Jay Sharbutt of the Associated Press has some tips about how to watch pro football on television--

"The pro football season is about to bloom. But new fans may not realize there are officially approved positions for watching the games on television. These positions must be known.

-The Full Stretch. You extend fully on the sofa, head at a 90-degree angle to the set, left hand resting comfortably on the Sunday funnies. Classicists prefer Sunday book reviews, but this is optional.

-- The Moveable Stretch. It requires an adjustable lounge chair. The full upright position isn't recommended, as urchins tend to grab the back of the chair while the viewer dozes. -The Unexpected Position. It's right in front of the set, reserved for stiffs who just happen to drop by late in the season when the score is tied and the title at stake. Their job is to give you a detailed account of their summer trip to Bulgaria.

## Fall Weather 1 Week Early

Fall weather moved into the area Sunday, at least a week earlier than the calendar allows.

The calendar says Sunday, Sept. 23, is the first day of the new season, but the weather ignored that date as a front moved into the area Sunday morning, bringing with it cool temperatures and misting rain.

Temperatures dropped into the 40s Sunday and Monday and the overcast sky and heavy fogs kept temperatures from coming up much during the days.

Also adding to the dampness of the Bovina area was rain Tuesday night of last week which ranged from one-half to two inches in the Bovina area.

The moisture brought some farming operations to a halt and farmers who hadn't been able to shut off their wells jumped at the chance to do so.

Some corn harvesting was expected to get underway this past weekend, but the damp weather prevented combines from entering the fields. Milo harvest is still at least a couple of weeks away and perhaps more if the sunshine doesn't return

Most winter wheat planting has been completed and the moisture is expected to be highly beneficial to the young crop, getting it off to a good start.



ING THE DEPOSIT OF TRASH AND WASTE MA-TERIAL OF ANY KIND IN THE CITY SANITATION LOT OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS BY NON-RESIDENTS THEREOF WITHIN AUTHO-RITY OF CITY SEC. OR WATER SUPT. OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS AND THE PAYMENT TO THAT OFFICIAL OF A \$10,00 FEE FOR EACH LOAD AU-THORIZED TO BE DE-POSITED THEREIN: THE PROHIBITION OF THE DE-POSIT IN SUCH SANITA TION LOT OF ANY TRASH, WASTE MATERIAL OR SALVAGE BY ANY RESI-DENT ENGAGED IN ANY BUSINESS OR COMMER-CIAL OPERATION WHICH GENERATES SALVAGE OR WASTE MATERIAL; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR ANY VIOLATION THEREOF.

Whereas, a public necessity exists for controlling the input of trash and waste material into the City Sanitation Lot of the City of Bovina, Texas; and

Whereas, the only method of controlling such input is by passing and enforcing an ordinance controlling such input;

Now therefore, BE IT ORDAINED, by the CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation engaged in any business or commercial enterprise which generates, accumulates, or acquires salvage or waste material of any nature, to deposit such salvage or waste material or any of it in the City Sanitation Lot of the City of Bovina, Texas. Section 2. That it shall be

unlawful for any non-resident of Bovina, Texas, whether person, firm or corporation, to deposit any trash or waste material of any nature in the City Sanitation Lot of the City of Bovina, Texas, without first obtaining a permit therefor from the City Official of the City of Bovina, Texas hereinafter named, and without first

paying to such City Official for the benefit of the City of Bovina, Texas, the sum of \$10.00 in cash for each load of said material so authorized to be deposited and which is deposited in such City Sanita-

By "non resident" is meant, as to individuals, anyone who doesn't reside within the corporate limits of the City of Bovina, Texas; and as to businesses, any business that is not operated within the. corporate limits of the City of Bovina, Texas.

Section 3, The City Official to

whom application shall be made for such permit, and to whom shall be paid such fee, is the City Secretary or Water Supt. of the City of Bovina, Texas. Such official, in issuing such | MCKILLIP Drag Line Service. permit, shall designate in such permit the site in the City Sanitation Lot where each such load shall be placed or dumped, and it shall be unlawful for each such permittee to place or dump each such authorized load at any other location than that designated. 

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


