It would be better to make that starting time 8, we're guessing. No longer than it takes to breeze through seven innings, both games are often over by 9:30, just as the spectators are settling down to watch an evening of softball.

## For Phone Service Here --

# General Asks Council For Increase Of Rates

Rate increases proposed by General Telephone Co. were discussed at a Thursday night meeting of Bovina's city council.

The phone company proposes to increase "across the board" with the highest percentage of raise in the business category.

The proposal calls for the monthly charge for one-party business phones to be raised from \$9 to \$14.10. For a one-party residence phone, the company proposes to increase the charge from \$5 to \$6.30.

A rural business phone, on a four-party line, would be increased from \$7 to \$12.65.

The asked-for raise on a two-party business phone is from \$7.50 to \$11.70 and on a two-party residence connection the increase would be from \$4.25 to \$5.25.

General has recently installed a computer-type telephone system here which includes direct distance dialing.

The present rates were put into effect in 1958.

In the proposal to the council, General pointed out that the telephone company "has been subject to the same economic pressures that affect all other types of business."

The council took no action on the request.

Other business included accepting the resignation of Water Superintendent Darrel Read effective July 15. Applications for the position were discussed and the council members agreed to meet again this week in regard to the job.

Details of the phone company's request for the rate raise are available at the city hall.

## FCA Meeting Set At Bank Thurs. Night

The Hereford chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes will present a program at 8 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) at Community Room of First State Bank, according to Roger Ezell, athletic director at Bovina High School.

All male athletes in grades nine through 12 who are interested in the organization are invited to attend the meeting.

Ezell said that a chapter would be formed here.

Funds for the FCA will come from the Lynn Murphy Memorial Fund established at First State Bank of Bovina shortly after his death.

## Class Of '68 Gives \$100 To FCA Fund

The Bovina High School Class of '68 has contributed \$100 to the Lynn Murphy Memorial Fund, according to Bill Caldwell, president of the class.

The money was what remained of the class funds when they were graduated, said Caldwell.

The memorial fund will be used to establish and operate a chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at Bovina High School.

Lynn was a member of the Class of '68.

Contributions to the fund have passed the \$1000 mark as of early this week, according to a spokesman at the First State Bank.

The \$100 donation by the Class of '68 swelled the total to \$1,097.08.

## Fireworks Net \$1900 For Lions

Adults whose nerves were rather "frazzled" by the noise over the Fourth of July holiday might expect the total to be much greater, but gross sales of Bovina Lions fireworks through the holiday were about \$3800.

Total sales were up about \$1500 over the past two years. The net income from the fireworks stand, which was operated by Dalton Morrison and his daughter, Cindy, was about \$1900, Morrison reports.

The stand was located on the east side of town on Highway 60. It is one of the major fund raising projects of the civic organization each year.

# Read Resigns City Position

Darrel Read has resigned as water and sewer superintendent for the City of Bovina to accept a similar position at Dumas.

Read's resignation was accepted by the city council at a Thursday night meeting. He will complete his duties here Friday and begin work in Dumas Monday.

A member of the city's staff since '68, he was promoted to the superintendent's position in '69. Read is a 1956 graduate of Bovina High School and attended Texas Christian University on an athletic scholarship.

Active in civic work here, Read completed a year's tenure as president of Bovina Lions Club the first of this month. He has been in charge of the boys' baseball program here for the past four years.

He is a former coach and teacher in Bovina High School. Prior to joining the city staff, he was associated with a farm supply firm.

Read and his wife, Patricia, have three children. His duties with the city also included the position of fire marshal.

During his tenure with the city, he has served with three mayors, E. B. Caldwell, Chas. W. Flynn and the present mayor, Johnnie Horn.

"I hate to leave Bovina," Read says, "The people here

have been good to me. But, I feel the opportunity at Dumas is too great to pass up."

At Dumas, he will be in charge of the water and sewer departments.

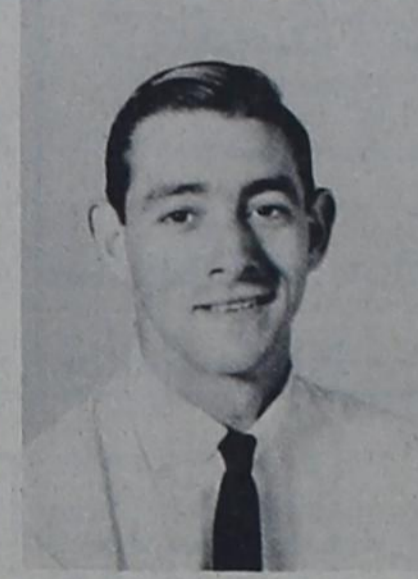

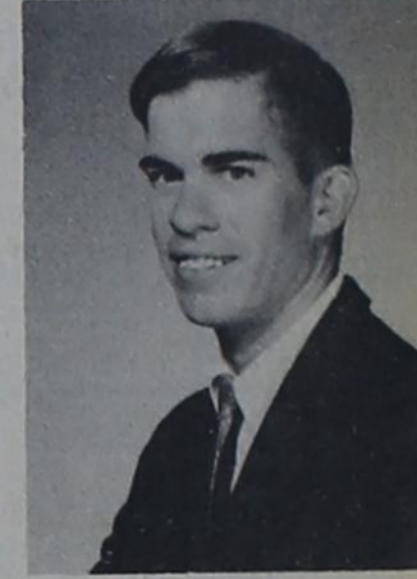

# School Board Signs Additional Teachers

Four new Bovina High School faculty members have been

named following Thursday and Monday night meetings of the school district's board of trustees.

Selected by the board were a homemaking instructor, a vocational agriculture teacher, a head boys' basketball coach and a head girls' basketball coach. The coaches will also assist in football.

The new home economics teacher is Gwen (Christian) Corn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendol Christian and a '66 graduate of Bovina High.

Mrs. Corn received her B. S. degree from Texas Tech in '69. She has taught in Amarillo for the past three years. Her husband, Eddi, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Corn, will teach industrial arts in the Friona schools.

Named vocational agriculture teacher was Rex Rash.

Rash began his new duties here Monday. He was graduated from Abilene High School in '66 and received his B. S. degree in agriculture education from Texas Tech in '71. He has experience in working on ranches and stock farms and as a horse trainer.

Four applications were considered for the home economics position and eight for the vo-ag position, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs.

New head boys' basketball coach and assistant football coach is Eugene Boaz (pronounced Bowes).

He has served as an assistant in all sports with an emphasis on basketball at Merkel,

Rotan and Crosbyton. At Merkel, he was head girls' coach two years.

Boaz is a graduate of Anson High School and attended Howard County Junior College at Big Springs, where he played basketball. He finished his college work at Texas Tech.

Boaz is married and the father of two children.

Loyd Halbrooks was named girls basketball coach and assistant football coach.

Halbrooks has been at Bovina the past four years as head girls' basketball coach. His team there last season had a 31-1 record, losing the second game in the regional tournament. He also coached boys' basketball one year and was head football coach for the school's eight and six-man teams.

Halbrooks is married. He and his wife are parents of one child.

Several applications were received for the coaching positions, according to Jacobs.

The vacancies on the faculty occurred with the end-of-school resignations of Mr. and Mrs.

Mike Potts as vo-ag and home economics instructors and Gib Hough and Dalton Morrison as athletic director-head football coach and head basketball coach, respectively.

Roger Ezell, an assistant coach, was then named athletic director.

Positions yet to be filled to complete the faculty for the forthcoming school year include a high school math job and one elementary or junior high teaching job. Applications for the positions have been received and the faculty should be complete within the next three weeks, Jacobs says.

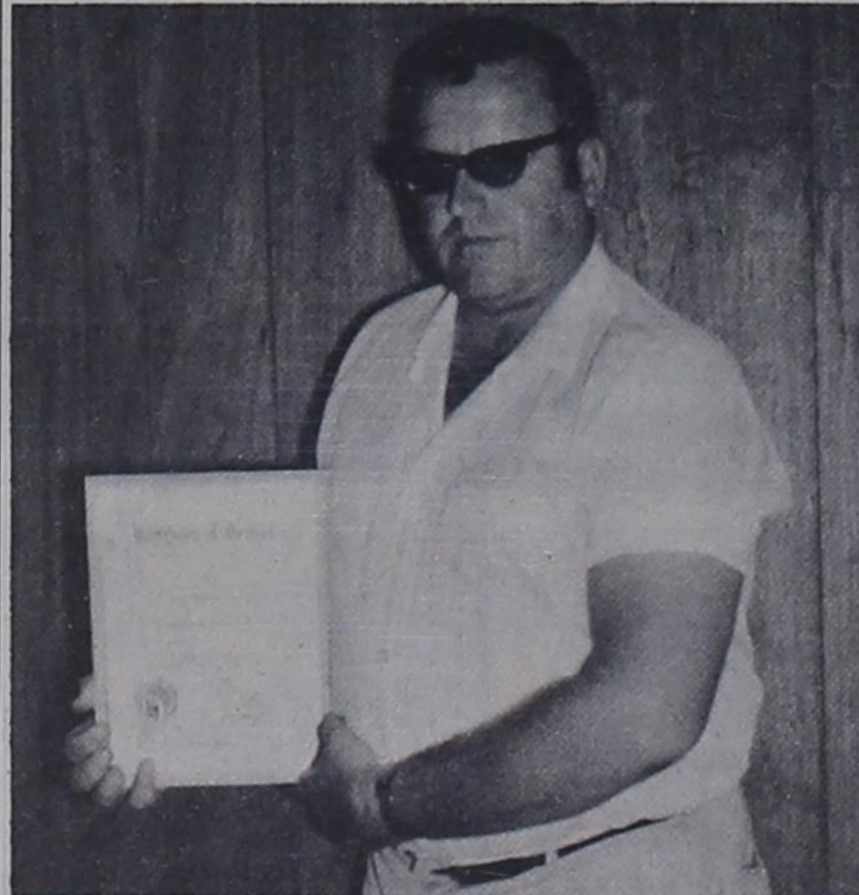
Six girls entered the 1971 LTD Queen contest with five girls participating in the judging.

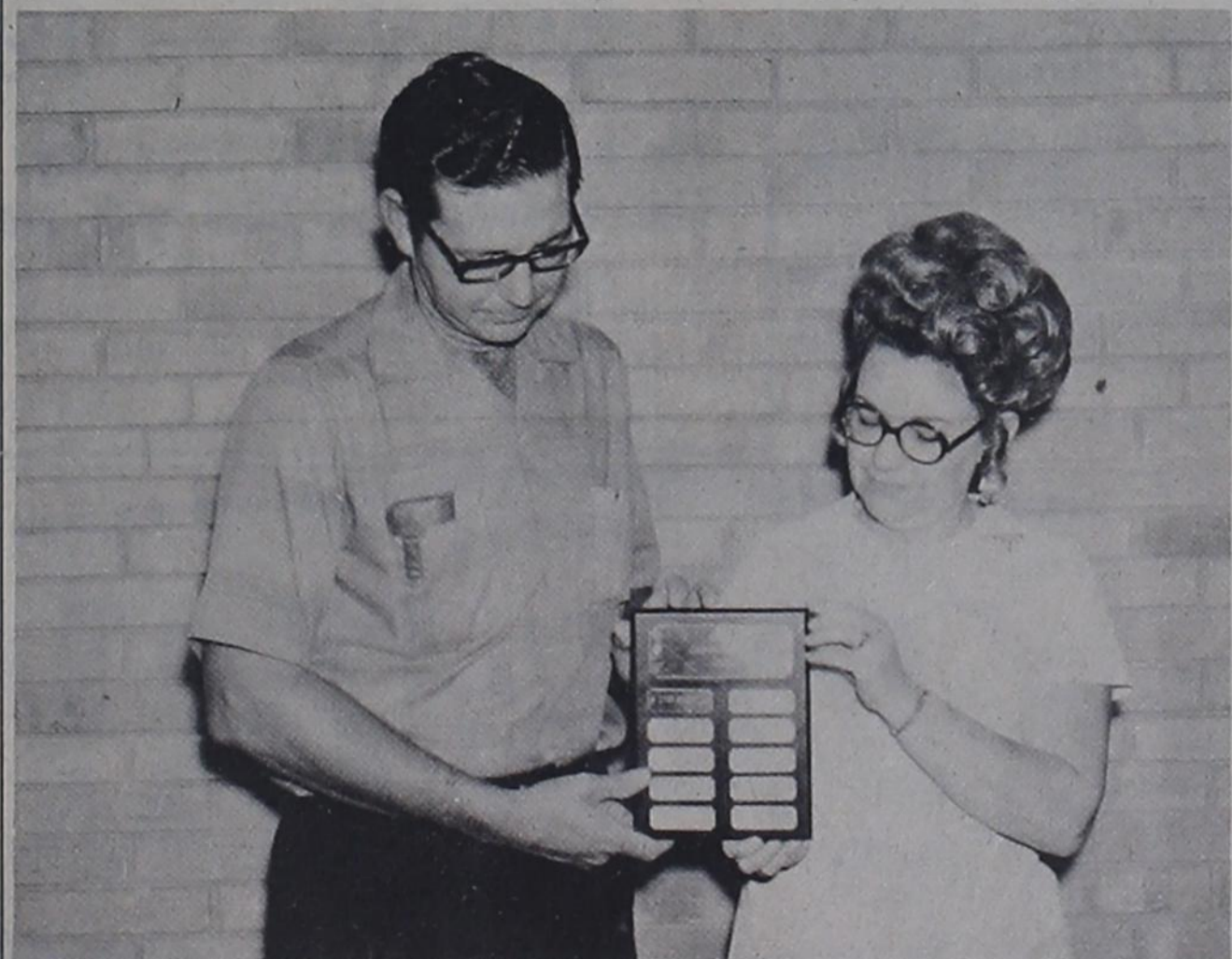

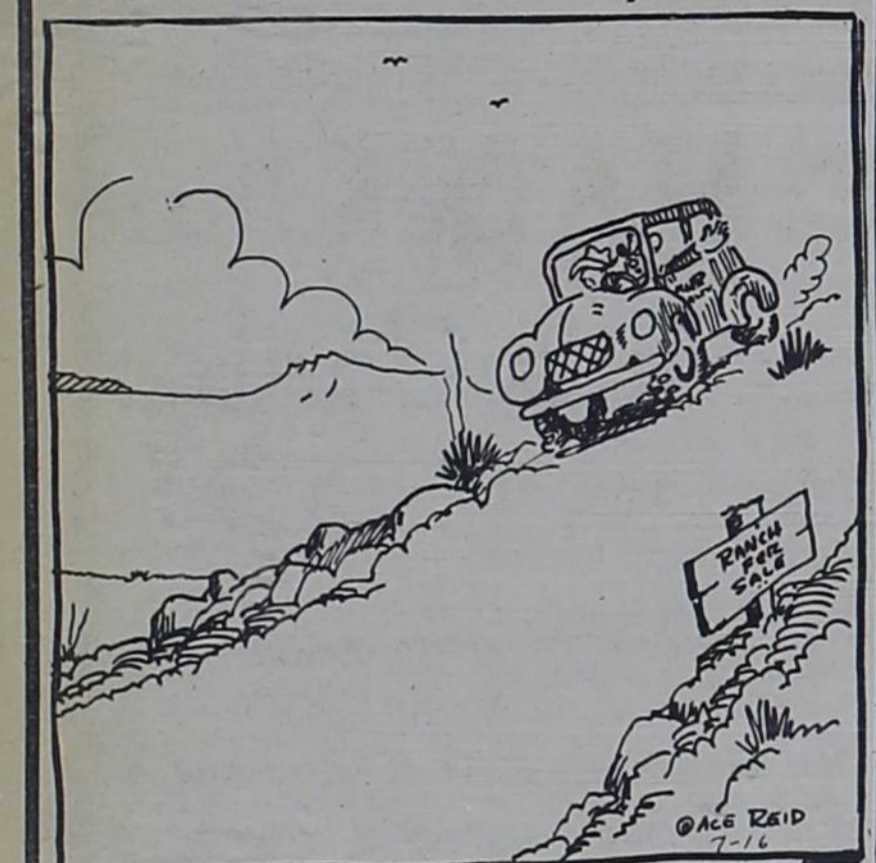

**RAISIN HONEY CHOCOLATE DROPS**

- 1 cup shortening (half margarine)
- 1/4 cups honey
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 2 (1-ounce) squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1/2 cups uncooked quick cooking oats
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cups California seedless raisins
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Blend together shortening and honey. Blend in eggs. Stir in melted chocolate and oats. Mix in flour resifted with baking powder, soda, salt and cinnamon. Blend in raisins and nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased baking sheets about 1 1/2 inches apart. Bake in moderately slow oven (325 degrees F.) about 20 minutes. Remove to wire racks to cool. Makes about 6 dozen 2-inch cookies.

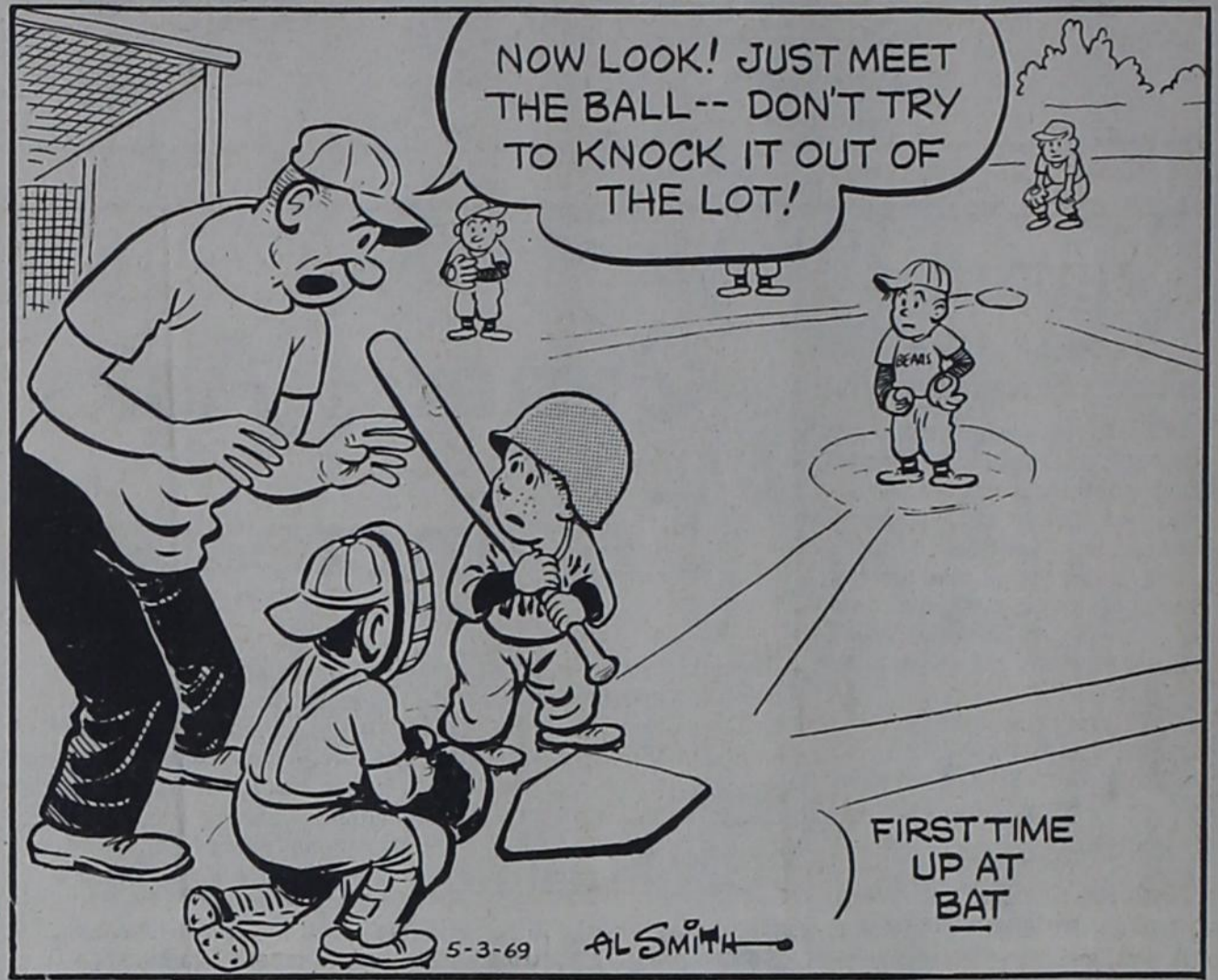

For a wedding trip to Lubbock, the bride wore a hot pants ensemble in red, white and blue. She wore an orchid

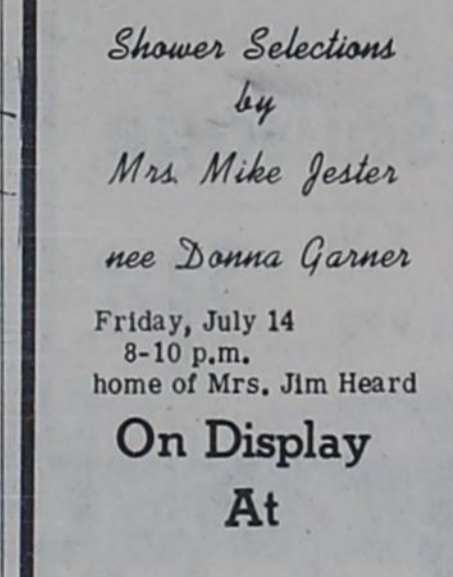

### JIFFY PAN ROLLS

- 1 t. sugar
- 1/2 c. lukewarm water
- 1 pkg. dry yeast
- 1 c. sour milk
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1/8 t. soda
- 1 t. salt
- 3 c. sifted flour
- 3 T. vegetable oil

Dissolve 1 t. sugar in lukewarm water, add yeast, let stand 10 minutes. Scald milk, add soda, salt, 1/4 c. sugar and vegetable oil. Stir well. Cool to lukewarm, stir in yeast, add 1/2 of flour and beat well. Add rest of flour, knead for 3 minutes. Shape into rolls, place in greased pan. Cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk (about 1 1/2 hrs.). Bake in 400 degree oven 20 minutes. Makes 1 1/2 dozen rolls.

### BARBECUED SPARE RIBS

- 3 lbs. spare ribs
- 3 T. butter
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 2 T. brown sugar
- 3 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 c. water
- 1/2 c. chopped celery salt and pepper
- 1 T. prepared mustard

Mix all ingredients together with exception of milk. Add enough milk to fill ice cream container to fill line. Makes 1 gallon.

2 T. vinegar  
1 c. catsup  
Brown ribs on all sides. Melt butter in saucepan, add onion and brown. Add remaining ingredients and cook slowly until flavors are blended (about 15 minutes). Pour sauce over browned ribs, cover tightly, and bake in 350 degree oven for 1 1/2 to 2 hours, or until done. Serves six.

Put cheese slice between two hamburger patties. Wrap with bacon and grill.

- 1/2 c. oleo
  - 1 c. sugar
  - 1 c. flour
  - 1 t. baking powder

- Melt oleo in a baking dish. Mix other ingredients and pour over oleo. Heat fruit to boiling point. Pour over batter and bake in 350 degree oven until dough is firm and brown on top (about 30 min.).

### At Home In Pomer County

Trim, Cut, Clip, Snip. Women who sew need proper cutting tools. Sharpness is the most important quality of good cutting equipment.

An ideal kit of tools might contain eight-inch shears, six-inch snipping scissors and three-inch embroidery scissors. Though you could get by with less, a minimum set should include at least a pair of bent handle dressmaker shears and a pair of scissors.

Shears are usually larger than scissors and are used for heavy cutting jobs. The handle's bent to let the blade rest flat against the cutting surface.

The openings in the handle of shears are of unequal size so that two or three fingers can be inserted in the opening of one handle and the thumb in another.

Use scissors for lighter cutting tasks. The handle features smaller openings of equal size. Later, when you want to add some luxury items to your minimum kit of sewing tools, consider embroidery scissors, pinkie scissors, buttonhole scissors and thread clips.

Buttonhole scissors, designed to cut buttonholes of uniform size, provide adjustable cutting edges.

Thread clips are a modified form of scissors that have only one finger opening. They fit snugly in the hand and provide maximum flexibility of movement.

For the homemaker who likes to carry her needlework with her, folding scissors offer the perfect solution. These tiny scissors fit into their case which

is the size of a match box. Manufacturers also produce left-handed shears for those who work with their left hands.

Buy good quality cutting tools and have them re-sharpened when necessary. Select shears and scissors with blades connected by a screw that can be adjusted.

Avoid buying cutting tools that have blades riveted together or a rivet made to look like a screw.

Keep the blades in proper adjustment. Blades connected too tightly are tiring to use. Those too loosely connected cut sloppily.

Since shears and scissors are expensive, keep all cutting equipment for sewing only. Keep them in a safe place away from children who need to cut paper, husbands who need to cut a piece of wire and little brothers who need to trim fingernails.

With good sharp shears, you can cut out a garment easily. And sharp, well-kept tools make your work more accurate than dull ones do.

We hope all who attended the Suit Fair in Hereford did enjoy and benefit from it. And we hope you will consider coming back next fall as a Sew Fair is being planned for Sept. 12 with demonstrations and exhibits by representatives of nationally-known manufacturers connected with home sewing needs.

### Gourd Bird Feeder



This chickadee claps the gourd feeder with its claws — does not need a perch.

The size of the hole in this gourd tells you immediately that this is a feeder filled with seeds and not a bird house.

There also is no perch so it is intended only for small birds that cling with their claws.

It's so easy to make a similar one. Plant a packet of seeds of mixed gourds and, in autumn, cut the hole with a sharp penknife, shake out seeds, dry and hang the gourd. That's all!

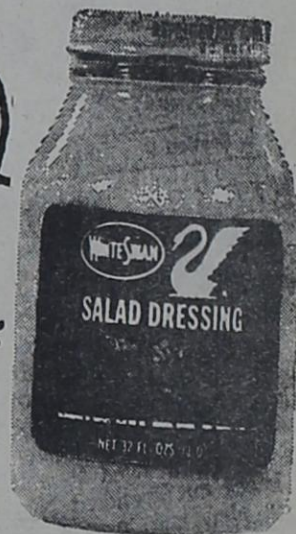

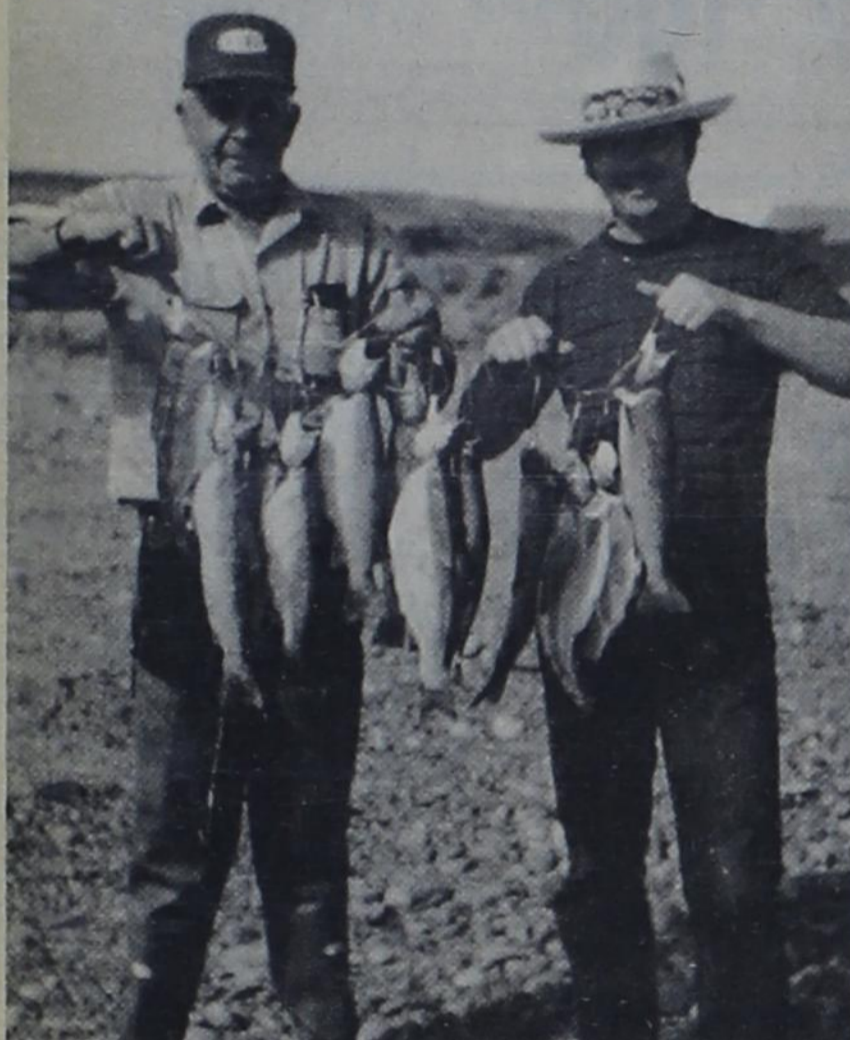

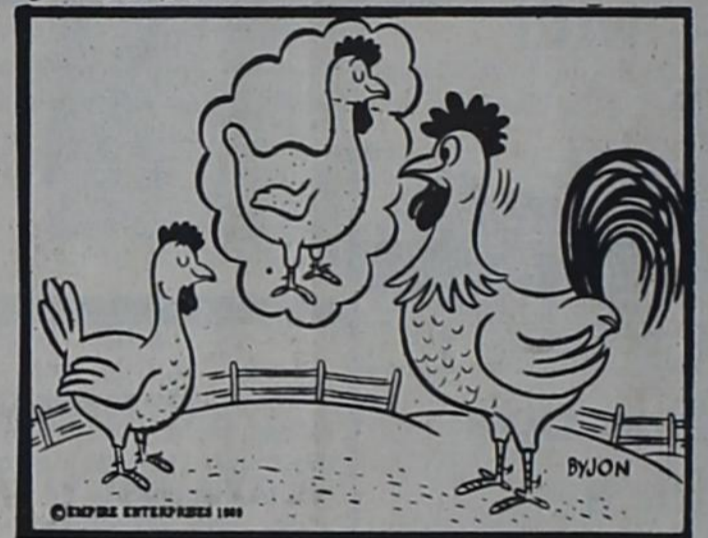
Does winter have days with less sunlight than the other seasons? Is this why it's the coldest of our seasons?
