

# Stage Set For 1972 Bull Town Days Events

The stage is set and final details are being worked out for Bovina's ninth annual community celebration, Bull Town Days 1972, which is scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 17-18-19.

Everything is on schedule for the celebration, which has been highly successful during its nine-year history, according to Tom Bonds, general chairman of this year's event.

Several members of Bovina Roping Club will haul mesquite wood from the Eastern Panhandle later this week or early next week for the barbecue fire on which 3000 pounds of choice beef will be cooked for the free Friday supper which is a highlight of the celebration. The meat will be cooked the night before by a crew headed by

Matt Graham and R. L. Hopingardner. Barbeque pits will be located at Bovina Gin Co.

Bull Town Days have permits went on sale this week at a cost of \$2 each. Purchase of a permit allows male members of the community to freely walk the town's streets without the threat of being placed in the BTD jail which will be set up on Main Street.

Only three girls have so far entered the competition for Bull Town Days Queen.

The contest will be judged at 7 p.m. in the roping arena on Thursday.

Deadline for girls to enter the contest is Monday, August 7, says Mrs. C. C. Naegle, chairman of the queen's contest.

The winner and two runners-up will be announced at intermission of the Grand Ole Opry Thursday night in Bovina Schools auditorium.

The celebration officially gets underway at 6 p.m. Thursday with cow calling contests and heard growing contests at the roping arena.

The queen's contest will follow at 7 p.m.

From the roping arena, the festivities will move to the school's auditorium for the Good Times Grand Ole Opry Show from Roosevelt County, N.M. Winners of the afternoon's contests will be announced at an intermission during the show.

Friday in Bull Town starts early with a chuckwagon breakfast at Bovina Gin from 7 to 9 a.m.

Following that, old-timers will register in downtown Bovina with a community basket lunch slated for noon.

Horsemanship activities will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until 2 p.m. at the roping arena.

Scheduled for 4 p.m., the BTD parade will wind through the downtown area and prizes will be awarded in three areas.

Also Friday afternoon, the annual fiddlers contest is scheduled for 5 o'clock. It will be in downtown Bovina. Cash prizes of \$50, \$35 and \$15 will be awarded to the top three contestants.

Pearl Singleterry and Al Kerby are in charge of the fiddlers contest.

Friday's activities continue with the highlight of the three-day celebration, the free bar-

beque on Main Street, which will be followed by presentation of awards, a square dance contest and downtown square dancing.

Menu for the meal will consist of Parmer County-grown beef barbeque, pinto beans and Bovina-grown onion and cantaloupe slices.

Wilbur Charles is in charge of obtaining cooks for the beans. Anyone who would volunteer to cook a pot of beans is asked to call him at his office or home.

Dancing will continue with the Teenage Dance scheduled for 9 until midnight at the American Legion Hall. An Amarello group, "The Friends," has been signed to play for the affair. Tickets are on sale for \$3 per person

or \$5 per couple, according to Mrs. Elton Venable, supervisor of the dance.

Judging in the 12th annual Quarter Horse Show, sponsored by Bovina Roping Club, will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday. Interested persons may contact any member of the club or Mrs. Pat Read, show secretary, for further information.

Bovina Schools Ex-Students social will be at 8 p.m. in the school cafeteria. Election of officers for the coming year will be conducted along with visiting and refreshments of homemade ice cream.

Saturday's activities conclude with a western dance, sponsored by the American Legion, at the Legion hall on Third Street. A new addition to the '72

celebration is motorcycle races at the track on the Dimmitt highway west of town. The races are Moto Cross AMA-sanctioned with trophies to be awarded in all amateur and expert classes.

For the second year, several civic organizations will be sponsoring carnival-type booths on the downtown block at least one night of the three-day celebration.

Booths include a bingo booth, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus; a wet sponge toss and bean guessing booth, sponsored by the 4-H Clubs; and a homemade ice cream and popcorn ball booth, sponsored by St. Ann's Society. Other organizations are expected to have booths, said Bonds.

Interest in the slowpitch softball league here continues at a good clip.

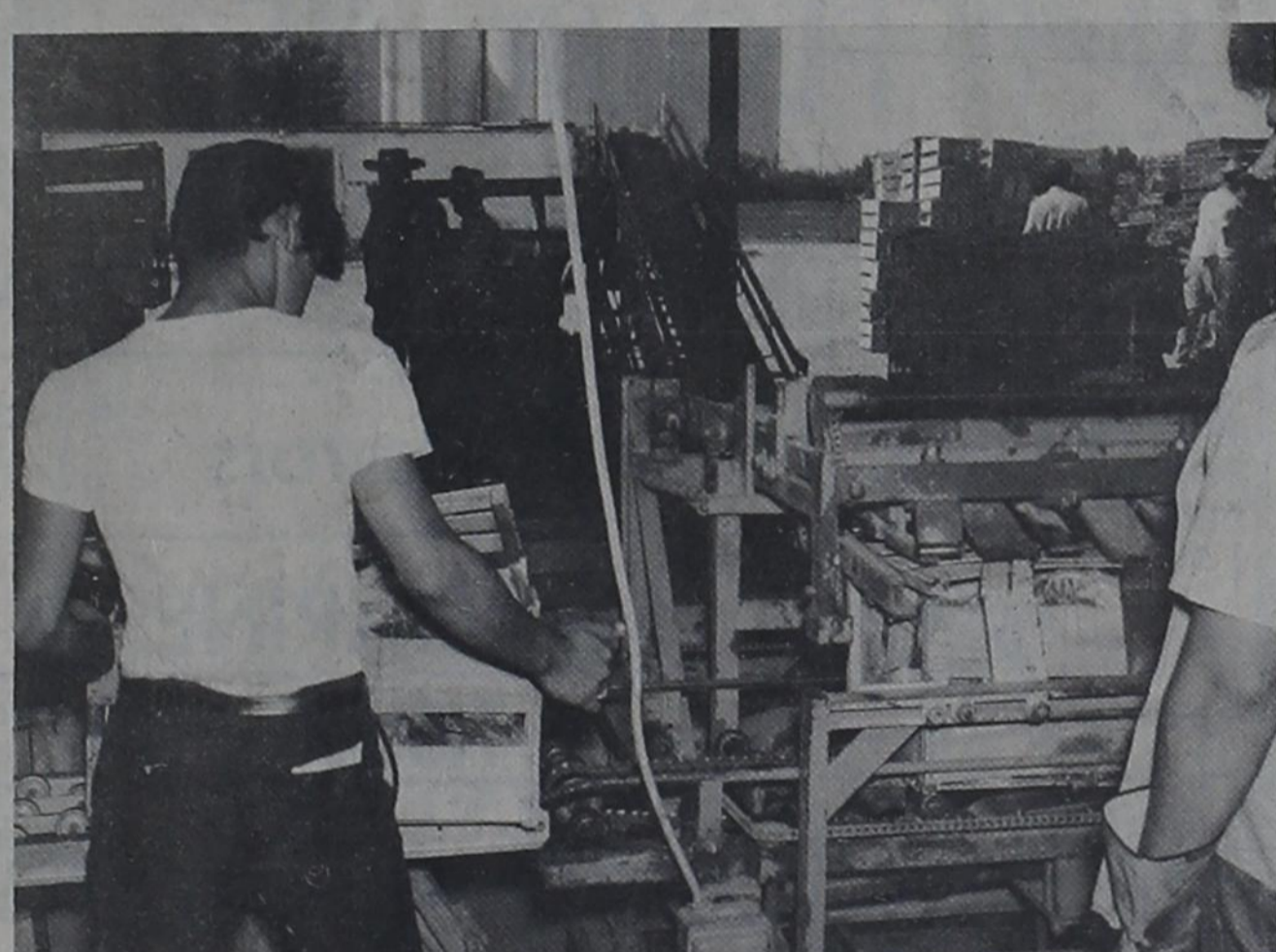
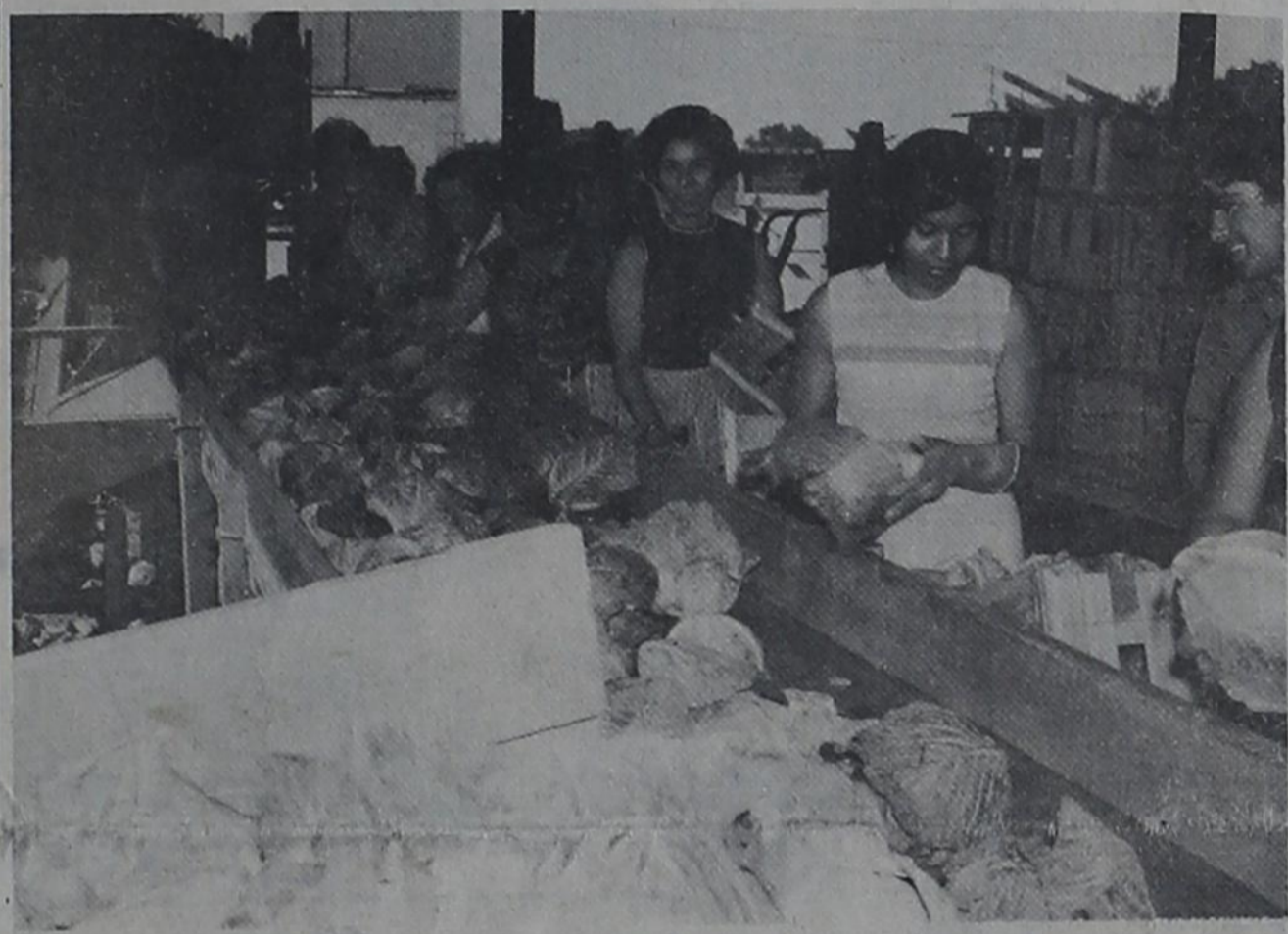
This season has more teams than ever before --- 10 instead of the usual eight.

## '72 - '73 School Year Begins Here Aug. 21

Bovina Schools will begin the 1972-'73 school year Monday, August 21, 19 days from now, at 8:30 a.m.

A registration schedule for kindergarten pupils, first graders and junior high and high school students is expected to be released soon, perhaps next week, announces Superintendent L. F. Jacobs.

Faculty members will report for in-service work Monday, August 14, a week earlier than students, Jacobs says.

Parents are reminded that under the state's compulsory immunization law, all school-level children must be immunized against five communicable diseases -- diphtheria, measles, tetanus and poliomyelitis -- before they will be allowed to enroll. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of the illness. Smallpox, which was originally a required immunization, has been removed from the list by the State Board of Health.

Two positions on the faculty remain to be filled this week following the signing of a high school math teacher, Jacobs says.

Named to fill that position was Miss Shirley Kilgore of Comanche.

Miss Kilgore, who earned her degree at the University of Texas at Arlington, has a year of teaching experience at Harlingen.

Jacobs asked that anyone who

might know of an available apartment to phone him at the school or at his home.

Vacancies remaining on the faculty include a coaches job

and an elementary or junior high teaching job.

Jacobs said he hoped the vacancies would be filled by next week.

The opening for a coach came with the resignation of newly-hired Loyd Habbrooks who quit to take a similar position with Class AAA Levelland.

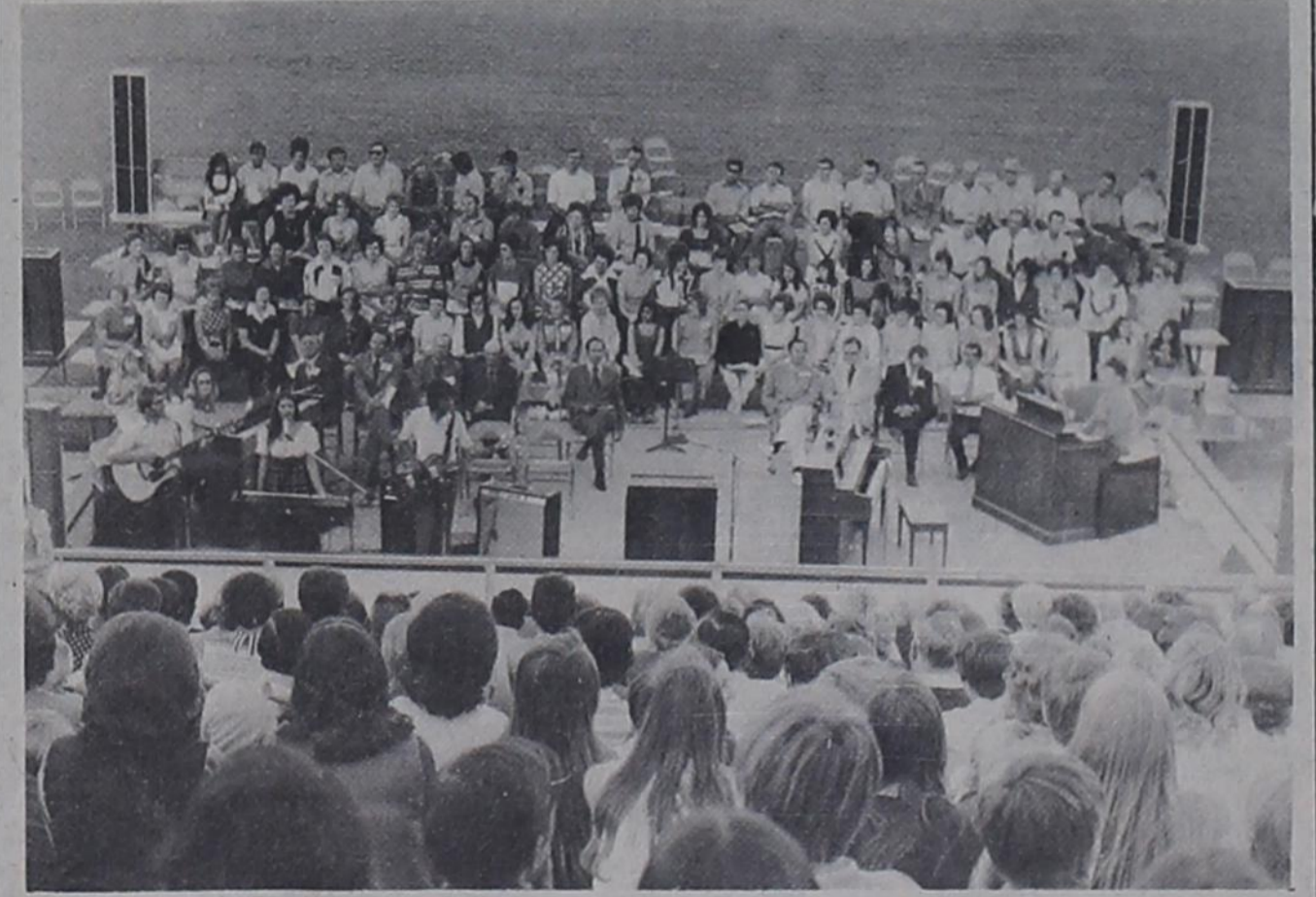
Miss Cooper, a 1972 graduate of Dalhart High School, is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs.

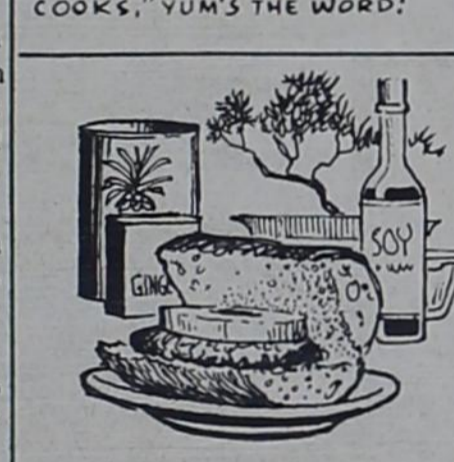

Bovina Lions took a 13-10 decision over Goldsmith's Fireballs in a match between previously-undefeated teams Friday night in the slow-pitch softball league here.

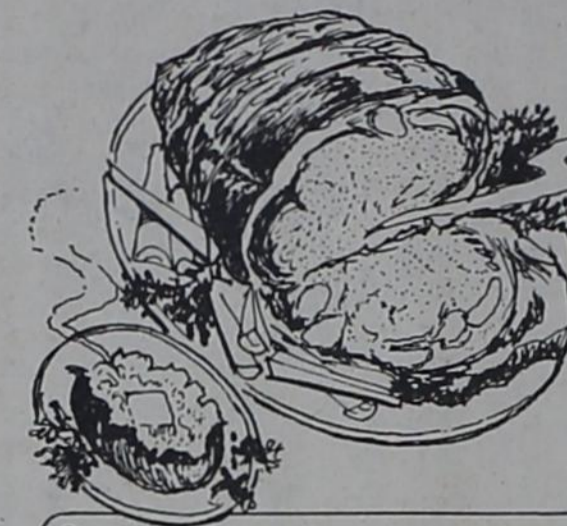
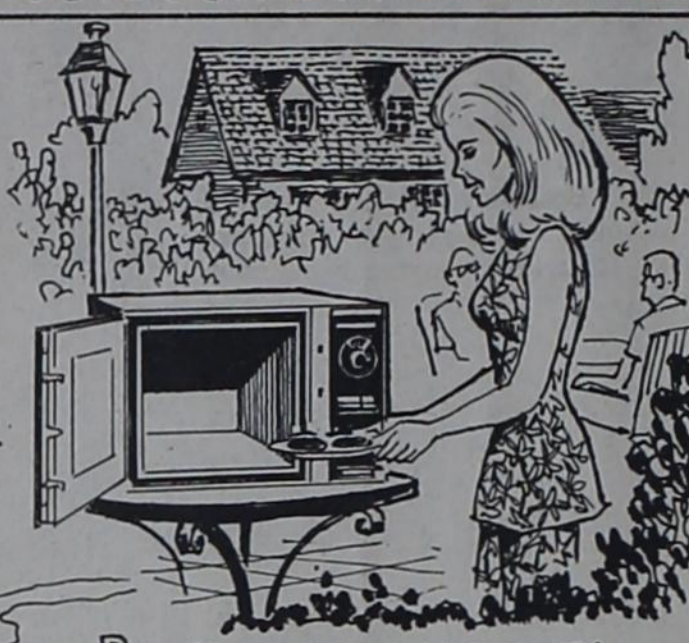
Work on the city's water system expansion program continued to progress last week and this week as the 300,000-gallon ground storage tank began to take shape. The tank is located just west of Ninth Street.

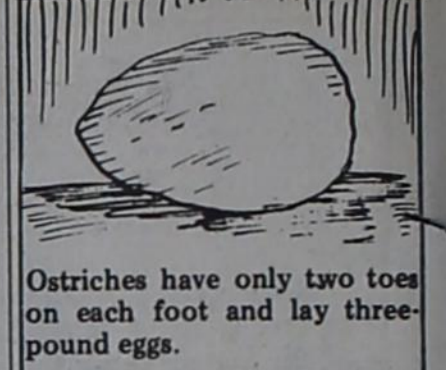

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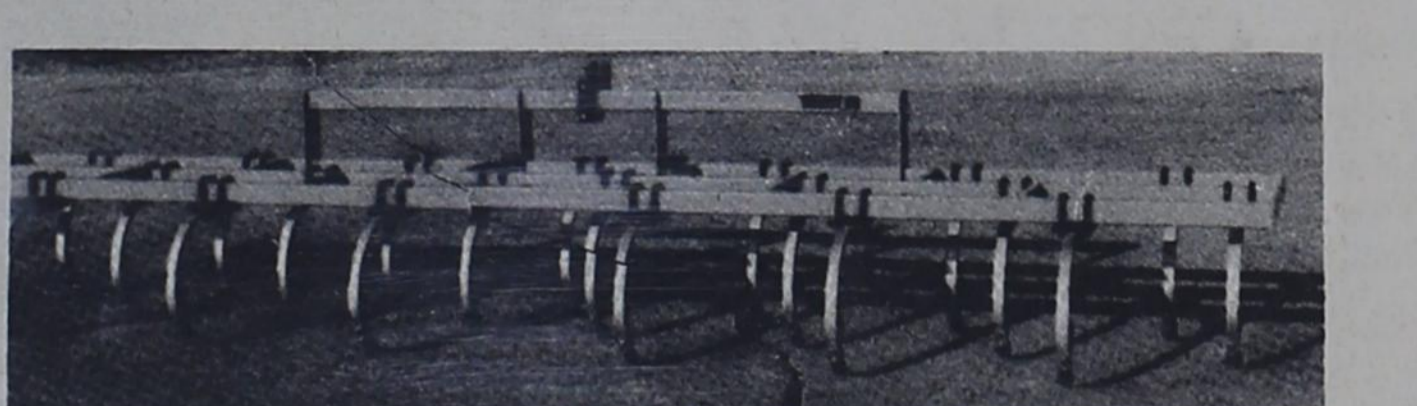

## On The Farm In Parmer County

In case some of you have been wondering about the dip order on scabies scheduled for July, it was postponed a full month. Dipping was started Tuesday, August 1. A scabies quarantine is still in effect in the following counties: Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Foard, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler.

Official dipping will be required on all cattle being moved within any of the above 34 counties, except the following: (1) Cattle moving direct to slaughter; (2) Cattle moving to slaughter through a livestock market; (3) Cattle moving to a livestock market for sale and dipping prior to release; (4) Cattle released from livestock market to an official dip point with permit; (5) Cattle moving to an official dip point; (6) Cattle officially dipped within the past seven days, provided accompanied by a dip certificate; (7) Cattle from outside the quarantine area moving through the quarantine area with no stop-overs; (8) Cattle moving (same owner) from one premise to another premise within the quarantined area; (9) Cattle from outside the quarantine area moving into the quarantine area for grazing.

Undipped animals leaving the quarantine area and moving outside the quarantine area must be accompanied by an official movement certificate allowing movement to an official dip point for official dipping at destination, except being animals moving direct to slaughter.

The high risk of creating a continuing source of infection makes it necessary that any

### Green Thumb Tips

One of the newest stoop-savers in gardening is seed embedded in water-soluble tape. Seeds are accurately spaced according to kind.

The gardener need only open a trench in previously-prepared soil, lay the tape in the bottom, cover to the depth given in the directions on the package, and firm soil to tape.

Rain or artificial water will dissolve the tape, leaving seeds in place, ready to grow.

Gardeners who have trouble after eating cucumbers should grow the kind named Burpless. Its low acid content allows anyone to indulge and yet be comfortable afterward.

undipped cattle from a scabies quarantined area that move through a livestock market outside the quarantined area be dipped at the livestock market together with all other cattle at the livestock market, exception being animals consigned from the sale directly to slaughter prior to release to the country.

In addition to the above requirements, cattle from the above listed counties destined for shipment to other states must meet Federal requirements, as well as requirements of the state of destination.

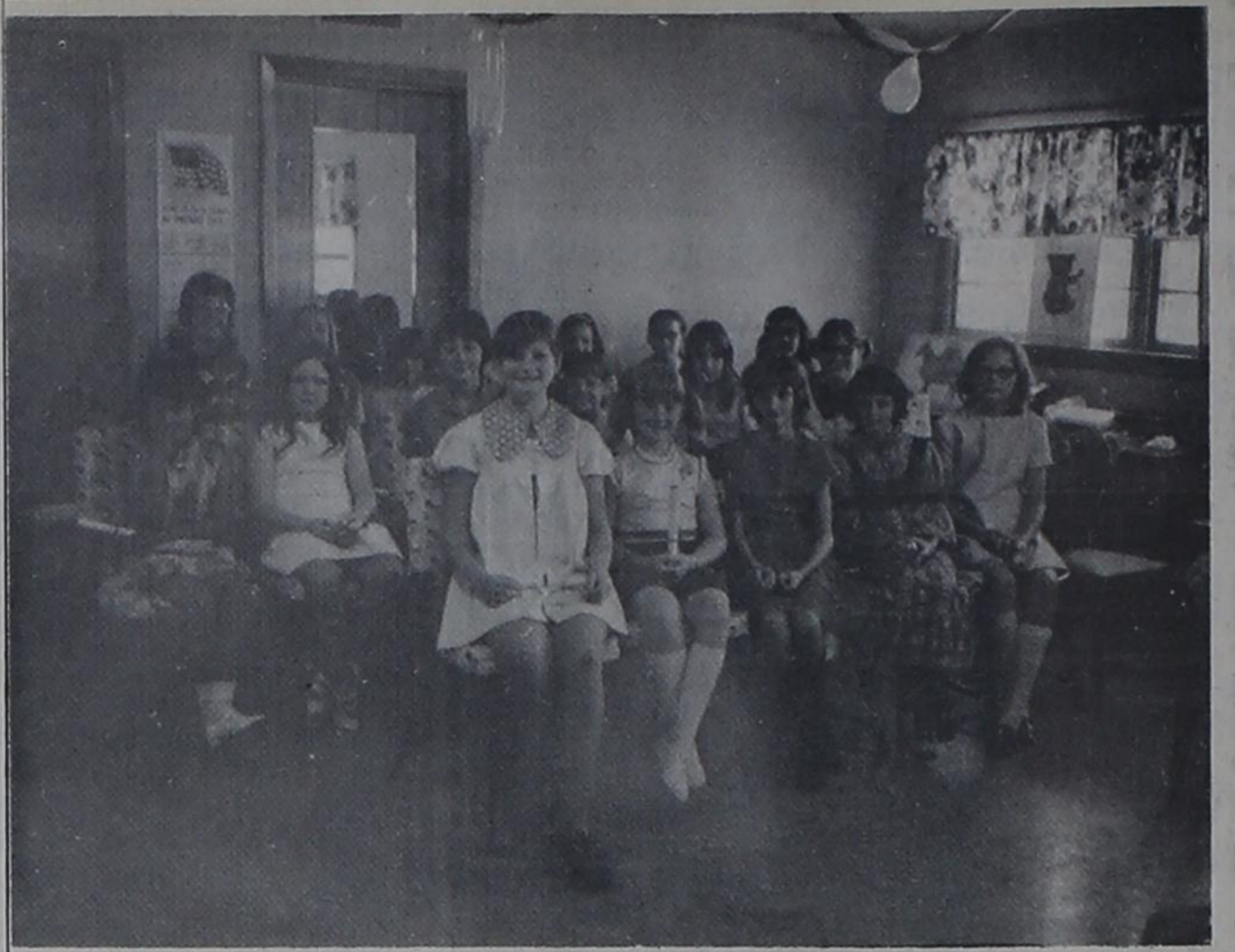
**AN UPLIFTING EXPERIENCE**

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

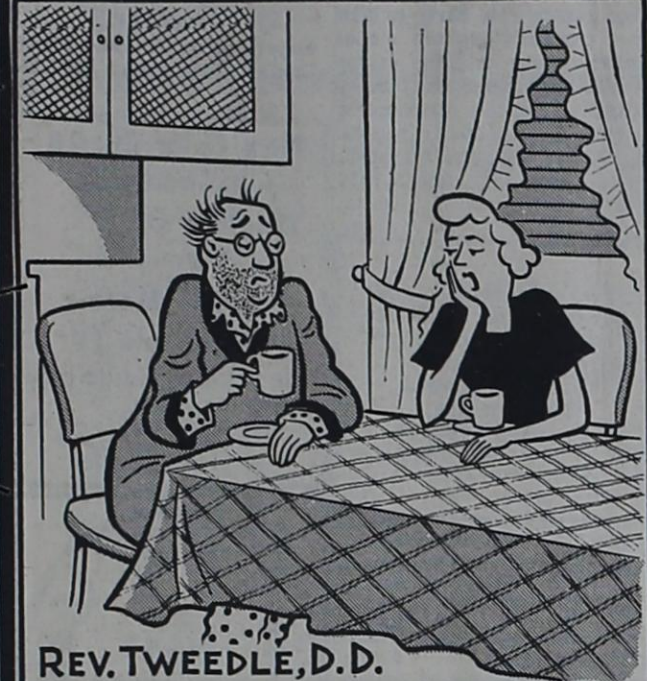
"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

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### At Home In Parmer County

Is your home safe? Did you realize that 95 per cent of accidental poisonings occur while children are supposedly under adult supervision?

More than half a million different kinds of medicines, cleaning aids and other household substances tempt children's curiosities and often cause poisoning.

The key to halting these poisonings is a continuing plan of prevention in the home. First, don't store bleach, detergent, drain cleaner or other hazardous substances under the kitchen sink or any other place accessible to small children.

And don't keep bug killers, medicines or other dangerous items next to food. Paint, insecticide, turpentine, alcohol or other such substances may be mistaken for something to drink when poured into bottles or similar-type containers.

Just because something looks, smells or tastes horrible to you doesn't mean that a child won't eat or drink enough of it to poison him.

A child's sense of smell and taste aren't as developed as an adult's. He can't read or recognize the signs of poison, and just one taste can kill him.

Remember, it's up to you to keep your child safe from poisons.

The Food and Drug Administration is working to prohibit lung disease caused by certain furniture polishes.

After September 13, 1972, manufacturers of certain liquid furniture polishes must package their products in child-proof containers to comply with a new FDA regulation.

The regulations covers liquid furniture polishes that contain at least 10 per cent mineral seal oil, a crude form of mineral oil used to put a shine on furniture. When swallowed by children, such polishes can cause lung diseases.

The FDA formulated a test that the packages must pass. First, a sample of children under five years of age must be able to open the package 85 per cent of the time. However, a panel of adults must be able to open it 90 per cent of the time.

Second, the opening of the container must restrict the flow of polish so that only about a half teaspoonful comes out from one shake or squeeze of the opened container.

Children aren't the only ones being poisoned. Adults using pesticides should use them with extreme caution since all pesticides are poisonous.

Spring has come and with it comes man's pests -- insects, weeds, rodents and plant diseases. And, farmers, ranchers and homeowners are once again calling on pesticides to eliminate these problems.

Pesticide use increases drastically in the spring. And, since all pesticides are poisonous, extreme caution in their use is essential.

Improper pesticide use may cause more trouble than the toxic nature of the pesticide itself. Observing some simple rules can minimize the hazards involved.

Always read the label completely, even the small print, before beginning and follow the directions for mixing and using the pesticide. If the information on the label includes specific recommendations for safety equipment such as a respirator, by all means use it.

Wear clean, long sleeved clothes. If pesticides are being used for extended periods of time, such as several days, a shower and a change of clothes at the end of each work day are important. Clothing should be laundered after each day's use.

Always change and bathe if pesticides are spilled on the skin or clothing. Studies have shown that you must wash the affected area immediately in order to minimize the chance of poisoning.

Pesticides used on crops and livestock should not be used in or around the home. Also, never eat, drink or smoke when handling or using pesticides.

After a field or area has been treated, re-enter it only after the danger of poisoning has been reduced. Contact with treated plants, surfaces or application equipment can be hazardous.

Mend and clean clothing before putting it up for sale. Pin the correct size on garments. Tie or pin pairs of shoes together. Clean and repair toys, records, kitchen equipment and books. Steer clear of selling un-repaired or damaged goods.

Remember a trick of the trade, and set up a few tables where everything sells for the same price. Otherwise, group similar items together. Hang all garments on a rack.

Don't forget advertising for the sale. Neighborhood signs can help. You can also consider placing a small ad in the newspaper.

Remember to check legal aspects that relate to selling goods. Call the comptroller of Public Accounts for information on collecting sales tax. He's listed in the phone book under Texas State Agencies.

Check with the Internal Revenue Service for information on reporting income from a garage sale. Is the money collected to be donated to a recognized charity? Ask about giving tax deduction receipts to donors of merchandise. The Internal Revenue Service is listed in the phone book under United States Government Offices.

## Minimum Tillage Has Advantages

Minimum tillage is gaining wide acceptance throughout Texas and the United States, according to Soil Conservation Service officials in Parmer County.

Minimum tillage is a new system of farming that is producing more net return per acre for many farmers while reducing soil erosion.

This practice leaves last season's crop residues on the soil surface to provide a seedbed for a new crop. Farmers leave the past season residues on the soil surface and use planting equipment such as fluted coulters, common drills or chisel openers to place the seed in an otherwise undisturbed seedbed.

Herbicides are used to control weeds during the growing season. Tillage is kept to a minimum by the use of herbicides.

Farmers such as Frank Hinkson of Lazbuddie are finding advantages such as: reducing breakdown of soil structure - reduces soil compaction - improves soil aeration - soil takes water more readily - less labor - reduces trips across the field - conserves moisture - soil erosion reduced as much as 95 per cent - protects seedlings from wind

damage - more food and cover for pheasants and other wild-life.

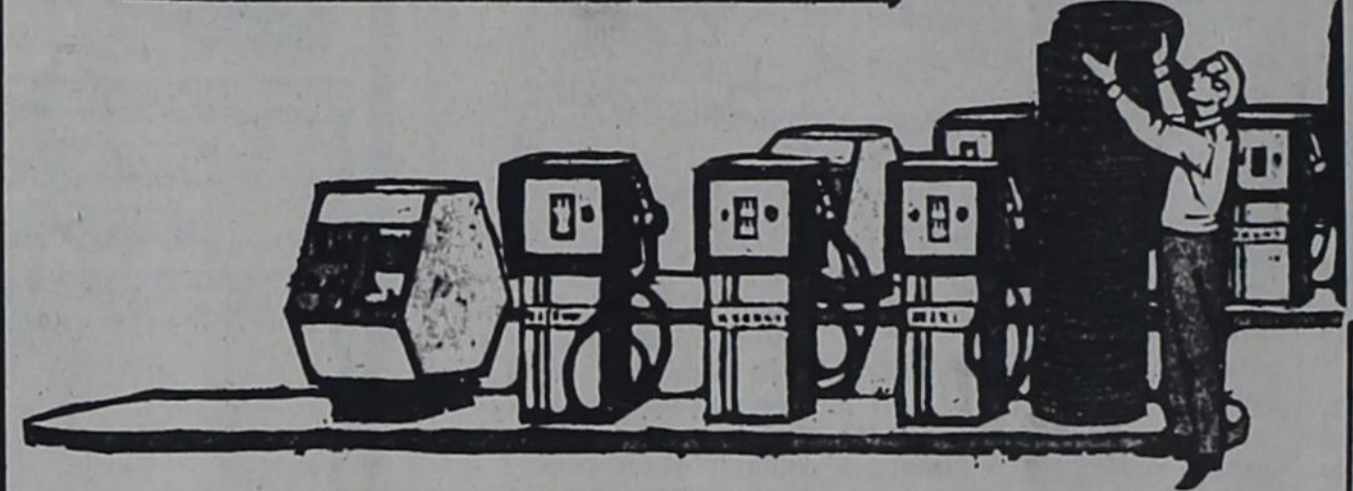

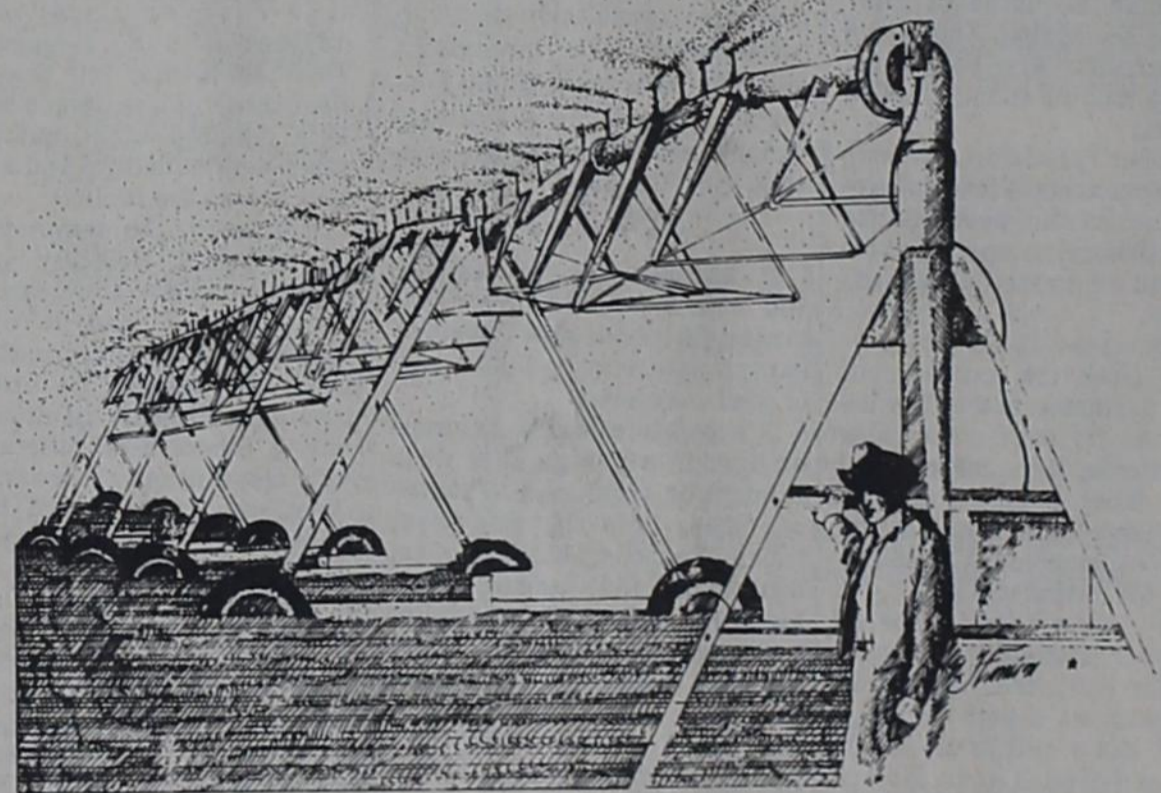
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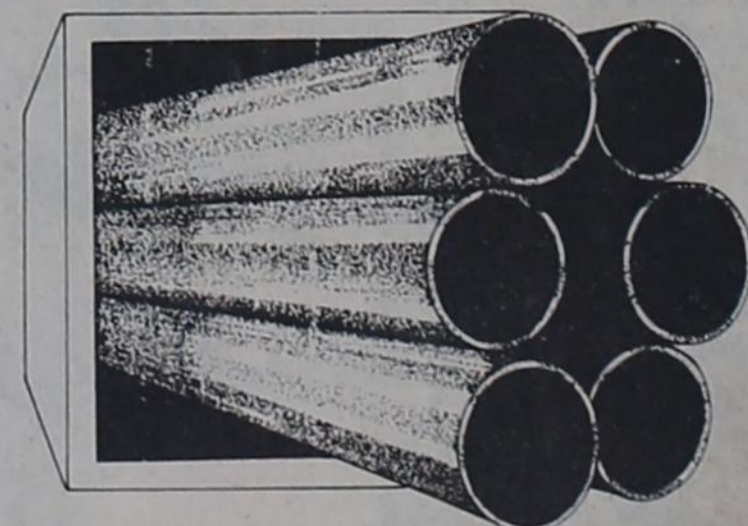
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
