### LIEUT. WHITE VISITS BRADY IN AIRPLANE

Lieut. W. J. White, known better here by the name of "Billy", accompanied by Lieut. Chandler, both of the aerial service at Kelly Field No. 2, San Antonio, paid Brady a visit Sunday morning by the airplane route.

News of the coming of two airplanes was circulated Saturday morning and an immense crowd of people in autos and other vehicles gathered near the stock yards between 12:00 and 1:00 o'clock Saturday to watch the arrival of the planes. Both planes started from San Antonio Saturday morning about 10:00 o'clock, and stopped at Mason for dinner, and intended to come on to Brady shortly after noon, but an accident to one of the machines caused the flight to be postponed, and a wrecker out of San Antonio was phoned for. The other plane, with both aviators, arrived in Brady Sunday morning at about 9:00 o'clock, and after circling over the city for several minutes at a height of about 4000 feet, landed near the stock yards south of the city.

The honking of horns and yells of applause greeted the aviators as they made their descent, and a rush was made to the plane where both young men were received with many handshakes and complimentary remarks. A special guard was put in charge of the plane and many visitors went to the scene of the landing to get a glimpse of this magnificent type of flying machine.

The young men were escorted to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. White, father and mother of Lieut. White, where they ate breakfast and stayed until their start about two o'clock Sunday evening.

The fire whistle was sounded about forty minutes before their return was to commence, and a still larger crowd was present to bid them good-bye and good luck.

The start to Kelly Field was made about 1:00 o'clock, and after rising from the ground the aviators circled over the crowd twice and waved their good-bye to relatives and friends, and the plane then flew high in the air and headed southeast toward Fredericksburg, where a short stop was made.

The event was quite a treat to Brady citizens, and were even more so by the fact that Lieut. White was a Brady boy, who entered the aerial service about one year ago.

Lieut. Chandler, his companion, is also an expert flyer, and he was made to feel like he was among home folks and friends.

**REMEDY FOR CUT WORMS  
AND BLIGHT GIVEN BY  
DEMONSTRATION AGENT**

M. E. Brown, emergency demonstration agent for Menard county, has had published in the Menard Messenger the following remedy for blight and cut worms, which may prove or benefit our readers:  
"I hear there is some trouble with cut worms and blight this spring. The Bateau Mixture: 1 lb. lime, 1 lb. blue stone and 10 gallons of water will kill any trouble of the kind if sprayed every two weeks. The cut worm can be poisoned by using 15 lbs. brand and one lb. arsenic, 2 gal. syrup and one lemon juice all mixed and scattered to one acre of land. This will kill any amount of cut worms if there is not too much vegetation for them to get."

This afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, the meetings for the War Savings Stamp pledges will be held at every school house in the county with the exception of Brady, where the meeting will be held at the court house instead of the school house, and every citizen residing in Brady independent school district is expected to be present.

A great effort will be made to have McCulloch county come up to the total pledge of \$130,560.00.

The quota assigned for each school district, together with the delegates from Brady who will visit the district and assist in the holding of the meeting, is as follows:

Camp San Saba	3,500.00

**A CLEAN-UP.**

If the "Cleanest Town in Texas" campaign were to begin over again, Brady, at present, wouldn't have a look-in on the favorable mention list—let alone a prize. Brady needs a clean-up—and needs it now.

The recent rains have given a wonderful impetus to the growth of weeds, and they will soon be going to seed and perpetuating themselves for years to come. And while the city sanitary force deserves credit for maintaining the city's streets and alleys in a fairly sanitary shape, yet there are several premises and back yards about town that leave much to be desired.

A general clean-up is in order, and will do much to promote civic pride, as well as the health and sanitation of the town.

**WORK OR FIGHT.**

Some weeks ago the order came forth from the war department that all men of draft age must "work or fight." And when they said "work" they made it clear that that it must be work of essential character, and that clerks, porters and many other classes of employment were not considered as coming under the head of essential. Following this order there has been an exodus of men who came under this classification, from the cities to the rural districts, where they are earning their wages in the sweat of their brows, and thereby are helping the country's production of food and supplies.

It has been argued that this order should have included not only the men of draft age, but those of over draft age as well. However, there is no way at present by which the war department can force those who are over draft age, and who refuse to work, to enter the army. It is very likely that for this reason the extension of the draft age limit is being urged so as to include men of from 18 years to 45 years.

That it is the intention of the government, however, that every man who possesses the physical ability, must work or fight is shown in the notice now being given out by the Council of Defense, requesting all men without regular employment to assist the farmers with their crops. The notice states that if the request passes unheeded, then the person who fails to take heed will be forced to engage in some necessary or useful work.

This is a time of war!

The whole nation is one vast beehive—and in this beehive there must be no drones. If there be such, then the sooner they are stung to death the better for all the working bees.

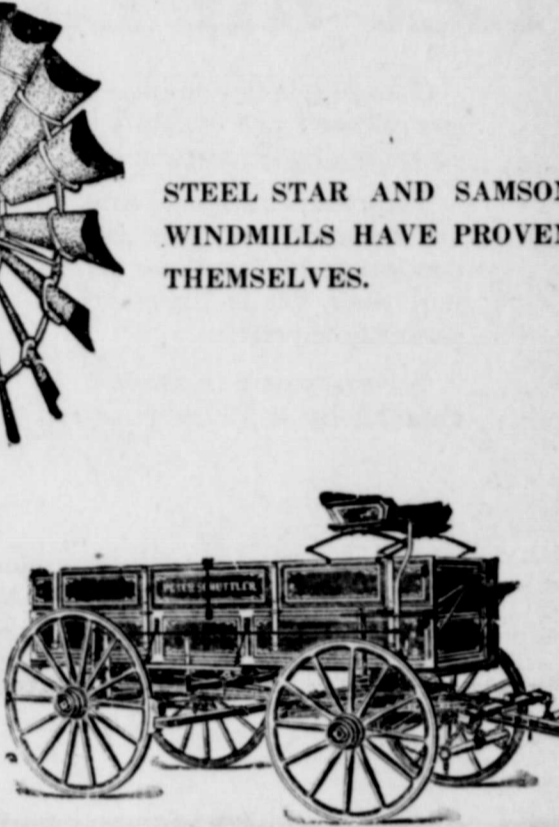
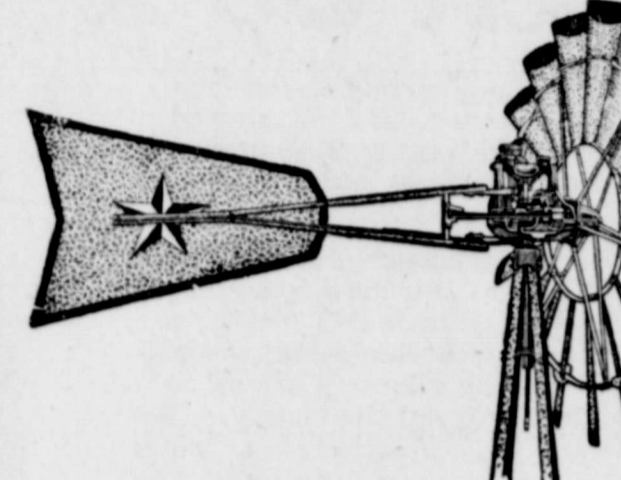
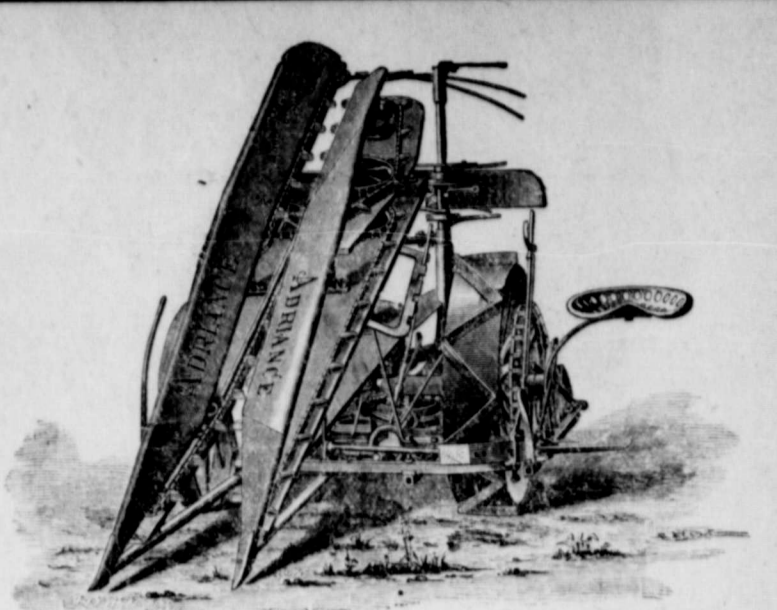
