He was stationed at Great Lakes for a time, but has since been in the overseas transport service. His many friends are glad to greet him once more.

Clifton, who is now at Burlington, Texas, is going to keep posted on the happenings back home now, for John Moore has ordered The Standard sent to his address to enable him to keep up with his old friends and neighbors. It is thought when P. C. reads about the sudden wealth that McCulloch folks are expected to acquire, he will lose all restraint over himself and hurry back into this land of milk and honey.

Miles states that the finest crops he has seen were right here in old McCulloch. In the San Marcos neighborhood they have one of the finest corn crops ever enjoyed, but their cotton crop has been virtually destroyed by the boll worm.
