NEW RIGS ARRIVE--OIL SANDS STRUCK--NEW CONTRACT LET

SHULTZ HAS OIL--NEW WELL RIGS HAVE ARRIVED

The biggest news of the week was contained in the phone message received by Jeff Meers from W. O. Shultz that the Shultz Oil Co. well No. 2, near Paint Rock, had drilled through 20 feet of hard, tight sand, thoroughly saturated with oil from top to bottom. The well was shut down waiting on a steel line with which to measure the hole for shooting, should the well not come in naturally. The Shultz well is about 14 miles northwest from C. S. Thomas Salt Gap well, and its showing has caused acreage in the western and northwestern parts of the county to gain rapidly in value.

The good news on the Shultz well followed hard on announcement of good showings in a number of shallow wells drilling in McCulloch county. Probably the best showing was had in the Record Oil & Refining Co. well No. 3 on Survey 99, which at 207 feet tapped the Lohm sand, and after drilling two feet into the sand struck a good showing of oil. The well is now waiting on new tools to drill in, and which are expected at once. The well will be shot and put on the swab.

The Pope-Randerson well on Survey 86 which has been drilled to 295 feet, had a showing of oil at 290 feet. This well has been drilling with a hole full of water since reaching a depth of 47 feet. The well is now being cased to cut off this water, and an effort will be made to develop the oil sand encountered.

The Annie Laurie Oil Co. on Survey 141, 1 1/2 miles east of the Lohm shallow field, had a fine showing of oil at 295 feet, and the well has been

taken in charge of by Supt. D. E. Weaver of the Record Oil & Refining Co., who will endeavor to develop the sand into a pay well.

The arrival of two new drilling rigs; the spudding in of a new 1,000 ft. well, and the letting of another drilling contract, constitutes the main items of development in the McCulloch county field this week.

The tools and machinery for the Smith & Jergins deep test on the northwest corner of Survey 42, and on the same structure as the Prairie and C. S. Thomas Salt Gap wells, Tuesday passed thru Brady for Melvin where it is being unloaded and hauled to the location. The derrick has been up for a couple months, and operations are expected to begin within a week or ten days. Paul Smith came down from Fort Worth Tuesday and spent the day with Field Superintendent Dave Kinsey and Contractor J. W. Waymire in completing arrangement for drilling. The well will be drilled by Waymire.

The Parkersburg Rig for the J. T. Hare well on Survey 1218, in the northwest part of the county, also passed through Brady Tuesday for Melvin, and is now being placed on the ground. Hare will drill a deep test and also three shallow tests.

The Lohm Oil & Gas Co. of Alvarado Monday spudded in on a new hole on Survey 595, known as the Claud Ledbetter farm. The company has a tract of 981 acres at this location, and has contracted to drill a 1,000 ft. hole. This well started in black shale, and made 31 feet the first day, and is still drilling in black shale.

Messrs. C. E. Martin of Dallas and E. G. Woodward of Stephenville, representing the Lucky Stone Oil & Gas Co., a half-million dollar corporation of McKinney, Texas, were here this week and closed a contract for a 500 ft. shallow well to be drilled on the Beckham tract, 1 mile east of Lohm, the location being on Survey 1059.

J. R. and R. O. Clark have the drilling contract, and operations are to be in progress on or before May 18th.

E. B. Wood arrived Wednesday from Mineral Wells with the fishing tools for the W66d-Cobb & Lowry well on Survey 1295. This well was caved in at 430 feet, with the tools in the hole. As soon as the tools can be recovered, the well will be cleaned out, and drilling will be resumed. Oil sands are expected 100 feet further down from where the drill stopped.

The Turner-Wickham well on Survey 83 is drilling at 375 feet.

The C. S. Thomas well at Whitehall is under-reaming. The Thomas well at Salt Gap is drilling at 1310 feet.

The J. E. Morgan well 2 miles north of Brady is drilling at 1,000 feet.

The Texas Eastern well on Survey 302 is drilling with a ten-inch hole at between 1200 and 1300 feet. Repairs on the derrick have slowed up work on this well, but rapid progress is now promised.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. well on Survey 89 is drilling.

Various accidents or delays of one nature or another have caused a temporary shut-down of the Douglas, Texas O. & R. Co., King and Coopers, Shields wells, all of which are expected to be drilling again next week.

Among the visitors here the past week have been E. S. Graham of

Lexington, Ky., who is making a geological survey of the northwestern part of the county for large oil interests.

J. F. Woodyard of Parkersburg, West Virginia, has also been a visitor, this being his second trip to the McCulloch county field. Each time Mr. Woodyard visits here he grows more enthusiastic over the oil possibilities here, and his enthusiasm has resulted in some of the biggest oil men in West Virginia becoming interested in McCulloch county acreage.

Accompanying him on his last visit were Messrs. Geo. W. Strong and G. W. Mealy, both of Parkersburg, and have purchased acreage here.

MILLION DOLLAR RAINS COME IN INSTALLMENTS

McCulloch county's million dollar rains are coming nicely, and each installment has so far been met promptly just when it is about to fall due. The big oat and wheat crop in the county, while not on the verge of bankruptcy last week, was nevertheless suffering a decline in its stocks, on account of lacking the necessary rain to keep up its margins, but a general downpour sent by Jupiter Pluvius last Tuesday saved the day, and the small grain stocks are again "way above par."

The first rain was threatened last Saturday afternoon, but amounted to only a very light shower. Tuesday afternoon, however, the county enjoyed a general downpour, varying from a quarter of an inch to over an inch. Pear Valley reports fully an inch of rain, and heavier to the northwest, while it was lighter nearer to Brady. Calf Creek had a fine rain, and between Brady and Mascen the rain was good, while beyond Mason it was lighter again.

While the rain was not as heavy as might have been desired, yet it fell slowly and all went into the ground. Oats and wheat, especially the early grain, will be inestimably benefited, since it is now heading out and the moisture will assure a heavy yield.

Proprietary Medicine Tax.

On and after May 1, 1919, retail druggists must affix a stamp at the rate of 1 cent for each 25 cents or fractional part thereof of the price at which they sell proprietary medicines and toilet articles, except toilet soaps and toilet soap powders, to each of such articles sold by them. This tax must be paid by the purchaser at the time of purchase. The druggist must not only affix, but he must also cancel the stamp by writing his own name or initials across its face. The tax must be paid regardless of whether a manufacturer's tax has already been paid on the article under the old revenue law.

YOUNG LADIES IN SPECTACULAR AIR PLANE FLIGHTS

The honor and distinction of being the first young ladies of Brady to take flight in an aeroplane, fell to Misses Gussie Rice and Sue Riley last Sunday. More than that, their flights were among the most spectacular and sensational ever witnessed by Brady citizens, and the stunts performed by the aviator in charge of the plane were as nerve-racking to the spectators as they were enjoyed to the fair passengers.

The occasion was the visit here last Saturday of an airplane from Kelly Field at San Antonio for the purpose of boosting the Victory Liberty loan. The plane was in charge of Lieutenant M. B. Cameron, who was accompanied by Sgt. Snider as mechanic. While the plane was scheduled to arrive at 10:00 a. m., it did not reach here until about 4:00 p. m., having been delayed enroute. The fliers, however, made up for the delay by their daring stunts, such as swooping down so close to tree tops and hopping over houses and buildings in a manner calculated to give the innocent bystander heart-failure. As had been previously announced, the young lady selling the most liberty bonds would be permitted to ride in the plane. Miss Rice, having sold \$12,100 worth of bonds, won first honors, and Miss Riley, whose sales totaled \$6,750, second--and each was accorded the privilege of an aeroplane flight, during which the aviator performed every manner of stunt, including nose dives, looping the loop, tail spins, and skimming over the tree tops and telephone wires at a 100-mile clip. Both Miss Rice and Miss Riley were game from start to finish and would not have missed the flight for an oil well, so they declare.

Both young ladies also were presented with a German helmet as mementoes of the occasion. The following also received helmets in exchange for certain marked slips dropped from the aeroplane during one of its flights: Mrs. G. A. Krueger, Frank Ogden, Hubert Jackson, Jay Priddy, Cecil Striegler. Mrs. W. N. White, chairman of the Woman's committee was presented with a helmet, which left one on hand and which was appropriated by County Judge Evans Adkins, county chairman of the Liberty Loan committee.

A second aeroplane, which was to have taken the man selling the largest number of Liberty bonds for a flight, was wrecked at Fredericksburg coming up, and upon the return trip, Lt. Cameron's plane was also wrecked at Fredericksburg, while trying to arise from the field.



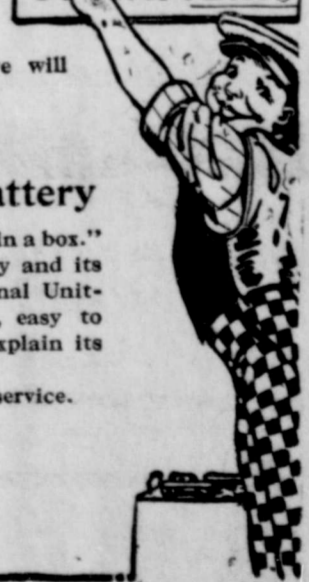



THAT STATE BOND ISSUE FOR GOOD ROADS.

As The Reporter understands the proposition to issue \$75,000,000 in bonds for the building of good roads by the state of Texas such action would not raise any man's taxes. The necessary money to provide funds for interest and sinking fund would come out of the state automobile license money—and this tax is already being levied and collected. In short, the plan is for the owners of automobiles to pay for the building of the state highway system without having their automobile license fees increased. It simply means a capitalization of our present automobile tax.

Under our present constitution Texas cannot appropriate a single dollar for the construction of roads. Hence the necessity for an amendment to the constitution which will authorize the Legislature to issue the \$75,000,000 bonds. New York, Illinois, California, Arizona, Missouri, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Georgia and Oregon have already taken this step or are now engaged in so doing. These states will build a system of highways. Shall Texas lag in the rear? No state has ever found a way to build a system of highways without having some money of its own to spend on the road system.

It is not the intention to issue the whole \$75,000,000 in bonds at one time but they will be issued as rapidly as the money can be wisely and economically invested in the construction of hard-surfaced roads.

It is no longer necessary to produce an argument in favor of good roads. They are a necessity to the life of the state, the county and community. We believe the adoption of the good roads amendment would yield a greater return to the tax payers than any investment they could make. Good roads make money for the people—and the people are going to have them sooner or later, so why not start now. Start right by adopting this amendment.—Rockdale Reporter.

APPEAL TO VOTERS ON AMENDMENT CONSTITUTION PROHIBITING LIQUOR MAN'G.

The manhood of the State of Texas is called upon to rally to the standard of righteousness on the twenty-fourth of next month and register their approval of the amendment to the Constitution that forever prohibits the manufacture and sale of intoxicants in our state. If the good women of the state had had the right of franchise this iniquitous business would have been prohibited long ago. The same election that calls our men to put over the top the prohibition amendment calls them also to approve the amendment giving our women the right to vote. That these amendments will easily be put over no one doubts if only our men will go to the polls and vote their convictions of right. But if our people should be disposed to close their eyes to the importance of this election and rest in the victories already won and allow a spirit of apathy to possess them the result will be defeat and confusion for the forces of righteousness.

The truth is we have not yet gained a victory over the infamous liquor business. The enemy has not yet acknowledged defeat. He has simply hoisted a flag of truce for the signing of an armistice. But the peace treaty has not yet been signed. This is to be signed at the ballot box on the 24th of May. If we should fail of a safe and decided majority then the war would continue indefinitely in the future. The German-American liquor forces, which have been the worst enemies of our civilization for the past half a century, are doing all in their power to defeat our efforts and perpetuate the life of this nefarious business. They are raising millions of money to oppose the national amendment. Should they succeed our only hope would be in our state amendment. The importance of adopting that amendment cannot be overestimated. The same spirit of true patriotism, of courage and determination, that was manifested by our boys in checking the outraging Huns and driving them back and snatching victory out of threatened defeat is needed now in defeating this, the worst of all enemies—the infamous liquor evil.

PAUL HADDOW WRITES NONE OF THE "G. I. CANS" HAD HIS NUMBER—SO HE'S ALIVE

"Tanlay, France, March 30. Editor Brady Standard:

"I shall take much pleasure in writing your paper a few lines this rainy Saturday evening. This letter leaves me well and able to perform my duties which consist of burning gas and lub. and fixing punctures. Since my last letter to The Standard I have received four copies and I will say they are always a very welcome visitor. It seems that McCulloch county is on the map on the oil boom—and here is hoping she goes over the top. "Toot Sweet."

"Well, I just returned a few days ago from Paris and I must say that is some city. I spent five days there and I put in good time sight-seeing, which from beginning to end was a sight to me. I was at the depot when President Wilson came back to Paris and a large crowd met him at the station. Well, as we, the 36th Division are the unlucky division to stay over here a few more months I am going to make a real interesting trip in May. I will go from here to England and then to Ireland and Scotland. I think that will be a trip worth my time. I will have 16 days off, and I think I can see about all I care to in that time. If we are still here the latter part of June, which I think we will be, I am going to ask for a pass to Rome and Italy.

"While I was on my 27th day leave at Chamoinix in the Alps, I left a print of my hob-nail shoes on both Italy and Switzerland soil.

"Well, as I have been asked by a few friends to give a description of some of my experiences while on the front line, I shall make an attempt to touch it lightly, as I was so excited the biggest part of the time I really know what did happen. My squad's duty was to keep in touch with our regiments by wireless, telephone, motorcycle runners, or any way we could. So the first night we were on the line the Boche got our range and began throwing heavy shells (G. I. cans) at us and I was feeling a little sick from looking the conditions in the face and the closer the shells got the sicker I felt. At last I made for a dugout and in it I went, but in a couple of hours I heard some officer calling for Haddow to take a message up to the front. So I got up and shook myself and said: "Well boys, my number is not on any of those shells. I will be back and if it is, I will die like all true Americans have." But as I was in very much of a strange country, and the night was awfully black and after walking until I gave out, I decided I was about to get over the dead line, and as I was completely turned around I proceeded to lay down on the cold, wet ground, with my pack and gun on my back and in spite of all danger, I was soon in dreamland.

"About day break the next morning a soldier came along and awoke me, and told me how to find Brig. headquarters, so I got up and went in and reported not dead—but nearly so. I worked in the office all day and that night. The next day we made our big drive, pushing the Boche across the river. On our way up it was a pitiful sight to see the dead men on the hills where they had done some hard fighting for three days and nights. Brig. headquarters was stationed at Vav. Champagne, which had been occupied by the Boche only a few minutes before we came into it. They burned and destroyed all the towns they could, but we crowded them so much they didn't have time to destroy Vav. Champagne, but they got across the river and got their artillery set up and from the way they began putting the shells back there I think they were trying to shoot it down, and they were making a good start until our artillery began sending it back. One day I was sitting at my table and all at once a large piece of shrapnel came bursting in the window and hit the wall near me, but it did not have my number, so I am still alive. That night I went out to the 1st Bat. of the 144th Inf., to direct the soldiers to a well for drinking water and my captain told me if I heard a machine gun to fall down and lay there until the shooting had ceased; so I was walking along and of course, I didn't feel very much at home. All at once I heard a machine gun and about the same time the whole earth was lighted up and I layed down and everything got dark and I jumped up and made a run for the ditch and about the time I got to it, "zip! zip!" went the bullets. I jumped into the ditch head foremost and to my surprise I hit on top of a comrade and I said something but he didn't answer. So you can imagine a man's feelings. I thought I had fallen in with a Boche, but I soon discovered that he was one of my friends that had been killed a few moments before. I crawled down the ditch a short ways and stopped to listen to see what was going on around me but my heart was beating so I could not hear anything else, so I got up and finally reached my destination. Well, to make a long story

short, until October 28th, we were going through all this kind of excitement, and then we were relieved and came back to Triacant where we were preparing to go up on the Verdun front. We were to go on Nov. 13th, but the good news came on Nov. 11 and at 11 a. m. that all hostilities ceased, and we had two bands in the town so we had quite a celebration. There is one thing I shall never forget and that was when the band played "The Star-Spangled Banner." I stood at "attention" like I never stood before and I have often heard of people crying for joy. Now I can say, for one time in my life, I have cried for joy. Well, as I have written quite a long letter, and nothing much of interest either, I shall ring off for this time.

**BRADY CHAMBER
OF COMMERCE TO
RAISE \$5,000 FUND**

The Brady Chamber of Commerce now has on a campaign the object of which is to raise a fund of \$5,000 for advertising and publicity work—or rather to continue this work as already begun. This sum is to be in addition to the membership fees. It has been decided to pro-rate this fund among the citizens, and ask each individual to contribute an amount equitable with his holdings or interests in the county. This campaign is to be inaugurated at once, and in addition there will be a strong effort made to increase the present membership of 150 to 500. The Chamber of Commerce is working for the whole of McCulloch county, and has already accomplished much for the county, as every citizen must admit. To continue this good work, the assistance and support of every citizen is needed.

The foregoing conclusion was reached at an executive board meeting of the Chamber yesterday, and follows the meeting held Monday. While the meeting Monday was a success from the standpoint of attendance—all the stores and offices in Brady being closed from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m. and the business and professional men conscripted for the meeting—yet the financial results left much to be desired. A number of new members were added to the list, bringing the total up to 150. A fund for advertising and publicity purposes was also started, but the number of subscriptions were but a drop in the bucket, as compared with the needs.

On the whole, the meeting was a repetition of the meeting held the week previous—numerous reports and short addresses were made showing the benefits already had from the Brady Chamber of Commerce advertising campaign, and Sam McCollum presented in forcible style what had been done and what should be done. As stated in the course of his address, the development of McCulloch county depended upon the interest taken in the work of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, and the assistance rendered by those citizens who would be mostly benefited. This development might be had now—or it might be postponed for 50 years by the lack of co-operation by our citizens.

During the coming week an active campaign for members and subscriptions will be made by the committee appointed. The complete list of members and subscriptions will be published, so that all may know to whom credit is due for the boosting of McCulloch county interests; also the publication of these lists will enable every man to know who the slackers and tight-wads are.
