### DAYLIGHT SAVINGS EFFECTIVE SUNDAY MORNING 2:30 O'CLOCK

All Clocks to Be Advanced One Hour at Bed Time — Clock Time In Use Until October

Sunday morning at 2:30 o'clock the new Daylight Savings bill recently passed by Congress and which was signed by President Wilson on the 19th inst., becomes effective insofar as it affects any operations of the Federal government or railroads. Quite naturally this means that all citizens of the United States will have to adopt and put into practice the same plan, since otherwise there would result endless confusion; trains would be missed and business go awry.

The safest plan to follow and which will be practiced all over the United States, is to advance your clock one hour Saturday night when you go to bed—then until the last Sunday in October guide all your day's work or business by clock time. After the last Sunday in October the clocks will be retarded one hour and sun time will again be used.

The object of the new bill is to make the greatest possible use of every minute of daylight. As everyone knows in mid-summer dawn comes about 4:15 o'clock in the morning, and dusk does not come until 8:00 o'clock or after in the evening. By advancing the clock one hour, those usually arising at 5:00 o'clock, will, in reality, arise at 4:00 (sun time) but will suffer no disadvantage since it will already be daybreak. Those retiring customarily at 10:00 o'clock will really retire at 9:00 o'clock (sun time) or just one hour after dusk. The saving thus effected in fuel and light all over the nation will go a long way towards overcoming the present shortage; the added hours of daylight will make for more efficient work, and many other material benefits will accrue.

Some citizens are of the opinion that the same results might be obtained by beginning the day an hour earlier without changing the clocks but this change would be so radical from lifetime habits as to cause serious inconvenience. For instance, everyone is accustomed to taking dinner hour between 12:00 and 1:00 o'clock. To change the dinner hour to between 11:00 and 12:00 would seem contrary to all usage. Under the new plan, however, dinner hour will be observed as usual between 12:00 and 1:00 o'clock, although in reality sun time will show it to be an hour earlier in the day.

In Brady the daylight savings is to be everywhere observed. Business houses will be opened in accord with the advanced hour, and will close promptly when the clock strikes 6:00, as has heretofore been agreed upon.

#### APPROVES DAYLIGHT SAVINGS PLAN

The following resolution was passed by the Board of Directors of the Brady Y. M. B. L. at its regular meeting Tuesday afternoon:

"The Brady Y. M. B. L. hereby places itself on record as favoring the strict compliance with the new government 'Daylight Savings Bill' requiring all clocks to be set forward one hour beginning March 31st.

"We further recommend that all business houses observe the new law to the extent of closing their places of business promptly when the clock strikes six, as heretofore agreed."

### A DOG-GONE SUBJECT.

The Brady city council is to be commended for their action in prohibiting the running at large of chickens and other fowls to the detriment and destruction of neighboring gardens and flower beds, and now since biddy is penned up there is some incentive to patriotic citizens to garden. There remains, however, a danger which, to us, appears more real and of even great destructiveness than old biddy, and that is in the hordes of stray dogs that are allowed to roam about at will, disturb the midnight quiet with their barking at the moon and the chasing of imaginary enemies, and dig in the soft earth of newly-made gardens and flower beds whenever they run across one.

Last year one 140 citizens thought enough of their dogs to pay the city's required license. This year the number, we feel safe in making the statement, could be counted on one's hands and toes. Yet there are over five hundred dogs in Brady at a conservative estimate.

One citizen has complained to us that the dogs in his neighborhood make a race-track around his house every night, and the noise they make is equal to that of a stampede of a bunch of horses. Another complains that his slumbers are disturbed by the endless staccato of dogs barking at the moon or at one another. Another complains stray dogs suck everyone of his freshly-laid eggs. The complaints do not stop there, but go on ad infinitum.

The Standard presents these facts, believing they are worthy of consideration and that we are entitled to relief from this pest.

Let's get some action on the dog license ordinance—the city needs the money, and the citizens need a general clean-up on dogs that are not worth licensing.

The Standard editor may be "rushing in where angels fear to tread," but we want to say to our Brown-wood brethren that the controversy now raging in their respective papers is not worth the space it is printed upon. Each and every one of them will find there is more to be had in mutual co-operation and a sympathetic understanding than by being at variance. Let the argument drop, brethren, and if you must differ, as you will, on various subjects, let it be in a friendly spirit.

## STANDARD IS- SUES EXTRAS ON LATE WAR NEWS

The Standard innovated a service last Saturday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock that is meeting approval from a large number of Brady and McCulloch county citizens, when it issued the first "War Extra" ever put out in Brady. The "Extra" was a miniature one, to be sure, but it gave the news—and that was what the citizens wanted. We do not mean thereby to say that the news contained in the extra was just what the citizens wanted—but the service. The news was, in itself, bad, since it made public the beginning of the great German offensive on the west front, and the breaking through of the British defenses. The second "Extra" issued at 8:30 that evening, gave more reassuring news, and was much more joyfully received.

To date The Standard has issued fifteen extras, and has delivered them to all parts of the business district. The object of The Standard's service is to give the news to the citizens while it is news, and give it to them in a form that they can carry with them to their home folks and neighbors. Despite the skepticism of a few citizens, The Standard has actually been giving the live news of the day from 12 to 18 hours ahead of the daily newspapers—and that is no discredit to the dailies, either, since it is through them we are enabled to give this service.

W. M. Bryson very aptly summed up the situation yesterday, when he dropped a dollar on our desk and said he appreciated getting the war news and wanted to show his appreciation. More than that he said he was willing to pay a dollar every week to get the news and that he had gotten a dollar's worth of service out of a single one of our "Extras." He said his home folks were just as much interested in the war news as he, and that he always wanted a copy of each "Extra" to carry home with him.

And it is a significant fact that very few of the "Extras" are to be found thrown away—the persons receiving them fold them up carefully and take them home with them.

Quite incidentally it might be mentioned that The Standard's "Extras" have been sent on the night train to Mercury and Rochelle, thus giving the citizens of these places the news twelve hours ahead of time.

Just so long as the citizens of Brady and McCulloch county evidence interest in receiving the latest news, The Standard will continue to supply it.

### DAYLIGHT SAVINGS.

The Standard commends the action of the Brady Y. M. B. L. in passing resolutions requesting the strict observance of the new government law known as the Daylight Savings bill. The whole plan is to use the extra daylight hour that comes early in the morning during the mid-year months. Some do not see the necessity of making the change in clocks—nevertheless and notwithstanding, it will be a good plan to move your clock one hour forward Saturday night when you go to bed; otherwise you are apt to miss your train, miss your meals, miss getting your shopping done—and finally find out that you are behind the times.

Daylight savings has been in effect in Germany and Austria, if we remember correctly, ever since the war began. It has been in effect in England, France and other allied countries almost for as long a period. Needless to say, it has been thoroughly tried out in these countries, and with success, else it would not have been continued.

Another resolution passed by the Brady Y. M. B. L. is that all Brady stores should close when the clock strikes six—and this plan is sure to be followed by all Brady merchants. With this extra hour in the evening much good work may be accomplished at home in the war gardens and in similar patriotic work.

So get in procession—when you go to bed Saturday night, advance your clock one hour—and then go about your business next day and until October 27th as usual, observing your usual customs at the usual time, but using clock time and not sun time.

Within a period of eight days, citizens of Brady will have had an opportunity to cast votes three times "fer" or "agin." The first was on last Tuesday at the Tick Eradication election. The next will be on Saturday in the School Trustee election, and the last on next Tuesday in the election of City officials.

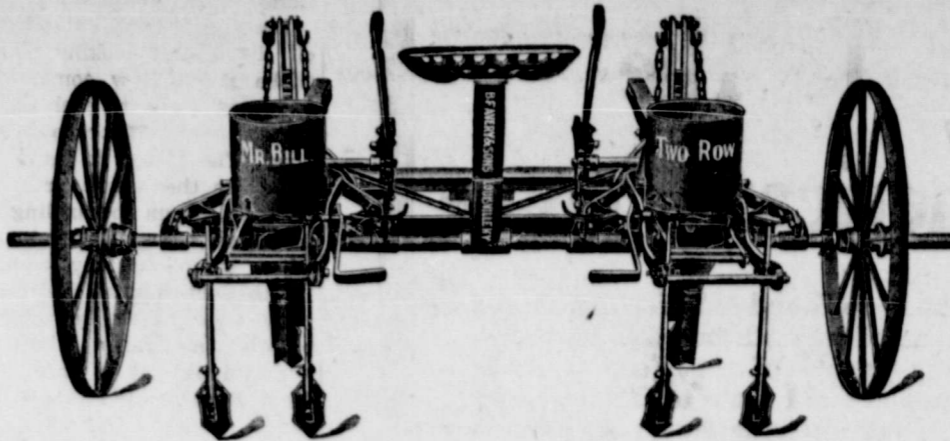

### MERCURY WELL TO BE SPUNDED NEXT MONDAY

It is given out on good authority that the well on the J. R. Beasley tract in the Milburn community is to be spudded next Monday. A visit to the place shows a wonderful amount of preparation for the drilling. The 84-foot tower, which was completed some weeks ago, now has the addition of sheds for housing all the engines and machinery. Two immense bull wheels have been hung, and part of the machinery is already in place, while the rest is being hauled out and placed as rapidly as possible. The great pile of bright new casing, some of the largest of which measures 14 inches, gives evidence that the drillers mean business. A car of coal has already been unloaded and placed on the ground. Water for drilling will be secured from a well on the Beakley tract, about half a mile distant from the point of drilling. This well is said to have an abundant supply. At one time it was an artesian well, but now the water stands even with the surface, and to a depth of 192 feet.

Burford & Brimm have secured an abundance of water in their water wells on the Caywer tract, and will proceed with drilling immediately.

At Rochelle the Liston & Pruitt well on the Sellman ranch is making good progress, and at latest reports was between 150 and 200 feet down.

The Southwestern Petroleum oil well on the J. F. Crews' ranch is making splendid progress. This well was spudded last Friday afternoon at five o'clock, and on Wednesday was reported down over 260 feet. The rig is kept going night and day, and the drillers are determined to find what the earth has to offer in return for their efforts.

As a result of the activity in this field, old leases are bringing splendid figures, and it is reported that \$10 per acre is being readily paid for desirable tracts. The J. A. Dennis 167 acre tract, one mile west of the Southwestern's well, has been leased by a prominent oil company of Tulsa, Okla., for \$1,500.

G. W. Blanton, who was in from Lohn last Saturday, reported having leased a 50 acre tract in the Lohn community for \$10 per acre. Mr. Blanton has a half section in this community, and early in the game leased part of this acreage for \$200 per acre. Later he was paid \$6.00 per acre, and the \$10.00 price paid Saturday marks top notch for him.

## FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR

### FRANK MERRITT, SANTA FE ENGINEER INSPECTS SITES FOR BRADY DAMS

#### PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION DISCLOSES MERITS TO EACH OF TWO LOCATIONS—ENGINEER REQUESTS FULL DATA ON SUBJECT.

Frank Merritt, Chief Engineer of the Santa Fe, was in the city yesterday from Galveston, and escorted by several auto loads of citizens, inspected the two sites contemplated for the building of a dam to supplement the present Brady water supply. Mr. Merritt declared both sites to be admirably suited, and that each possessed merits that entitle it to consideration. He was not prepared to make any decision in the matter, but requested that all data regarding the two locations, the area of water shed for each, and such other information as might be available be furnished him, to enable him to make the right decision. He will not only give his decision, but will suggest plans and make an estimate of the cost of building the dam.

Mr. Merritt was greatly impressed with the Bowie proposition, and said it was admirably adapted for the building of a dam under ordinary circumstances. However, in view of the scant rainfall in this section of Texas, he was extremely doubtful as to whether or not sufficient rainfall might be had from year to year to enable it to give the service expected

of it. He was unable to decide this, he stated, until he saw the figures on the watershed, and other data. The dam on upper Brady creek, according to Mr. Merritt, was a much better proposition from the standpoint of rainfall, since every shower of rain, even if spotted, would contribute more or less water to Brady creek because of the extensive water

shed. Mr. Merritt warned against the spoiling of our plans for a water supply for all future needs, by the practice of too great economy. On the contrary, he said, a matter of a few thousand dollars should not be allowed to stand in the way of building a dam that would be a monument for all time to come, and that would forever solve our water problems.

Mr. Merritt, personally and as representative for the Santa Fe railway, is greatly interested in helping Brady solve her water problem, and his interest, and the courtesy of the Santa Fe in freely granting his assistance to Brady in response to requests from our citizenship, is highly appreciated by all. Brady citizens feel that with the help of the Santa Fe and its engineer, our water troubles are to be permanently and satisfactorily solved.

A cordial invitation is extended all citizens to attend this service.

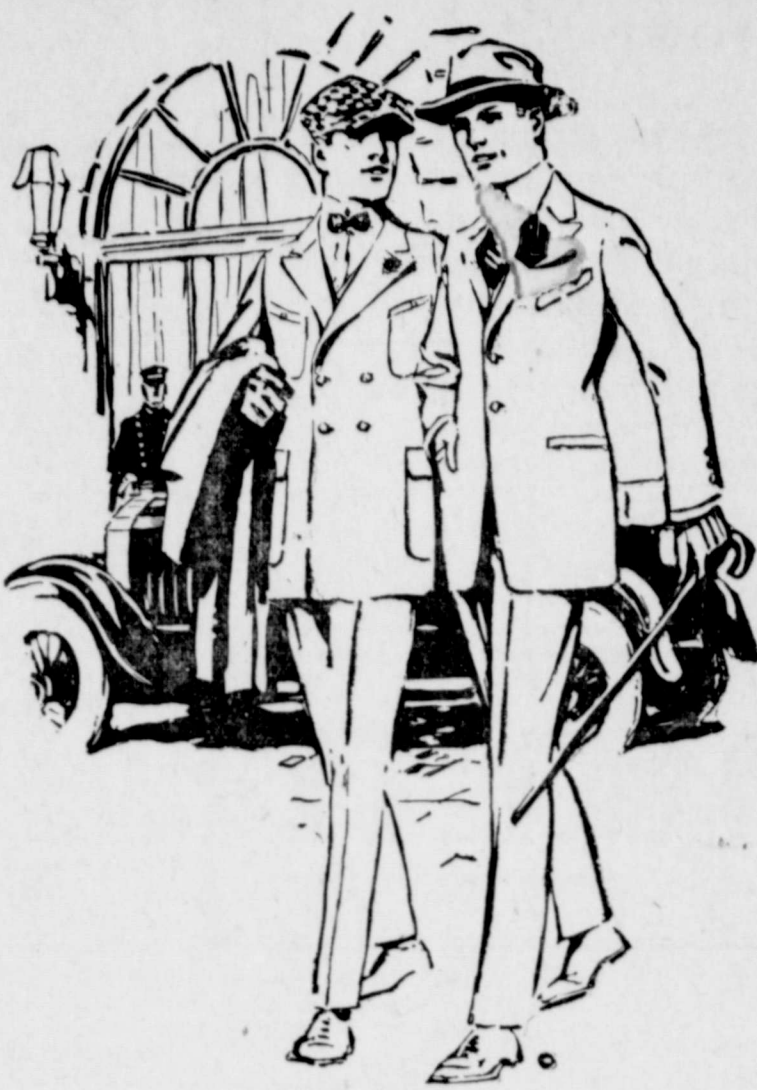
### PRES. WILSON AFFIRMS DECISION OF THE DISTRICT BOARD IN BROOKS' CASE

### ERADICATION OF TICKS VOTED DOWN IN COUNTY

Tick eradication in McCulloch county lost by a good sized majority in the election Tuesday, the vote standing 482 in favor of eradication and 623 opposed.

Brady gave eradication a handsome majority, the vote here being 275 for and 101 against, but this big lead was overcome by the fact that, with one exception, every box in the county voted solidly against the eradication plan. Mercury was the only box to give a favorable majority to eradication, besides Brady, and her majority was only one vote, 22 favoring and 21 opposing the issue.

### FIRST ALL STEEL DRILLING RIG AT FORT M'KAVETT

The first full-size all-steel deep well rig to be used in West Texas will soon be set up and put in operation a few miles east of Fort McKavett, where the Kentucky Producers and Refiners corporation of New York is preparing to sink a deep test well. The rig will be eighty-five feet high, and will be of the most complete sort. The corporation has some 40,000 acres of land under lease in Menard county in the district of the new well and is engaged in prospecting for oil in many other parts of West Texas. The new rig will be erected and put

to work as soon as the material arrive.

B. H. Temple, a representative of the corporation, is in the city in the interest of the work the company is doing in these parts. His company is engaged in "spotting" operations and is active in the oil development work of the West.—San Angelo Standard.

Burford & Brimm have completed a water well at their location near Mercury, finding plenty of water at 142 feet. This well showed an oil sand, and No. 2 will be drilled at once in search of oil. If oil in sufficient quantities is found at a shallow depth it will be utilized in drilling the deep test. Materials and equipment are now on the ground and the rig will be erected for the deep test at once. —Brownwood Bulletin.
