## 2500 FT. TEST CONTRACTED NEAR HEXT--RIG ALREADY HERE

### CAPITAL FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA INTERESTED

Development of the McCulloch county oil field is on in earnest, and the real oil men and operators, many of whom have been quietly awaiting the opportune moment, are now coming in and taking a hand in the development already well under way.

The fact that McCulloch county is considered one of the best bets among the undeveloped fields of Texas, is indicated by the gathering here of men from all parts of the Union, and who have gotten in on the ground floor in order to profit by the widespread development now in progress.

Of particular interest at this time is the purchase of E. Evans of British Columbia from D. E. Weaver of the Record Oil & Refining Co., of a 40-acre tract, part of Survey No. 99, adjoining the Lohn shallow field, for a consideration of \$75.00 per acre. Mr. Evans expects to make arrangements immediately for drilling his acreage.

Development to the south of Brady is also coming rapidly, and the announcement is this week made that a contract was signed and a forfeit posted on April 4th for the drilling of a 2500 ft. test on the Ben Brandenburg land in Mason county. The contract was made through Messrs. E. L. Ogden, Lee King, J. C. McCormack and Dick Dyer, with J. G. Cochran and J. W. Stewart of Parkersburg, West Virginia, and who are prominent among the operators in West Virginia and Wyoming. The well location has been made just south of the Brandenburg ranch house, and 4 miles east of the town of Hext. Derrick lumber is here on the track, and Henderson & Southern of Eldorado, Kansas, who have the drilling contract, have their drillers already on the ground, and expect to have their tools here and ready to work within a week or ten days. The contract calls for operations to be in progress by July 4th. J. F. Woodyard, who has been here the past couple weeks representing Messrs. Cochran and Stewart, is enthusiastic over the structure found on the tract, and expects to interest other Eastern parties in acreage in McCulloch and adjoining territory.

Prominent among the visitors here this week have been W. T. Worth and H. W. Marss of Chicago, representing the Great Western Refining Co. of Chicago. Mr. Worth has made numerous visits here, and each time is more profoundly impressed with the possibilities. He is interested in a number of McCulloch county tracts, as well as having leases throughout this section. His company is interested in oil field by-products, and Mr. Worth is keeping close touch on the McCulloch county developments in order to keep his company advised.

The Texas Oil & Refining Co. has received all their 15 1-2 and 12 1-2 inch casing, comprising two carloads, and are now in position to make steady progress. This week they lost

some time on account of a fishing job, but hope to be drilling again within a day or two.

The Geo. F. King well No. 1, which has been shut down at 1040 feet, awaiting casing, expects to resume drilling within a few days. Contractor H. H. Beagle returned Wednesday from Wichita, Kans.

Under-reaming is still in progress at the C. S. Thomas, Whiteland well, and the Thomas Salt Gap well is drilling at around 1,000 feet.

Smith and Jergins are hauling their tools and machinery out from Melvin, and hope to be ready to spud in by the middle of next week.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. is under-reaming, and expects to finish by next week, when they will resume drilling at 2200 feet.

D. E. Weaver, superintendent for the Record Oil & Refining Co., is having trouble with his tools, and has been unable to bring in his well on Survey No. 99, on which a splendid showing of oil was had last week. As soon as the trouble can be remedied, he expects to shoot the well and bring it in.

G. M. Peat of Amarillo, one of the members of the Annie Laurie Oil Co., has been here this week with J. T. Brady, watching developments. This company had a good showing of oil on Survey 141 last week, but were able to control the water. They are proceeding with drilling, and hope to get a better producer in the 585 ft. sand.

Andrew Colvin, who is drilling on Survey 102, is making good progress, and is now at 180 feet.

The Tucker Oil Co., who have had two of their wells cleaned, find the results so satisfactory, according to field superintendent W. F. Roberts, Jr., that they expect to have all the rest of their wells shot and cleaned as soon as possible. J. A. Kelley of Stamford, who has been cleaning the Tucker wells, temporarily abandoned the work in order to spud in last Friday on a shallow well on Survey 1106. This new well adjoins the Tucker field, and its splendid location induced Mr. Kelley to pay \$100 per acre for a ten-acre lease.

F. J. Brooks of Waco is here to complete arrangements for the drilling of the first two of a series of wells on Survey 102. Two rigs are now enroute from Brownwood and Mr. Brooks expects to have them in operation by next week. A third rig for Mr. Brooks is now enroute from Waco, and will be placed at once on Survey 1160. Gene McCarthy, one of the best drillers in this section, has arrived and will have charge of all three wells.

H. T. Sparks, representing the Red Triangle Oil Co. of Corsicana, has had his big Star rig moved out the past week by E. B. Ramsay, and hopes to be ready this week to spud in on his 1,000 ft. hole contracted on Survey 49.

Some delay has been met with, due to the breaking down of a truck, in getting the Parkersburg rig for J. T. Hare on Survey 1218 ready for operation, but it is expected that everything will be in readiness by next week.

### MCCULLOCH CO. VICTORY LOAN MUST GO OVER

According to figures compiled late yesterday afternoon by County Chairman Evans Adkins, McCulloch county lacks but \$5,450 of going "over the top" with her apportionment of the Victory Loan. The total amount placed upon McCulloch county was \$48,900—certainly a small enough quota. Of this amount, \$53,150 has been raised—most of the subscriptions being by Brady citizens. A few of the communities in the county have made very good showings—some have done very little and others nothing at all.

McCulloch county cannot be allowed to fail in raising her quota, and every patriotic citizen should help, according to his ability.

The campaign will close Saturday night, and McCulloch county citizens should not allow failure to be written over this, their last Liberty Loan quota.

### "FIGHTING PARSON" IS BACK--THOS. P. GRANT

Capt. Thos. P. Grant, better known as Brady's "Fighting Parson," has returned from overseas, and is this week greeting his many friends in and about Brady with the same cheery smile and hearty handshake as of yore. He is looking fine and appears in the best of health and spirits. The Parson is not back permanently—just yet—but he took advantage of a brief leave of absence to visit here. At present he is in the casualty camp at Fort Sam Houston, but hopes to secure his release and discharge from the service at no far distant date. Then—well, everybody hopes then he will come back to Brady and resume his boosting of and for McCulloch county just where he left off when he started out to win his spurs and whip the Kaiser.

Mr. Grant was a member of the famous 90th division, which performed such heroic deeds during the closing days of the war. This division was at Stenay—the farthest advanced point in the enemy lines, at the time of the signing of the armistice. Stenay, by the way, was the headquarters of the German crown prince from which he directed his attack upon Verdun. His division was also in the heavy fighting in the Argonne forest during October and November, when the American soldiers advanced over ground and held and improved their positions—a feat that the French had thrice attempted without success. Nor did they know that the armistice was so soon to be signed. On the other hand, the Germans were aware of the contemplated armistice and had been massed in front of the Americans to hold the line in the hopes of securing more favorable terms in the armistice. With a river at their back and the enemy in front and on both sides of them, the position of the Americans was far from enviable.

### SHULTZ WELL NEAR PAINT ROCK TO BE GIVEN HEAVY SHOT

The Shultz oil company is waiting on nitroglycerin from Brownwood in order to "shoot" its well eight miles southeast of Paint Rock. Oil sands were entered Tuesday at the 3,120-foot level and were penetrated to a depth of twenty-five feet.

On account of the excellent showing, work was stopped at 3,145 feet, and a shell to hold the "soup" was ordered. The diameter of the hole at the bottom is eight inches, which is said to be the largest of any well in this section. This size will permit further drilling to a great depth in case the "shooting" of the well fails to start a paying flow of oil.

Between Shultz No. 2 and the Russell well ten miles north in Runnels county, W. O. Shultz has leased 3,850 acres of Jeff Meers of Brady. Mr. Meers has awarded a drilling contract to a Canadian firm and a test will be spudded in by June 15th.—Brownwood Bulletin, Tuesday.

### MORE RAINS IN MCCULLOCH MAKE "MILLION" AIRES

The rains in McCulloch county the past couple weeks have not only met all the interest as it came due, but promise to take up some of the principal, and put a surplus in McCulloch's treasury besides. The moisture could not have fallen better or more opportunely, and while the oat and wheat yield may not make any millionaires just now—yet there is every indication that McCulloch county farmers will be enabled to put on "million" aires.

Sunday the atmosphere became as hot and oppressive as in mid-July, and a few old-timers allow their hearts to melt and run down in their boots, with the result that they predicted the "beginning of another drouth."

The rain finally came, though. South of Brady along the Mason road a fairly heavy shower fell, and in other parts of the county there was some moisture. Sunday night and early Monday morning about 1-4 of an inch of moisture fell in Brady. The best rain of the week, however, fell early Wednesday morning, the total in Brady being .65 of an inch. No rain fell at Lohn until after 7:00 a. m., when a fine rain was had. In fact, this rain was general over the county.

Early oats and wheat is looking fine, and should make a heavy yield. There was considerable smut in some oats, but it is thought the rain will have washed this out; consequently the benefit will be two-fold. As this is written Thursday, indications are good for still more rainfall.

The Brady Water & Light Works has received and is now installing a 75-horsepower Corliss engine, and expects to have it in operation within the next few weeks. The engine was purchased about three weeks ago by the Board of Trustees, and will be used to carry the day load. Its installation is expected to materially improve the light service.

Wonder, Ore., April 13.  
Editor Brady Standard:  
One of your readers wrote me and wanted to know what kind of a place Wonder is? So I will give them a description of it. I will not describe it as merely a wide place in the road but even more. Wide places in the road are exceedingly scarce in this hilly country. If you travel the public highway from Grants Pass, Ore., to Crescent City, Calif., and come to the nicest looking two-story eight-room residence on the route, and a general merchandise store, an extra wire house beside it, and a post office in the store—that is Wonder. Just thirteen miles from Grants Pass, west, and eighty-two miles to Crescent City on the Pacific coast. We have two mails each day, Sundays and all. One from Grants Pass and one from Crescent City. Have star route delivery and two saw mill crews to supply with mail; also two stations. One railroad station or depot and one stage and hotel station. The railroad station is called "Waters Creek." The old stage stands where they used to change horses before auto trucks came into use where the hotel also is, is called Love's Station, in memory of Mr. Love who established it.

Horses are still in use over the summit of the Cascade range where the snow is yet two feet deep in places. On the Pacific slope on this route stands a forest of the giant redwood trees.

I am sorry to see in the newspaper accounts of the awful and destructive storms in parts of Texas. It seems that one extreme follows another. I certainly hope that McCulloch county may escape disaster of any kind.

"Lots of barley, alfalfa, milo maize and long staple cotton raised here. I am raising 150 acres of long staple cotton this year. Last year the cotton made from 3-4 to one bale per acre and sold at 55c to 60c per pound.

"The dairy business is the leading industry here. Most every farmer has a few Holstein cows. They net \$10 to \$12 each, per month.

"Hope you have a prosperous year."
