Jay Sharbutt of the Associated Press has some tips about how to watch pro football on television.

"The pro football season is about to bloom. But new fans may not realize there are officially approved positions for watching the games on television. These positions must be known.

If you aren't in them by kickoff, there's danger a passing inspector from the National Football League will dash in, throw down his orange flag and turn the channel to a cartoon. So remember—

—The Full Stretch. You extend fully on the sofa, head at a 90-degree angle to the set, left hand resting comfortably on the Sunday fannies. Classicists prefer Sunday book reviews, but this is optional.

—The Moveable Stretch. It requires an adjustable lounge chair. The full upright position isn't recommended, as urchins tend to grab the back of the chair while the viewer dozes. When this happens, the chair slams into the full recline and the viewer abruptly awakens. He then flails wildly and gets a hernia.

—The Forward Tilt. It occurs when three or more viewers occupy a sofa and have no room to stretch out. They sit leaning forward and burn cigarette holes in the coffee table.

—The Flanker. A temporary position on the arms of the sofa, usually occupied by housewives. Flankers aren't real fans and are there only to put out fires on the coffee table and sofa.

—The Leaner. In this position, you sit on the floor with your back against the sofa. By the end of the game, you are in the three-quarter Floor Stretch and saying "off" and "dammit" quite often.

—The Bar Stool. People in this slot rarely have a direct view of the TV set and don't really care. They do get engrossed in the game by the third quarter, but usually miss the fourth quarter, having toppled unconscious from the stool.

—The Thanksgiving Day Position. It only occurs on Nov. 22. Viewers cluster around a table and say grace. Then they put the turkey on the floor and the TV set on the table next to the cranberries. Anyone who complains has to eat the turkey or talk to Grandma.

—The Unexpected Position. It's right in front of the set, reserved for stiffy who just happen to drop by late in the season when the score is tied and the title at stake. Their job is to give you a detailed account of their summer trip to Bulgaria.

These are the nine officially approved positions, although there are unconfirmed reports the NFL will add another one—the Four-Quarter Snooze—as the season wears on.

Mrs. Jester Takes First In Contest

The winner of the second weekly contest in the Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest had to be determined by the tiebreaker score again as three contestants turned in entries with nine correct predictions out of 10 listed games.

Food Stamp Program Meet Set Tuesday

A meeting to discuss the new Food Stamp Program, which will open in Parmer County Nov. 1, has been scheduled for Parmer and Bailey county grocers and wholesalers on Tuesday of next week.

Led by officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the meeting will be at 2 p.m. in the district court room of the Bailey County courthouse in Muleshoe, according to James Sattler, officer in charge from the Lubbock field office of the USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Purpose of the meeting will be to acquaint grocers and wholesalers with the new program operations and responsibilities.

"Store owners and employees must understand Food Stamp Program operating procedures before a store can be certified," Sattler pointed out, "so it is most important that county grocers attend the meeting."

The program is a cooperative effort involving the State Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Under the new system, families certified as eligible by the welfare office can buy USDA food coupons which may

be used as cash at retail stores authorized by USDA to redeem the coupons.

In addition to the coupons they purchase, needy families are given "bonus" coupons to enable them to obtain better diets. The value of the "bonus" coupons is determined by the

size of the family, its income, resources and other factors, Sattler said. Cooperating banks redeem the coupons through the Federal Reserve System.

The new program will replace the commodity-type plan now being used by Parmer County.

The president of each class will automatically serve on the Student Council along with the elected delegates and officers of the council.

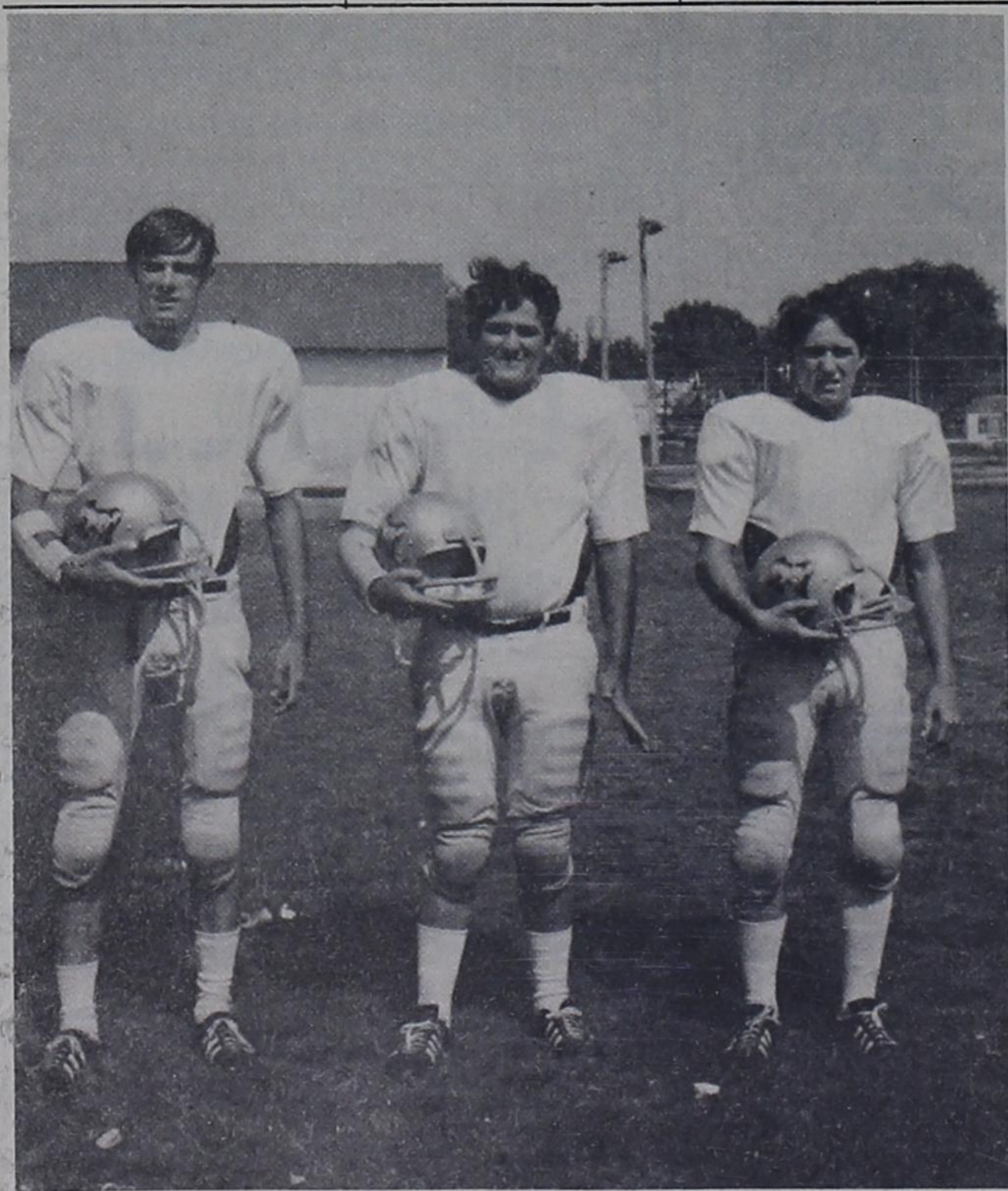
Junior high classes and the junior high pep club also elected officers for the coming year Tuesday of last week.



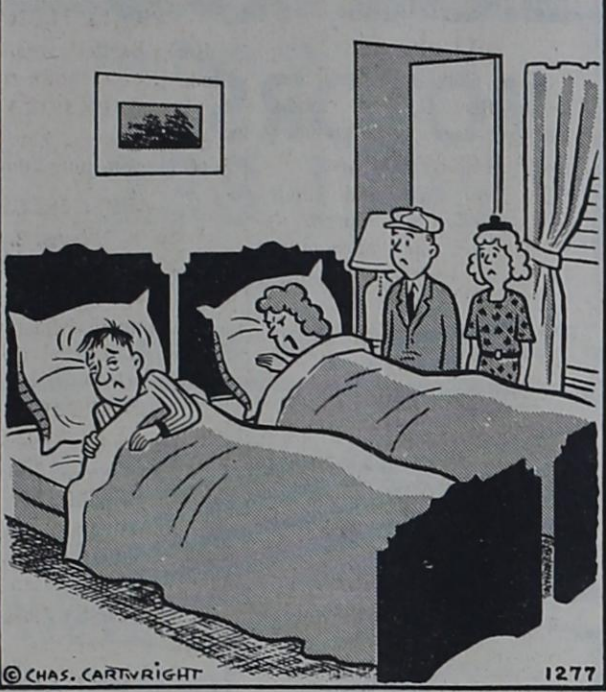

A Letter From A Communist

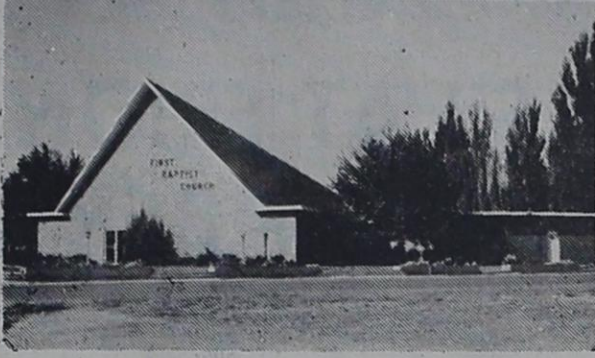

Mrs. Odessa Finch of Bovina underwent major surgery at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Friday.

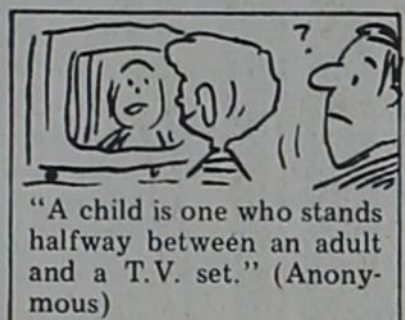

Chips, dips and soft drinks were served at the meeting here.



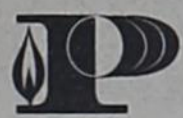
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Gromowsky LCC Chorus Member

Fumbles Cost Ponies; Friona Wins, 46-6

The combination of the Chieftain's King and Bandy and a bad case of fumbitis on the part of Bovina's Mustangs proved to be too much for the young Ponies to overcome Friday night, as the visiting Friona Class AA aggregation took home a 46-6 victory in the intra-county rivalry.

The Maroons, plagued by fumbles on their first three possessions in the first quarter, were never able to get their offensive machine moving in the first half, picking up a total of only 19 yards by intermission time.

Friona owned a 33-0 lead when the two teams went to the dressing room at halftime, scoring four quick TDs in the first quarter.

Bovina's lone tally came in the third quarter, capping a 78-yard drive.

The loss brought the Bovina team's season record to 0-2. The Chieftains are 2-0 with wins over Farmer County rivals, Farwell and Bovina.

For the Mustangs, the only consolation to come from the game was that they scored on the classy Class AA team, something which Farwell failed to do the previous week.

The Ponies won the toss in the pre-game ceremony at the center of the field and for awhile that was the only thing that went right for the Maroons.

Defending the north goal, the Ponies began play from the 25-yard line and lost the ball on the third play from scrimmage

when Mitchell Wiseman hopped on a Mustang fumble at the 28 yard line. Four plays later, Teddy King raced 26 yards around the right end for the first Friona TD of the evening with 9:35 remaining on the clock in the first period. Davy Carthel's kick for the extra points was good and Friona led, 7-0.

The Mustangs fumbled on their first play from scrimmage following the Friona kickoff and five plays later Friona's Clay Bandy hit Dale Parsons in the flat with Parsons going 46 yards for the TD. Carthel's kick made the score 14-0 with 7:11 left on the clock in the initial period.

The Mustangs fumbled again on their second play from scrimmage, but this time the Ponies rallied to hold the Chieftains on the Bovina 16-yard-line. A 15-yard dead ball penalty put the Ponies back in the hole on the eight-yard line and after gaining only seven yards Roy Hartzog punted to the Friona 48.

Three plays later the Chieftains scored again when King went 25 yards up the middle. Carthel's kick was good and the Chieftains led, 21-0, with 1:37 left in the first quarter.

The Chieftains scored once more before the quarter ended on a keeper play by Bandy which went 38 yards. Carthel's kick failed.

Friona scored once in the second quarter and failed on a field goal attempt from the 20

yard line with the score at halftime 33-0.

The Chieftains elected to take advantage of the slight breeze in the second half and on their second possession of that quarter, the Ponies put together a 78-yard scoring drive for their only points of the evening.

However, just prior to that, the Chiefs had scored again with King stepping off 44 yards for the TD. Carthel's kick was blocked and the scoreboard read 39-0.

The Ponies put the ball into play on their own 21 yard line after an 18-yard return by Ray Martinez. From there Elbert Shelby picked up three yards and Dennis Willard tossed an 11-yard pass to Roy Hartzog for the Ponies initial first down of the game. A 15-yard penalty against the visitors placed the ball at the 49-yard line. Marching steadily downfield on the running of Elbert Shelby, Alton McCormick and Bryan Fillpot, Shelby put the Ponies on the scoreboard with a five-yard dive with 2:19 left on the clock in the third stanza. The passing attempt for extra points fell short.

Friona scored yet another TD in the third period when Bandy stepped off 27 yards on a keeper play. That ended the scoring for the night with the Ponies' drive for another score halted on Friona's 15 yard line when Dee King intercepted a Willard pass.

Shelby was the leading ground gainer for the Mus-

tangs, picking up 73 yards on 16 carries. McCormick carried the ball 11 times for 29 yards, Fillpot six times for 25 yards and Martinez five carries for six yards.

Head Coach Roger Ezell understandably had little to say about the Friona tilt, remarking only that he thought the Ponies had improved over last week on their pass coverage and rush, however, were still weak on the option coverage. After recovering from the shaky hands in the first half, Ezell noted, the Mustangs managed to move the ball fairly well in the second half against Friona.

The Ponies will have a week off to prepare for the Sanford-Fritch Eagles on Friday, Sept. 28. The game will be played at Sanford-Fritch at 8 p.m.

Seventh Downs Friona, 12-0

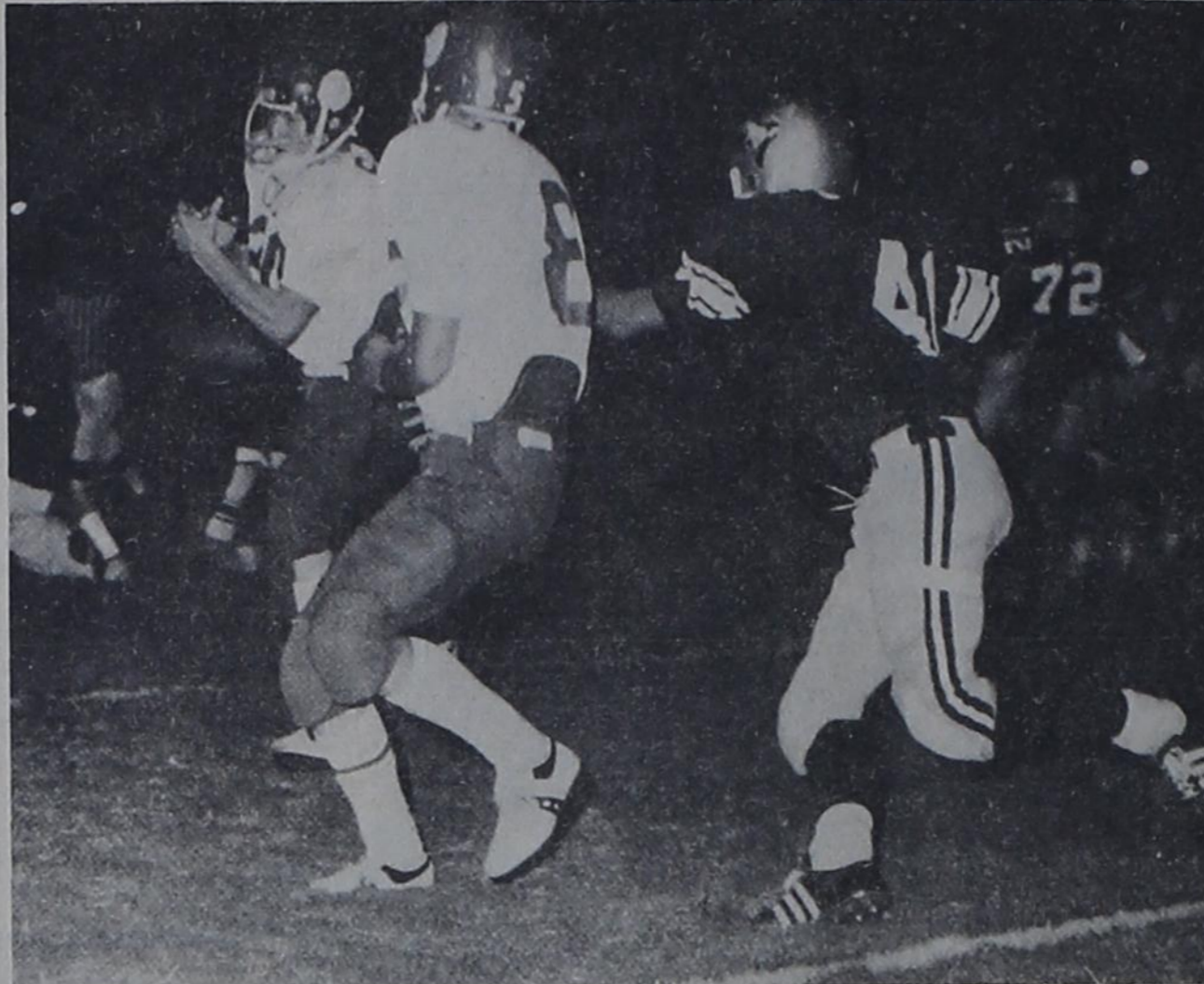
The Bovina Junior High football teams kicked off the 1973 season here Thursday when they hosted Friona's seventh and eighth grade teams.
