LEASE SALESMEN AND AGENTS MUST HAVE LICENSE

C. C. Abney, representing A. S. Walker, Internal Revenue agent at Austin, has been in the city this week ascertaining whether all oil lease salesmen and commission agents have proper authority under the federal government to follow their profession. The federal law compels everyone who acts as a broker or commission agent to secure a license, the license for the current year being higher than that of the past year. Also the rate for license varies with the size of the town. Agents and brokers in Brady (less than 5,000 population) are required to pay \$50.00 per annum for a license, or may secure a six months' license at a higher proportionate rate, the charge for such period being \$35. Many who had been selling leases failed to learn of the federal requirements, and are now having to pay for their license. Those who secured a year's license any time during last year, are having to pay an additional fee for the unexpired portion of their 1919 license, to cover the increased government rates for the current year.

NEW TESTAMENT AND PACK CARDS AS LIFE SAVERS

Fate plays some peculiar tricks, sometimes. To owe your life to a copy of a new testament; or again, to have a pack of cards save your life if not entirely a new story, but nevertheless a most interesting one, especially when you know it to be an actual occurrence.

Tom Brown, who returned Monday from overseas service, says he knows these incidents to be true. In the one case, the deadly bullet, which struck a soldier boy in the left breast was turned aside by a copy of a new testament carried in the left hand coat pocket. Another boy had identically the same experience, but in his case, a pack of cards acted as the life-saving device.

Then, again, to grow so thirsty that you would lie down and drink water from the tracks of the soldier who just passed ahead—some gripping story that!

Tom saw 11 months overseas service with C. Co., of the 141st Infantry, 36th Division. He was in all the heavy fighting on the Champagne and Meuse-Argonne fronts, and saw the time when the bullets flew about him so thick, he didn't see how he could possibly escape with his life. He had confidence in his steel helmet, and lay flattening himself out and hugging the earth as tightly as he could, but in spite of that he expected every minute to have a bullet strike underneath his helmet and smash into his face. Another time a machine gun bullet ricocheted off the steel helmet of a companion and burned its way past his face so closely that he could hardly realize he had not been struck. Yet, through it all, Tom returns without a scratch.

On October 8th he went over the top at Champagne, and out of his platoon of 58 men, but 14 escaped without injury. They were sent out to capture Hill No. 213. Needless to state, they did! On the river Aisne they encountered most stubborn resistance. Tom says to never get the idea the Germans weren't fighters, for they were. Nevertheless the 36th Division advanced a total of 21 kilometers (13 1/8 miles), and when they once got the enemy on the run, they retreated so fast that even the allied cavalry couldn't catch them.

The French frequently accused the Americans of wasting ammunition by shooting their machine guns too fast. Tom says the guns were made to shoot that way, and an American machine gun would fire at least a half dozen shots before you could raise your finger after pulling the trigger. He saw one Browning machine gun which had been fired so fast and so furiously that 8 inches had been melted off the barrel.

One of the most interesting of souvenirs brought back with him, was a big clasp knife, measuring 14 1/2 inches in length. The knife was evidently a home-made product of some German soldier. The spring was made from the spring of a hand grenade, used early in the war by the Germans. The handle was made of an elk's horn and the big blade, curved to fit the

A complete program of entertainment and amusement has been arranged, and a good time is being anticipated by all who attend.

Mason is also rejoicing with the soldier boys and their families and friends over their safe return and the return of universal peace, and that place is drawing its share of Brady folks who are anticipating a good time.

RAIN IN BRADY SO FAR FOR THIS YEAR HAS TOTALED 17.25 INCHES

The rainfall in Brady the past month established a record for the year, both in number of precipitations and in total amount of rainfall. All told the rains in June total 8.05 inches, and brought the total rainfall for the year up to 17.25 inches, exceeding the total rainfall of 1917 by five and a half inches, and that of 1916 by over three and a half inches, and lacking but little more than an inch and a half of reaching the total for 1918.

I feel that I must tell you how very much elated I am over my work as teacher of First Aid in the public schools of McCulloch county. Since last February it has been my pleasure to give this work in eight different schools of the county, and I must say that each place where the work has been given the teachers, pupils and patrons were greatly pleased, indeed. I never could tell the many nice things that have been said regarding the work, and the great praise given to the Red Cross chapter for the great opportunity afforded. Out of the eight schools that I have visited there were 180 who took the work and 96 who were awarded certificates. I had in my classes 16 of our rural school teachers and every one of these teachers say that the work is wonderful and something that every boy and girl should have as a part of his or her education.

I truly believe this to be one of the greatest opportunities ever afforded the children of our county, and that we should ever praise the leaders of this great and noble undertaking.

OUTPUT OF ONE BAKERY IN A.E.F. 52,000 LBS. DAILY

What would you think of being employed to work in a bakery whose daily output sometimes reached 52,000 pounds of bread—just 26 tons of the "staff of life?"

That was the experience of Finis F. Westbrook of Brady and Dell Bowers of Hext during their service with Uncle Sam. Speaking of his experiences, Westbrook talked most interestingly and gave a slant on Uncle Sam's activities that is from an entirely new angle.

Westbrook has just returned from a 17 months' service overseas in a bakery company, having arrived at Newport News on the 20th of June, and receiving his discharge on the 27th. Asked if he wouldn't like to secure employment in a local bakery, he said most positively he wouldn't. Maybe his story will give the reason.

While in overseas service, Finis worked in one of the big bakeries whose output frequently reached the astounding figure of 52,000 pounds of bread per day. The baking was done by three shifts of bakers, with 24 men in each shift. During their period of service of nearly a year and a half, his bakery company lost but four of its original numbers.

One of the peculiar and unexplained incidents, was the building and completion of a \$70,000 mess hall, after the armistice was signed. Orders called for the suspension of all contemplated building and improving, after the armistice was signed. Nevertheless, although the work of erecting this mess hall had not been begun and, in fact, only the blue print for the building had been completed, the building was started and completed. Ten thousand soldiers can be fed at one sitting in this mess hall, and electric cars are used to distribute the food about the tables.

The Misses Benson visited in Brady Friday and attended the chautauqua, and I believe got sprinkled on coming home. Ask the girls about that.

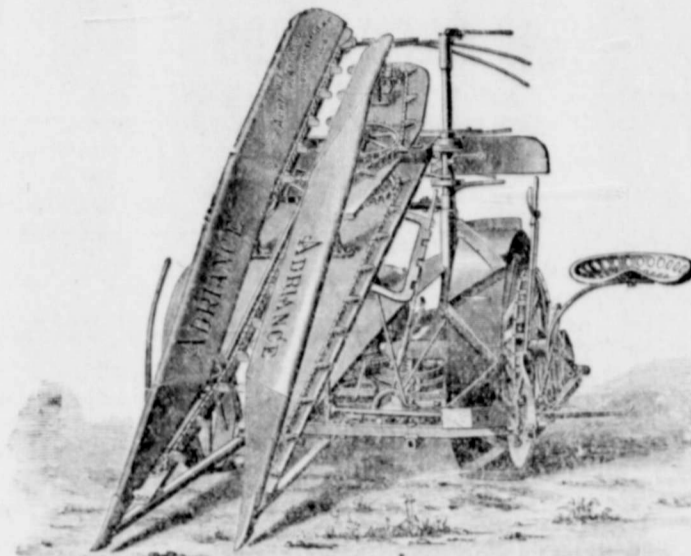

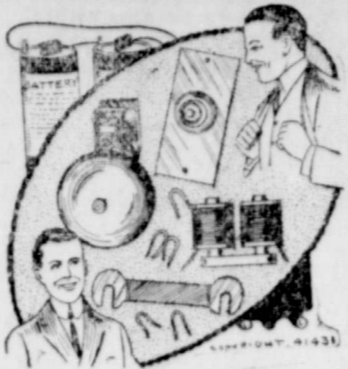


