MORE DEEP TEST PROMISED--M'CULLOCH'S FAME WIDESPREAD

THREE NEW DEEP TESTS PROMISED IN NEAR FUTURE--NEW TERRITORY

TEXAS EASTERN EXPECTED TO START TWO DEEP TESTS ON J. E. BELL TRACT--NEW LOCATION SOUTH OF SAN SABA RIVER

The Texas Eastern Oil Company, which holds a lease on the J. E. Bell tract of 4,536 acres, 11 miles north of Brady on the Brownwood road, is expected to drill two deep tests on the tract, and present indications are that work will begin within three months. The fact that the company intends to drill, was made known by a statement of one of the company officials to Mr. Bell in effect that "Regardless

of what development is made in the county, you can be assured that you will get two deep tests on this acreage." The company's lease on the land was renewed recently for only a short period, which would indicate that they intend to begin drilling operations before the renewed lease expires. This tract adjoins the Matthew Capps 7,000 acres, which is to be drilled in June by Harrison, Hyde,

Meadows, et al, of Kansas City, Mo. J. L. Galloway & Co. of Fort Worth, who hold lease on about 4,000 acres, 10 miles south of Brady and across the San Saba river in McCulloch county, are reported on good authority to have arranged to drill a test well on Survey 90. This will be the well on Survey 90. This test is the farthest south in the county, and will test out entirely new territory.

Among the deep tests in the county, interest is kept at high pitch by the steady progress being made. The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. succeeded in setting 8 1-4 inch casing to shut off a flow of salt water at 1800 feet, and is now drilling with a dry hole, at 1880 feet, in limestone.

A wire from Contractor J. W. Wymire to Dave Kinsey, field superintendent for Smith & Jergins, stated that the tools for the Smith & Jergins deep test on the Northwest corner of Survey 42 were shipped out and are now enroute from Kansas. The derrick for this well has already been completed.

The Douglas Oil Co. struck a strong flow of fresh water, with just a trace of sulphur, at 1365 feet on Survey 1134, but drilling is proceeding.

The C. S. Thomas test at Salt Gap on Survey 1351 resumed drilling Monday and is now at above 950 feet. The C. S. Thomas well at Whiteland, Survey 1237, is underreaming to let down 10-inch casing. Five stems have been received here by Jack Tait, field superintendent, and two more are enroute, so it is thought there will be no further delay in operations at either of these wells. News from C. S.

Thomas in Los Angeles, Calif., is in effect that he has just brought in a 25,000 barrel well at Piesencia, within 5 miles of the old field at Fullerton, Calif. This big piece of luck for Mr. Thomas is gratifying to all his many Texas friends.

The Texas Oil & Refining Co. on J. H. Gibson Survey No. 1 is fishing for a bit. J. E. Morgan on State School Survey No. 2 is drilling in very hard lime at about 890 feet.

Geo. F. King well No. 1 on Survey 401 is still waiting on casing, which is enroute along with the rig and tools for the Geo. F. King Trust well on Survey 333, and arrival is anticipated any day.

The Texas Eastern on Survey 302 has resumed drilling after a short delay.

Jeff Meers has been in Concho county this week, accompanied by Judge W. P. Doty and a crew of men, who are making the surveys and the location for the well to be drilled by the Jeff Meers Oil Co. on the 4,000 acre tract, part of the Shultz Oil Co. and Mrs. Hartgroves holdings. This well is to be drilled as soon as the rig and materials can be placed on the ground. The location is near the south end of Survey 231, Concho county. Mr. Meers returned to Brady Wednesday night. He is delighted with his prospects for getting a big well on this tract, especially since he was enabled to stand on his lease and see the oil going over the derrick of Gulf Production Co.'s Russell No. 1, in Rannels county, just north of his location.

M'CULLOCH COUNTY PUBLICITY ATTRACTS ALABAMA FINANCIERS

SYNDICATE IS CHECKERBOARDING TEXAS OIL FIELDS--McCULLOCH COUNTY'S SHALLOW FIELD TO BE FURTHER DEVELOPED.

"You McCulloch county folks are certainly live ones," said J. R. Wood of Fort Worth, Texas, Wednesday. "I don't know who is doing it, but you are getting a world of publicity, and McCulloch county is the best-advertised and most talked of field in Texas, and in the South. In fact, so widespread is the reputation of McCulloch county as one of the big opportunities in the oil game, that my associates in Alabama advised me to make a special trip here to look over the field. I have just come from a visit to the Lohn shallow field, and my guess is that you are going to have another Ranger here. I am on a deal for 200 acres in the Lohn valley and we will drill a series of wells in the near future, as my associates have authorized me to make such arrangements if we could secure acreage in some promising shallow field."

Mr. Wood is general manager for the Texas-Alabama Syndicate, an association of prominent bankers and financiers of Alabama, who are extensively interested in the Texas fields, and who are checkerboarding the state with their holdings. The syndicate has already invested something like \$50,000 in leases, and at present holds over 5,000 acres in Texas. They expect to drill on various tracts, and are now completing arrangements for this development.

S. C. Parks of Cross Plains, who has been superintending arrangements for the drilling of the J. M. Hembree well on Survey 1277, has spudded in and is this week going right down with his hole.

The Cobb & Lowry well on the Northeast corner of Survey 1205, on which casing was pulled last week to cut off a flow of salt water at 309 feet, has its tools hung in the well by a cave-in, and is waiting on equipment to clean the hole out.

Smith & Jergins test on Survey 1331 is down 120 feet and is now making good progress.

The Parker-Wickham well, spudded in last week on Survey 83, is reported making hole fast.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. test on the Southeast corner of Survey No. 99 is drilling at 300 feet.

F. J. Brooks was here this week anticipating arrival of his two Star rigs shipped out from Oklahoma, and with which he will drill a series of wells on his 155 acre lease in Survey 102. Mr. Brooks expects to have the rigs on the ground and drilling in progress by next week.

Andrew Colvin of Waco has purchased the Northwest 60 acres of the Southeast 1-4 of Survey 102, adjoining the Brooks tract, and will drill a shallow well at once. The rig for this contract is now enroute from Weatherford.

The Sanitary committee of the City Council is very anxious to make a thorough clean-up of the city next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and will appreciate the assistance of the ladies of the town in making this "Clean-up Campaign" a complete success. GET BEHIND THE MOVEMENT IN YOUR OWN NEIGHBORHOOD.

Arrangements have been provided for the hauling away of trash, free of charge; have all your rubbish ready by Tuesday morning in a box, if possible, on alley or street, or at least where it is accessible to wagons without opening gates. (City wagons will not haul rock, ashes, weeds, etc.)

It is necessary that the trash be ready by Tuesday morning, because the wagons start early and may come to your place first. If yours is not ready, wagons will not come back, and you will be compelled to make your own arrangements to have it hauled. After clean-up period, inspection will be made by City Health officer and all premises not in sanitary condition, will be made to clean up.

If you have your trash ready and wagon fails to call for it, notify the City secretary, who will see that it is done.

It is also urged that, in connection with the campaign against trash and rubbish, every citizen should cut the weeds in and about their premises. Let's not let the beauty of our city be marred by unsightly weeds. Cut them down now before their seeds ripen and are scattered everywhere.

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

BABY.

There is a great deal of attention being given to the protection of cattle from the tick. What is being done to protect the babies from the fly?—Teague Chronicle.

Well, the baby can be covered with a bit of mosquito bar, but it is inferior with cattle. Cattle are so careless. Old-fashioned busy mothers, before the days of screened doors and windows, used to put the baby to sleep on a pallet in a cool place and trust to luck. Usually the old-fashioned baby's face was a playground for the flies, also a feeding ground. The baby, as a rule went to sleep with its lips and cheeks, even ears, calcimined with sticky elements of its dinner. The modern theory, especially among the conservatives, is that these old-fashioned babies were as healthy and successful as the modern babies are. But it is an erroneous theory. The death rate of babies and small children in the old days was something dreadful. If the birth rate in the eighteenth century has been as low as in the present century the gain in population would perhaps have been little or nothing. Fewer babies are born, relatively, in the twentieth century, but a larger proportion of them live to maturity than formerly. Flies disseminate disease, mosquitoes inoculate with malaria, and invisible germs produce hookworm. Every home should be adequately screened, every fly adequately killed and every mosquito utterly demolished. It is going barefoot that gives the hookworm bacillus its chance. Wear shoes, friends, wear shoes even if your feet do feel cramped in them. State Press reprobrates high-heeled shoes, but he will say this for them—they make it almost impossible for hookworms to get to the girl who wears them.—State Press in Dallas News.

A SQUARE DEAL FOR COUNTRY SCHOOL-CHILDREN.

The city man has long lived under the delusion that his country cousin's children enjoyed perfect health. The United States Bureau of Education, Department of the Interior, says that it is not so, and has taken steps to give the "barefoot boy with cheek of tan" the benefit of medical supervision in his rural schools. The boy's sister also needs it, for, according to the Bureau's investigation, adenoids, astigmatism, malnutrition, and defects of teeth and ear are almost as prevalent among the boys and girls of our rural communities as among city children. And the unfortunate part of it is that at the present time there is no such widespread provision for the examination of the health of country children as there is in almost every city, nor a hundredth part of the medical facilities.

According to statistics furnished by the Bureau of Education, a full half of the men rejected for physical defects by the army and navy medical boards in the last year and a half were defective because their health in childhood days had been neglected. The same thing seems to be to reach the country children through their schools, as the city children have been reached for a long time. In so important a work as health conservation it is difficult to believe that the various State and county authorities will hesitate to fall in with the Government's plans, which call for an expenditure of less than two thousand dollars a year per county. The plans call for the appointment of a county health supervisor by the county school authorities. This officer need not be a trained nurse, but should possess personality and executive ability sufficient to awaken the community to the necessity of caring for the common defects of the children. As advanced by Dr. Hiram Byrd, to whose charge the nationalization of the plan has been committed by the Bureau, the scheme assumes the same humanitarian and scientific support from the small town doctor as our city medical men and dentists have given to the city plan in the form of clinics and minor operations at reduced fees. According to Dr. Byrd, the county health or medical supervisor, equipped with an automobile, will be able to solve the problem of transportation which has so often prevented the children in the country from obtaining medical and dental assistance when needed.

Already the plan has been tried out in the South, and the results proved excellent. Women's clubs and societies in the rural communities of several counties have accomplished remarkable work in conserving the

health of their children simply by rounding up a few automobiles and taking the defective children into the nearest town affording a specialist. It has been proved again and again that almost anything in the way of personal services, donations of medical materials or even money, can be secured by the county medical supervisor in behalf of defective children. It is to be hoped that the plan will be quickly instituted throughout the country, for obviously the health of the children comes before, and not after, those matters of such absorbing interest to the rural press: good roads, bigger hogs, and more bushels to the acre.—The Outlook.

WEED BLOAT KILLING CATTLE—SIMPLE REMEDY—EFFECTS COMPLETE CURE

Reports coming to The Ledger tell of the loss of valuable cows from what is known as "weed bloat." Weeds are more numerous than usual and cows are grazing on them, and where they get too much, death results, if relief from the "bloat" does not come quick.

J. H. Taylor reported Thursday that eight head of cows had died in South Ballinger, and loss in other neighborhoods is being keenly felt.

Mr. Taylor offers a simple remedy for the "weed bloat" and says a stick about twice the size of a broom, or large enough to hold the cow's mouth open, if tied in the mouth and the cow's mouth kept open for several hours, the cow will get relief and not die.

When "weed bloat" sets up death is due to the failure of the cow to open her mouth and throw off the gas. It is a simple remedy and worth trying.—Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

BRIGADIER GENERAL O'NEAL REVIEWS ACHIEVEMENTS OF FAMOUS NINETIETH DIVISION

The following address from Brigadier-General J. P. O'Neal, commanding the 179th Brigade of the 90th Division, to his men as they were being made a part of the army of occupation of Germany, will be of intense interest to all those who have members of their families in the famous 90th Division.

Capt. T. P. Grant, well known in Brady is a part of the division, and sent the address to Mrs. Grant, who is residing at Comanche, and the address was first published in the Comanche Chief-Exponent.

General O'Neal in detail gives the important places and battles thru which the division went and speaks of the men the highest terms in which an officer may speak of his men.

"You have been chosen as part of the Army of Occupation. You occupy a portion of Prussia, which once boasted that its soldiers were the finest in the world. You have been chosen to show the German people what the American soldier is and what every soldier should be. You were chosen for honor because you have so faithfully displayed the highest qualities which a soldier can possess, and in doing this you have helped to make the reputation of the 90th Division.

"The 28th Division—the Kaiser's Favorite—the 27th Division, the 20th Division, the 117th Division, the 41st Division, and 5th Bavarian Reserve Division, the 77th Division, the 123d Division, and the 255th Division, of the famous German army, you have met and defeated, and have taken prisoners from their ranks. The names of Bois de Frierre, Vilecy, Sur Prenny, Foret des Venchères, Bois de Rappes, and Souleurefme in the St. Michiel sector, and of Bantheville, Bourrut, and the Ancreville road, Halles, Viller franche, Wiseppe and the ruined bridge at Sassez, north of the Argonne, and lastly Baalon and Stenay—all these recall the merit of your achievement.

"In your first assault of September 12th you obtained every objective. In spite of every possible obstacle, both natural and artificial you progressed. Counter attacks by superior forces never checked your advance. Finally in the raids of September 23d and 26th you penetrated the famous Hindenburg line, winning the special commendation of the commanding general of the 4th corps. In the Argonne sector you again won the praise from the commanding general of the 3rd corps and also from the commanding general of the 1st army for the capture of Bantheville and the heights north of that place—a feat which had twice been attempted by others without success.

"Again on November 10th, after a night march of fifteen miles you attacked advancing across the country swept by machine gun and artillery fire, you entered the town of Baalon and Stenay, the very spot from which the Crown Prince in the height of his power directed the attack on Verdun. To halt your advance the enemy threw in his last division—it was beaten.

"Not only did you gain every objective against which you were launched, not only did you exploit every success to the limit allowed, but every foot of ground you took—you held under fire from front flank and rear, shelled with high explosives and gas, machine gunned and bombed by aircraft, whether at Les Huit Chemins, Bois de Rappes, Hill 210, or the Ancreville Road, you held and improved your positions.

"The division, as you know, was seventy-five days under fire without relief (other than change of sector) of that time you held the front line alone for 10 days and at least half of the divisional sector for 52 days more. This, despite the fact that you led the attack in the major offensive, and executed 6 of the minor operations undertaken by the division, not to mention the pursuit thru Bois de Hautes to the Meuse and the attack on Stenay.

"Courage and fighting ability are not, however, the only qualities demanded of the soldier. Equally admirable is that disciplined and courteous behavior toward the civilian population, particularly women and children, whether of friend or foe which retains the friendship of allies, and breaks down the hatred of the foe. Amongst the people of France you were well beloved and often the people of the town were heard to say 'these men will fight fell, the Americans are indeed a great nation,' while the population of the conquered territory have nothing but praise for the men who have conquered them.

"What the New Year will bring we know not. Whether we shall shortly return to take up the battle of industry or whether we shall again be called upon to defeat the forces of tyranny and anarchy, we cannot tell. Whatever the event, I await it with my brigade in perfect confidence."

SHERIDAN COPPER MINE TO INSTALL 50-TON MILL AND CONCENTRATING PLANT

Messrs. Hugh G. Maclean and Sam Waring paid another visit to the Sheridan Copper Mine in Burnet county last week, after receiving reports from four different assay offices, El Paso, Texas, Denver, Colo., New Orleans, La., and Globe, Ariz., estimating that the ore will run from \$28.00 to \$53.00 per ton of 2,000 pounds, and also on recommendation of their mining engineer, Louis K. Acker, Jr., of Pittsburg, Pa., that mine was sufficiently developed for installation of mill and concentrating plant. It was decided to install a 50-ton mill and site was selected for same and Mr. Sheridan left immediately to purchase the necessary machinery. They

now have about \$35,000 mined and blocked out and expect to have at least \$75,000 by the time the mill is installed. They hope to have the mill in operation at least by the first of August. The indications now are that this is going to prove a very rich mine.—Eden Echo.

IN BEHALF OF THE JEWISH WAR SUFFERERS

THIS THING OF GIVING

I do not understand it, any more than do you, but there is something about this thing of giving that blesses us. No man has ever impoverished himself by giving. It cannot be done. Those who give most, have most left. No man has ever died poor because of that which he gave away. No one has ever gone hungry after giving away his bread; some way, somewhere, bread has been provided for him.

Misery is upon the war-torn world as it never was before. Want is almost universal in the countries that have been ravished. They call to us from every quarter of the earth for help. They cry aloud, or moan in tones subdued. The gaunt and famished, the lean and weary, the sick and wounded—they hold their outstretched, empty hands towards us, and beg for help. And we, of all the people in the world are in a position to relieve them.

I believe that every one who gives a penny will get it back a hundred-fold. I believe that every one who dries a tear with his assistance will be spared the shedding of a thousand tears. I believe that every sacrifice we make will so enrich us in the future that our regret will be we did not sacrifice the more. This thing of giving! A glorious privilege it is! How meaningless now is money that is hoarded. How hateful to himself and to his fellows is he who does not answer to the call for aid. Give—and in the giving live the life of a human being is entitled to enjoy. Give—and let no thought of sorrow abide with you because you did not give. Give—and somewhere, from out the clouds, or from the sacred depths of human hearts, a melody divine will reach your ears, and gladden all your days upon the earth.

A PROCLAMATION

The end of the war has not lessened, but rather has accentuated the misery of the war-torn area of Lithuania, Palestine, Poland and Galicia, and the Jews in these countries have been subjected to every outrage, persecution and indignity. They are compelled to go insufficiently clad and permitted to starve, and have been ground between the upper and the nether mill stone by friend and foe alike. Now that the veil has been lifted, there is borne to our gaze a picture so crushing in its desolate misery that we shudder to describe all of its horrible details.

The mere mention of hundreds of thousands of emaciated mothers vainly striving to still the hunger cries of piteously begging children, and the recent statement on the part of a high government official that unless help is given there will not remain alive in the evacuated territories on the Eastern front a child under seven years of age, are a few of the indications of the horrible conditions existing.

The people who have suffered the full weight of these blood-curdling conditions have been the Jews. Six millions of them—children, women and old men, have been ground and crushed to the point of extinction. Their protectors, the young and vigorous, have been killed or deported, and they, the helpless have been left to bear the brunt of oppression.

With the one purpose of aiding these victims of brutality, the Texas Division of the American Jewish Relief Committee has determined to carry on a campaign for the raising of funds. The tears, the agonizing cries of outraged womanhood, the imprecations of the impotent and feeble aged must have the answer of the citizens of this great State of Texas, in this campaign for funds.

NOW THEREFORE, I, William P. Hobby, Governor of the State of Texas, issue this proclamation, setting aside,

APRIL 7th TO APRIL 12th,
NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETEEN
AS JEWISH WAR RELIEF DAYS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

and I call upon our people to organize in each city, town, village and rural district so that an aggressive and vigorous campaign can be conducted and Texas contribute her means for the relief of the suffering, starving and deserving Jews in those sections where they have been the innocent victims of a ruthless war. The Jews have contributed liberally to every drive for Liberty Bonds, War Savings Stamps, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and other war funds, and in this, their first call for assistance from other members of their own faith, it is most fitting and proper that each and every one of us give of his means to aid the suffering and dying of this great race.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto subscribed my name and caused to be affixed the Seal of the State. Done at Austin, Texas, the capital, this 31st day of March, A. D. 1919.

BRIGADIER GENERAL O'NEAL REVIEWS ACHIEVEMENTS OF FAMOUS NINETIETH DIVISION

The following address from Brigadier-General J. P. O'Neal, commanding the 179th Brigade of the 90th Division, to his men as they were being made a part of the army of occupation of Germany, will be of intense interest to all those who have members of their families in the famed 90th Division.

Capt. T. P. Grant, well known in Brady is a part of the division, and sent the address to Mrs. Grant, who is residing at Comanche, and the address was first published in the Comanche Chief-Exponent.

General O'Neal in detail gives the important places and battles thru which the division went and speaks of the men the highest terms in which an officer may speak of his men.

"You have been chosen as part of the Army of Occupation. You occupy a portion of Prussia, which once boasted that its soldiers were the finest in the world. You have been chosen to show the German people what the American soldier is and what every soldier should be. You were chosen for honor because you have so faithfully displayed the highest qualities which a soldier can possess, and in doing this you have helped to make the reputation of the 90th Division.

"The 28th Division—the Kaiser's Favorite—the 27th Division, the 20th Division, the 117th Division, the 41st Division, and 5th Bavarian Reserve Division, the 77th Division, the 123d Division, and the 255th Division, of the famous German army, you have met and defeated, and have taken prisoners from their ranks. The names of Bois de Prieure, Vilcey, Sur Prenny, Foret des Vencheres, Bois de Rappes, and Souleuvre in the St. Michel sector, and of Bantheville, Bourrut, and the Aincreville road, Halles, Viller Franche, Wiseppe and the ruined bridge at Sassey, north of the Argonne, and lastly Baalon and Stenay—all these recall the merit of your achievement.

"In your first assault of September 12th you obtained every objective. In spite of every possible obstacle, both natural and artificial you progressed. Counter attacks by superior forces never checked your advance. Finally in the raids of September 29th and 20th you penetrated the famous Hindenburg line, winning the special commendation of the commanding general of the 4th corps. In the Argonne sector you again won the praise from the commanding general of the 3rd corps and also from the commanding general of the 1st army for the capture of Bantheville and the heights north of that place—a feat which had thrice been attempted by others without success.

"Again on November 10th, after a night march of fifteen miles you attacked advancing across the country swept by machine gun and artillery fire, you entered the town of Baalon and Stenay, the very spot from which the Crown Prince in the height of his power directed the attack on Verdun. To halt your advance the enemy threw in his last division—it was beaten.

"Not only did you gain every objective against which you were launched, not only did you exploit every success to the limit allowed, but every foot of ground you took—you held under fire from front flank and rear, shelled with high explosives and gas, machine gunned and bombed by aircraft, whether at Les Haut Chamms, Bois de Rappes, Hill 210, or the Aincreville Road, you held and improved your positions.

"The division, as you know, was seventy-five days under fire without relief (other than change of sector) of that time you held the front line alone for 10 days and at least half of the divisional sector for 52 days more. This, despite the fact that you led the attack in the major offensive, and executed 6 of the minor operations undertaken by the division, not to mention the pursuit thru Bois de Halles to the Meuse and the attack on Stenay.

"Courage and fighting ability are not, however, the only qualities demanded of the soldier. Equally admirable is that disciplined and courteous behavior toward the civilian population, particularly women and children, whether of friend or foe which retains the friendship of allies, and breaks down the hatred of the foe. Amongst the people of France you were well beloved and often the people of the town were heard to say 'these men will fight fell, the Americans are indeed a great nation,' while the population of the conquered territory have nothing but praise for the men who have conquered them.

"What the New Year will bring we know not. Whether we shall shortly return to take up the battle of industry or whether we shall again be called upon to defeat the forces of tyranny and anarchy, we cannot tell. Whatever the event, I await it with my brigade in perfect confidence."

SHERIDAN COPPER MINE TO INSTALL 50-TON MILL AND CONCENTRATING PLANT

Messrs. Hugh G. Maclean and Sam Waring paid another visit to the Sheridan Copper Mine in Burnet county last week, after receiving reports from four different assay offices, El Paso, Texas, Denver, Colo., New Orleans, La., and Globe, Ariz., estimating that the ore will run from \$28.00 to \$53.00 per ton of 2,000 pounds, and also on recommendation of their mining engineer, Louis K. Acker, Jr., of Pittsburg, Pa., that mine was sufficiently developed for installation of mill and concentrating plant. It was decided to install a 50-ton mill and site was selected for same and Mr. Sheridan left immediately to purchase the necessary machinery. They

now have about \$35,000 mined and blocked out and expect to have at least \$75,000 by the time the mill is installed. They hope to have the mill in operation at least by the first of August. The indications now are that this is going to prove a very rich mine.—Eden Echo.

A PROCLAMATION

The end of the war has not lessened, but rather has accentuated the misery of the war-torn area of Lithuania, Palestine, Poland and Galicia, and the Jews. In these countries have been subjected to every outrage, persecution and indignity. They are compelled to go insufficiently clad and permitted to starve, and have been ground between the upper and the nether mill stone by friend and foe alike. Now that the veil has been lifted, there is borne to our gaze a picture so crushing in its desolate misery that we shudder to describe all of its horrible details.

The mere mention of hundreds of thousands of emaciated mothers vainly striving to still the hunger cries of piteously begging children, and the recent statement on the part of a high government official that unless help is given there will not remain alive in the evacuated territories on the Eastern front a child under seven years of age, are a few of the indications of the horrible conditions existing.

The people who have suffered the full weight of these blood-curdling conditions have been the Jews. Six millions of them—children, women and old men, have been ground and crushed to the point of extinction. Their protectors, the young and vigorous, have been killed or deported, and they, the helpless have been left to bear the brunt of oppression.

With the one purpose of aiding these victims of brutality, the Texas Division of the American Jewish Relief Committee has determined to carry on a campaign for the raising of funds. The tears, the agonizing cries of outraged womanhood, the imprecations of the impotent and feeble aged must have the answer of the citizens of this great State of Texas, in this campaign for funds.

NOW THEREFORE, I, William P. Hobby, Governor of the State of Texas, issue this proclamation, setting aside,

APRIL 7th TO APRIL 12th,
NINETEEN HUNDRED AND NINETEEN
AS JEWISH WAR RELIEF DAYS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

and I call upon our people to organize in each city, town, village and rural district so that an aggressive and vigorous campaign can be conducted and Texas contribute her means for the relief of the suffering, starving and deserving Jews in those sections where they have been the innocent victims of a ruthless war. The Jews have contributed liberally to every drive for Liberty Bonds, War Savings Stamps, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and other war funds, and in this, their first call for assistance from other members of their own faith, it is most fitting and proper that each and every one of us give of his means to aid the suffering and dying of this great race.

BEN REED WRITES HOME
FOLKS FROM PANAMA CANAL ZONE.—ALL NATIONALITIES

"U. S. Navy, Submarine Base.
"Coco Solo, C. Z., March 14.
"Dear Father and Mother.
"I received a letter from you this p. m. and I surely was glad to hear from you again. I am sorry you were disappointed so, in me not writing but I was so disgusted and tired of this place I didn't have ambition enough to write a couple of lines, but I'll tell you I am feeling like a millionaire now. Never before was I in any better spirits in my life! I am delighted so with my work and believe I will get something out of this before the end. What I mean I will make good at it; it is a good trade to know on the outside and I have been recommended for examination by the Pay Master for Storekeeper, 3rd class, which I think I can make with little trouble.
"My request for a rating has already been signed by the Pay Master—that means \$40.00 you know. I am going to try the best I can and think I will be o. k.
"Well, I guess I told you about the Republic of Panama being open to the sailors? Well, to our disappointment they closed it up again for an investigation. A bunch of Senators from the States arrived today on the Steamer 'Panama,' as an investigating party. Chances are she will re-open in a few days after they see how conditions on the Isthmus are for the service man.
"The officers of Coco Solo are going to give them a big banquet Monday next, so they will have a good line to give the 'boys,' for the officers are just as anxious for the place to open as the 'gals' is.
"I don't know if I will take a furlough this summer or not. Mamma, for it costs a bunch of jack to go to the states and back. It is like this, if Colon opens I won't take it, and if it remains closed I will get a leave—so there you are; but I think it will open. I don't think I will be out here for some time, for there are only four of us storekeepers on the base, and we have all we can do to take care of things.
"The Pay Master has qualified me to stand store-room duty watches now. That exempts me from all stry watches. Mamma, I took a stroll over Colon yesterday, it being Sunday. Just to look the city over. It is an old-time Spanish town—hundreds of years old. You see this country used to belong to Columbia, South America and Colon was the principal part at that time.
"There are several old Spanish scenes all through the city, which are really interesting, but the people! O, My God! All nationalities you can name in the world live here, and they all live so close together. Most of the buildings are two-story, and families live up stairs and business houses down below. There is no residence section. They all live in the same building where their business places are. Most of the people are of the black race. They are quite different from the colored people in the States.

LIVE WIRE OIL MAN VISITS HERE—DRILLING TEST IN MENARD COUNTY

A. G. Holmes, live-wire oil man from Menard county, was a visitor in Brady yesterday, and took occasion to compliment McCulloch county on the publicity it is receiving. He stated that he had recently received a letter from a friend back in Wisconsin, and within 200 miles of the Canadian border, asking about McCulloch county, and stating that he had read a newspaper article telling of the Lohn shallow oil field in McCulloch county.

Mr. Holmes is a consistent booster of the oil game, not only in Menard county, but for all this section. He gives the following report on oil activities in Menard county:

Russell, Holmes & Callan are drilling on the Las Marias (Martin) ranch, and struck a good showing of oil at 536 feet. They are now setting casing.

The Thos. Ludlow rig on the Kothman ranch is waiting on tools. Cline & Wallace on the Evans ranch are waiting on rig.

Two rigs are now on the track at Menard for Benedum & Trees, who are contracted to drill in Kimble county.

Another rig is now on the track for the James Russell ranch in Menard and Kimble counties.

Col. Kempner has two rigs enroute, one for Menard and the other for Mason county.

LOCATION IS MADE FOR THE GULF'S RUSSELL NO. 2 IN RANNELS COUNTY

Geologist for the Gulf Production Co., was here this week and made the location for Well No. 2, on the Russell ranch fifteen miles east of Ballinger. He gave out nothing to indicate how soon work of constructing the derrick and drilling would begin, saying that was not his part of the business, his duties being confined to making the selection and driving the pegs.

Russell No. 2 will be about six hundred yards northwest of Well No. 1, and just across the draw towards Ballinger from the old well. We have been reliably informed that Well No. 2 will be drilled four thousand feet deep, if necessary to get oil.

In drilling the second well on the Russell ranch the Gulf Production Co., is complying with their contract in order to retain the acreage acquired under drilling contract. The first contract called for a 3500 foot hole, and the drill went that depth in the contract also provides for the drilling of the second well within a given time, and the company is pushing work on the second well and drilling will no doubt begin at an early date.—Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

SEVERAL MORE DEEP TESTS TO DRILL IN CONCHO

Special to The Brady Standard: Paint Rock, Texas, April 11.—Following the favorable report of two geologists who have just completed a survey of a large portion of this county, drilling contracts are being negotiated which will give this county several more deep test wells. An anticline has been traced across the county with at least one cross, and much favorable structural formation has been observed.

It is the opinion of these experts that the wells now going down are favorably located and that one at least, will come in within the next 200 feet. The Shultz well is now in the Ranger black lime and is drilling with full crew.

BURFORD & BRIMM WELL 2 MILES EAST BROWNWOOD COMES IN A PRODUCER

The Burford & Brimm well, on the Capps, or old Swinden farm, located two miles east of Brownwood on the Zephyr road, came in Monday an oil producer.

A gas vein of considerable volume was struck in this well last Saturday morning at 1500 feet. It proved to be what is known as wet gas, and was of sufficient force to blow the mud and slush from the hole, which is cased with 8-inch casing.

Gas of a yellowish color and having a very strong petroleum smell, flowed off the well all day Saturday and Sunday. On Monday the drillers again put down their drill and had gone only a short depth when they struck oil, which came up in regular gusher style, spraying the derrick and surrounding scenery liberally with oil.

Following the first burst, the oil has continued to flow from the well at intervals. How much oil is in the well is unknown, but the owners of the well are reported to be enthusiastic over their prospects of developing, within two miles of the city, the best oil field in Brown county.—Brownwood Bulletin.

GRAY WELL IN SAN SABA COUNTY IS SPUN IN ON LAST THURSDAY

The derrick for the Gray well has been erected for some time and several car loads of machinery were hauled out there this and last week and actual drilling commenced yesterday. The contract calls for a deep well and this will give that section of the county a thorough test for oil. The Martin Oil Co., of Wichita Falls, with W. A. Edwards, formerly of Ranger, as head driller, has the contract. This is the first real development work in this immediate vicinity and the progress of the work will be watched with eagerness by all our people. Here's hoping they'll punch a hole where a big gusher will be struck and we will all live happily ever afterwards.—San Saba Star.
