Miss Gohlke was chosen win-

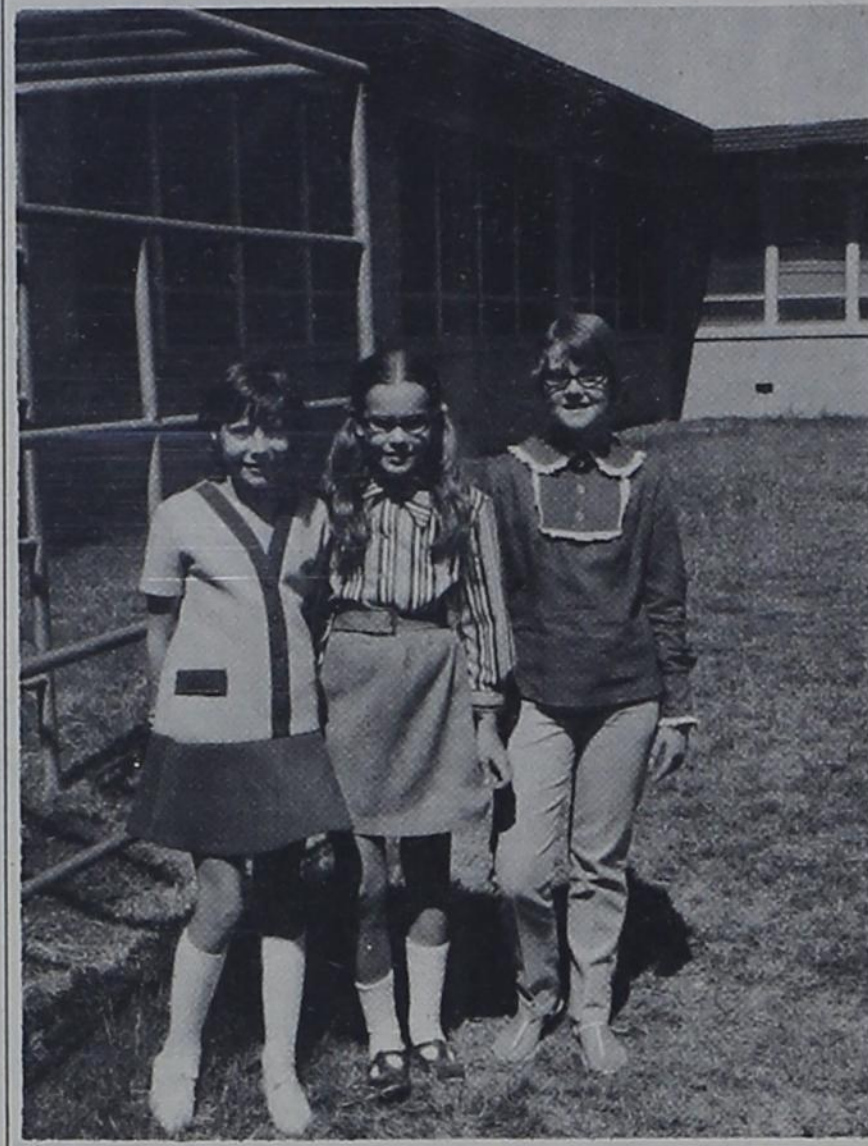
ner by judges on the basis of overall score for her baked goods and records.

15 Injuries --

16 Accidents During August

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 16 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of August, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 15 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1971 shows a total of 87 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 55 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1971, shows a total of

581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 17 more accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 76 more injured than during July.

Cook's Corner

"Life has been good to me," says Mrs. Charles (Anne) Corn, "I like to do just about everything, just enjoy life."

Anne was born and spent the first 15 years of her life in Czechoslovakia. When she was 15 and just after World War II, her family was deported to Germany. Anne's father was in the grocery business in Czechoslovakia and the family lost all their possessions in the Communist takeover. After they were moved into Germany, near Hof, the family stayed with farmers and worked for room and board.

After about a year, Anne moved to Munich and attended the university there and finished high school and took an interpreter's course in special classes for refugees.

When she completed the courses, she went to work for the American Forces in Munich and Garmisch, which is a town in the Alps. She met Charles while working as an interpreter, but says they were just casual acquaintances at that time. Charles was a sergeant in the Army and stationed in Germany.

They met again after Anne moved to the states, Charles was stationed at Fort Bliss at the time. They were married in Las Cruces, N.M.

After Charles was discharged

from the Army, the Corn family moved to Bovina, where Charles worked for several area farmers before going into the fertilizer business for himself. He now farms several places northwest of Bovina.

Anne enrolled at Eastern New Mexico University in 1960 and received her bachelor's degree in math in 1962. She taught math in Bovina High School for six years before returning to school at West Texas State University where she worked on her master's degree and taught part-time. Anne says she is retired from teaching and going to school now and is enjoying every minute of it.

The Corns are parents of three children, Eddi, now a senior at West Texas State University; Mrs. Phil (Doris) Sorley, and Heidi, who is a sophomore at Bovina High School.

Anne says each of her children have spent some time with her parents in Germany with Eddi staying a year and going through seventh grade there. Doris spent six weeks last summer and Heidi spent the summer in Germany this year.

Combining the duties of running a household with an active slate of community affairs keeps Anne on the run most of

the time. She serves as treasurer of Bovina Woman's Study Club, and is chairman of the Grace Paul Memorial Fund, which administers a loan fund to needy students. She is also on the board of directors of Opportunity Plan, Inc., headquartered in Canyon and on the board of Farmer County Community Action Program.

Two of Anne's favorite hobbies are raising and riding horses and skiing. The family makes several trips to nearby ski areas in the winter. Reading and gardening are also listed among her favorite activities and Anne says that her new grandson born last Saturday, David Cole Sorley, will probably be her next hobby. Anne also tries to make at least one trip a year to Germany, but says it was hard to do so when she was teaching, which is one reason she has enjoyed her early retirement from the teaching field.

"I don't like to prepare fried food when we have company, because there is too much commotion and with this recipe, I can visit with the company and not spend all my time over the stove."

CRANBERRY SALAD
3/4 c. raw cranberries, ground
3/4 c. sugar
1-10 oz. pkg. miniature marshmallows

1/4 t. salt
grated garlic
1 c. pecans, chopped
1 c. fresh parsley, chopped
(dried flakes may be used)

Let cheeses stand until they reach room temperature and mix. A small amount of cream may be added to make it softer. Add salt, pepper, garlic, Worcestershire and 1/2 c. pecans. Spread remaining nuts and parsley on waxed paper. Shape cheese mixture into a ball and roll in pecan-parsley mixture. Refrigerate overnight. Serve with cocktail crackers.

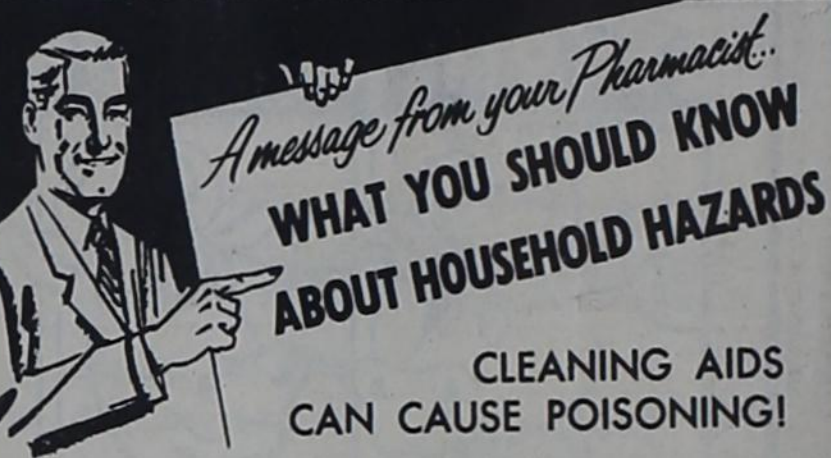
QUAIL WITH MUSHROOMS
6 slices bacon
6 quail, dressed
salt and pepper
1/2 lb. mushroom caps
1 bunch green onions, chopped
3 T. melted butter
2 T. prepared mustard
Wrap a slice of bacon around each quail, arrange in rows on a large sheet of heavy-duty aluminum foil, season with salt and pepper. Saute mushrooms caps and onion in butter. Pour mixture over quail; seal with double wrap. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour.

Ponies Earn 6-6 Tie With AA Chieftains

First Deadlock In 12 Games

In drizzling rain and uncomfortable, unseasonable low temperatures, the Bovina Mustangs battled the Friona Chieftains to a 6-6 deadlock in the second football game of the season for each team Friday night on the Friona field.

The tie, though it will forever be considered that in the record books, was a victory of a sort for the Class A Mustangs as they went into the game as underdogs to the Class AA Chieftains.

The weather, no doubt, hampered the offensive play of both teams. The drizzle made the pigskin slick and limited the number of passes which the teams would have probably thrown under normal, dry conditions.

The weather was also considered to be at least partially responsible for fumbles during the tilt. The Chieftains had five fumbles while the Mustangs were guilty of three miscues.

Except for the one scoring play by each team, the game had a defensive nature. After allowing the Friona team a TD on its first possession, the Mustangs played tough defense for the remaining three and a half quarters.

Offensively, the Mustangs managed only three first downs while the Chieftains had eight. Bovina's tally came early in

the second frame as Al Delgado got loose on a flanker-around play and darted around left end for 21 yards and the six points.

The touchdown was set up by the Bovina defense, which blocked a Friona punt two plays earlier. Held on downs on their own 29, the Chiefs attempted to punt from their own 29. The Mustangs' Ken Jamerson blocked the punt, giving Bovina possession, at the Friona 19. A ground play lost two to move the ball back to the 21, from where Delgado rabbitied to the endzone.

Kim Rundell's attempted kick for the extra point was blocked to leave the score knotted, 6-6. It was too early to tell at that point that the scoring was all over for the cold, wet night.

The Chieftains started the game like they meant to make it a long game for the Mustangs and their fans. They allowed the Mustangs only one yard in three carries after the kickoff and then scored the first time they had the ball as if they were to have an easy time of winning the game between the two Parmer County teams.

Bobby McMeans' punt rolled dead on the Friona 42-yard line after Bovina's first possession and the Friona boys went to work from there. In six plays, including a fumble which they recovered and earned eight yards in the pro-

cess, the Chiefs had the ball on the Bovina 31. From there, Quarterback Johnny Bandy broke for a touchdown to put his team out in front, 6-0. The extra point attempt failed, but at that time, it appeared to be of little consequence because the Friona offense hadn't been stopped.

The Mustang defense tightened from that point on. The red-clad Frionians didn't pick up another first down in their next five possessions. Their next first down came just before the half on an 18-yard run by Fullback Bill Bailey. Late in the second period, Rundell tried a 41-yard field goal as the Marrons faced fourth down on the Friona 34. The attempt fell short.

The Mustangs missed a scoring opportunity early in the third period. They recovered a Friona fumble on the host team's 32-yard line. Fullback Shannon Davis and Tailback Jeff McCormick took turns carrying the ball down to the 11 yard line. However, the ground attack bogged down there as Bovina faced fourth down with four yards needed.

Kim Rundell then tried an 18-yard field goal which would have put his team out in front. The place kick was long enough, high enough, but just off to the left and no good.

The Chieftains got into the missed field goal act late in the game. Bobby Drake tried one for the Friona team with 0:54 remaining to be played. It, too, was wide to the left.

The Friona field goal try came at the end of a drive that made Bovina fans uneasy. The drive started on the Friona 31 with 5:32, plenty of time to score, remaining in the fourth period. A 15-yard penalty against the Ponies and a 19-yard run by Bandy put the Chiefs in Bovina territory. A 20-yard pass from Bandy to Mario Perea made for a first down on the Bovina 19 and hopes of the Mustangs staying even in the game began to dim. However, three running plays netted the Chiefs only three yards and the futility field goal was tired on fourth down.

The Mustangs, not satisfied with the tie, attempted to move back down the field in the few seconds that remained. They got in four plays before the game-ending gun sounded and one of those was a 20-yard pass from Quarterback Billy Shelby to Halfback Ronnie Steele. This was one of four aerials attempted by Shelby, who played the entire game at quarterback, and the only one completed.

Leading the determined Mustang defense were Davis, who was moved from linebacker to a guard position for the game, and Larry Wiseman, defensive end.

Davis, McCormick and Delgado almost evenly divided the Mustangs' ground yardage. Davis made 28 yards in 10 attempts. McCormick carried 13 times for a net of 23 and Delgado totaled 22 yards, including the TD jaunt, as his number was called three times.

This was the first tie games between the two teams in their last 12 clashes. Going into last week's game, Friona had won eight of 11 games played between the two teams since 1951. The Chieftains won last year's contest, 27-7. In their opening game this season, the Friona team outscored Farwell, a District 3-A rival of the Mustangs, 26-8.

tal attitude of his players to be the same way.

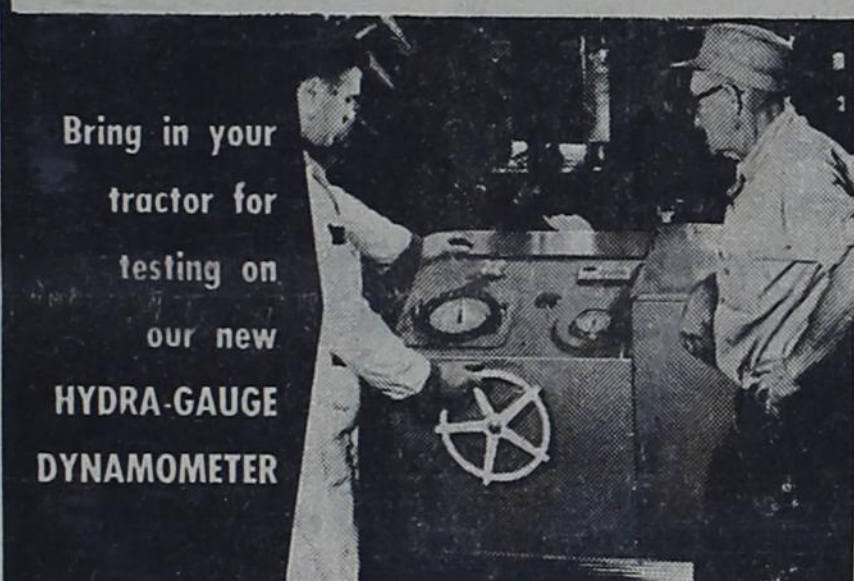
