met by appropriation of county funds and also by the Melvin road bond issue. To meet the appropriation on the Fort Worth-Brady road, it is proposed to create a road district and to vote bonds.

The success of the McCulloch county delegation is a source of gratification to all, and the fact that McCulloch county sent over twenty representatives to the meeting fully maintained her reputation as a live good roads county. Included in the delegation were the following: Judges J. E. Brown, F. M. Newman, Joe A. Adkins; Chas. Samuelson, R. L. Burns, Gus Carlson, Bailey Jones, E. L. Ogden, J. E. Bell, E. L. Jones, Chas. Weise, W. M. Murphy, Will Ballou; Dr. J. B. Lockhart; T. J. Beasley, Mercury; Arthur Neal, Rochelle; Oscar Sellers, Melvin; H. D. Bradley, Fife; Dr. O. C. Jackson, J. J. Armor, Voca; Lee Webster, Pontotoc.

Mason had no delegation present, but had in an application for federal aid and was allotted \$11,266.

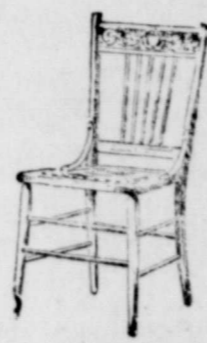

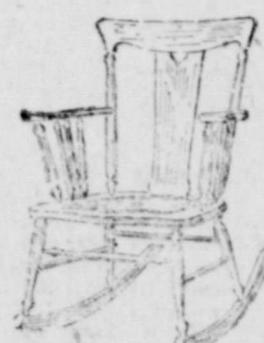

This commission will give him the rank of 1st lieutenant, with corresponding increase in pay. Bill has made a splendid record, and is rated as one of the best of the young aviators at the camp. He reports the aviation service as possessing great fascination for him, and his experiences in the air so far have only made him keen for other feats. He reports having performed almost every imaginable stunt in the air, except looping the loop, which is forbidden by the army regulations. He has flown at a height of 6,000 feet, which is about the greatest the machines at present in service can attain. He states that the so-called "pockets of air," about which much has been said since aviation first became a reality, are the result of currents of air. For instance, while flying over a plowed field, the warm atmosphere causes the current of air to be upwards; while that over a wooded tract will be downwards because of the cooler air. When crossing these currents, the machine is apt to drop or rise suddenly, but the aviator soon becomes accustomed to these sudden changes and adjusts his machine accordingly.

One of the trying experiences of his career was when one of his closest pals, Sidney Brooks, fell to his death a few weeks ago. Brooks had just about completed a fifty-mile trial flight and was

nearing the camp when he fell to his death. The only possible cause of the accident was said to be that the young man had been vaccinated just a few days before, and it is presumed he fainted and fell against the steering device in such a manner as to cause the machine to collapse. Brooks was a San Antonio boy and was buried there with full military honors, aviators flying

overhead and dropping huge wreaths upon the funeral cortege.

Sam J. Durnett Dies Suddenly.

Sam J. Durnett, well-known and highly esteemed citizen of Brady, died Sunday morning at 2:00 o'clock, following a stroke of paralysis which he had suffered only a few hours before.

All day Saturday Mr. Durnett had gone about his duties as usual, and at the close of day had gone to the barber shop for his customary shave. It was here that the first symptoms of the approaching attack were noticed. After leaving the barber's chair he became momentarily helpless, but after sitting down and resting a while he appeared recovered, and proceeded to the Lyric opera house. Before the show had ended, he apparently felt worse, and, leaving the show, he started home. Just outside the opera house the stroke of paralysis came on, and he fell to the side-walk. Bystanders hurried to his assistance, and he was carried home, where all efforts to revive him proved fruitless. He appeared to retain consciousness until the last, but was rendered speechless and helpless.

Mr. Durnett was born in Galveston 65 years ago last September, and had resided in Texas all his life. There he was married thirty-seven years ago to Miss Susie Harper. After residing at Harper, Texas, for some time, the family came to Brady six years ago, Mr. Durnett having engaged in the business of street sprinkling. He was a man of cheery and jovial disposition, being universally popular and held in high esteem by all.

For 24 years he had been a member of the K. of P. lodge—and in another year would have attained the rank of honorary member. He was also a member of the Odd Fellows lodge, having joined here six years ago.

All his life he had been a consistent member of the Episcopal church, and it was at St. Paul's Episcopal church Sunday afternoon that funeral services were held, Rev. John Power of Brownwood conducting. Following the services at the church, the Odd Fellows took charge of the remains and consigned them to the grave with impressive ceremonies.

Surviving are his widow, one brother in Houston, and three nieces, Mrs. S. P. Mallia and Mrs. W. F. Steinbach of Galveston, and Mrs. Flora Britton of Philadelphia. Out-of-town relatives present for the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Harper and Miss Maud Harper, Richland Springs, Mrs. S. P. Mallia, Galveston, Mr. and Mrs. Kelle and Mr. Will Brown of Milburn.

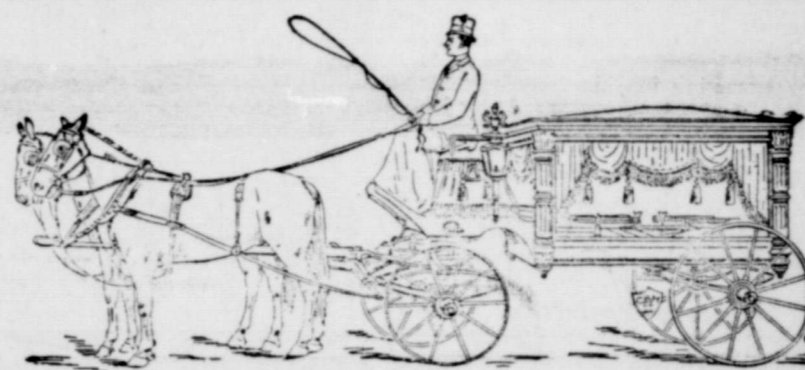

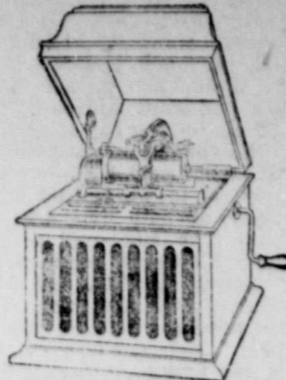
