## QUESTIONNAIRES BEING MAILED TO 439 NEXT 10 DAYS

The U. S. War department has shown some speed in getting out the Questionnaires for the newest class of registrants. At first the date for starting the mailing out of the Questionnaires was thought to be sometime in October. The second guess named September 24th. As a matter of fact, the local board Wednesday began the mailing of the Questionnaires to all registrants of the new class between the ages of 19 and 36 years. These figures include all men 19 years of age and those not yet 37. The Questionnaires must be filled out and returned within 10 days from the date of mailing, and every registrant who contemplates a change of address is warned to make arrangements with his postmaster, or the local board to have the Questionnaire forwarded to him without delay, as no excuses are accepted for failure to return the Questionnaire within the prescribed period.

The mailing out of the 439 Questionnaires will cover a period of ten days, 44 being mailed out each day, with the exception of the last day, when 433 will be mailed.

### HURRY UP CALL

FOR OLD CLOTHES  
FOR BELGIANS.

The destitute of Belgium and Northern France need your spare clothing.

Back of the German wall that has hemmed in Belgium and Northern France, 10,000,000 human beings look to us for clothing as well as food. We, who are well clothed, can hardly appreciate in what dire need these people are for lack of necessities. Stocks of clothing and raw material are long since exhausted. There are no imports other than those the Commission for Relief in Belgium has been permitted to make, and these never have been sufficient. The world is now short of both clothing and raw material, so the Commission can no longer purchase what is needed. But you can give it. Every household in the land has some spare clothing, worn or outgrown, of little use here, but desperately needed by the destitute there.

The very wonderful results of the clothing campaign of last March assisted in helping to meet the demands, but when we realize that there are 10,000,000 inhabitants in the occupied regions, most of whom look to the outside world for the protection against the rigors of winter, it is seen that we can not send too much. As long as the war lasts Belgium and Northern France must depend chiefly upon America for aid.

Every kind of garment, for all ages and both sexes, is urgently needed. In addition, piece goods, cotton flannel and other kinds of cloth from which to make garments for new born babies, ticking, sheeting and blankets, woolen goods of any kind, and shoes of every size and kind except fancy slippers are asked for. Scrap leather is needed for repairing foot-wear.

Since clothes will be subjected to the hardest kind of wear, only garments made of strong and durable materials should be sent. It is useless to offer to any afflicted population garments of flimsy material or gaudy coloring. Make the gifts practical.

Garments need not be in perfect condition. A hundred thousand destitute women in the occupied regions are eager to earn a small livelihood by repairing gift clothing and making new garments adapted to needs for which they are familiar.

Soft hats and caps for all ages and sweaters of any kind and size are needed.

Mrs. R. A. King is chairman of the Conservation work. If you need any more information phone her. The McCulloch County Red Cross will make a campaign to collect this clothing during the week of September 23 to 30th. Everybody is urged to collect what they have to give and place same on their front porches Friday morning, September 29th. Mrs. King will have committee call for same. Those who can bring their gifts, please leave at the Red Cross work room, which will be open every afternoon after three o'clock.

## THOMAS TO SHIP IN 3 RIGS—STRIKE OIL AT LEADAY

C. S. Thomas left Wednesday for California, where he will arrange for the shipping in of three more rigs, two of which will be placed in McCulloch county. Mr. Thomas states that for a year and one month before beginning operations in McCulloch county, he had made a careful study of the possibilities of McCulloch county being developed into an oil field, and the result of his investigations was the starting of the well on the Comfort ranch at Whiteland. Now, in spite of adverse criticism of McCulloch county by some oil geologists of North Central Texas and Oklahoma, his experience in drilling had only confirmed his earlier faith, and he expected to proceed with his developments until his confidence is borne out by the development of one of the greatest oil fields in history. Mr. Thomas is firmly of the opinion that the structure to be found here did not happen by chance, and that before another year McCulloch county will be the center of attraction in the new oil world.

Mr. Thomas further stated that the bend formation found here is without question the Mississippi bend, as it is identical in every respect with that formation.

The well at Whiteland is making slow progress just at present, drilling in very hard lime rock. The heavy tools are being used, however, and are enabling satisfactory progress to be made. Driller Jack B. Tait, in order to be prepared for any eventualities, has gone to Ranger after some Mether Hubbard bits, which may be substituted for those now in use as long as the drill remains in the hard lime.

Considerable excitement was occasioned here yesterday by the report that quite a showing of oil had been struck on the Russell ranch, five miles from Leaday, and near Stacy. The showing of oil was found at 1895 ft.

M. W. Eiser was here this week accompanied by J. S. Miller, a drilling contractor of Kansas, who made a thorough examination of the block in the East Sweden community on which Mr. Eiser and his associates will drill. They left Wednesday night for Brownwood to contract for fuel oil, and from there will go to Fort Worth to secure rig material. Mr. Eiser will proceed to Kansas to arrange the immediate shipment of his rig, and drilling is promised at an early date.

Another carload of piping and a string of tools arrived here Tuesday for the Prairie Oil & Gas Co., which means another step towards completing their preparations for drilling.

The Liberty Petroleum Co., (A. W. Cooper) is now down about 210 feet. A strong flow of water was struck at 150 feet, but drilling is proceeding without delay.

The Great Eastern Oil Co. had the misfortune to crack a stem while drilling in hard lime rock, and are delayed at present. They are at a depth of about 900 feet.

Bowen-Day are setting 500 feet of 10 inch casing to shut off the strong flow of salt water, and also because of a cave-in in the well. The casing had to be pulled on account of not shutting off the water a the first attempt, and reset. Bowen-Day are running double shift, and expect to make good progress with their drilling.

The Shultz Oil Co. is at a depth of 1230 feet with their well near Paint Rock, and have just set 912 ft. of 12 1/2 inch casing. They should strike oil sand at 1375 feet, as the sand was struck at 1430 ft. in their old well, which stands on a 55 ft. elevation from the new well. The log of the new well has tallied exactly with that of the old.

Messrs. Morgan, Meers and McCormack are completing arrangements for the development of their shallow tract two miles north of town, but have nothing to report on the extent of their progress to date.

## TICK ERADICATION WORK IS PROGRESSING

O. F. Bates, who is in charge of the tick eradication work in McCulloch county, reports excellent progress being made in the work. He states that if the present good work continues they will be enabled to release something like 150 herds, and 15,000 head of cattle. Mr. Bates is being assisted in the work by Marion A. Rice and J. H. Coker.

### A. M. Dunsworth Dead.

The death of A. M. Dunsworth occurred Monday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock following an illness the past four weeks. Typhoid fever was the cause of his demise. The body was shipped Tuesday night to Brownwood for interment, funeral services being held there Wednesday. Deceased was 36 years, 1 month and 8 days old at the time of death.

Mr. Dunsworth came here three years ago from Brownwood, being employed as sexton of the Brady cemetery during his residence here. He was a man of quiet, straight-forward disposition, and was highly thought of by all. He was a member of the Church of Christ, and also belonged to the Odd Fellows lodge.

Surviving are his widow and five small children, the oldest eight years of age. Also his father, who lives in Brown county.

## GOOD OIL SAND IS STRUCK AT 1,150 FEET IN WOOD & WOOLEY WELL AT COLEMAN

The Wood & Wooley well No. 1 on the Overall lease near Coleman struck a good oil sand Saturday, according to reports from Coleman. After drilling about five feet into the sand a cave-in covered up the bailer, which is still lost in the bottom of the hole. Reports say the sand showed a very high grade of oil. The sand was struck at a depth of about 1,150 feet.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

## BAKER AWARDED \$610 BY JURY'S VERDICT YES'DAY

District court convened here Monday morning at 10 o'clock, with Judge Goodwin on the bench. The Grand Jury was empaneled at 1:00 o'clock, with W. W. Henderson foreman.

The first case taken up was that of J. T. and L. M. Baker vs. G., C. & S. F. Ry. Co., damages. This case occupied the attention of the court until yesterday morning when it went to the jury, who returned a verdict for the plaintiffs, amounting to \$610. The Baker case has been on the docket since 1911, and Baker was previously given a verdict. The case was appealed to the court of civil appeals, and was reversed and remanded. Attorneys for the plaintiffs were F. M. Newman, T. C. Wilkerson and Adkins & Adkins; for the defendant, Sam McCollum and Lee, Lomax and Smith of Fort Worth.

The case of Cohen & Co. vs. H. P. Roddie & Co., suit for damages accrued from failure to deliver mohair was taken up by the court yesterday.

## A. W. TIPTON AND FAMILY LEAVE THIS WEEK FOR FARMERSVILLE TO LOCATE

To the surprise and regret of their many friends, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Tipton have announced their intended removal from the city, having decided to take up their residence in Farmers-

ville, Texas, where Mr. Tipton will have charge of a hardware store just purchased by O. D. Mann & Sons.

The deal for the store at Farmersville was closed this week by Jas. T. Mann, who left for that place Monday with that object in view. The stock purchased was that of the Schnelle Hardware Co., an old and well established concern, and Farmersville is located in one of the most prosperous sections in Texas, consequently a splendid business may be anticipated there.

Mr. and Mrs. Tipton have been located in Brady the past fifteen years, during which time they have taken a prominent place in religious and business circles. Mr. Tipton for the past four or five years has been in charge of the Mann Bros. tailor shop, and in his successful conduct of this business has merited the choice of O. D. Mann & Sons in the management of their new venture.

Mr. Tipton Tuesday night tendered his resignation as alderman to the Brady city council, in which capacity he was serving his third term. The council, however, took no immediate action on the resignation. Mr. Tipton's removal from the city will also cause a vacancy on the local exemption board, on which he has served the past four or five months.

Mr. and Mrs. Tipton will leave today for their new home, and the best wishes of all their friends go with them. They still retain their home in Brady, and Mr. Tipton says they are burning no bridges behind them. Their son, Henry, who attended State Dental college the past year, will accompany them to Dallas to re-enter school. He will enter the medical department of Baylor university, which is now a certified government medical school, and which will continue the work of the State dental college under federal supervision.

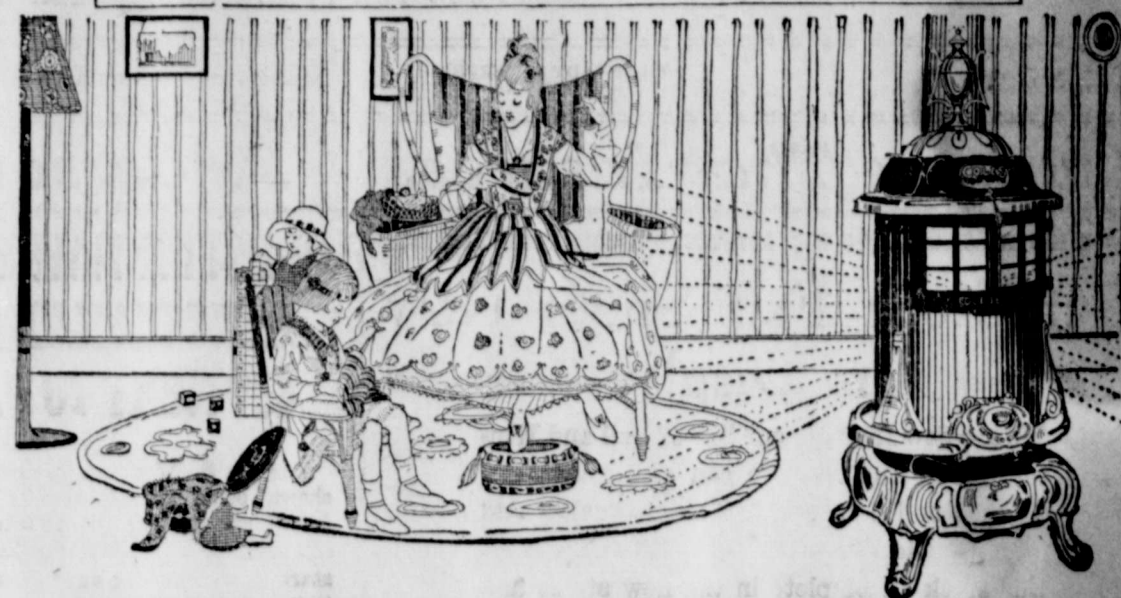
