NO COMPLAINT ABOUT THIS RAIN - FINEST EVER

The weather man appears to be in exceptionally fine humor with the citizens of McCulloch county this year, and is sending weather almost like "the doctor ordered." After a couple weeks of hot, sunny weather, during which the threshers were run day and night garnering the golden grain, and just when the citizenship began to express their wishes for a good rain, he sent a downpour which entitled him to be called a "regular fellow."

According to the rain gauge at the Commercial National bank, a total of three inches of precipitation was had since Saturday night, and the rain is reported general all over this section of Texas. The rain which started Saturday night was an extremely heavy and dashing one, and by Sunday morning had totaled 1.4 inches. Sunday morning another slow, steady downpour was had, with a total precipitation of 1.2 inches. Monday morning .2 of an inch was had, and Monday afternoon another .2 of an inch. Grand total, 3 inches.

The rain was worth countless millions to this section of Texas, and assures the most wonderful corn yield ever had in this territory, while maize, kaffir corn, sudan grass and all manner of feed crops is unexcelled, and the feed crop will be the greatest in history. Cotton, too, has been wonderfully benefited, and although most cotton has been late, it now promises an exceptional growth and fruiting.

The only possible complaint that could result from the rain, would come from those who are threshing their grain. Saturday night's shower did no damage to the unthreshed grain, but the additional rains may possibly have some bad effect, although the promised sunny weather will overcome even this effect.

All in all, it appears that McCulloch county has been awarded a seat among the Elect for the good year 1919.

RUSSELL NO. 2 HAS BEEN SPUDED IN; RUSSELL NO. 1 IS SHOWING MORE OIL

At five o'clock Monday afternoon the bit bit the dirt spudding in Russell oil well No. 2 and drilling is now in progress on full time -- a day and night shift being on duty. Unless accidents prevent drilling there will be no let up or shut down in this well until a four thousand foot hole has been completed or oil in paying quantities found at a depth nearer to the top of the ground.

The Gulf Production Company, should make faster time in their No. 2 well than was made in No. 1. The drillers are better equipped, having on hand complete supply of tools, casing, etc., and using gas from well No. 1 they will not be delayed by fuel.

Increased Production in Russell No. 1.

When told that the San Angelo correspondent to the Dallas News had reported Russell No. 1 as abandoned, Ed Eubanks, foreman on the job, said: "She is showing an increased production. The gas pressure is rapidly increasing and when turned loose we do not know what it might do."

This well has been set with casing and a two-inch pipe controls the gas pressure. Oil continues to "ooze" out around the casing while the gas pipe is carrying gas to the new well, and the gas is being utilized for fuel, light and cooking at the Russell camp.

Sinclair Drilling in Dry Hole.

The Sinclair Gulf Company's well on the Padgett land one mile and a half east of Russell No. 1 has passed the 2300 foot mark and is drilling in a dry hole. This well will go to a depth of 4000 feet unless oil is found before that depth is reached. The log of the Sinclair well is not encouraging when compared with the log of Russell No. 1. First oil and gas was found in Russell No. 1 at 1805 feet. A better flow was found at 1955 feet, and the well is now producing oil and gas at 2290, after being drilled to a depth of 3510 feet and plugged and shot at 2290 foot mark. Drillers and oil scouts are optimistic for greater success in the territory west of Russell No. 1 since the Sinclair well east has failed to make a showing after passing the good logging of the Russell No. 1.

Russell No. 3 Soon to Spud In.

D. G. Lacy is moving the Cain well equipment from San Angelo to the Russell ranch east of Ballinger, where the pegs are down for Russell No. 3. The rig purchased at San Angelo and being shipped to this well is one of the best in the country. The drillers put down over a four thousand foot hole at San Angelo striking salt water at 4200 feet. Russell No. 3 will be spudded in as soon as the machinery can be placed in order.—Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

At the Presbyterian parsonage on last Friday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, Mrs. Clara Millerkin became the bride of Mr. Bart J. Crowley, the Rev. S. H. Jones performing the ceremony.

He has been engaged in oil well drilling for a long number of years, and is accounted one of the best of his profession. Up until recently was engaged in drilling the well of the Texas Oil & Refining Co.

The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Keller of this city, and during her residence here has been a popular favorite with all. For a number of years she has been employed with the Popular Dry Goods Co., where her courtesy and pleasant manners added to her popularity with patrons of the store. In winning her for his bride, Mr. Crowley is to be sincerely congratulated and the best wishes of all their friends carry with them to their new home.

Mr. and Mrs. Crowley left Saturday morning in his car on a honeymoon trip to Kansas City and other northern points, an expect to locate at Eldorado, Kansas, where Mr. Crowley has made his home the past fifteen years or more.

Tarantulas May Be Tropical--But Inhabit Temperate Zones, Too

The Standard's entomological exhibit has been enriched--or enlarged--with a life-size and life-like specimen of tarantula. In fact, our exhibit would indicate that McCulloch county was in the heart of the tropics, as such "bugs" as we show are generally understood to be of tropical origin.

The newcomer was captured alive by Teddy Steelhammer in the Steelhammer home in the southwestern part of Brady. At the time of its capture it was calmly walking up the kitchen wall, and but for its timely imprisonment in a fruit jar, would doubtless soon have been monarch of all it surveyed. In size when spread out it would be about as large as a saucer. As is well known, the tarantula bite or sting is deadly poison--consequently we are keeping the "lid on," and the prisoner may be viewed with entire safety.

Some several weeks ago Thad O. Day while out riding, saw a monster tarantula crossing the road. Thad being guileless and unsophisticated so far as the habits and disposition of tarantulas were concerned, thought it would offer an excellent addition to

The Standard's bugology exhibit. Consequently he stopped his car with the expectation of bagging it with a piece of newspaper. He got a stick and was teasing it a little to see if it was real when another motorist drove along. He stopped and asked Thad if he knew what he was playing with, and when Thad said he had no idea, he was told it was a tarantula, that it was deadly poison and that it could jump at least six feet. Thad desisted instantly from all further attempts to bag his big game, and securing a rock about the size of a small mountain, crushed the inoffensive, but offending spider without delay or regard.

The County Agricultural Department, realizing that "all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," has planned to give an educational outing to all members of the several agricultural clubs for boys and girls in McCulloch county, and if possible Coleman county will join us in this encampment. The purpose of this get-together meeting is two-fold: It will be splendid recreation for the young folks who have been working hard all the spring and summer trying to clean out the crops and harvest the small grain; the instruction that they are to receive will be of untold value to them.

Every farmer who has a child in the club work should make a special effort to have same present for the entire time of the encampment. Several chaperons will be with both boys and girls from the beginning to the last of the trip. Do not fear that your child will not be properly cared for. Every precaution will be taken for their safety and welfare. Arrange a way for them and see to it that they are present. The lecturers will come from College Station and will give instruction relative to the different phases of farm life, and these lectures will be enforced by demonstrations of different kinds; cooking, canning, terracing, and pecan budding are some of the demonstrations to be given. Do not forget the time. The exact location will be determined later, and a letter to each member will announce this.

OATS GRADING WELL - WHEAT IS VERY FINE

More and more are the good reports being had on McCulloch county's grain crop, and from gloom following the excessive and continued rains which came just at threshing time, the spirits of the farmers have risen to the highest degree. More especially now since the rains Sunday and Monday assure a bumper feed crop—not to mention cotton—are the citizens of this section in fine fettle.

While oats is stained, it is grading well, is testing out 28 to 30 pounds to the bushel, and is selling at around 60c in bulk and 64c sacked.

Wheat is exceptionally fine and shows scarcely any damage from the rains. It is testing out 56 to 57 pounds to the bushel and is bringing around \$1.90 to \$2.00 per bushel.

Local shipments so far have totaled something like 35 cars, in the proportion of about 15 cars of wheat to 20 cars of oats. Shipment would have been on in full swing this week, but for the rains Sunday and Monday, which will hinder the movement for several days, or until the cut grain dries out sufficiently to be threshed.

Last Saturday evening J. E. Carlsson and sons threshed out 1300 bushels oats on their place. Their machine has a capacity of 2700 bushels per day, so it will be seen that they were running just about capacity throughout the afternoon.

Among the big yields, Carl Hanson, living in the East Sweden community is reported as having threshed out 60 bushels oats, and 20 bushels wheat to the acre. P. D. Jordan of Lohn so far holds the record for wheat yield, with 32 bushels to the acre.

So far the average yield of wheat is 18 to 20 bushels and of oats, 60 bushels to the acre.

FARM HINTS
By B. D. Black

Now is the time of all times for the farmer to think seriously of the seeds he is to plant later. Seed breeding is a highly profitable business, and why should not the farmers reap the benefit of it? We have lots of good seed in this county now and we must take care of it. The writer is prepared to teach farmers who will get together and study for a few hours how to select seeds and how to improve same. All seeds should be selected in the field where it is grown—not out of the bin.

It is not possible for every farmer to produce his own seeds. He may be able to select and improve one or two kinds, but as a rule it can not be expected of every farmer that he produce all his seeds and seeds of best quality. There should be at least one seed producer of each crop grown in every community where the soil and climatic conditions are the same. This calls for organization of the farmers for one of the most profitable enterprises they can undertake. In the organization men can be elected to grow certain crops for seed—the members elected being men who have been successful in growing some specific crop, and contract with him to purchase from him a stipulated amount at a stipulated price, it being understood that he is to do for them what they have not time to do for themselves, that is, maintain the purity and improve the quality of that particular variety by careful scientific plant growing and seed selection. But it takes organization to do this. Watch for my article on seed selection next week.

Talk organization among yourselves and let's get together and organize large and strong units of agriculture. Those who are cooperating with their fellow workers are the ones who reap results. I plan to thoroughly organize five large communities for real progressive work this summer. Call on me if you are interested. August will be a splendid time to do this.

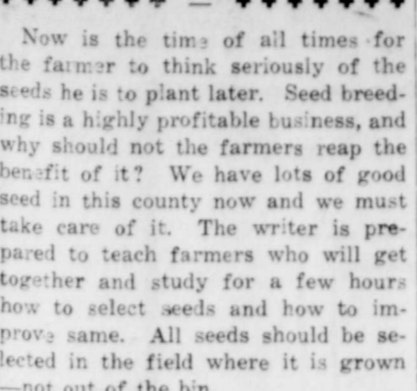

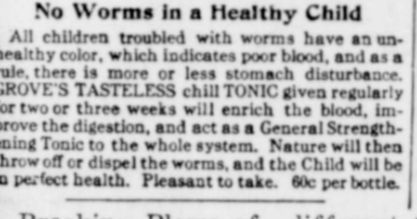

He hopes to receive his discharge by September and at least between now and Christmas, saying that now since it was all over, he was anxious to get back into civil life. Gus is quite an athlete and is one of the best boxers among the marines; consequently it appears they are trying to hold him in the service. While he did not get to go across, he nevertheless had some interesting experiences.
