

## SMITH & JERGENS SPUD IN DEEP TEST ON SURVEY NO. 42

### SATURDAY SAW SMITH & JERGENS WELL SPURRED IN

The Smith & Jergens well was spudded in Saturday on Survey No. 42, near Duroc, and is running tour steadily. This is the report of Dave Kinsey, field superintendent of the Smith & Jergens Drilling Syndicate, who states further that he hopes (but does not expect) to have the well completed before hot weather sets in so he can hunt some cool k' mate.

The 800 ft. test being drilled by Smith & Jergens on Survey No. 1331 is having trouble with a cave at about 400 ft. but expects to get the hole cleaned up and drilling going again within a few days.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. had its casing to break in two about 200 ft. from the top and 2100 ft. of casing is now in the hole. The crew has succeeded in getting hold of the casing with a spear, but so far have been unable to move it. The shallow well, which has been moved east of the deep test and on the same survey is drilling steadily.

### QUINN WALKER NURSING TWICE-BROKEN JAW AT THE LOCAL SANITARIUM

Quinn Walker is at the local sanitarium, nursing a jaw broken in two places, and a badly dislocated hip. Walker was brought here last Thursday from his ranch near Garden City, where the accident occurred on Wednesday of last week. He had started out from his house, riding a bad horse, and had gone but a short distance, when the animal in pitching threw itself and its rider. As he fell, Quinn was thrown clear of the animal, but it rolled over twice, catching him underneath on the second roll. It seems very likely that the broken jaw bone resulted from kicks of the horse as it got up.

Fortunately assistance was within calling distance, and the injured man was cared for until his brothers, Wiley and L. I. arrived with Dr. McCall, who set the dislocated limb and then brought him back to Brady for treatment of his jaw.

Indications are that he will make a speedy recovery from his injuries, and he is now able to be about once more.

### CAPT. H. W. MCGHEE DIED SATURDAY AT BROWNWOOD

The death of Capt. H. W. McGhee, pioneer citizen of this section, and well known over the state, occurred at 12:40 o'clock Saturday noon at his home in Brownwood. His death was not unexpected, and the members of his family had been summoned to his bedside, Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Malone of this city having been called to Brownwood Saturday morning, and having reached his bedside just shortly before he passed away. His mind was clear early Friday morning, and to his wife, who sat at his bedside nursing him, he remarked that the end was not far off and that he was ready to go. Shortly after he lapsed into unconsciousness, from which he never aroused.

Capt. McGhee was born in Alabama 65 years ago, but came to Texas in his youth. His death removes the last of his immediate family.

Capt. McGhee had spent the greater part of his life in Brownwood, but since coming to Texas, had lived in various other sections of the state for short periods. He came to Brady in 1915 and made his home here for nearly two years, returning to Brownwood in 1917. He was a whole-souled, genial and most likable man, and numbered his friends by his acquaintances. For a number of years he served with the Texas Rangers, during which time he became known throughout the state. Since leaving the ranger service, he had devoted most of his time to the real estate business in Brownwood. Of late years he had retired from active business.

Capt. McGhee was taken ill about nine months ago, suffering terrible agony from Bright's disease. He recovered sufficiently to be up and about for a period of about two months. A week or two ago he was again stricken, and dropsy hastened the end.

Capt. McGhee was married at Fredericksburg to Miss Emma Kysor, and of this union, three sons and three daughters are left with the widow to mourn his loss—Mrs. B. L. Malone of Brady, and Mrs. B. E. Bell, E. W. Harry, Johnny and Miss Margaret McGhee, all of Brownwood.

Capt. McGhee was a member of the Presbyterian church, and also belonged to the Elk and K. of P. lodges. Funeral services were held from the family residence in Brownwood at 10:30 a. m. Sunday, the Rev. R. R. Rives, conducting. The funeral services were attended by a great throng of mourning and sympathizing friends, and the great esteem in which the deceased was held was marked in the many beautiful flowers sent for the occasion.

Mrs. Malone and children expect to remain several weeks with her mother in Brownwood.

All former students are invited, and a large attendance is being anticipated.

The program includes a concert and campus jollification on Friday night. On Saturday forenoon the annual business meeting of the Ex-Students association will be held, at which Mr. J. L. Halbert, of Corsicana will deliver the annual address. At one o'clock the annual dinner will be given in the form of a barbecue. In the afternoon the students of the university will hold their Circus parade, and at night the Circus will be given at Clark Field.

For the first time in history, the entire student body is staying over out of compliment to the returning soldiers. The 14th Cavalry band of Fort Sam Houston, consisting of twenty-six members, will furnish music for the two days, and a flock of aeroplanes will be sent over from Kelly Field to give exhibition flying during the exercises. The War Department has also sent five thousand feet of moving picture films of scenes in which our soldiers are operating in France and Germany.

### PICTURES SHOW WAR AT ITS WORST GRUESOME RELIC

M. C. (Slim) Golden returned Sunday with his same cheery smile as of old, and, if anything, is smiling still more broadly since he is again a private citizen. "Slim" was given his honorable discharge at Camp Bowie on the 20th of last month, following eighteen months' service overseas, and he says it didn't come one moment too soon. In fact, he says the moment he hit France, he decided that no land looked as good to him as the good old U. S. A.

Golden brings back with him some of the most remarkable stories of the war, and some of the most interesting and gruesome relics as well. Following his entrance in the service in July, 1917, he spent a short while at Camp Travis, and then trained for a short while at Fort Jay, New York, before going overseas as a member of the famous 42nd (Rainbow) division, in the Quartermaster's corps. He was also for a time in a B. & C. Co. and while in an Ammunition train helped load the ammunition for the first fighting done by the American soldiers, the ammunition being shipped to Belleau Woods. As a member of the O. M. C. he was not directly at the front, nor so very far to the rear either, and so witnessed the war in some of its most interesting and exciting phases.

He has a series of kodaks which are the most remarkable ever exhibited here. One shows the carcasses of horses, the debris or wagons and equipment—all that was left of a wagon train composed of 80 wagons, 160 horses and 100 men. A bomb dropped in an airplane raid by the enemy in the Champagne sector, practically annihilated the entire train, but six men being left alive. Other pictures show the famous cathedral at Rheims, both before and after being struck by enemy shells and bombs; also the sand bags placed against it to protect it from air raids. The most gruesome of the pictures shows the skeletons of a number of American soldiers, an enemy shell having opened up the grave in which they were buried. Another shows a human skull in an American uniform lying out in No Man's Land. That was all that was left of this American soldier twelve hours after he was killed—the trench rats had picked his body clean to the bones.

Golden says the utmost precaution was taken among the troops, even those far behind the line, to prevent any information of military value leaking out. The soldiers were not permitted to talk about such matters, even among themselves, nor to tell of anything they saw or heard, for fear that spies, always at hand, might give the information to the enemy. He tells of the shooting down of a small enemy scout plane, and the taking of a German pilot only about fourteen years old. Yet this same boy had maps and drawings showing the disposition of both the French and American troops along the line, and which he would have, in the course of a very few minutes, been enabled to turn over to the Germans, had not a fortunate shot brought him and his scout plane to earth. "Doubtless, they would have made it merry for us for a time, had they gotten that information," says Golden.

## CONGRATULATIONS, EDITOR WHITE.

A recent issue of the Brownwood Bulletin contains the announcement of the retirement from ownership in the Brownwood Bulletin of Will H. Mayes, now Dean of the School of Journalism at the Texas university. As acquiring the interests of Dean Mayes are named his brother, Hervey F. Mayes and James C. White. This announcement is of interest to all members of the craft. Hervey Mayes has been at the head of the management of the Bulletin since Will H. first became associated with the school of journalism, and Jim White, in the editor's chair, has been his right hand assistant. ## STREET SPRINKLING.

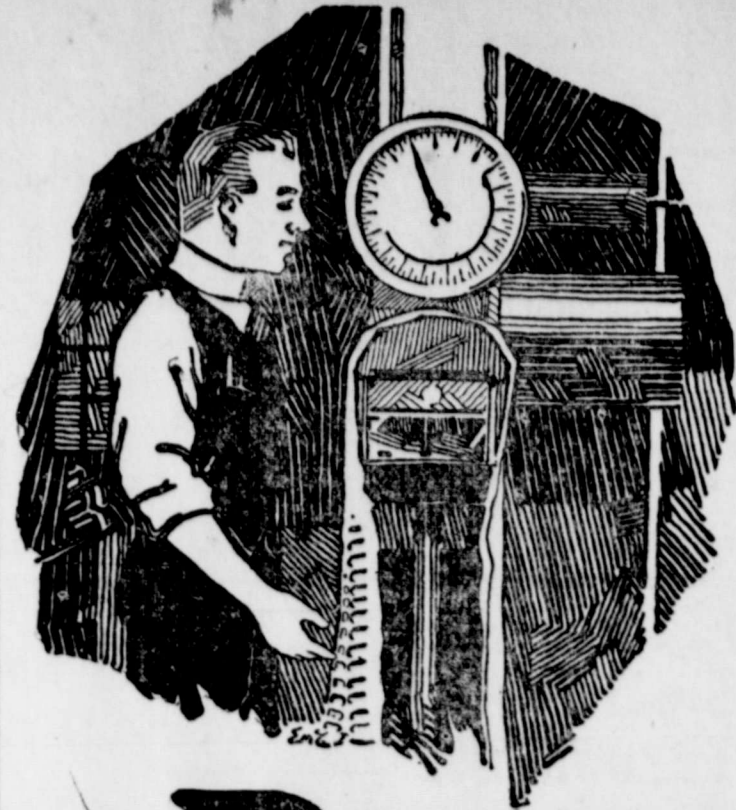

**GREAT SUM SPENT FOR BOYS ON RHINE**

**Y. M. C. A. Turns Loose More Than \$200,000 for Athletic Equipment.**  
More than \$200,000 worth of athletic equipment has been distributed throughout the Third Army in the Rhineland by the Y. M. C. A. athletic department in six weeks for use either in games for recreation or training leading up to championship competitions.  
The "Y" also has assigned 40 athletic directors to duty with this army. Footballs, baseball material, track and field equipment and a great quantity of suits have been supplied.  
In addition to this the Y. M. C. A. has distributed 1,200 sets of boxing gloves in the Third Army and is co-operating with the army officials in the A. E. F. championship contests. Boxing bouts have become almost as popular as theatrical entertainments in the Rhine forces. About 24,000 men attend the six bouts staged weekly by the "Y" at Coblenz and 9,000 the six bouts staged weekly at Neuweid.

**What the Oil Boom Has Done for the Citizens of the Entire West Texas**  
(From the Dallas Times-Herald).

Dallas, Texas, April 16, 1919—The attached is clipped from the financial page of the New York Tribune of the 13th inst. Apparently the statistics were prepared at Austin, Texas:  
"Austin, Texas, April 12.—Statistics compiled of the land acreage in Texas that has been leased for possible oil rights since the discovery of new oil pools in the central western part of the state was first made about a year ago show that the owners have received in cash more than \$1,000,000,000 for leases, and that there are approximately 172,000,000 acres under lease at this time. Nearly all of the land in a group of ten counties in the region where producing fields have been developed has been leased for oil exploitation at prices ranging from \$10 to \$1000 an acre. Estimating the average lease price for the 52,000,000 acres in these ten counties at \$20 per acre, it appears that a total of \$1,040,000,000 has been paid the land owners for the oil rights. Outside of the more or less improved area of the ten counties there have been leased approximately 110,000,000 acres at prices ranging from 25 cents to \$10 an acre. The average price paid on this big acreage was easily \$2 an acre, making \$220,000,000, which is to be added to the \$1,040,000,000, or a total of \$1,260,000,000 that has gone into the pockets of the landowners as a result of the unprecedented oil excitement.  
The owners of the leased lands get one-eighth of the oil that may be produced upon the property. It is estimated that three-fourths of the money that has gone into land leases during the last several months came from outside of Texas, although more recently home people have become active participants in this form of speculation."  
If it is true that landowners have been paid over \$1,000,000,000 for oil rights and that three-fourths of this amount came from outside the state, does it not occur to you that Texas has been greatly benefited by the enormous activity of seekers for oil? Who is responsible for practically all of this activity? The answer is obvious. The despised "wildcatter" cannot successfully deny that he, almost alone is responsible for adding billions of dollars to the wealth of this state. And the best part of the whole thing is that most of the money for leases has gone into the pockets of the drouth stricken farmer of West Texas.  
Just because a few scoundrels in the oil business defraud and deceive people who are hunting for somebody to deprive them of their money is no reason why people, who should know better, should scorn the "wildcatter" who is willing to take a chance.  
There would be no progress in this or any other country if there were no "wildcaters." Those who came to America on the Mayflower were willing to take a chance. They were "wildcaters." George Washington was a prominent "wildcatter" in his day. He located the City of Washington further away from civilization than was pleasing to the conservative citizens of Philadelphia. About fifty years ago nearly all the territory west of the Mississippi was called the "Great American desert;" but pioneers, men and women, who were willing to take a chance—"wildcaters"—loaded schooners and set out for the unexplored west. They made good. The evidence is undisputed.  
The staid, conservative, wise business man who loans money at maximum rates is looked upon as a pillar in the community; but I thank God for the "wildcatter." Instead of being despised and ridiculed he should have honors heaped upon him. Yours very truly,

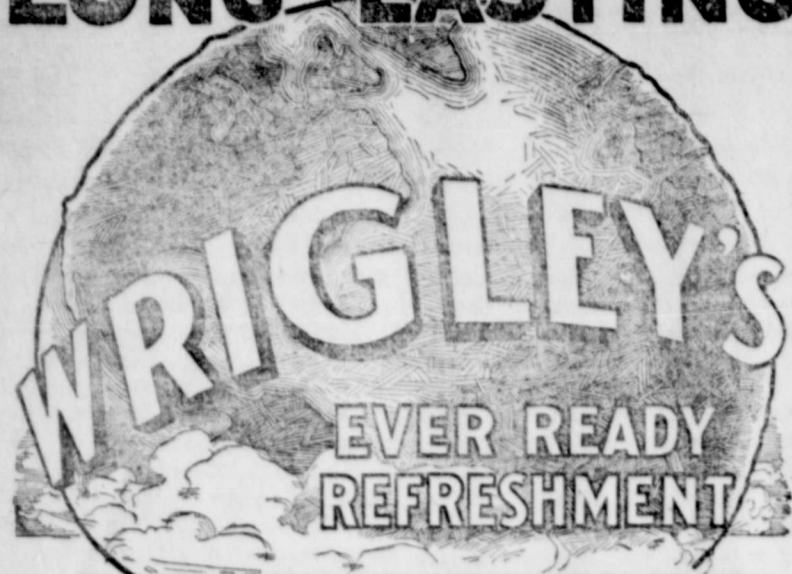
