MASON NATIONAL BANK TO ERECT NEW AND MODERN FIRE-PROOF BANK BLDG.

The Mason National Bank directors closed a deal with Wm. Hofmann last Saturday in which they purchased the property now occupied by the following firms: J. S. King, Herbert Hofmann, Brown Bros. and W. A. Zesch. The property has a 60 foot front and is 110 deep. The price paid was \$200 per foot, representing a total of \$12,000.

Possession is to be given January 1st, 1919, at which time the newly acquired property owners will start the erection of a bank building. Mr. White, president of the bank, informs us that the directors intend to build a modern, fire-proof, one story, stone building, occupying a 30-foot front on the corner lot and extending back 70 or 80 feet. Mr. White stated that while definite plans had not been made he felt safe in saying that the new building would be a credit to entire West Texas.—Mason News.

SCHULTZ OIL WELL AT 2430 FEET—LEONARD PETROLEUM CO. AT 1200 FEET

The well of the Schultz Oil Company on the W. O. Schultz ranch, seven miles southeast of Paint Rock in Concho county, is now 2,430 feet deep, and work is progressing steadily with a standard rig, according to W. O. Schultz and T. A. Schultz of Paint Rock. In the first well sunk on the Schultz ranch several years ago, oil was struck, but tools were lost at the 1,450-foot level and the hole was abandoned.

Fifteen miles south of the Schultz well, near Eden and also in Concho county, the Leonard Petroleum Co., of Denver, has drilled to a depth of 1,200 feet. This well is on Sam Waring's ranch. The Russell well of the Gulf Producing Co., fifteen miles southeast of Ballinger and ten miles northeast of the Schultz well, is now 3,200 feet deep. Gushing oil was struck at 2,300 feet, and since then a strong flow has developed.—San Angelo Standard.

SIMON CATHEY WOUNDED SEVERELY—HAS GUN SHOT WOUND IN THE THIGH.

The following account, regarding Simon Cathey, a former Brady boy whose parents moved the early part of the year to Santa Anna community, is reprinted from the Colman Democrat-Voice:

John S. Cathey of Santa Anna, Route 3, has received the following message from the War Department in Washington. Cathey registered at Brady, and was inducted into service by the local board:

"Adjutant General Office
November 26th, 1918.

"With reference to prior correspondence concerning Pvt. Simon C. Cathey, Company K, 106th Infantry, who was wounded in action, I beg to advise you that it is reported under date of September 30, 1918, that he was under treatment in General Hospital No. 12, A. E. I often think of the last time I was at your house at Trickham; I sure had a fine time and I'm trusting in the Lord to bring me back safe, and I believe He is with me, and that I will again be with the dear folks at home.

"I haven't got a shot at a German since I landed in France, but I am close enough to hear the rest of the boys from the good old U. S. A. doing it.

"It has been some time since I have heard from mama, but think I will get a letter soon—hope so anyway. I can always tell her dear old handwriting just as soon as I see the envelope. When did you hear from 'High'?" I think he has forgotten he ever had a bud by the name of Joe. Oh, but my! When I get back to old Pear Valley, he and I will have what you call a time.

"Well, I will go eat dinner and finish when I get back.

"Hello, there I wish you had been with me; I sure did enjoy my dinner. I had beef steak with potatoes and light bread, but we have that three times a day. I get tired of having it every day, every day. You have seen the picture of the newly married couple, where it says, 'I wish I had some bread like mama used to bake'? That is the way I am.

"I have seen Clyde Peel several times since I landed. I am always glad to see the old boy; it makes me think of being at home.

"What are you all going to do for Christmas? Oh! don't I wish I was where I was last New Years—but that will never be.

"I will close for this time. Write me a long letter soon."

GENERAL LEONARD WOOD SAYS MILITARY TRAINING TO MAKE ALL BETTER CITIZENS

Thousands of men in our Army and Navy encampments, who eagerly desired to take an active part in the war for freedom, have been disappointed by the abrupt termination of that war. It would not be unnatural if these men wondered if their sacrifice in submitting to the routine of camp life had not been in vain. We learn that General Leonard Wood has written the following letter to every man in his command who is retiring from the Army in the process of demobilization. General Wood, we think, has expressed the feeling of the entire country towards its soldiers and sailors, who have not been called overseas:

"1. In the performance of military duty to one's country in time of war it is not for the citizen called to the colors to select the kind of service to be done by him. One who has willingly and loyally responded to the call to arms and who has put his best efforts, mental and physical, into the training, and performed all military duties required of him to the best of his ability, standing ready always to make the supreme sacrifice of life itself, if need be, has done all that a good citizen and soldier could do to insure the successful prosecution of the war.

"2. Although I appreciate how keenly you feel the disappointment of your failure to secure duty overseas in the actual battle area, I know you rejoice together with all Americans in the prospect of a righteous and just peace imposed upon the enemy and the termination of the terrible conflict which has involved the whole civilized world. You have done your best. You have cheerfully and loyally discharged the clear duty of every citizen in time of war, and your work has been a part of the great National effort which has aided in securing a victorious peace.

"3. You are discharged from the Army because your services are no longer required in the present emergency. You will return to your place in civil life all the better for the training you have had, and I feel sure you will take with you a better and higher appreciation of the obligations of citizenship, including the obligation of every man to be trained, prepared, and ready to render service to the Nation in war as well as in peace."

BILLYSUNDAY TELLS EDITORS THE PAPERS ARE GREATEST MORAL FORCE IN COMMUNITY

Billy Sunday, addressing Texas and Oklahoma newspaper editors who attended The Star-Telegram's luncheon at the Metropolitan hotel Saturday, told them their papers were the greatest moral force in the community. In part, he said:

"The greatest moral force in any community is the newspaper. When you go out to organize a campaign against vice, you go to the newspaper and ask for help. If it stands for right, you have the big army of that community on your side to begin with. Those who back up and support those vices which destroy manhood and womanhood, dread the newspaper and will bow to it, when they would fight to the last ditch with an individual. Close up your newspapers tomorrow and you would see vice and all its agents holding a royal celebration. Murders, thieves, porch climbers, robbers, bandits, liquor dealers, drunkards and degenerates would all join hands and celebrate the death of the one great public agent for good, next only to the pulpit. And, many newspapers have much higher standards than some pulpits.

"I tell you folks there is no end to the power of the newspaper with the right kind of men directing its work. You might as well try to dam up Niagara Falls with tooth picks as to try to kill a newspaper with a high moral code to live up to as its daily standard. On the other hand, if a newspaper does not stand for right, the community will soon let it die, because its force is too great on the wrong side of the things humanity wants to do, even though it sometimes appears to be slow in turning its face and efforts towards Jesus. Again, I say, kill out all our newspapers tomorrow, and vice would increase 100 per cent before twenty-four hours. Every good man and woman would get down on their knees and pray God to have them brought back, and I believe God would hear that prayer.

Greater Than Powder.

"I believe the man who invented the printing press did humanity a greater service than the man who invented gunpowder, the submarine, the dreadnaught and numerous other things so often praised. By his invention it is possible for all of us to get together as one great family in our communities and help understand and right the forces that threaten to destroy us or to back up and support the forces that promise to make life worth living. And I believe there are few men who render a greater service to humanity than the editor of a newspaper who has religion in his heart and lives up to a high code of moral law and sees that his paper breathes that same spirit."

"Ma" Sunday said she had a son-in-law who is a country newspaper editor and that she believes the small town newspaper man is of inestimable value to his community. Both she and Billy closed with a smile and

The work of the Red Cross in the great World War is not yet completed, and every patriotic citizen is urged to continue the support of this organization as a patriotic duty. This support now is merely the enrolling as a member of the Red Cross, for which the dues are only \$1.00 per year. The Christmas roll call campaign will afford the citizens the only opportunity for aiding in the work of the Red Cross as no future campaigns for war funds are now anticipated.

The following copy of a night letter received from George W. Simmons, manager, at Washington, D. C., sets forth the need of a full response to the Christmas roll call:

"Washington, D. C., Dec. 3, 1918.
"To All Chapters and Branches,
"Southwestern Division,
"American Red Cross,
"St. Louis, Missouri.

"Chairman Davidson announces that until allied governments have formulated definite plans, Red Cross cannot make definite future plans, but it seems assured that present Division and Chapter organizations will be maintained available for future calls as needs may develop.

"Immediate need of refugee garments and knitting is imperative and present quotas should be pushed. Furthermore, it is clear that with the expected returns from the Christmas Roll Call, funds sufficient for probable requirements will remain in Chapter and National treasuries; therefore as far as can be seen there will be no War Fund campaign for future funds. Hence Chapters should impress all citizens that Christmas Roll Call offers the one great opportunity to respond to the Red Cross, as they will not be asked for large amount of money next spring. I expect to continue my Red Cross work as in the past and call upon all Chapter officials to do the same as a patriotic duty not yet completed.

CITY DOES EFFECTIVE STREET IMPROVING AT EXTREMELY MODERATE COST PER BLOCK

The city's street force has been doing some effective improvement of Brady's thoroughfares, and the cost per block has run to a very moderate figure. Alderman N. T. Cook estimates that the block on Commerce street east from the south side of the public square, cost the city just \$296.50, the cost being divided between dirt for filling, which amounted to \$126.50, and rock for surfacing,

which ran to \$170.00. The improvement of the two blocks on the public square cost the city \$400.00, the cost being less per block because but little fill was required.

Much credit is due Supt. Cook for the time and attention he devotes to this work, as well as the effective and economical methods evolved.

The past couple weeks the street force dragged several streets, and also filled in Main street east from the north side of the square, which had been badly washed out by the flood waters of two months ago.

2 NAMES ADDED TO HONOR ROLL; LIST TO BE PUBLISHED

Two more names have been added to The Standard's War Honor Roll. It is the purpose of The Standard to publish a complete list of names of all McCulloch county boys who have made the supreme sacrifice in the great war, or who have been wounded on the field of honor. To this end we will appreciate the assistance and co-operation of the readers. If there are any whose names have not been included in the list so far published, we will appreciate having such information given us. These names will be given to the State Council of Defense who will issue them in book form, showing just what each town and county has contributed in blood to the winning of the war.

To the list of nine McCulloch county boys who have made the supreme sacrifice, as published in The Standard a couple weeks ago, there are now to be added two more names.

Willie Walker, grandson of G. U. Walker of Calf Creek, was killed in France by an accident the nature of which has so far not been ascertained.

Charles James Williams died September 23, 1918, at base hospital No. 1, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, following two operations.

Jim Walker enlisted May 2, 1918, as a mechanic in repair shop No. 304, Fort Sam Houston, entering the shops May 27, 1918. He passed all tests in the shops, being made master mechanic, and would have gone to France, as his unit, 390, sailed overseas on July 26th. However, he failed to pass the physical examination, and was sent to the hospital on the 21st of July. He was operated on the 26th and again on the 27th of August, living until September 23rd.

He was well known in Brady, having worked at the Brady Auto Co., and also at the Mann-Ricks Auto Co. He was also well known in San Saba, having married Miss Ruby Jones of that city. His home was near Fredonia, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Williams reside.

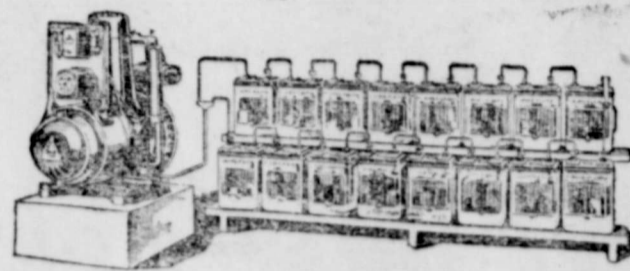

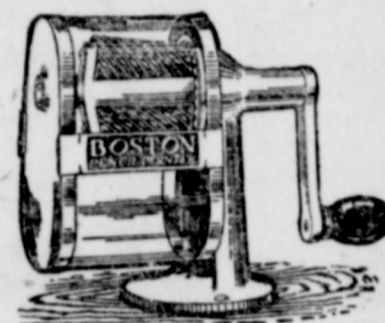
