McCULLOCH COUNTY CARRIES 2ND RED CROSS WAR FUND OVER TOP

EVERY DISTRICT IN COUNTY OVER-SUBSCRIBES, AND BRADY DOUBLES QUOTA—TOTAL APPROXIMATES \$11,000.00

Following a week of intense work upon the part of the various soliciting committees, acting in co-operation with local committees in each of the nineteen districts in the county, announcement was made last Saturday that McCulloch county was safely "over the top" with her quota of the Second Red Cross war fund. The efforts were not slackened, however, but the good work was carried on and every citizen was given opportunity and urged to contribute his share in this good work. The results show in the over-subscription of McCulloch county's \$7,500 quota by nearly 50 per cent, the more or less complete total so far running around \$11,000.00.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the noble and self-sacrificing efforts of the various committees and of various individuals, who lent their time and efforts unstinted towards making for the success of the drive in McCulloch county. Their success has been their own reward.

The committees all report awakened and intelligent co-operation in practically every community. Since the drive was made last year, the citizens have awakened to the great work done by the Red Cross and there was a hearty response made upon all hands. Many who had never before contributed, donated liberally and cheerfully, and one of the committees reported not having missed asking a single man in his section, and further not having been refused by a single man. This spirit of universal co-operation has been very gratifying to the leaders and the committees, and is worthy of special commendation.

F. Y. Jackson, secretary of the Red Cross War fund has been busy checking the lists and making up the totals, and while his report is not complete nor exact as yet, the following totals will show approximately the amounts subscribed in each of the districts, together with the grand total of the drive:

SUN TO BE IN ECLIPSE ON EVENING OF JUNE 8TH DARKNESS LAST AN HOUR

Citizens of Brady will on June 8th at about 6:30 o'clock in the evening have the opportunity to witness a natural phenomenon which the present generation will never see again. The phenomenon will be an almost total eclipse of the sun, 93 per cent of the sun's rays being shut off from view by the moon coming in between the sun and the earth. Darkness will last for about an hour, after which the sun will again throw its light upon the earth for a short while until sunset.

The last eclipse of the sun occurred in the summer of 1908 and was visible in parts of the United States about noon.

WATERWORKS BONDS ARE SOLD BY ALD. BROAD

Alderman Howard Broad returned the end of last week from Austin where he had carried the \$25,000.00 worth of waterworks bonds recently voted by the citizens of Brady for waterworks improvement, and where they were registered by him. Mr. Broad was successful in disposing of the bonds at par and accrued interest, J. L. Arlitt of Austin being the purchaser. The money secured from the sale of the bonds has been placed on deposit in a local bank, and will be allowed to remain there at interest until the city council decides upon the method of waterworks improvement.

As 6 per cent interest is being received from the bank, this will counterbalance the interest being paid on the bonds. Under the present unfavorable conditions, it has been decided by the council not to make any effort towards raising by public subscription the balance of the amount needed to make the necessary improvements, and no further steps are contemplated until local conditions change for the better.

CHAUTAQUA OPENS SUNDAY 5-DAY PROGRAM

Miss Elizabeth Hancock, representing the White & Myers Chautauqua system, arrived Wednesday and is assisting the local soliciting committees in the sale of tickets. The committees report very good progress in the sale of tickets so far, but are anxious to sell sufficient tickets to cover the \$750 guarantee. It must be understood that all tickets sold before the opening of the chautauqua are credited on this guarantee, while of those sold after the chautauqua opens, as well as of the individual admissions paid, only a per cent is credited to the guarantee. The citizens owe it as a patriotic duty to help the committee out by the purchase of season tickets, for it was none other than patriotism and loyalty to the town that prompted the committee to guarantee the chautauqua for this year.

For \$2.00 the purchaser of a season ticket is entitled to admission to the entire ten numbers of the program, making each number cost only 20 cents apiece. These entertainments include such famous numbers as a presentation of "The Mikado," which, presented in opera and by the same company as will be seen in Brady, commanded prices of from \$2.50 to \$5.00 a seat.

Then there is the lecture of Alfred H. O'Connor, survivor of the Somme, who lectures on his "Twenty-Two Months in the Trenches." In New York, in all the largest cities of the United States, O'Connor has spoken to capacity crowds. His is a most wonderful lecture. He describes the trenches, the firing of the guns, the charges—the entire bloody struggle—so graphically, so realistically, that his audience can almost see the life and death struggle right before their eyes—and he couples his narrative with such a quaint humor that at even the most tragic of battle scenes, the audience smiles through its tears. And he tells how and why we are going to win the war—how and why the American boys in the trenches are profiting by the costly experiences of the French and the British. It is a lecture you will never forget. It brings the roar of the battle and the whine of the bullets home to you.

There are other numbers of exceptional merit, but it will be found that each and every number possesses its own peculiar merit, and the varied numbers will appeal, each in its own way, to the audiences.

WORK OR FIGHT IS ARMY ORDER TO MEN OF DRAFT AGE

Washington, D. C., May 23.—Every man of draft age must work or fight after July 1st, under a drastic amendment to the selective service regulations announced today by Provost Marshal General Crowder. Draft registrants who are not engaged in useful occupations will be given the choice of new jobs or the army.

The regulations hold professional baseball players are not usefully employed, and must get new jobs or join the army. Gamblers, race track and bucket shop attendants head the list of those to be reached by the new regulations, which also include bartenders, theatre ushers, elevator operators, club and hotel attendants and store clerks.

Deferred classifications on account of dependents will be disregarded in applying the new rule. A man may be at the bottom of class one, or in class four, but if he is within the regulations and refuses to take regular employment, he will be given a new number in class one.

Local boards are authorized to use their discretion only where they find that an enforced change of employment would work a hardship on dependents.

Slackers who leave the country to escape the draft will be prosecuted under the selective service act on their return, Attorney General Gregory announces. The attorney general stated that it had been brought to his attention that a number of men of draft age left the country and occasionally others are leaving to evade military service. Temporary residence in other countries will not exempt them from prosecution on their return to this country.

Theatrical performers are excepted from the regulation at the direction of Secretary Baker, who said that the people can not do without all amusement, and that other amusements could be dispensed with more readily.

The Doom of Baseball.

Dallas, Texas, May 23.—A poll of Texas league baseball clubs this morning shows that none of the clubs will have even the nucleus of a baseball team if the men of draft age are barred from playing after June 1st.

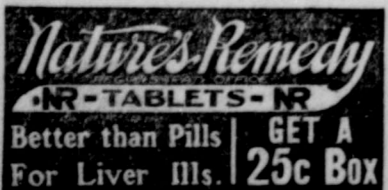

WORK OR FIGHT IS ARMY ORDER TO MEN OF DRAFT AGE

Washington, D. C., May 23.—Every man of draft age must work or fight, after July 1st, under a drastic amendment to the selective service regulations announced today by Provost Marshal General Crowder. Draft registrants who are not engaged in useful occupations will be given the choice of new jobs or the army.

The regulations hold professional baseball players are not usefully employed, and must get new jobs or join the army. Gamblers, race track and bucket shop attendants head the list of those to be reached by the new regulations, which also include bartenders, theatre ushers, elevator operators, club and hotel attendants and store clerks.

Deferred classifications on account of dependents will be disregarded in applying the new rule. A man may be at the bottom of class one, or in class four, but if he is within the regulations and refuses to take regular employment, he will be given a new number in class one.

Local boards are authorized to use their discretion only where they find that an enforced change of employment would work a hardship on dependents.

Slackers who leave the country to escape the draft will be prosecuted under the selective service act on their return, Attorney General Gregory announces. The attorney general stated that it had been brought to his attention that a number of men of draft age left the country and occasionally others are leaving to evade military service. Temporary residence in other countries will not exempt them from prosecution on their return to this country.

Theatrical performers are excepted from the regulation at the direction of Secretary Baker, who said that the people can not do without all amusement, and that other amusements could be dispensed with more readily.

GEORGE F. KING SOON TO DRILL WELL IN COUNTY

Announcement is made this week that George F. King, who came here a couple weeks ago from Denver, Colo., will soon commence drilling operations in the county. Mr. King has acquired some of the most desirable lease tracts in the county, and will drill on one of the biggest structures. He was not yet ready to make announcement of the location of his well, but expects to have everything in shape within a week or so.

Messrs. C. A. Bowen and Thad O. Day arrived on Thursday of last week. Mr. Bowen is owner of the lease on the Hall-Dutton tract, eight miles north of town, while Mr. Day has the drilling contract for the well. Both gentlemen will remain here until the well is completed or oil sands are struck, and will push the work with all possible speed.

This well is still being spudded in very hard rock, and progress has been delayed while the drillers straightened out a crook in the well. Drilling is proceeding night and day, however, and it is hoped that the next week or ten days will bring some important developments.

Comfort Well No. 1 at Whiteland is still waiting arrival of equipment. The rig is being built by O. Deeter and Harry Becker has arrived, and will take charge of drilling. The tanks contracted with O. D. Mann & Sons are nearing completion, and G. R. White has offered the loan of a gasoline engine to enable the filling of the tanks as a protection against the high winds. C. S. Thomas, who contracted this well, is at present up north endeavoring to rush the balance of his equipment.

At Rochelle the Southwestern Petroleum Co., are experiencing added difficulties in their well on the Crews tract, one mile south of Rochelle. The second packer, which was set the latter part of last week under the personal supervision of the general manager of the company, failed to hold, and the latter left Sunday for Tulsa, Okla., to see if another packer could be secured. He was expected to return yesterday. The Great Eastern Oil Co., had the misfortune to break their mast, and were unable to keep another mast secured in place of the first one; consequently their operations have been at a standstill.

At Milburn, drilling on the Cunningham well is proceeding, with numerous showings of oil; and the indications are said to be highly favorable. Burford & Brimm are also continuing the drilling on their well on the J. F. Cawyer tract east of Mercury, but with nothing noteworthy to report. The Fidelity Oil Co., has located their rig on the Cox tract, but have not yet begun operations. Several more rigs are expected at Mercury within the next few weeks.

Mr. Cooper, who has the contract for the well on the Robert-Shelton tract at Lohn, has been granted a 30-day extension on his contract. This well was to have been spudded in June 9th, and Mr. Cooper began shipment of his rig on the 25th inst., but because of transportation delays was obliged to ask for an extension to assure the starting of drilling on contract time.

SHULTZ OIL CO. STARTS DRILLING—LEASES TRACT TO GULF PRODUCTION CO.

The Shultz Oil company of Paint Rock started their crew to drilling this week, and after a few days will put on a double crew running day and night, until the well is completed.

This is one of the best rigs in the country and it is expected that they will make good headway in their drilling.

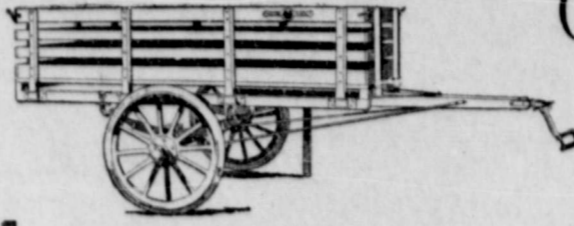

SOUTH TEXAS LUMBER COMPANY SOLD - YARD TO BE DISCONTINUED

CAREY-LOMBARD-YOUNG & CO. ABSORB BUSINESS—STOCK TO BE CONSOLIDATED—PURCHASING COMPANY PLANS IMPROVEMENTS.

The stock, sheds, office, business and good-will of the South Texas Young & Co.'s Brady yard will be purchased by the Carey-Lombard-Young & Co. Brady yard and will be merged with the latter yard on South Bridge and South Second street. The buildings and lumber sheds of the South Texas Co.'s yard will be torn down and the premises vacated.

While the news of the deal came rather as a surprise, yet it was not altogether unanticipated. The five lumber yards in Brady have greatly crowded the local field, and for the past several years it has been realized that sooner or later, in justice to themselves, as well as to the citizens of this section, the number must be cut down. The South Texas Co. yard is one of the pioneers in the field, and while regretting to lose it, yet the change is acknowledged to be the best interests of all concerned.

Mr. Josh Ewing of Houston, general manager of the retail yards of the South Texas Lumber Co., arrived last Saturday to conduct negotiations for the transaction for his company, and E. A. Foster, of Norman, Okla., general manager of the Carey-Lombard-Young & Co., yards, arrived Sunday. Both gentlemen remained here until Wednesday closing up the deal.

Mr. Foster announced that the elimination of one of the lumber yards in Brady gave them opportunity to do some much-desired improving of their local yard, and that the old lumber sheds would be replaced with new, larger and more substantial sheds, while various other improvements would be made about the yard, making it one of the best in this section of the state. He stated that the lumber would be moved from the South Texas Co.'s yard to their own yard, and that all the buildings and sheds of that company, which occupy leased ground, would be torn down and the property vacated.

E. T. Jordan will continue in charge of the Carey-Lombard-Young & Co., Brady yard, as well as having supervision of the company's yards in the county. In common with Brady citizens, he is rejoicing over the change and the contemplated improvements, and will put forth every effort to make a showing for his company under the improved conditions.

Tom King, who has had charge of the South Texas Co.'s yard is undecided about his future. Mr. King and family have been very popular with citizens of Brady since he again took up his residence here about a year ago, and nothing would suit his friends better than to keep him and his family residents of Brady.

J. E. BOYD OF BANGS INSANE FROM AUTO ACCIDENT—CARRIED TO ASYLUM

J. E. Boyd of Bangs, was declared insane at an examining trial in the county court Thursday, and it was the order of the jury that he be transferred to a State asylum for the insane for treatment.

Mr. Boyd's case is an extremely sad and regrettable one. Several weeks ago he was seriously injured in an auto accident at Brady, receiving a blow upon the head from which he lay unconscious for days. In the same accident, W. A. Scarbrough, also of Bangs, was killed.

Shortly after Mr. Boyd regained consciousness and was able to be moved from Brady to his home, his mind gradually clouded. The injury he received apparently had left a depression upon the brain, which, as long as it remains, has destroyed his mind.

It is the hope and belief of his family and friends that his case is curable and that his mind will be restored under proper treatment. Mr. Boyd's wife, his brother, C. C. Boyd of Holder, and other relatives and friends attended him at the court examination Thursday. — Brownwood News.

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
