50 MORE SHALLOW WELLS--TEXAS O. & R. SPUDS IN DEEP TEST

EXTENSIVE OIL OPERATIONS TO BRING REFINERY

"Wherever you go, Brady and McCulloch county are the magic words that invite instant attention from everyone interested in the oil game," said F. J. Brooks, prominent oil man of Los Angeles, Calif., and who is now making headquarters in Waco, Texas. "I have just returned from a business trip to Louisiana, and when I spoke of going to Brady, several gentlemen immediately made inquiries as to the McCulloch county field and the development and amount of oil being produced. The answers I gave, were most conservative, and so interested these parties that they stated they would come to McCulloch county and go over the field next week with the intention of becoming interested in operations here."

Mr. Brooks has been making visits to McCulloch county for several months, and his investigations have convinced him that McCulloch offers the greatest opportunities of any field. He is head of the Brooks Production Co., which has just recently purchased 155 acres from A. W. Cooper in Survey No. 102, and the company proposes to drill 50 wells. This operation, of course, depends upon their securing production from the first wells put down, and which Mr. Brooks is confident will be had. Mr. Brooks expects to have three wells drilling within a short time, and the rigs are to be shipped in as soon as possible. The Alvarado Oil Co. is drilling an offset to these wells on

Survey 1166. His company is organized with strong financial backing and there is no question but what it will carry out its plans of extensive development of its tract, should the production justify.

Mr. Brooks declares the Dohn shallow field to be McCulloch county's trump card in the oil game, and says there is not the slightest doubt but what refineries, pipe lines and other industries will come to Brady and McCulloch county as soon as the shallow field is sufficiently developed.

Messrs. Pope and Randsen of Floydada, Texas, were in Brady this week in the interest of the Pope-Randsen Oil Company, which has contracted to drill a series of shallow wells on Survey 86, two of the wells being already contracted for. A rig is now enroute from Brownwood, and drilling operations should be begun by the early part of next week.

D. E. Weaver, field superintendent for the Record Oil & Refining Co., reports operations resumed Thursday on the two shallow wells drilling for his company on Survey No. 99.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s shallow well is drilling at 230 ft.

Drilling is progressing satisfactorily on the Smith Jergins shallow well.

The Tucker Oil Co.'s well No. 5, which was placed on a 3 h. p. engine two weeks ago, is maintaining a 35-barrel production.

Cobb & Lowry, who are drilling on Survey No. 1205 are at a 250 ft. depth.

SHULTZ OIL COMPANY HAS SIGNED CONTRACT FOR WELL NO. 3; DRILLING BEGINS SOON

The Shultz Oil Co. have signed up for another deep test well to be put down about 3 1-2 miles from the location of the present Shultz well. The contract is with a strong company and drilling is expected to start in the near future.

The Shultz Oil Co. have a paid up capital of \$95,000 and will begin operations on well No. 3 in the immediate future.

Drilling in the Shultz well No. 2 is expected to be resumed within a short time, as the drillers now have hold of the tools and anticipate very little more trouble now in fishing them out.

A deep test contract has been let for a well in Tom Green county just a few miles northwest of the Concho county line.—Eden Echo.

BRADY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE RE-ORGANIZED ON PERMANENT BASIS

PLANS LAID FOR BIGGEST YEAR'S DEVELOPMENT IN THE HISTORY OF COUNTY—EVERYONE ENTHUSIASTIC OVER RESULTS.—MEMBERSHIP ASSURED.

The Brady Chamber of Commerce has been reorganized upon a permanent basis, with W. D. Crothers, president; Sam McCollum, vice-president; Bailey Jones, treasurer, and plans have been laid to assure through it the biggest year's development in the history of the county. The scope of work is to include the development, advancement and upbuilding of all and every part of the county, and its activities will be directed along the line of "One for all, and all for one." In other words, the organization will boost for every citizen and every section of the county, and every citizen and every section should, in turn, boost for it. The success attained by the Brady Chamber of Commerce during its temporary organization the past three months is best indicated by the cheerful response being made to solicitation for membership.

The plans for the re-organization and consolidation of the Brady Chamber of Commerce and the Brady Y. M. B. L., together with the modus operandi of the rejuvenated organization, were worked out by the committee appointed last week to consider this and other matters. The personnel of the committee was Messrs. Sam McCollum, chairman, C. H. Vincent, G. V. Gansel, Howard Broad, J. E. Bell and W. D. Crothers; with the following honorary members: Messrs. Ed Overholser, L. F. Ehlers and Thad O. Day. This committee worked hard and diligently for several days perfecting the details of the re-organization, and so well and carefully thought out were their plans that they were enthusiastically adopted at a mass meeting of the citizens held Wednesday morning at the court house.

Plan of Organization. In brief, the recommendations of the committee, as presented to and ratified by the citizens at the mass meeting, were as follows:

That the Brady Chamber of Commerce and the Brady Y. M. B. L. be merged into one permanent organization under the name of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, with W. D. Crothers as president of the new body.

That the membership fee of the Brady Chamber of Commerce be placed at \$12 per year, payable six months in advance.

That in addition to the membership fee, a budget for the year's work be prepared, and an assessment be placed against every citizen and land holder in the county in proportion to his interests and financial ability.

That the organization devote its energies to the advancement of every interest of McCulloch county and her citizens, and in particular at the present time to the development of McCulloch county's oil interests.

That the directors be divided into six groups or committees as follows: Advertising Committee, Membership and Subscription Committee, Agricultural Committee, Transportation Committee, Entertainment Committee, Supervisors of Finance Committee, Committee Membership.

named committees is to be a member of the Executive committee, and the president and vice-president of the organization are ex-officio members of the Executive committee.

B. D. Black was named and consented to act as temporary secretary of the organization.

The selection of a permanent secretary was left in the hands of the Executive committee, as was also the compilation of the constitution and by-laws for the organization. The next meeting of the body will be held Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock at the courthouse, at which time the Executive committee will present their recommendations for a permanent secretary and also the proposed constitution and by-laws for ratification. The committee on Membership will also report at this meeting. Every citizen of McCulloch county is invited and expected to be present at this meeting.

Every Citizen A Member. Before adjourning, the citizens at the mass meeting Wednesday were requested to place their names on the membership list, accompanied by payment of the initial installment of the annual membership fee. The response was instantaneous and enthusiastic, practically every man in the house being enrolled as a member.

Resume of Work Accomplished. That the organization last December of the temporary Brady Chamber of Commerce was most fortunate and opportune, no one for a moment can doubt, and those who were skeptical as to results three months ago are now numbered as the most enthusiastic of the advocates of the permanent organization. The membership and finance committee of the temporary organization, in the face of adverse financial conditions and considerable pessimism, raised over \$2500 for an advertising campaign. The results already obtained have been little short of marvelous. From one end of the United States to the other, Brady and McCulloch county are magic words that at once invite the interest of every oil man and investor, and the inflow of foreign capital for leases and royalties, for drilling contracts and operations has already assumed such proportions and such extent that the efforts of the past two years' drought have almost been entirely erased in this county.

This has been but the beginning, for heretofore the visitors have been largely speculators. From now on there will come greater opportunities than were ever before presented to McCulloch county and her citizens. Refineries, pipe lines, factories and industries that will mean a pay roll are ready at the threshold. It will take a live organization; an able and willing body of citizens, backed by the good will and financial and moral support of every citizen in the county, to put these big projects over to land these propositions—to bring home the bacon.

Wilensky. Lee McShan, who for the past ten years or more has had his home on the north side, has purchased and occupied the Dr. G. P. Callan residence, renting his former abode to Messrs. Carl Griggs and Glenn Westaw, drillers at the Texas Oil & Refining Co. well. Otis Turney has forsaken his former home near the waterworks plant and has occupied the Harvey Walker residence, recently purchased by him from C. A. Yoas.

TEXAS O. & R. CO. WELL SPUDDED IN MONDAY NIGHT

J. W. Waymire, contractor for Texas Oil & Refining Co.'s (Thad O. Day) deep test, spudded in on the new well Monday night at 10:00 o'clock, and drilling has been steadily in progress all this week. The well is being drilled with a standard rig and will go to a contract depth of 2500 ft. The old rig of the Thad O. Day well, is being dismantled and will be shipped to Paris, Texas, for drilling on the company's acreage at that place.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. is casing at 1200 ft., but is expected to be drilling again in a day or two.

The Douglas Oil Co. had a fishing job Wednesday, but is again drilling. The Cooper-Shields deep test on Survey 1096 is drilling in lime at 400 feet.

C. S. Thomas well at Salt Gap is drilling at 500 feet, and the C. S. Thomas Whiteland well at 1200 feet. The Geo. F. King well on Survey 401 is at 1040 feet, and is waiting on casing.

The J. E. Morgan well 2 miles north of town is drilling at 600 feet.

BAILEY WELL FLOWING STEADILY—A TWO-INCH PIPE ENCOURAGING FLOW

A two-inch pipe has been fitted in the Bailey well, Giliam tract, and the flow into the storage tank is now steady. The well was given two shots, the first of 40 quarts and the second of 100 quarts, and after cleaning out thoroughly the drillers have equipped the hole with the small pipe so that the gas pressure in the well could force the oil into the tank.

No figures are available as to the production of the well, but it is probably around 100 barrels, or would be if pumped. Whether it is flowing more than 50 barrels is not known, but the talent appears to be pretty well agreed that it would make a 100-barrel pumper.—Brownwood Bulletin.



# TRUST COMPANY ORGANIZING FOR GEO. F. KING WELL

The contract for the Geo. F. King well No. 2, to be drilled on Survey No. 333, has been let to Price & Beagle, and the well will be spudded in on or before May 24th, 1919. This well will be drilled by the Geo. F. King Trust, a \$30,000 organization operating under a declaration of trust, with Geo. F. King trustee until the first well is drilled. Mr. King offers what is probably the most original and unique, as well as fair and liberal a proposition yet put before the public in the oil game.

Mr. King has a tract of 3,000 acres of land, including the D. Harkrider, S. W. Espy and John Wall ranches. He has divided this tract into 300 units, which he is offering for sale at \$100 per unit. 

A will, written for him ten years ago by Judge Will McShan, bequeaths all his real and personal property to his sister, Marie Moreno Perez, and her husband, who live in the city of Leon, Mexico. Moreno owned the two-story building and property which he occupied as a hotel and restaurant and also a valuable bit of property just at the rear of the Queen hotel. He also owned a number of fine residences and pieces of business property in Leon, Mexico. During his sojourn in Brady, he had visited back in Mexico but one time.

Funeral services were held late yesterday afternoon, and interment was made in Brady Cemetery.

**LOST CREEK SAYINGS.**

How to Reduce Cotton Acreage—Substitute Other Crops.  
Voca, Texas, March 17.

Editor Brady Standard:  
Every farmer in this part of the country seems to be putting forth every effort to make a good crop this year and I hope our efforts will not be in vain.

The cotton reduction move is surely the salvation of cotton prices for this year's crop, although very few signed the cards that were sent out for the simple reason that there is no one that is a big cotton raiser. I know of only a very few men that will plant or ever do plant more than 40 acres of cotton. I believe that 20 or 25 acres to the man is a fair average estimate per year, and I doubt this year that it will even reach that average—as there is more small grain than usual.

This is not an all-cotton country; people can and do raise plenty of corn to meet all needs of the farm—they can and do raise plenty of cane and sudan grass and milo maize for roughage. We can raise peanuts in abundance but haven't got at it very extensively as yet. Nearly all raise lots of peas each year and the pink bean is a sure crop and almost every farmer raises plenty of these beans for home use. Some raise some for sale, and also everyone raises plenty of hogs for bacon. So it is easy to see that we do not depend on cotton for everything here.

If people raised plenty of food and feed everywhere and did not depend on raising cotton to buy everything—there would be no use of cotton reduction.

**CHAMBER OF COM-  
MERCE RECEIVES  
RY. PROPOSITION**

The executive committee of the Brady Chamber of Commerce was not long in being called into action after having been named Wednesday. Yesterday morning they were called upon to consider another proposal regarding a refinery and pipe line for Brady, and also a proposal for the building of the Panhandle Short Line railway through Brady. This last-named proposition was contained in a letter written by E. G. Cook of Wichita Falls, Texas, president of the proposed railway company, who asked that a director be appointed for the county, and who stated that the promoters would shortly visit Brady to confer with the Chamber of Commerce upon the proposition.

The road is projected from Dalhart, where connections would be had with the Rock Island and the Santa Fe, to Hereford, Dimmitt, Lubbock, Big Springs, San Angelo, Brady, where the oil field would be touched, to Cherokee, where there are iron deposits, on down to San Antonio, and to connect with Aransas Pass at Deep Water. The road is also proposed to build northwest to Pueblo, Colo., to tap the great coke and coal fields of Colorado.

The Chamber of Commerce has arranged to accord the delegation a cordial reception and entertainment upon the occasion of their visit here.

**PIONEER CITIZEN IS  
ALSO PIONEER BOOSTER OF  
OIL GAME IN COUNTY**

The Standard's good friend, W. B. Beakley, of the Mercury community, has been in Brady this week on business, and Monday, in company with L. M. Cravens, of Winchell, was a pleasant visitor at The Standard office.

Mr. Beakley assures us that the oil game is an old one, even in McCulloch county, and when he first came to this county 28 years ago there were being made efforts to develop oil in Brown county. Mr. Beakley, himself, has had the greatest confidence in the possibilities of developing an oil field in McCulloch county all these years, and about a dozen years ago, with some of his neighbors gave leases on about 2,000 acres of land just to get a test well put down. The first well was drilled to about 700 ft. depth, and was then abandoned. Later other parties were interested, and took up the work, drilling the well to a depth of 1200 ft. Numerous showings of oil were found in the well, but pay sands were not developed.

From the above recitation of facts, it must be admitted that Mr. Beakley is one of if not the pioneer oil booster in McCulloch county. He has never lost faith in the game, and admits to being a crank on the subject. Last year, with John Beasley and others, he secured leases on 10,000 acres, on which the Dallas-Milburn well was contracted. This well was drilled to a depth of 2449 ft., and 8 inches. At 1017 feet a good showing of oil was had, and at 2300 odd feet another sand was encountered, and the drill went through 250 ft. of this sand, when operations were ordered suspended by the head office, and the casing was pulled and the rig moved.

Mr. Beakley says he still feels that oil could be developed in paying quantities, and hopes to see another test well drilling sometime in the near future. He states that the oil sands encountered at 1200 ft. in the Burford-Brimm well No. 1 did not appear to be the same sand as found in the Dallas-Milburn well at 1017 feet. Much interest is taken in the Burford-Brimm test, and since they have been successful in shutting off the water, it is thought very likely that oil may be developed in the 1200 ft. sands.

The production of the Sinclair Gains as well is showing a steady increase. As soon as the tools were dropped into the hole the well began flowing, the oil gushing high above the top of the derrick and drenching the drillers before they could get away. This unusual flow was repeated several times in quick succession, and oil was thrown for a couple of hundred feet around the derrick.

When the tools were dropped into the hole the oil stood about 2300 feet in the well, and after the flows ceased it had dropped approximately 500 feet. It is estimated that something like 50 barrels were thrown out by

the flows. Drilling this week has been very slow owing to the constant caving in of the well, only about ten feet having been drilled during the week. The drillers themselves hardly know what sort of formation they are in, but it is apparently shale.

The arrangements for tankage are being rushed as much as possible to take care of the present production


which is momentarily expected. Many think that if the well were equipped with 6-inch casing instead of 8-inch, so that it could clean itself thoroughly, it might drill itself into a big producer from the sands already drilled. Meantime, the "dope" indicates that a big sand is to be found at around 2825 feet, and the drillers are trying to reach it.—Brownwood Bulletin, March 15.
