GRAND JURY BILLS SEVEN-3 FELONY 4 MISDEMEANORS

The grand jury last week returned seven indictments—three for felonies and four for misdemeanors. Only one indictment, a felony charge, has so far been given out, that of Ellen Nunn, colored, charged with burglary. She is accused of stealing a sack of chops from the city, and concealing the same on her premises.

The grand jury also recommended that the commissioners court do something to relieve the drouth-stricken citizens of the county.

In district court, the following cases were disposed of:
A Cohen vs. H. P. Roddie & Co., suit for damages; verdict for defendant. New trial granted.

J. Q. Triplett vs. G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co., et al, damages; judgment for the plaintiff against the Hartford Fire Insurance Co. This was a case growing out of the burning of 30 bales of cotton at Pasche a couple years ago, the fire being presumed to have originated from an engine spark. The award totaled \$1,716.17.

Dora Enix vs. E. W. Enix, divorce; granted.

Ava Myers vs. Adolph Myers, divorce; granted.

District court was adjourned Friday for the balance of the term following receipt of a wire from Major John C. Townes, Jr., requesting such action in order to allow all lawyers to assist the registrants in making out their Questionnaires.

The next term of the court will be held in February.

PRAIRIE RIG EN-ROUTE--EISER TO SHIP OUT AT ONCE

A carload of machinery for the Prairie Oil & Gas Co. is now enroute to Brady, having been shipped out of Muskogee, Okla., on the 17th inst. This shipment, without question, will complete the equipping of the first rig, and will enable the starting of operations on the Zelle tract in the course of the next week or two.

A. W. Cooper, of the Liberty Petroleum Co., has a fishing job on hand in his well, having broken off a bit last Friday. All efforts to hang the lost tool have so far been unsuccessful.

Bowen-Day have successfully set 500 feet of casing, and have cut off two stratas of water. They are drilling steadily on night and day shift, and are in shale at present.

M. W. Eiser has wired from Kansas that he is negotiating the purchase of a rig for his contract in the West Sweden community, and will ship out immediately.

G. A. Rudolph is down about 200 feet with his shallow well at Lohn and is expecting to strike oil sands at any time now.

The Shultz well near Paint Rock in Concho county is down 1355 ft., which compares with the log of the old well at 1410 ft. D. F. Savage writes that they expected to strike the cap rock any day now and drill into the oil sands.

Visitors at the Russell well state a good showing of oil was struck at 1805 feet, but it was decided to continue drilling, and last Monday a flow of gas was struck, estimated at 1½ million cubic feet.

The Thomas well at Whiteland is making good progress now, working both day and night shifts. So thoroughly are Drillers Becker and Tait convinced that oil will be struck in the well that they have acquired leases on a number of Whiteland town lots. Brady parties are also reported to have caught the fever and have acquired leases on several lots in that townsite.

Nothing of interest concerning the other wells in McCulloch county has been learned this week.

CAPT. CLEVELAND SAMMONS HAS CHARGE OF "BAD MAN" AT CAMP IN FORT WORTH

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram had the following item of interest concerning Captain Cleveland Sammons, Brady boy, now commanding the detention camp at Fort Worth. The item was printed in last Wednesday's issue:

"Capt. Cleveland Sammons, commanding the detention camp, has received a 'bad man' as a recruit with orders to make a good soldier out of him. The 'bad man' was arrested as a draft deserter in Dallas, where he faced charges of murder, robbery and other crimes, and in his signed statement says he wouldn't have been caught except that he was asleep."

"Captain Sammons intends to hold a review Wednesday of all recruits he has on hand. There are about 1,000 still unassigned. After the negro troops have been here two weeks, Sammons intends to review them also."

George D. Markley Dead.

Mrs. Frank Wilhelm has the sympathy of all her friends in the loss of her father, George D. Markley, who died last Friday evening at 7:00 o'clock at McKinney, where he had been the past several weeks for treatment. Death was caused by cancer.

Mr. Markley was quite well known to Brady citizens having made his home here with his daughter, and also spending part of the time with relatives at Cherokee.

The body was shipped to Cherokee, where funeral services were held Sunday.

WAR RELIC TRAIN BRADY MON., OCT. 7TH AT 7:45 P. M.

Brady will be visited on Monday, October 7th, by the famous war relic train, which will begin touring the western part of the state on September 28th, simultaneously with the opening of the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign. The train will consist of one automobile car, two flat cars and one sleeper car. Several speakers will be on the train, and a squad of men who understand all the details of the relics exhibited and who will explain them.

Among the relics on exhibit will be a French gun—the famous 75s—a machine gun and German trench mortars. Also the largest shells used in modern warfare—14-inch shells that weigh 1,520 pounds, and that stand more than four feet high. They are convertible shells and may be used for either armor-piercing purposes or to scatter shrapnel. Then there will be depth bombs used by submarine chasers to destroy the submarines after they have submerged.

The train will come in over the Santa Fe from San Saba, and will go out over the Frisco towards Brownwood on the following schedule:

REGISTRANTS IN McCULLOCH COUNTY NOW TOTAL 923. ADD TWO SINCE LAST REPORT

The total number of registrants in McCulloch county has been swelled to 923, two more names having been added since last week's report. The additional registrants are twin brothers, as follows:

923. Wallace August Deering, Lohn, 924. Walter William Deering, Lohn.

The fact that the total number of registrants is apparently 924, is for the reason, as explained last week, that one boy registered twice. However the registration numbers will remain the same as given out, and the adjutant general will decide which of the two numbers shall be applied to the registrant who registered twice.

G. A. Wright Dead.

The death of G. A. Wright, well-known and highly esteemed citizen of McCulloch county, occurred Monday morning at Fort Worth, following an illness of only about thirty minutes. Death is attributed to heart failure. The body was shipped to Brady, and funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, interment being made in Marion cemetery.

Mr. Wright, at the time of death, was 69 years old. He had lived in McCulloch county, in the Waldrip community since 1891, having engaged in farming the greater part of his life. For the past eight years he has been retired. He was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian church and was a noble, upright citizen whose loss is sincerely mourned.

Mr. Wright had been living in Fort Worth since June 6th, making his home with his son. His widow, who survives, is also in Fort Worth, but was too ill to come here for the funeral. Deceased is also survived by five sons, Richard of Tucson, Ariz., Oscar of Garden City, B. S. and Norris of Fort Worth, and George, now in France; and one daughter, Mrs. E. B. Bray of Waldrip. His brother, Rev. J. B. Wright of Waldrip also survives.

A. W. WOOD HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE MONDAY

Fire, originating from an oil stove completely destroyed the home of A. W. Woods in the east part of town at about 9:30 o'clock Monday morning. Mrs. Wood, son and daughter, were at home at the time, but the fire spread with the rapidity of lightning, the stove having evidently exploded scattering burning oil everywhere. As a result but a few articles of wearing apparel, a couple of mattresses and one or two pieces of furniture were saved from the flames.

The fire boys responded to the alarm, but the residence was so far

consumed that only the chemical hose was laid, being used to save the windmill tower and adjoining fences and outbuildings.

The house was a substantial frame dwelling with seven rooms, three porches and a hall, and its loss is a heavy blow to Mr. Wood. Insurance in the sum of \$1,000 was carried on the house and \$400 was carried on the contents.

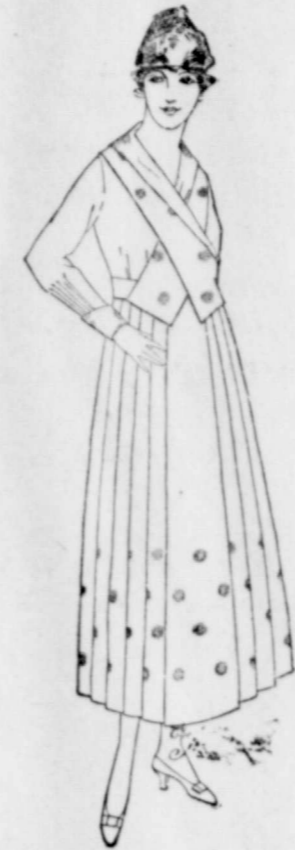

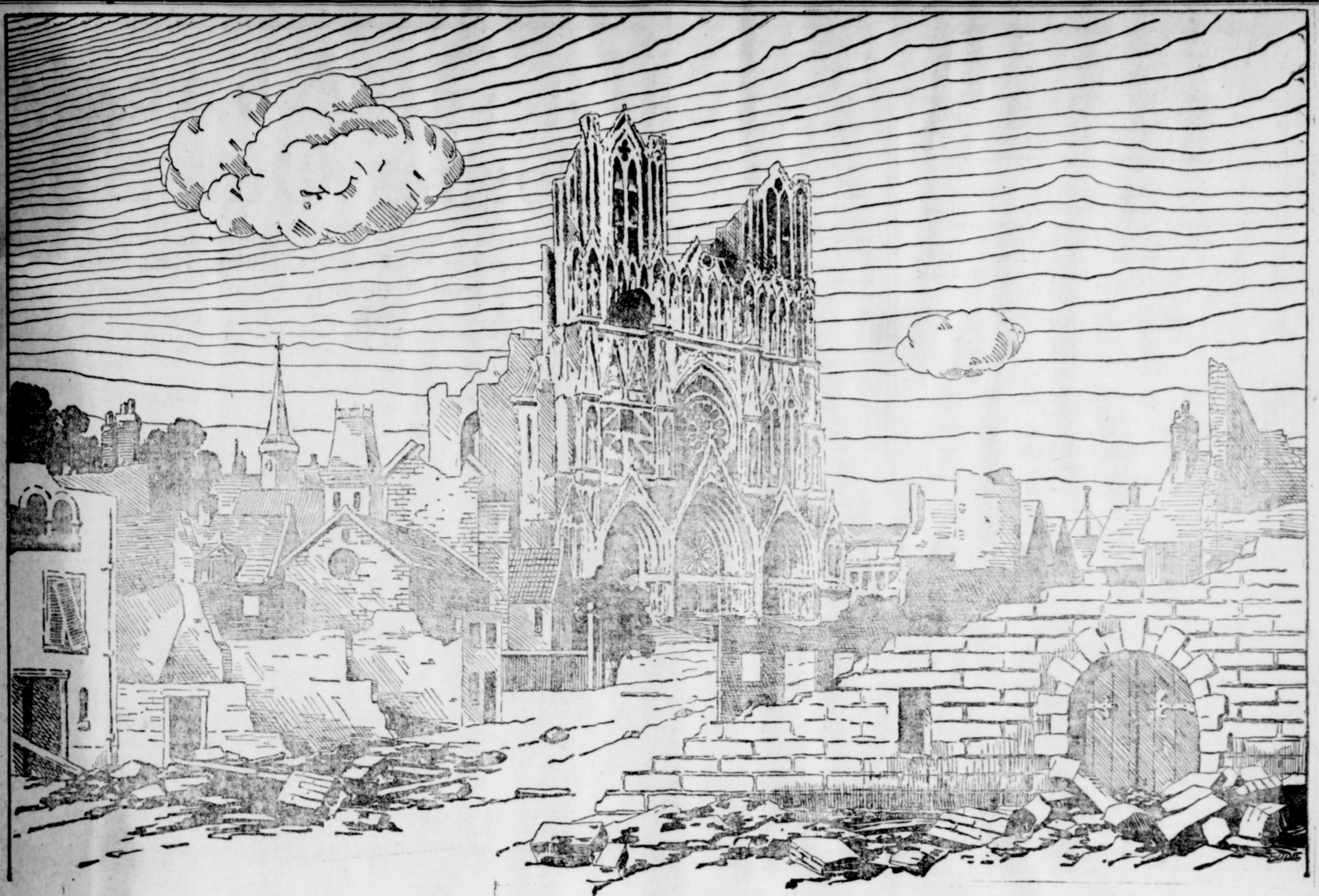

STILL THEY COME.

The Standard last week received a new and revised price list from the wholesale house supplying us with printing paper, but until this week did not have time to digest the contents, and the revisions, which, these days, are of an unvarying upward trend.

By comparison with the list issued about eight weeks ago, the new prices show the following: News paper has scored an advance of 20%; high class bond papers an advance of 10% to 12 1/2%; medium priced bonds, 10%; rag stock, 8 1/3% to 10%; envelopes, 5%; cardboards, 10%, and inks of all kinds, 10%.

Were these the first advances on paper and inks, the increase might not be specially noteworthy, but with increase on top of increase for something like a dozen times in the past 12 or 18 months, there is no alternative for the printer who expects to stay in business, but to raise his prices and increase his subscription rates.

THE HOMESTEAD LAW.

The homestead law should be held inviolable and the money-mud-trenchers and political shysters should be given to understand they will not be permitted to rob women and children of the benefits of this beneficent statute. Like all good laws the homestead law is sometimes abused by dishonest people, but this is also true of other protective laws. Religion is many times used as a cloak to cover acts of some of the greatest rascals the world has produced, but no sane person would do away with it because it is thus abused—better do away with the rascals who take advantage of its usefulness. The homestead law is the families best protection and also shields the honest creditor who understands its provisions. Those who have been sufficiently industrious and economical to own a home will be honest enough not to incur debts that they cannot pay.—Farm and Ranch.

The San Angelo Standard announces that on October 16, 1918, it will advance the subscription price of the weekly edition from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per year. The Standard in announcing the increase says: "The price of paper, ink, labor and all material needed to publish The Standard has increased to such an extent that to continue publication under the present subscription rates would be impossible. Again, the Government War Tax, increased postal rates, and the conservation orders of the War Industries Board, have caused an additional expense that must be met."

the Aransas section, where they have been the past several months picking cotton. Mr. Murphy reports a remarkable cotton crop there, and thinks the average yield will be about three fourths of a bale to the acre. The first rain had on this cotton was last April, and while the stalks did not grow very tall, yet the plants are heavily fruited. \$1.25 per 100 lbs. was the price prevailing for picking. On the return trip, Mr. Murphy says, they encountered all sorts of rain and mud beyond Fredericksburg, and he says the farmers in that section have some fine fields of fall grain, having planted immediately after the rain had there some weeks ago. The rain he says extended right up to the other side of the river.

John Irvine King and Stewart Harkrider, who have been in special training at Camp Mabry the past few weeks, were home for a short visit here the first of the week. The state legislature appropriated \$20,000 for a Students' Army Training corps at Camp Mabry, and there were about 300 in training there. The officers in command were some who had seen service on the Mexican border, and King stated they were sure "hard-boiled." The boys left Wednesday for the State University, where they will be instructors. They will live in barracks, will draw regular soldier's pay, \$30 per month, and will be provided board and uniform. Something like 1,000 students are expected to enroll in State University, and their instructors will be chosen from the number who received their training with King and Harkrider at Camp Mabry.

Judge John E. Brown is enjoying a visit from his brother, Ensign Perry T. Brown, who is enjoying a 30-day furlough, the first in five years of service in Uncle Sam's navy. Ensign Brown completed his four-year enlistment in the naval service on Jan. 4th, 1916, and thereupon enrolled in the college at Commerce to finish his education. When the war broke out, however, he could not resist the temptation, and accordingly re-enlisted, and, at present, is on the naval reserve. During his first enlistment he

was stationed in the Pacific ocean, and visited the Hawaiian Islands, Honolulu, and many other points of interest. At the time of the Vera Cruz incident in Mexico, he was stationed on the Western coast of Old Mexico, where an outbreak against the United States was momentarily expected. He re-enlisted at San Francisco, and after being stationed for a while in the Pacific, his ship was sent through the Panama canal to Haiti, where he helped quell the incipient trouble brewing there. Before again taking up his duties at sea, he will go to Annapolis, Md., for sixteen weeks training at the naval college there.
